Arrests made after Monday manhunt

Deputies grab up suspect in chase, plus two more in search

ARGYLE - A Burlington man has been arrested in connection with a chase and hunt that took place near Argyle Monday morning.

Lee County Sheriff's deputies attempted to pull over a stolen F250 truck out of Des Moines Monday morning and the driver led police on a chase through central Lee County at speeds exceeding 100 mph, before ditching the truck in a creek bed and taking off

According to the release, on Tuesday the sheriff's Criminal Investigations Division, The Lee County Narcotics Task Force, and the Lee County Joint Special Response Team executed a search

warrant in the 2400 block of 340th Street where they believed the suspect was located.

As a result they recovered a second truck stolen out of Hancock County and a trailer that was stolen with

A resident at the address, David Alan Londrie was taken into custody and charged with two counts of theft. Law enforcement officers also arrested Michael Joe Spring on an outstanding warrant for providing

false information.

At about 6:30 p.m. law enforcement responded to the 2900 block of 180th Avenue where a call had come in about a suspicious male who matched the description of the suspect from Monday, was being detained by citizens.

The male was identified as Scot Andrew Flora, 50, of Burlington, and officials allege that Flora was the man driving the stolen vehicle and eluding officers on Monday.

Flora has been charged with aggravated eluding and felony theft. He was taken to the UnityPoint Emergency Room in Keokuk for possible dehydration.

Weber said the case is still under investigation and more charges could be filed. Weber also extended a thank you to the citizens involved in helping bring Flora into custody.

Forestry field days planned across region

AMES, Iowa - Iowans interested in the care of trees, forests and natural resources should consider attending a forestry field day this fall, held by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach and various public and private partners.

Topics will include how to manage a forest for profit, water quality, wildlife and the aesthetic value of trees. Additional topics will include forest establishment, tree protection and invasive species control, herbicide use, forest products, portable

sawmills, timber marketing and the legal aspects of forestry.

"Trees, woodlands and forests are often vastly under-utilized by Iowa landowners," said Billy Beck, assis-

Dutch graduated from Searsboro High School in 1938 and attended Central College for two years before joining the Army three days before Pearl Harbor. He received his commission as

a 2nd Lieutenant on November 19, 1942, and married the great love of his life on November 23, before leaving for the South Pacific where he served in Australia and New Guinea with the 32nd Infantry Division. Dutch received a disability retirement August of 1944 as a result of his service in New Guinea.

He graduated from Iowa Teachers College in 1947, and did his graduate work at Drake University. During his thirty-seven years in education, he served as a principal, coach and classroom teacher at Monmouth, Greeley, Searsboro and Truso. His last thirty-five years were spent at Farmington High School and Harmony High School as a classroom teacher and drama director until his retirement in 1982.

Dutch regular attended the United Methodist Church in Farmington. Dutch and Margaretta directed the Van Buren Ministries production of "The Last Supper" for twenty-one years and sixty performances until her death in 2007. Dutch and Marg loved music and performed local duets in many churches throughout their lives.

A Celebration of Life for Dutch will be held at 2:00 p.m Sunday, September 15, 2019, at the Farmington United Methodist Church.

Burial will be at a later date.

Joe Thomas Smith, 90 of Beloit, WI died Monday, September 9, 2019 at The Suites Hospice facility in Beloit, WI.

He was born June 23, 1929 in Canton, MO the son of Frank William and Emma A. (Alderton) Smith. He was raised by his step-mother, Leta Smith, and his father following his mother's early death.

Joe grew up in Canton and attended school there. Following his graduation from High School, Joe attended Culver Stockton College in Canton, MO and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Physics in May of 1951.

Following college graduation, Joe answered the call of his country and entered the United

States Marines in 1951. He served in Korea during the Korean War as an Electronics and Radio Repair Mechanic II. He received his honorable discharge in August



of 1953 with the rank of Corporal. He was awarded the Korean Service Medal with two Stars and the United Nations Service Medal.

On September 3, 1961 Joe wed Catherine E. (Betty) Hickey at St. Peters Church in Keokuk. After the wedding he and Betty made Beloit their permanent home. While living in Beloit, Joe and Betty became lifelong friends with George Porter, George's wife, Kate, and their children. Joe and George spent hours discussing most everything under the sun, especially the Chicago Bears football team Theirs was one of those special friendships that not only endured over time, it grew stronger.

Joe began employment at Fairbanks-Morse in Beloit Wisconsin in 1953, working in the Diesel Engine Testing Laboratory. During his time with Fairbanks he traveled extensively doing engine data collection on remote engine installations. His work took him to several South American countries, Greenland, and on US Navy submarines at sea. He retired from Fairbanks after thirty-seven years of service on June 30, 1991 as their Chief Instrumentation Engineer.

He was a long-time member of the American Legion Post 41 in Keokuk. He is survived by his sister, Emma Ruth Ayers of Painted Post, NY, nieces and nephews including Steve (Cindy) Ayers of Canton, MO, Diana Ayers of Bath, NY, Donna Ayers of Raytown, MO, Paul (Blanca) Ayers of Conway, AR, Debbie (Kevin) Carr of Nutley, NJ, Tim (Rita) Hickey of Montrose, Mike (Karen) Hickey of Keokuk, Mary (Dennis) Blickhan of Keokuk and Chris (Kevin) Blind of Solon, IA.





Fort Madison girls drop first two conference matches

Hounds struggle with errors, BHS' size at the net

FORT MADISON – The Fort Madison girls volleyball team dropped it's second straight conference match Tuesday night on the road to Burlington, 17-25, 16-25, 21-25.

Head Coach Kent Bailey said the Grayhounds size and success at the net gave the Bloodhounds trouble offensively and defensively.

"We went up against a good, athletic team in Burlington. Their height and ability to get above the net

caused our hitters problems.," he said. "We continue to struggle with hitting errors having 25 against 13 for Burlington."

Fort Madison had a hitting efficiency of just 61% going 46 of 75 with senior Jillian Wiseman leading the way going 19 of 24 with 10 kills.

The Hounds serving was much more efficient at 98% missing just one serve on the night. Lauren Bailey led the way for FMHS going 13 of 13 with three aces. The junior also led the Lady Hounds with 14 assists, which were the only assists on the night for any Fort Madison

Nadia Boeding had 15 digs from the back row to lead Fort Madison defensively.

"I give Burlington a great deal of the credit for our hitting errors. They put up a good block against our hitters who began to press a bit," Bailey said. "We will keep working hard and things will start to come around as our players get a feel for what the others can do."

Bailey said things don't get easier for Fort Madison as they travel to Linn Marr on Saturday and play Linn Marr, Tipton, and Center Point Urbana in their pool, before bracket play begins.

Burlington senior Angel Baylark was 22-25 hitting with 17 kills helping control the front line. Junior Madison Burton dug up 35 shots and was 14 of 17 serving to lead BHS in both categories. The Grayhounds are 4-1 on the year and are 2-0 in the conference. Their only loss was a 5-set affair with West Burlington back in

Fort Madison is now 2-6 on the year and 0-2 in Southeast Conference action.







unique perspectives on area sports.

"I want to inform and entertain our listeners on local, state, regional, and national sports and I welcome listener feedback," O'Hara said.

Pen City Current co-owner and editor Chuck Vandenberg said the first-week run has been a different hat to wear, and is a bit outside his wheelhouse.

"You can give the platitudes to the talent. These guys get along, they have a nice rhythm and good banter and aren't afraid to test each other a bit," Vandenberg said.

"But this I.T. stuff...I'd rather not," he laughed. Vandenberg said the first show featured HTC head volleyball coach Melissa Freesmeier who talked about the 2018 state runner-up Crusaders and how 2019 is shaping up. Joe Merschman of Merschman Seeds also showed up and talked about Iowa sports and fall ag news.

Numbers were surprisingly good for the first show, but Vandenberg said the stream didn't podcast so it's lost "in cyberspace". The second show with Big Ten analyst Shelley Till on Tuesday also was lost after its initial airing, and the third show, with Fort Madison Head Football Coach Derek Doherty had dead time at the beginning due to a technical "oversight" but fortunately the interview itself did archive and is available on the website (click on the promotional banner at the top of the page).

Bohnenkamp said he was intrigued by the show and is excited about its future.

"I want to bring a daily show with the best questions and answers with the top area sports personalities," Bohnenkamp said.

Vandenberg said some listeners may have logged on to listen and either couldn't find the podcast or heard dead air at different times.

"Yeah, we tripped over our tail a bit in launching as we were dealing with a pretty new system, but we think we've got most of the bugs worked out and we're geared up for a great weekend of shows," he said.
