LCEMA shifts local funding to county levy

County officials oppose move to add to countywide collection

MONTROSE - After several weeks of deliberation, the Lee County Emergency Management Agency has changed the way it gathers local funding.

At a meeting Monday afternoon, the board voted 5-2 along city/county lines to approve shifting its local funding stream from a per capita contribution from cities and townships in the county, to a countywide levy.

The levy will be assessed as part of the county's annual property tax assessment and will amount to less than one cent per \$1,000 taxable income on the total county assessment or about .37 cents for a county home with a \$50k taxable assessment.

Currently, homeowners in the county are assessed

The added levy will generate just over \$30,000 per year to help offset costs of the agency's \$70,000 annual budget. The agency will have a slightly higher budget

this year due to the approval of an assistant to Cirinna, who will be retiring at the end of

year. That position is a temporary three-month position that will ascend to Cirinna's position upon his retirement.

Currently, the agency is funded with grants and an 80-cent per capita charge to cities in the county and the county itself. Fort Madison, Keokuk, and Lee County paid the majority of the per capita charges with each at about \$8,700 per year. With the temporary position included, that amount would have increased to about \$9,250 each.

## HTC girls down Nikes in regional tussle

FORT MADISON – Holy Trinity Catholic's Emily Box may have summed it up best after the Crusaders ended Burlington Notre Dame's season Tuesday night.

"I've never played a game that rough ever," the senior said after HTC held on for a 55-51 win at home in Class 1A Region 5 second round action.

The game was one of only 10 that were played due to inclement weather around the state. The banana belt that is southeast Iowa was spared the wrath of otherwise treacherous conditions.

The Nikes advanced after downing New London 60-39 at home on Saturday night.

Holy Trinity will now face the winner of Sigourney/Winfield Mt. Union on Friday at 7 p.m. in Sigourney. That game was postponed until Wednesday night.

The Lady Crusaders led the entire game by margins of as much as eight points, but could never shake off the Nikes.

HTC wouldn't score in the next possession. With the Nikes with the ball and a chance to take the lead, Box pulled down a rebound of an errant shot and was fouled by the Nikes' Taylor Ackerman. The foul put the Crusaders in the one-and-one bonus and Box converted both free throws to give Fort Madison the lead again.

Notre Dame would stay within two points until junior Avery Hopper, who finished with a dozen on the night, scored inside on a nifty pass underneath from junior Ashlynn Haas. Box would hit two more free throws after getting banged around underneath to push the lead to six with about two minutes left in the game.

Notre Dame would pull within four when Ackerman would hit a couple free throws on a foul by Haas driving the lane with only nine seconds on the clock. Notre Dame Head Coach Jimmy Myers called a timeout to set up a defense for the inbound, but HTC was able to get the ball into Taylor Boeding's hands on the inbound and Boeding was quickly fouled by Ackerman.

Boeding hit both free throws and the Crusaders then let Ackerman run through the lane for a bucket at the buzzer to set the final.

Johnson said the Crusaders had a tough time getting Box going in the first half.

"They played more of a 2-3 and then stretched it into that 1-2-2 in the second half which opened it up more. But Box is just a phenomenal athlete. There's nobody that can jump with her. That's her advantage. When she's jumping, she plays like she's six-four," he said.

Both teams suffered a cold spell from the floor in the second quarter. The Crusaders would go 4-12







### Agency may look at legalities of setting their own tax

ed to create about \$37,000 in revenue to replace the per capita charges.

Larkin's opposition was rooted in the fact that now a committee outside of the board of supervisors had a say in what the county's levy would look like.

"This has worked for us for a number of years and I don't know anybody that had a real complaint in the way it was done," he said.

"But my real problem is that if you go with a levy, there will be folks on the committee who have no financial obligation to the levy. But it is on the county, so you have people making decisions, that in effect, in my opinion, don't have any skin in the game."

Cirrina said the 28E agreement the county has with the PSAP board is the exact same way as the 28E with the agency and that's millions of dollars.

"We're not talking about \$30,000, we're talking millions of dollars of which PSAP board has all of that control. They have not mismanaged their funds because the budget passes through the county. This is a pass through just like that. I realize it's reflected in your budget, but it comes through and goes right back out," he said.

He added that it was his hope that, at some point, the agency become its own taxing agency, a move that Larkin said he would support. "It would be much cleaner if it just went through one agency," Larkin said.

Fort Madison Mayor Brad Randolph said Larkin's point burdens the cities to try and help keep the county levy lower.

"In an effort to keep the countywide levy lower, you put an extra burden on the community to pay more, and that's asking a bit much. The fairest way is to put it as a countywide levy. Having it be its own taxing agency is for debate," Randolph said.

Ron Dinwiddie, Mayor of Montrose, said he favored the county levy because for the cities it's not a tax, it just comes from the general fund.
