FMHS boys 3rd, girls 6th at Anamosa Invite

Steffensmeier 2nd overall in boys race

ANAMOSA - The Fort Madison boys and girls varsity cross-country teams got a look at some different runners over the weekend and still put three runners in the top five.

Aaron Steffensmeier had one of his best finishes of the year taking second place in the 5K run with a 17:36 time just :21 off the leader Will Dehaan from Central DeWitt.

Dayne Cordray who has been finishing right on Steffensmeier's heels for most of the season, finished in 10th place with a 18:05 time, which had the Hounds in 2nd place through the top 10, but the next Hound to finish was Nathan Steffensmeier at 23rd with 19:06 mark to give the Hounds a third place finish

Scoring takes the top five finishers for each team so the last two to figure in the scoring were Elton Kruse at 26 with a 19:12 time and Noah Sissel at 33rd

finishing the run at 19:25. Owen Kruse finished in 35th place and Miguel Trejo finished in 48th place.

"Our boys continue to run very well. Aaron and Dayne have been very solid all season and the rest of the boys are following their lead. I have been impressed. Our girls are running well too and continue to to improve," said boys and girls head coach Brian Mendez.

Sierra Howardson took third in the 5K run with a 19:58, 40 secs off the pace. Brett Schneider came in fifth place with a 20:47 time, which when factoring in how cross-country meets are scored, put them in first place for about two minutes and 20 seconds.

The next FMHS runner to finish the event was Elizabeth Miller who took 31st place with a 23:10 time. Claire Mendez finished in 38th place with a 23:34 time. Ashlynn Haas rounded out the top five finishers for the Bloodhounds with a 49th place finish at 24:48 giving the Hounds a total of 126 points behind Monticello, Anamosa, Solon, Cascade and Central DeWitt.

Miho Shiria finished in 56th place and Lauren King took 58th to round out the places for the Hounds.

Josh Barr finished in 13th place in the 11th grade run with a 23:58 time.







appointment where our daughter had been poked and prodded for about 3 hours checking all her blood levels not even a year after her diagnosis. She had to take an injection of insulin before eating. She doesn't have to do that now thanks to advances in technology, a pump does it for her. But at that time, she discreetly did it under the table. A woman sitting across the way noticed the injection and came over and told us she was offended that our daughter would do that at the table.

I told the lady to go back to her table. My wife lost... her... mind. The ready-for-jail - like lost her mind.

Those of you that know Lee know her to be extremely mild-mannered. She exploded. We removed ourselves from that situation, but it's something that at the time, I thought, this is who we are? We're this self-consumed and cold that this could happen in Iowa?

The restaurant went above and beyond their role in the ordeal and several people came over and apologized. Two weeks ago when we attended the game and the crowd

waved and those children and families waved back, I thought about that moment. In a flash of cheers and smiles and tears, I thought of my daughter who was sitting over in the student section of the college that she's wanted to attend since she was a kid.

These children are battling for their lives up there with diseases and conditions more critical than Type 1 Diabetes, and one can't help but think that kind of human emotional energy is having some kind of impact. It's palpable. You can fill it on your skin. ESPN hangs out over the first quarter deciding not to make money with commercials, but to show America what's happening in Iowa.

National news networks have been carrying and commenting on the new tradition. On the way up to Iowa City Saturday afternoon, I suggested to my wife that Kinnick can never get away from it. She said they should never, ever stop doing it. It should happen forever. Short of moving that stadium or that hospital these kids get a wave of love and support about six times a year from 70,000 people.
