Sheriff's dept. uses Facebook to find hot spots

LEE COUNTY - The Lee County Sheriff's office is giving everyone in the area a chance to slow down in an effort to beef up efforts to make county highways safer.

Not only is the department rotating speed indicator signs throughout the county, now they are actually asking the public about the best places to put deputies for enforcement.

Lee County Sheriff Stacy Weber said the department has polled people in the past, but this time they've received a large number of responses using Facebook.

"Normally what we do, and we've never really done it using social media, but we've asked people where they want to see us," Weber said. "This week we just decided to ask on social media where people would like to see us doing directed patrols."

He said directed patrols are stationary radar, following buses to monitor motor-

ists obeying traffic arms, and that kind of enforcement.

He said there were six on staff the other day including himself and they went out and hit every place that was listed on the Lee County Sheriff's Department Facebook page at https://www.facebook.com/Lee-County-Iowa-Sheriffs-Office-1630841777222635/

Visits to the sheriff's face book page show daily photos of where the Sheriff's department is taking radar that day.

And Weber said he's not worried about people knowing where they are. He said it's a motorist safety issue with a focus on saving lives.

"We saw the response was awesome," he said. "So we just made a list that day. There was six of us and we split it up and we went out and hit every spot they asked us for. One guy was asking for specific times and the times he was asking for didn't work out, but we got everywhere."

He said he can't give people any more warnings than pictures of where they are. It's a similar process to big cities that

We need to think about the 'social' in "social media"


There was some Facebook chatter over the weekend from a sitting city councilman about the Fort Madison football team not being on the field for the national anthem Friday at Solon.

First and foremost, I've gotten to know head coach Tony Shiffman pretty well over the past four months.. Any question to his, or that football team's, inclinations should have triggered a phone call...at minimum...to a school official before posting something that incendiary, especially five weeks from an election. This incident amounted to officials controlling the schedule for when teams take the field before a game. Fort Madison wasn't on the field when the national anthem was played, but, as is the case in most games, the away team and sometimes the home team just hasn't taken the field yet.

For the record, I asked Shiffman in week 2 about the team carrying the American flag onto the field for the Central Lee game. I wondered if it was some type of 9-1-1 tribute or something.

I had just never seen it before and thought it was a thoughtful, patriotic

To put this whole thing to rest, Shiffman's response was the ultimate in patriotism. "It's just something we wanted to do. This is such

Sheriff using Facebook for patrol locations

will actually have morning news programs tell motorists where they are.

"I think this fair way of warning them," he said.
"There'll be no excuses. We've even told them we were going to be in the area. Bigger cities will do this to. The bottom line is we've gotten complaints and we're going to have a car there and you'll get a citation of you're speeding.

"This effort goes hand in hand with what the department is trying to do, which is increase awareness so people pay attention to driving habits without us writing tickets. If they get used to seeing us, they'll do all the things they're supposed to do. We don't write a lot of tickets, we really don't. It's more of a contact thing to let them know they need to pay more attention to what they're doing."

Weber said he's also working regularly with the Iowa Department of Transportation to look at high incident intersections and get signage or other precautionary measures in place that will reduce the frequency of incidents in the county.

"When we find trouble areas, I try to work with Bob Porter with the DOT in our area. We've had at least one meeting with the DOT regarding working traffic so we can slow the rate of the fatalities," he said.

One such intersection is where the old Hwy 394 and Hwy 218 intersect just south of Donnellson. Weber said he's had a car pull out in front of him while he was in his sheriff's vehicle because they just didn't see him.

"I just got a call from DOT regarding that intersection. We've been monitoring it to figure out why there have been so many incidents there and to see what we can do to improve it. Most of the time people tell us they don't see cars coming, so we're looking at improved signage, a flashing red light maybe or caution signs. They put that on and off ramp in and they've had issues there."

Weber said the department is using whatever tools are the most successful to keep motorists safe while the department continues to do the other jobs on their plates.

"I think it's just a shift from where we were to where we're going," he said. "We've managed to keep up with the civil papers and all the other jobs we have like running the jail, transportation, etc. All those things are getting done and we're still being effective and responsive to complaints of citizens to help stop or prevent things from happening," he said.

The post from Councilman Brian Wright was pulled down in less than an hour Wright posted "WOW" and then asked if it was true that the Fort Madison team wasn't on the field for the anthem and hoped it wasn't true. The Hounds weren't on the field for the anthem, because they were instructed to not be on the field at that time, a usual and customary protocol. Wright, however issued an apology within the hour after clarification was made to him via the post.

The post prompted responses from Shiffman and assistant coach Derek Doherty explaining the situation...and then triggered a lot of replies to Wright's post as well as Doherty's and Shiffman's. Wright's quick apology thanked Doherty for the clarification.

"It takes a bigger man to admit wrong and apologize. In the case of the Bloodhound football team supposedly not coming out for a national anthem, I was wrong and apologize. I posed what happened supposedly and asked for clarification. I got clarification. Thank you to the Hounds for supporting our national anthem!" - Wright posted about 30 minutes after the original post.

This was not an supposition. It was an assump-

tion for which, it seems, several people are to blame.

The apology was absolutely the right thing to do, but how many of Councilman Wrights' 1,832 friends read that post and drew a conclusion? Several posts scolded Wright for not looking into the situation a bit more carefully before posting. Wright compared the reaction to reactions Donald Trump gets with his Tweets on a daily basis. Rep. Dave Loebsack and many legislators have asked for Trump to stop Tweeting because it's damaging to America's image and reputation.

But this is the very reason why this issue of how people are conducting themselves during the national anthem, manifested by the media or not, is such a hot issue right now. It's extremely emotional for almost everyone and quick reactions sometimes are ill-advised. Wright is very visible on Facebook and has used it on several occasions to gauge the city's reaction to issue after issue. In this case, emotions ran high again. Shiffman's here to teach and build a football program and odds are he won't be derailed, but the lesson maybe in bit more caution before asking a question in front of 1,800



plus readers. I certainly have to respect the 3,000 plus we write for.

I don't know folks... we're all Americans and we filter information daily based on our beliefs, our emotions and our experiences. My experience and belief is that we're a country of freedoms and choices. That's what has us as the envy...and scourge... of many others countries. Our veterans have fought and died for our freedom's and at times, yes, for the actual red, white, and blue fabric that hangs from our office buildings, ballparks, schools and homes. And this country does a horrible job taking care of veterans by the way. I just read an article about a staffer at the Iowa City VA office who quit due to poor working conditions, was denied unemployment benefits and then won them on appeal, specifically because of the working conditions. We have to do better

I recite the Pledge of Allegiance., I sing the national anthem sometimes quietly in a small crowd, sometime louder in bigger stadiums (you do not want to hear me sing) and sometimes to myself..,.. and my hat comes off and my hand covers my heart every time. But not because it's a law. It's not. It's a choice. It's my choice. And the freedom to make that choice is what we've been fighting for for the past 242 years.

Speaking of emotional issues, Tom Rinaldi, a reporter for ESPN, took time on College Game Day Saturday to have the fans gathered at the Game Day location wave, through the ESPN camera's to the children in the Stead Family Children's Hospital on the campus of the University of Iowa. This just keeps getting better and better.

massage. My curiosity was aroused. I sidled over for a closer look. Michael is quite friendly and articulate. He invited me to lie down on his Body Tuning Table for a massage. What the heck? There was a pain right between my shoulder blades from all the lifting of my heavy sculptures. Actually, there is some degree of pain in my back most of the time and I'm a great user/ abuser of ibuprofen. Michael got under the bed and began twanging on four piano strings he has stretched on the underside of the bed. A musical vibration came up through the structure and through my body. It seemed to focus on the tight muscles between my shoulder blades. He twanged a long, low note that trilled off into a sharp trill. The Crusaders take their 24-5 record to 5th-ranked New London (28-3) on Thursday for a key matchup with the Southeast Iowa Superconference rival.


