FMHS returns gift of service to area veterans

Students and faculty put on special event for those serving and retired from military

FORT MADISON – Veteran's Day is celebrated on Nov. 11th, the recognized end of World War I. But at Fort Madison High School they hold another celebration around the holidays as a gift to area veterans.

FMHS students and faculty put on an assembly honoring all veterans Thursday afternoon with performances from the high school band and choir, and Army Sgt. Carlos Ruiz.

Fort Madison High School Principal Greg Smith said the student government, which organizes the event, wanted to celebrate the veterans in December as a gift from the school to those who had given so much for them.

Command Sgt. Major Matt Doty of the Iowa National Guard gave an address to the assembly and said each year the country sets aside Veteran's Day to pay tribute to all veterans for their devotion, patriotism and self-sacrifice on behalf of all Americans.

"It is a celebration of their service to our nation, state, and community. Just like police, fire, EMS, teachers, and countless other professions, our veterans make our world a better place to live," Doty said.

"So today I ask you to make yourself better. Contribute to your community to make it better. Our nation's veterans, throughout history, have kept us free, returned home, and continue to serve our nation in a multitude of ways. Today, we say thanks to them all."

Doty said regardless of the branch veteran's serve in, Army, Navy Air Force, Marines, or Coast Guard, Veteran's Day belongs to them.

"Service members live by values including loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, honor integrity and personal encourage and excellence in all we do. They do not leave those values behind when they transition into personal life. They continue to serve by making positive contributions, building stronger futures and inspiring future generations."





FM Invite loaded with top state wrestlers

FORT MADISON – Some of the best wrestlers in the state and beyond will be taking the mat this weekend in Fort Madison.

The Bloodhounds are hosting the Fort Madison Invitational, a two-day pool play and then bracketed wrestling tournament on five mats at the Hound Dome Friday and Saturday.

Then the little one's take over on Sunday in at Battle of the Border Kids' Wrestling Tournament also at Fort Madison High School.

Head Coach Ryan Smith said last year he got rave reviews from area coaches about the event's format. That word of mouth has brought in additional schools and bring in some of the best wrestlers in the area.

Last year's Invitational was the first time it had been a two-day affair with pool play.

"Last year was the first time we went to two days and we got rave reviews from the way it was handled," Smith said.

"They like the format we do with pool wrestling on Friday night where we break them into four man pools. If we have a full brackets that will mean four pools in each weight group."

The pool play will determine if the wrestlers go into the gold bracket which is for the top eight placers in pool wrestling Friday, or the Silver Bracket, which is the bottom eight in each weight class.

Smith said that helps reduce the possibility of a wrestler coming in and going 0-2 and sitting out the rest of the tournament.

"We like that because then the wrestlers that go 0-2 to start can still wrestling the bracket against other wrestlers at the same level of competition," he said.

"That's the best thing about this tournament."

Cedar Rapids Kennedy is usually the big kid on the block at the tournament and Smith said they will be bringing another strong team. But this year wrestlers will come from Illinois and Missouri as well.

"Liberty, out of Wentzville is coming up and they have some tough individuals and Solon's another new team coming this year. They're a Class 2A powerhouse, so they'll bring some competition up as well," Smith said

"Washington is also a new team coming up, so this is going to be a fun tournament."

All in all 18 teams are signed up to be at the Hound

Dome over the weekend. Other schools attending include Clear Creek-Amana, Illini West, Dubuque Hempstead (new), Louisa-Muscatine, Mediapolis, Muscatine, New London, Burlington, Notre Dame, Van Buren and Fort Madison Junior Varsity, among others.

"There'll be all types of state-ranked kids. Cedar Rapids Kennedy has a strong team and they're the perennial front-runner, but there will be plenty of state-ranked athletes that will be here."

At 285 lbs, the bracket could hold four top 10 wrestlers in the state with Fort Madison's Danen Settles sitting at 8th in IAWrestle rankings. But CR Kennedy's Josh Vis is currently 2nd and Dubuque Hempstead's Cayden Lovett is 10th in the most recent rankings. Louisa-Muscatine's Gabe Hayes is 6th in Class 1A.

In the 145 lb bracket, Kennedy's Dylan Falck is a top 5 wrestler in that division at 3A, while Ben Faber of Hempstead and CJ Walrath of Notre Dame also could make that bracket interesting. Washington's Dillon Sanders is 7th in Class 2A.

Other local ranked wrestlers include Burlington's Duncan Delzell No. 8 at 132 lbs, Grifen Molle at 138 No. 5 from Notre Dame and Blaine Frazier currently

No. 2 at 113.

Class 2A notables include Solon's Hayden Taylor, who sits atop the 138 lb rankings, along with teammates Zeb Gnida 7th at 152, Jax Flynn 2nd at 170,. In the Southeast Conference, Keokuk's Dylan Jeffers is 5th at 182.

In 1A, New London comes into the tournament ranked 7th in Class 1A as a team and features 113lb Marcel Lopez at the top of the rankings. Lopez has wrestled at 120 as well this year. Other brackets will be interesting with the Tigers Josh Glendening 8th at 126, Dominic Lopez 5th at 138, Gabe Carter 4th at 160. Louisa-Muscatine's Chase Kruse is 9th at 170.

Action starts at 5 p.m. on Friday through pool wrestling and then action picks up again on Saturday morning at 10 a.m.

On Sunday youth wrestlers take the mat with division featuring preK-Kindergarten, bantam (1-2nd graders), novice (3-4th graders) juniors (5-6th graders) and seniors (7-8th graders) in 8-man brackets. 



Veteran encourages grads to consider military options

improve the country for years to coming.

"But always remember the foundation was secured and protected by those in front of you," Doty said.

He told the story of Salvatore Guinta, the first living person since the Vietnam War to receive the country's highest military honor, the Medal of Valor.

Guinta and his platoon were ambushed on the way back to their post after providing security cover for a mission in Afghanistan in 2007, his second tour. The sargeant walking point was hit by enemy fire in a hail of bullets and grenades from an ambush. Guinta ran straight into the enemy fire, as his platoon fired guns and launched grenades into the ambush. Guinta killed at least one Taliban fighter, and wounded several others

before recovering a soldier that was being dragged away, and pulled him to cover.

The soldier would die the next day from his wounds, but those in Guinta's platoon said with all the enemy fire happening, there's no way he should be alive.

"What most amazes me about Staff Sgt. Guinta is his commitment to the team and how humble he is," Doty said.

"He said, 'If I'm a hero, every man that stands around me, every woman in the military, everyone who goes into the unknown, is a hero," Doty said.

Doty said he watched an interview with Guinta a few years ago where a reporter asked him what kind of soldier he is, and Guinta responded, "Average".

"The reporter said, 'you were just awarded the highest award that the military has, presented by the United

States, and you are average?' 'Yep', he said, 'You should see the good ones," Doty recalled.

Doty said not every veteran performs great acts of valor, but every veteran is truly a hero in their own right, simply because they served.

He said the U.S. has been at war for 18 years and the country has the largest population of young veterans since the Vietnam War. He said the Iowa National Guard has the largest number of veterans in their formation since World War II.

But he said less than 1% of Americans choose to serve in the military and 78% come from families that have already served.

"The contributions these veterans and their families make on behalf of our country are remarkable," he said.

Military service isn't for everyone, but every young person should consider whether it may be right for them, he said.

He said the country needs to broaden the appeal of service to include all fabrics of society, all socioeconomic groups and ethnic backgrounds.

"The pride and honor of military service should not be reserved for just those who hail from a tradition of military service."

The FMHS Student Government presented the American Legion Auxiliary with a check for \$350 at the end of the assembly.
