LCHD shows new digs to public | Spirits of the Old

New space, storage put smiles on staff at LCHD

FORT MADISON -The Lee County Health Department opened its doors for visitors to see the group's new offices at the former John Bennett Administration building in Fort Madison.

The department has been working out of the offices since August, but was putting the finishing touches on the office spaces before having the public in for a viewing.

LCHD Director Julie Schilling said the new space is even better than she had anticipated.

"I think we're more happy now than we were when we first started looking at it," she said Thursday evening as crowds of people from southeast Iowa milled about in the reception area. Groups were taken up in small and large groups to view all four floors of the office space.

"One of the things the staff likes most is the increased amount of space. We were at The Kensington for quite a while and they were very good to work with, but space was one of the things the board of directors had identified as a need a while back and we think this works very well for us," Schilling said.

LCHD moved in April under an air quality concern at the department's former location at 2218 Avenue H. The department had been housed at



end of April, be- SCHILLING fore signing a three-year lease with the Iowa Department of Corrections.

The Health Department inked the deal with the IDOC in June to lease the 4-story former John Bennett Administration building at \$7,000/month. Their lease with The Kensington's ownership group was \$5,400/month. but didn't include utilities or maintenance, which the DOC agreement does. IT crews had to rewire some of the building's digital cabling and phone systems and that took some time and delayed the department moving into the new location. However, the group has

been serving area residents at the new facility since the end of August, Schilling said.

"We didn't need to paint or anything," Schilling said, "It was move-in ready. We came over several times to see what sections each staff should have."

The new office opens into a reception area in what used to be the ISP's John Bennett Critical Care Unit entrance. To the right after you walk in the door is a reception area where people needing services can be directed to the right staff. On the first level past the reception area is administrative staff and storage with an office for one environmental staff. The second floor is more office space and a child vaccination clinic. The third and

FORT MADISON - Despite a rain out last Saturday, ghouls and haunted spirits of the Old Fort have been pestering visitors to the "Dead Zone" haunted settlement over the past weekend.

The Haunted Fort will be open to bring chills and thrills to visitors Friday and Saturday this week and then Thursday through Saturday next weekend Oct. 26-28 from 8 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. There will also be a kid-friendly event on Halloween Tuesday Oct. 31, from 5 to 7 p.m. for a tamer form of trick 'n' treating.

The costumes and make up are genuinely spooky. So much so that one of the cast members walking to the Fort prior to the entertainment had emergency services called on his behalf as a man walking down Avenue H, soaked with blood.

Fort Madison Tourism Director Jean Peiton said attendance was decent on the first night last Thursday when cast members were able to extend tickets to family members and the cast got some good run-throughs. Friday had more than 80 people come through the haunted Fort. Profits from the event go the Old Fort.

Patrons are escorted through the north walls of the settlement and then through the barracks and quarters where spirits of fallen soldiers and families torment visitors to a story of the perils and death associated with the times.

Trappers and ghostly spirits splattered with blood and suffering ghastly injuries pester the visitors, while kinder and gentler Indian spirits try to keep the peace. Tickets are \$10 per person.



fourth floors have offices for HOPES (Healthy Opportunities for Parents to Experience Success) which includes staffing and family counseling services, a large breakroom, and a large conference room as well as additional staffing offices and WIC services.

The new facility is approximately 11,000 square feet, which is 6,700 feet over what the department had at The Kensington. "The concept for a new building was set at 12,000 square feet but included a basement storage area. In the new location, each floor has allocated storage on each floor for the respective services.



Holy Trinity 8th-grader Goldie goes through season unbeaten

FORT MADISON - It's not a family thing...it might be a genetic thing...but it's certainly a running thing.

HTC eighth grader Philip Goldie went the entire middle school cross country season without ever crossing the finish line after someone else.

At this past weekend's Washburn Middle School State meet, Goldie put the finishing touches on the season, taking first place with an 11:19 time in the two-mile event. He beat St. Ansgar's Riley Witt by eight seconds, helping HTC's 8th grade team to a second-place finish behind Central Springs.

Goldie has his sights set on a varsity spot next year, but said he hasn't really tried to set his pace on the longer 3 mile, or 5K events.

This is just Goldie's 2nd year of organized running, joining the cross country team as a seventh grader a year ago.

He said he was given a choice of playing baseball, track, or cross country when he entered the Holy Trinity middle school.

"The reason I started was because I had a choice of track, baseball, or cross-country. I picked cross-country because I'm really bad at baseball and I really didn't want to do track. But it turns out...I'm pretty good at it," Goldie said Tuesday afternoon.

Matt Mohrfeld, who coaches the varsity and junior high runners for HTC, said Goldie came along pretty quickly once he realized the impact he could have on the team.

"When he's clipping out some of the other shorter races, we had him pegged at a 5:20 pace (per mile). And we just found out a little bit ago, that if they had run all the classes at state together, Philip would have finished in third out of all the classes," Mohrfeld said.

The state meet was run in classes and was divided by 7th and 8th grades. HTC is one of the smaller schools at most events and runs Class 1A, but Goldie's time put him in the top four of all classes at the event. He was two seconds faster than the winner of the 2A run and he trailed only the top two runners in Class 3A and in the largest class, which was 4A, his time would have been good enough for second.

Those are clock finishes and it's really unknown how

Goldie would have finished considering he rarely had anyone in front of him during the year and when he did he usually was able to catch them.

"At state there was a runner who kept up with me but someone he knows was standing off to the side of the race and I heard someone tell him to speed up because I was about 10 feet behind him. All I heard him say was 'I can't, so I just passed him around the next corner."

Goldie said running is actually exhausting and when he's running the only thing he's thinking about is finishing.

"It's really exhausting at the beginning when you think you still have the whole race in front of you, but I kind of enjoy the part when I'm running and it feels good. During races you have that adrenaline built up and you don't think about the pain in your legs and stomach. At that point it's just about winning."

Mohrfeld said Goldie has been under a very specific training protocol since the summer.

"For all practical purposes, he trained under a high

Hellige qualifies for state at Pekin

PEKIN - Matt Hellige punched his ticket for the state cross country meet with an 8th-place finish at the Class 1A meet in Pekin Thursday night.

Hellige finished the 5K in 18:02 for the highest finish for HTC. The Crusaders took 8th place overall as a team with Jacob Mohrfeld finishing second on the Holy Trinity squad and 48th overall with a 20:22 time. Ben Abolt was third for the Crusaders and 47th overall at 20:33.

Sam Avery and Chandler Rung took 4th and 5th places for HTC with overall meet finishes of 57th and 72nd, respectively, to round out the scoring places for Holy Trinity with times of 21:05 and 22:19.

Wyatt Hellman finished 86th in the Class 1A run in a time of 24:08.

Head coach Matt Mohrfeld said he was happy with his team's effort, despite missing two runners with injury and illness.

"Matt Hellige had a stand out run finishing 8th overall and qualifying for state. I'm really proud of how my team performed both tonight and the entire season," he said.

LEE COUNTY - Friday, October 27, 2017 at 5:00 P.M. is the final day to pre-register to vote in the Tuesday, November 7, 2017 City Election. You must be a United States Citizen, a Lee County resident and at least 17 ½ years old to register to vote, but 18 years old by Election Day in order to vote.

Residents may register to vote in person at the Lee County Auditor's Office located at 933 Avenue H, Fort Madison from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm or located in the west hall across from the Lee County Assessor's Office at the South Lee County Courthouse, 25 N. 7th St, Keokuk, from 8:30 am to 12:30 pm and 1:30 pm to 4:30 pm. You may also download and print a form from the Lee County <u>website-www.leecounty.org</u>. Mailed voter registration forms need to be postmarked on or before Monday, October 23rd.

Iowa law allows eligible persons to register and vote at the polls on Election Day. An Election Day registrant must provide acceptable proof of identity and current residence in the precinct. Voters choosing this option should plan to take a few extra minutes for the transaction. Regular office hours are 8:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M.

The school district supports a healthy environment where students learn and participate in positive dietary and lifestyle practices. Schools contribute to the basic health status of students by facilitating learning through the support and promotion of good nutrition and regular physical activity. Improved health optimizes student performance potential. The FMCSD provides a

comprehensive learning environment for developing and practicing lifelong wellness behaviors. 


