Kempkers expands with Huxley acquisition

Third generation handles purchaseof new location

FORT MADISON - The 3rd generation of Kempker's True Value & Rental put their mark on the family brand just before the holidays when they expanded the family business by one, with the addition of a location in Huxley, Iowa.

Jason and Dustin Kempker handled the purchase of the fifth location under the Kempker's True Value &



Rental brand with the purchase of Hardware Hank's location owned by the same couple for the past 33 years.

Huxley is a small, growing community of about 3,500 people nestled between Ankeny and Ames just out-

side the Des Moines metroplex, but inside the Ames metropolitan area. It's located on Hwy. 69 just west of Interstate 35.

"This was the first time where mom and dad kind of stepped back and let the Dustin and Jason do the work," said Chuck Kempker owner and operator of Kempkers True Value & Rental, Inc. Chuck is a second generation hardware man, learning from his dad, Bob Kempker who started the business in 1969 in Fort Madison.

Since that time, the Kempkers have acquired locations in Mt. Pleasant, Burlington, and Grimes, in addi-

 ${f B}$ ecause of Donald Kaul, I'm a columnist today. Donald Kaul was a columnist for the Des Moines Register and Tribune back in the sixties and seventies. I was an English Major at Iowa State University, living in a roach infested apartment on Lincoln Way in Campus Town. My roommates and I would start the day off by skipping class, nursing hangovers, drinking coffee at the L-Way Cafe and discussing Kaul's column, "Over the Coffee." I told them then, "I can do this." They said, "Go ahead."

So I did. I wrote my first weekly column in Windsor, Colorado in the late eighties, early nineties. It was in the Windsor Beacon and occasionally the Greeley Tribune and Ft. Collins Coloradoan. It was called, "True Story."

When my family and I moved back to Iowa in the late nineties, I resurrected the column, this time called, "Empty Nest," because our kids were off to college. At first Empty Nest was only in the Mt. Pleasant News but eventually coverage expanded to twenty Iowa newspapers. The greatest compliment I have ever received is that I, "Write like Donald Kaul."

Preliminary county budget \$1.5M short

MONTROSE - A short budget workshop on Friday resulted in some tough projections for the upcoming fiscal year budget.

According to Lee County **Budget Director Cindy** Renstrom, the county's preliminary budget for fiscal year 2018-19 shows a shortfall of just over \$1.5

million. The county is projected to carry a general fund balance of close to \$10 million at the end of the year, but current figures will have that carry over at just \$7 million as presented. However the CPC Mental Health Services fund the county carries is being required by the state to be spent down, so that department is showing a \$1.5 million shortfall for the spend down. The department is

headed by Ryanne Wood. Lee County Chairman

that was not the direction the county needed to go and all department heads needed to be at Tuesday's workshop following the board's regular meeting. He also outlined some possibilities for cutting the budget, but said the ideas were just discussion items and nothing he was ready to move forward on.

Some of the items Don Hunold told the board Hunold suggested included a wage freeze for county employees, having employees pay more for their health coverage, having all county employees outside of the sheriff's department reduced to 35 hours per week, looking at increasing employee contributions to health insurance, a review





Third generation of hardware family takes reins in Huxley

tion to the newest Huxley acquisition. That location opened under the Kempker's umbrella on Dec. 13.

"This is a smaller growing community and that business there was very well maintained by the family that owned it and the boys had been looking at for some time," Kempker said. "We've never put reigns on the kids so we said if they wanted to go for it we'd back 'em 100%."

Dustin said Jason had a friend in the area who knew the store was for sale and the two had been looking at it.

"All of a sudden it became real, but we had to let the dust settle on a few other things. We've all been in True Value together so it seemed like it could be pretty seamless for us," Dustin said.

"This has been a true, blue mom and pop hardware store for 35 years. They were both involved

in the business there every day so it has a good customer base."

Dustin said the town just built a Fareway Grocery similar to the Fort Madison Fareway Grocery and is in growth mode.

"There's a ton of growth and opportunity here. The towns right between Ankeny and Ames and that whole Des Moines metro area is right there, too."

He said the future of hardware is good because of neighborhood hardware stores like the ones in the Kempker family. Being able to withstand big box stores and the internet is demonstrated in the success of the neighborhood locations.

"It's hard to do hardware online. Shipping hardward just isn't easy. It hasn't caught on because people like that service aspect and want to be able to ask questions," he said.

Chuck Kempker agreed,

saying hardware has been able to withstand the larger discount stores and Amazon because of the personal service you get in the aisles of the local stores.

Jason Kempker said part of local hardware success in an Internet world is that you can't wait for days to have something shipped to fix a problem.

"It's the plumbing issues, the electrical issues. You can't wait two days on some of those problems," he said. "Some of those things need to be done right away and that's what we're here for. Especially the weather - in real cold years you have pipes that freeze. Everything in the hardware business right now, the Internet hasn't created an answer for."

He said the rental part of the business is the probably the biggest opportunity for the Huxley location because former

owners Steve and Ann Quick didn't offer that business.

"This will be our core hardware and rental business. It's an 8,000 square foot facility and we definitely look to see the rental business being something we can grow."

Jason attended Iowa State University in Ames and said traveling up and down Hwy. 69 going to campus he always had in the back of his mind, that "nice little hardware store in Huxley".

"If Grimes didn't work out, I always thought that would be a nice addition, but fast forward after the Grimes acquisition and the Quicks were still looking to sell," he said.

He said his parents handled the negotiations for the Grimes store, but he was involved in the discussions and observed how that process works.

"I think it went great," he said. "We did the discovery and negotations and all the fun stuff that comes with that."

Steffensmeier knocks off No. 2 (or No. 1) wrestler

Named Co-Outstanding Wrestler at Ed Winger Classic

URBANDALE - A Bloodhound wrestler was named Co-Outstanding wrestler at the Ed Winger Classic in Urbandale after taking down one of the top wrestlers in the state at 152 lbs. Senior Harlan Steffensmeier reached the championship match against Grant Stotts, of West Des Moines Valley on Saturday, and depending on which ranking publication you prefer, Stotts was either No. 1 or No 2 in the state. Steffensmeier won the match 5-4 after a late take down in the final period. <u>IAwrestle.com</u> had Stotts as the top-ranked wrestler at 152 lbs, but the Predicament had him ranked behind Cayd Lara of Fort Dodge at No. 2. Steffensmeier was ranked 4th in both publications.

"It was a barn burner," Head Coach Ryan Smith said Saturday night. "Harlan got taken down and escaped in

"That guy was rated No 1 or No. 2 in the state depending on where you look, but he's a tough dude. He won state as a sophomore."

Smith said he couldn't remember the last time a Fort Madison wrestler was named outstanding or co-outstanding wrestler and said he was going to have to look at the books and see when the last time Fort Madison had a champion at the Urbandale meet.

With just three weeks remaining before the run to state begins, Smith said this should give Steffensmeier more confidence going into regional and state action.

County Department heads asked to trim back 2018-19 budgets

of all major projects, and the possibility of stopping driver's licenses services in Lee County.

Renstrom said the county isn't mandated to provide driver's license services.

Denise Fraise, the county auditor told Hunold if there

was going to be a reduction in hours, it should be done for all departments. Fraise had recommended in her budget that all employees work 40 hour work weeks, Most employees in the county treasurers, recorders, and auditor's office work 35 hours a week currently.

"I'm gonna stop you right there," Fraise said. "If you do that, I think your other departments should be doing that too then. Just to be fair to all the employees in the offices." Hunold said he wasn't saying that was out of the question.

"From a service point, that's going to be kind of tough. But I don't want anything off the table yet."

Matt Pflug said the county could look at those options, but insurance premiums is something he'd

like to keep where they are.

"Our goal has always been to offer a competitive insurance plan which we have," he said. "I guess you could always have the discussion of should they being paying more out of their pocket. I think if we can continue to do it, that would be fine."

"If we can continue to do it," Ron Fedler said. "If we have the funds to continue to do it."

Right now county employees pay \$95 per month for their share of a single policy.

"Looking at the new fund balance going on the re-estimated budget we show that were spending \$2.99 million more than we're bringing in, but you take out Ryanne's, she needs to get her fund balance down, so we don't want to mess with hers."

"We're not going to solve this today," Hunold said.
"Tuesday we'll invite them all in to a workshop and tell them this is where we're at. Go back and do some more work and come back and see us again and then we'll take a look at where we're at and if we still have a ways to go, we'll look at the other options."

Supervisor Gary Folluo said all department heads need to go back and see where they can cut.

"We need to tell them to take last year's budget and put pencil to paper and see how close they can get to that budget," Folluo said.

The Board of Supervisors will meet again on Tuesday morning with a workshop to follow where the budget issue will be discussed with all department heads.

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

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Kaul was writer who inspired Empty Nest

ter. Kaul is in his early eighties and dying of cancer. This is my eulogy to Donald Kaul.

In addition to his column, Kaul is also known for, along with Register Journalist, John Karras, founding RAGBRAI, the Register's Annual Great Bike Ride Across Iowa, or, "Midwestern Woodstock on two wheels." Kaul, a character if there ever was one, made famous another character on that first RAGB-



RAI, Clarence Pickard. At 83-years old, and wearing a pith helmet, Pickard liked to keep fit by riding a bicycle in case he ever, "had to chase a hog."

I rode RAGBRAI three times in my early sixties. Like Kaul, who tapped out daily RAGBRAI stories on a portable typewriter, at a kitchen table, while surrounded by sweaty riders, I too pecked out daily RAGBRAI stories at a picnic table, on a laptop, while surrounded by spandexed riders, and emailed the stories to the Mt. Pleasant News. "How can you write in all this noise?" I was asked. "Huh?" I said.

Unlike Kaul, who was an unabashed agnostic, I'm a devout Christian. At his height, he was syndicated in 150 newspapers. I write for free in twenty. He wrote a lot about politics, Nixon, the Viet Nam War, the 18-year old vote, Sunday beer sales, the NRA, handguns, vitamin C, and Watergate. I, for the most part, stay away from politics and stick with human-interest stories, my favorite subject lately being our chickens, which is avian interest.

In Kaul's day, girls' high school basketball was still six-on-six and Kaul loved to poke fun at the sport. In his words, "I was once hired by a radio station to do color commentary for the broadcast of a game, but I came down with laryngitis and lost my voice. So they let me do the play-by-play." He also loved to poke fun at Ankeny, Iowa, one of the fastest growing, most expensive Iowa cities (towns) to live in at the time. "Where is Ankeny?" he would write. Kaul could easily have been a character in

While Kaul wrote as many as five columns a week, I write one. People ask me how I can write one column a week, week-after-week. I would like to ask Kaul how he could write five columns a week. He has compared being a columnist to being married to a nymphomaniac. "It can be a thrilling and even ecstatic exercise, but there's no respite from it."

Note: In the creative writing class that I'm teaching, one of the students also attributes his penchant for writing to Donald Kaul.

I'm sad that Donald Kaul is dying. Maybe this year's RAGBRAI can be dedicated to him. I also hope this column I'm writing can find its way to his bedside. I owe it all to you, Donald Kaul.
