# **County Republicans showcase** candidates at annual banquet

Reichman says Lee County is "Open for Business"

FORT MADISON -Three candidates up for election on Nov. 6, told **Republicans Saturday** night that the state is headed in the right direction.

At Saturday's annual Lee County Republican banquet, candidates Jeff

and Kim Reynolds have brought the state back from disaster.

Reichman, of Keokuk, said Lee County is open for business. He's seeking to fill the District 84 State Senate seat currently being held by Jerry Kearns, a seat that Republicans haven't had for three decades.

"At the state level, one of the key jobs will be to advocate for Lee County and let people know that Lee County is open for business," Reichman said. "The president started this and it was great to see that. He was at Grant City at one of the steel mills and talking about bringing back the man-

ufacturing jobs that the last president said were gone and weren't coming back. They are coming back."

Reichman, who's a veteran of the U.S. Marine Corp, said he had to have his arm twisted a little to run. He grew up in Ke-

### Loebsack says Congress should stay in session

Gehle takes five golds at junior nationals

FMHS grad just eight days away from Barcelona in Cerebral Palsy World Games

FORT WAYNE, Ind., - A Fort Madison man has wrapped up two more gold medals in a series of junior national paralympic games in Fort Wayne, Ind.

Caleb Gehle, 18, was coming off two gold medals and



two silver medals Wednesday and Thursday and then wrapped up the Adaptive USA Junior Nationals with wins in the 100- and 400-meter wheel chair races Friday.

The event finished just eight days before Gehle and his family head to Barcelona, Spain to compete in the Cerebral

Palsy World Games Aug. 5-12 with TeamUSA. Gehle said the competitions at these events are

broken down into specific categories and the classifications allow people with similar disabilities to compete against each other instead of being lumped into one group.

"The nice thing about these competitions is that they're separated into different classes including spina bifida, cerebral palsy and amputee," he said. "We're not all lumped together, like at state where someone may have an unfair advantage over someone else."

At the Iowa State Track meet, where Gehle competed during his years at Fort Madison High School, all athletes with disabilities compete in the same events with boys and girls being the only classifications used. "I like the competition here. "It's a very friendly environment, where as in Des Moines everyone's kind out for themselves." On Wednesday, Gehle heaved the shot 17'-5.75" which was about two and half feet further then Matthew Tomaino who through 14'- 9". Tomaino then beat Gehle in the javelin and discus events. Gehle threw the discus 29'-9", to Tomaino's 34'-10" and then took silver in the javelin with a throw of 25' compared to

# Former Sterzings owners think newest chips "have got it"

BURLINGTON - It's been a long summer for Craig Smith and the iconic Sterzing's brand potato chip.

After the Food and Drug Administration implemented a phasing out of oils containing trans fats in 2015, the writing was on the wall and changes were coming.

There rarely is a potluck, picnic or party in the region that won't showcase the familiar redand-pale yellow bags with the salty and snappy chip that Iowans and beyond have been snacking on for almost eight decades.

But then the chip maker ran out of inventory of the original oil used to make the chips and had to transition into the new transfat free cooking agent.

According to Sterzing Food Co. President, Craig Smith, that's where trouble began. But...better news may be on the horizon.

Smith said the company's food scientists have been tinkering with the

formula for a good portion of the year trying to find ways to abide by the new regs, but get close to the original flavor and texture that loyal customers were accustomed to.

"We started out with this new formula and it appealed to a lot of people, but didn't resonate with our loyal fan base," Smith said Friday morning. "Our focus was on the taste and the mouth feel and texture and that has taken a long time."

But he said Friday the newest tweaks have resulted in a chip that just may be worthy of the customers looking for that original Sterzing chip.

"I had a bag in the hands of the previous owners and they said, 'We think you got it," Smith said. "That's as high a regard as I can ask for."

That family included the daughters of Dutch Duttweiler, who bought the business in 1959 from Barney Sterzing. Sterzing started the company in 1933 as an off-shoot from his candy business and, when sugar rationing took place during WWII, Smith said Sterzing dumped the candy portion of the business and turned his focus to making a chip that has been in high demand regionally and regularly shipped across the nation. After an inter-family sale of the company to Duttweiler's daughters, Smith and current Chief Financial Officer Gary Schmeiser purchased the company

in 2011.

In May, the company held a chip-tasting at Community Field in Burlington and got mixed reactions and went back to the drawing board. The chip at that time had a feel and texture that would be considered a "kettle" chip, with a heavier crunch. Smith said a lot of people liked the new offering, but it was, and still is, the company's goal to do everything possible to get back to the original taste and composition of a Sterzing potato chip.

He said it's difficult to just implement change because the production process requires a lot of inventory of potatoes, oil, and salt and you have to work through those inventories, while making minor adjustments to the recipe based on what customers are saying. "Once you buy the oils

# Avid customers still craving original flavor profile

and potatoes, you have to go through the process and it's getting a lot better, but we're not sure if we're there yet or not," Smith said. "We're waiting for this latest blend to get out in full supply and see what customers are saying."

If this version of the chip fares well with critics, Smith said the company will probably do another launch and maybe do some social media to encourage everyone else to get a bag and, well....Tri-Some.

He said the company didn't want to do another fullon roll-out until they were getting responses that were more favorable to the original recipe.

"We didn't want to put out a brand new product and say 'here it is, take or or leave it," he said. "Our continued goal is to mimic that original product. We didn't want to find ourselves in the repeated position of having customers buying a bag and it would be different, and then it would be different again, and different again. That's very frustrating."

### BTW.... it was always gluten free

Smith said the company made an "interesting" marketing decision when they started labeling the bags "Gluten-Free".

"What people didn't realize is that it was always gluten free. We were getting dozens of calls each week asking us if we had gluten in them. We put that on our bags to make it very clear, but there's never been gluten in our chips. After people started seeing things change, we had lots of calls from people telling us to put the gluten back in," he said with a laugh.

In what is probably the clearest picture of the demand for the original Sterzing, Smith said customers desperate for that one-of-a-kind flavor were suggesting tongue-in-cheek, that the company get their oil on the black market and sell the chips that way.

Short of that, Smith said customer reaction to the most recent recipe blend that is in production now has been favorable and that blend is in production and hitting stores currently. He's waiting for responses to how they set up in the bag and then if things are still on the right track a promotional period may begin.

"We're gonna load the market up and hopefully start hearing some better comments," he said "We're not responding publicly or through social media because there are so many comments and I just don't like to address naysayers. When we're there we're gonna talk about it."

### What about the Kettle-style?

Smith said the company has discussed keeping it as an option because many did enjoy the chip. It just wasn't the original Sterzing and that is ultimately the product they are looking for. He said the company has the equipment to continue to make that product as well as do some flavorings, but all that is on the back burner until people respond positively to the regular Sterzings.

"We're slow at making change. It took us 80 years to learn how to make popcorn," he said. "But it's always been fun making chips," he said.

He asked customers to hold on and keep trying the product as that's the best way for the company to know how the chips taste.

"Be patient with us and understand it is our goal to continually move to our original product," he said. "Through our discoveries, we're finding steps we can take to get there. It's simple to say 'do this and you'll have that', but trying to match our original oil has been more difficult than we anticipated. From our testing now, we are very close we believe. At some point we'll have to say this is where we're at for a while, so customers know they will get the same product. The problem with that is that we're still moving through the processes."

# Mitchell says state is going in the right direction

okuk and graduated from Southeastern Community College before joining the Marines. He moved back into the area five years ago and said he was concerned by what he saw on Keokuk's Main Street.

"I was driving down Main Street with mom and wondered if I had been living with rose-colored glasses on, or if things had gone down hill that fast," Reichman said.

"You can get \$300 million per year in Lee County's economy," Reichman said. "We need to start building this county back up and take advantage of this turn we're having right now with bringing some of these manufacturing jobs back."

Lee County Republican Chairman Martin Graber said Kearns probably did the Republicans a favor by not running again, but he's endorsed Fort Madison's Jeff Kurtz for the seat.

"Jerry Kearns probably did us a favor by retiring. He's endorsed his successor, but if you have been to any debates and listened to what he thinks and believes and what his issues are - he doesn't talk about jobs too soon and he doesn't talk about making the state better," Graber said.

Joe Mitchell, fresh off a graduation this spring from Drake University, is trying to win Dave Heaton's 84th district State Rep. seat. Both Heaton and Kearns have said they will not seek re-electhat won't continue if the Republicans don't fight back what he called the "Blue Wave".

all heard of the Blue Wave movement they're trying to do. They think they're going to take over all the state legislatures and they think they're going to take over Congress and I'm sorry to tell them but I think that's a false notion," Mitchell said.

"I would think that was going to happen if we weren't the No. 1 state in the country, with the lowest unemployment rate in the Midwest. If we didn't have the highest graduation rate in the country. If we haven't delivered on historic tax cuts for working class families and small businesses."

He said the state does hold all those recognitions and when voters go to the polls they're going to ask if they are better off now than they were eight years ago under Governor Chet Culver.

"Eight years ago we spent every single penny we had, drained our reserve funds, had record high rather than record low unemployment, and our state was going down and I just thank God for Governor Branstad and Governor Reynolds for getting us out of that," he said to applause from the 120 in attendance. Graber said it was almost Mitchell's race to lose when you look at demographics. "He almost has to work real hard at losing that, but I always tell people don't ever assume you've got a win because I guarantee you in politics it's not always the best man or woman wins," Graber said. James Steffen is running for the Lee County Board of Supervisors to take the District 3 seat being vacated by Don Hunold at the end of his

term.

Steffen said the county has been run by Democrats for too long and it's time for more transparency and more accountability at the county level.

Steffen ran for the statehouse in 2012 losing to Kearns and said he stepped away from public office.

"I kind of stayed out of politics for a while, but I don't like what is going on in Lee County. The focus on economic development doesn't have to be just manufacturing. We've got 5G in Lee County now so we can have any type of technology jobs."

He also said he was disappointed that the supervisors took \$400,000 out of the budget for law



forcement. They took \$400,000

"I

out of the budget for the sheriff, but he ended up getting back most of it. One party has been in control of the entire county and I think there needs to be more transparency and accountability and I think I can bring that," he said.

He also said education should be a priority.

"They told me to not worry about education, but children are our future and if we don't provide them with a quality education with more emphasis on the STEM program, if we don't provide them with that, then we are failing them and failing our state and county."

Tomaino's gold medal throw of 29'-6". Both Gehle's discus and javelin throws were personal records for him.

Gehle took gold in his only Thursday event, the 200-meter wheel chair race, and then took gold in both races on Friday. In the 200, Gehle won with a time of 56.11 seconds. His gold time in the 100 was 28.67 and he raced to a 1:50.73 in the 400-meter race. He also won a gold medal in the 4x100 relay with a team that asked him to join when he got to the event.

He said he had good leads in most of wheel chair races with his closest competitor being about seven seconds behind. But he said the track was very spongy and none of the racers set personal bests during the games.

Now Gehle begins to prepare for the World Games in Spain. He leaves for Europe on Aug. 4 and said the next week will be full of training and prep work for the trip.

"It's gonna be a lot more training within the next week," he said, "I don't know any times or anything I need to be at I just want to race the best I can and throw the best I can."

In 2017, Gehle competed in the junior nationals and won one gold and two silvers. He said going in April for qualifying allowed him to compete in the javeline and discus events, which were events he didn't get to compete in last year. Now he says he has a better idea of what to expect in Europe.

"I feel confident going over there just with this week even. I've learned a lot of helpful tips from other paralympic athletes that have been on TeamUSA and traveled the world. I'm honeslty just extremely honored to get this opportunity."

Gehle said without the support of his family and the community he wouldn't be able to be a part of TeamUSA.

"I want to thank everyone for everything I'm able to do because this all probably wouldn't be possible without their donations and support," he said.
