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

Loebsack says he'll keep fighting for federal CTE funding

FORT MADISON - With a pronounced skills gap in Lee County, career training education is floating to the top of state school priority lists and U.S Rep. Dave Loebsack need was and Smith told him resources to expand the program. Smith said he uses federal Per-

m An}$ overwhelming response to a six-day Facebook poll showed that about 64% of our readers don't believe golf carts, ATVs, and UTVs should be allowed on the streets.

It's an interesting poll and quite a few people questioned us on how many of the respondents were from Fort Madison. We don't believe it's relevant because about 93% of our readership is north Lee County and those readers have a viable opinion.

They move through Fort Madison on a regular basis, and when you consider that we had more than 70 comments on the issue on the post, they were genuine opinions.

Here's ours for what it's worth. Why not?

Former City Councilman Brian Wright has been railing publicly against the issue, and on the Facebook post saying the council voted it down in the past due to safety concerns and he asks, "what's changed".

First and foremost, the council has changed. Councilman Matt Mohrfeld rejuvenated the idea about 10 weeks ago calling it a piece of Americana - folks riding to the park with sandwiches and lemonade to listen to music or visit an art fair or what have you.

Councilman Bob Morawitz says the vehicles aren't rated for street use, which is indicative that the manufacturers don't even believe they are safe on city streets.

But there is merit to the argument that a bicycle, a moped, or City Manager David Varley's motorcycle are no safer on the streets than a golf cart, and are probably a little less safe than an ATV/UTV with a roll bar. I mean that's real....that makes sense. The safety argument doesn't fly in our opinion. There is a lady that rides right down our street on a motorized scooter, the type of which you'd see in a grocery store. Again, you can't make the argument for safety. It just doesn't fly. What would fly is one of the vehicles that isn't working properly going 10 mph with an orange flag waving in the air and backing up traffic for three blocks. We cover the news.... we gotta go.

Loebsack took a 30-minute tour with Fort Madison High School Superintendent Dr. Erin Slater and Principal Greg Smith visiting the school's welding, culinary, automotive, and ag classes, and spoke with instructors about the programs. Loebsack asked what the biggest

Slater says district assessing above state, federal requirements

but they can get a great job without doing that. They might have to go to a community college, but not always do they even have to do that."

Slater said the district is working closely with industrial and business partners to identify how the district can help with demands on those employers.

"Greg's a part of it, too. We sit at the table with business and industry and say, 'What is it that you're needing, what is the workforce demanding, and what can we do to help to help get kids plugged in?'. Those conversations are important to have," Slater said.

Loebsack said he's not convinced that Secretary of Education Betsy DeVoss knows what needs to be done, but said Congress needs to make sure funding for such programs as Perkins grants stay in place. "That's why CTE is so

important. We'll see what happens with budget caps and by Sept. 30, we have to have appropriations done. We did our job in the House, but the Senate is lagging behind, which always seems to be the case," Loebsack said.

"The good news is more and more schools are doing exactly what you folks are doing here. Again, it goes back to what are these students going to do when they are done here, and just recognizing that setting people on a four-year track and beyond is not necessarily the way to go."

Loebsack said the economy is a big factor in maintaining the need for these programs so high schoolers are a valued resource for employers.

"As long as the economy is going strong, we're

going to be able to get these kids jobs."

Loebsack also asked how the district was performing with the **Every Student Succeeds** Act, which is the federal education mandate that replaced No Child Left Behind in 2015 under President Barack Obama.

"You don't have such a straight jacket on you as you did with No Child Left Behind, right?" Loebsack asked Fort Madison Superintendent Dr. Erin Slater.

Slater said the district is still is responsible for the Iowa Assessment, but school leaders have been working on additional assessments that identify real-time student needs.

"We're still accountable to the Iowa Assessment and we make sure we do that, but one of the things our district has been working on the last four years is multiple

assessments, formative assessments. Doing that on-time real-time instruction and then that real time feedback for kids and teachers," Slater said.

He said No child Left Behind focused on everyone being above average which really made no sense.

"I think No Child Left Behind is a classic example of Congress making a law not knowing what the hell they were doing." Loebsack said.

Slater said she believes the district is assessing students at a higher level than the government requires.

'We need to because those are the faces we see very day. Parents are sending them to us, they're expecting them to be successful so we need to make sure we are doing everything we can," Slater said.

doubts when the county installed a new law allowing the use of the vehicles on secondary roads. They can cross highways but only perpedicularly to get from one secondary road to the next.

Weber said just as recently as Tuesday that he's been surprised by how little trouble has been caused by the new code. He even referenced a rally at Charleston Board of Trade where more than 60 ATVs and UTVS were on site and the sheriff's department had no issues with any of the riders on or off the site.

Chris Greenwald went on record with me last week saying he will not be selling golf carts at his dealership, River City Motors Plus. He said he's got way more credible product lines.

We have a park-to-park historical district and we, for one, think that riding around in golf carts could enhance that image. But I think you're going to see very few golf carts and more ATVs/UTVs.

Think about tourism. The way Iowa is going, you're going to be able to get just about anywhere on an ATV or UTV, side-by-side, whatever you want to call it. People could hold rallies for charities like they do with Poker Runs. This is the base entertainment for a lot of people and if they now can come through Fort Madison isn't that good for a lot of people?

We just ask one thing. If the speed limit is 25, for the love of god, please try to stay close to the speed limit. Golf cart gridlock will not sit well with the wife.

By the way, we also allow horses on the street...as you will see very very soon, but that's Beside the Point.

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
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

Hounds, Hawks ready for opening week clash

Doherty trying to make it three straight over Hawks in home opener

SON- Heading into the fourth-consecutive season of the Lee County rivalry between the Hounds and the Hawks, Central Lee has a chance to even the series between the two programs at 2-2 over the five year span. Fort Madison has bested the Hawks the past two seasons, winning 21-0 last season and 56-35 in 2017-2018.

Both teams are starting fresh in different ways however, coming into the 2019 campaign.

Long-time Bloodhound Derek Doherty now finds himself at the helm for Fort Madison, while Central Lee looks to rebound after a rough 0-9 season. Both teams will also look similar in styles of play on both sides of the ball according to their head coaches.

"They're pretty identical to us," Doherty said. "They change their offense and they change their defense. Coach Ehret and I shared film, we decided that would be the fair route to go. We saw a lot of the same things we run. We're intrigued by that matchup to line up against their 11 and see who can execute better."

With the Hounds opening the season at home Friday night, getting off on the right foot and getting the first win of the Doherty era is crucial. A win Friday is just



the momentum boost Fort Madison needs to start the season off hot.

"We're going to be about energy and effort and having a good attitude and execution," Doherty said. "We know what our kids are capable of, it's just getting them to do it. For a lot of them, this is their first chance to execute under Friday night lights. That's exciting because we know how hard they worked this summer and here is their opportunity."

Last season Fort Madison went with a pass-heavy approach, as newly graduated Lennon Barker aired the ball out a team-high 283



times for 1,630 yards. By comparison, Kali Maestro led the team with 343 rushing yards on 88 attempts, while Diego Lozano ranked second on the team in rushing with 26 totes for 206 total yards.

Maestro and Lozano both return for their senior campaigns looking to improve upon last season's numbers, but the 1,630 passing yards may be harder to replace. The good news is it appears Fort Madison has an idea of who will be running the huddle this season with junior Will Larson taking first-team reps under center.

Larson will be without two of the team's leading receivers from last season in Dom Frantz and Shaymour Redd-Donald, but Parker Denning and Michael Mosena both saw the field for plenty of snaps last season and

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look ready to take over lead receiving roles this year.

As for Central Lee, regrouping from a winless season is one thing, but playing on the road against a bigger school makes Friday's contest even more of an uphill battle. Ehret knows Friday will come down to flight or fright for the Hawks.

"It's obviously a big test to play a bigger school," Ehret said. "They've gotten us the last couple of years. We just have to go over there and compete to the best of our abilities and hopefully we can do a little better than we did last year."

Defensively Fort Madison won't have to worry about slowing down the Hawks former leading rusher in Tyler Hopp, but they will have to be ready for the aerial attacks from now senior quarterback Evan Pohren who tossed a team-high 625 yards last season. As for formations and style of play, expect it to be somewhat of a mirror image of what Fort Madison will look like. "Week one is crazy

because you don't know," Doherty said. "Yeah, we shared film, but we have some things inside of our system that we didn't show on film and I know that they have the same. It's kind of a crazy start I guess.

"You never know what you're going to get from them this first week. They've got some good athletes out there. Coach Ehret is a fantastic coach, so you know that their guys are going to be disciplined and ready to go and know what they need to do."

Two schools, two programs looking for a fresh start and two coaches who are looking to build a foundation for their futures both this season and beyond. While the program matchup and coaching matchups are intriguing, at the end of the day, players play and coaches coach.

"We talk to them about control the controllables, but once Friday night happens we can call plays and stuff, but we're really out of the mix," Doherty said. "It's up to them to get down and do what they need to do."




