SCC looking at CarSmart property

City council to consider zoning changes on Tuesday

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison city officials are considering amending city code to allow schools in the downtown business district.

At Tuesday's City Council meeting a public hearing is



on the agenda to discuss listing schools as an allowable use within the district.

Southeastern Community College has requested the amendment so they can move forward with plans to rehabilitate the former Car Smart auto lot at 712 Avenue G.

Current city code has a short list of specific uses within the "Downtown" area defined as 6th to 10th streets. That list does not allow dwellings, churches and home occupations on the first floor.

SCC President Micheal Ash confirmed the request

Friday and said the college has already been in front of the city's Planning & Zoning Department and the amendment to the code was approved unanimously.

"We've been working with planning & zoning and walked through the requirements and requests we had for some changes," Ash said.

"It was my understanding others were seeking similar changes so it wasn't just the college. But we were there and presented and talked with them."

But he said he hopes the city can move quickly on

Cruise line cancels three visits to city

Final stop on Oct. 16 is still on the schedule

FORT MADISON - According to Fort Madison Chamber of Commerce coordinator Savanna Collier, American Cruise Lines has cancelled its next two stops in Fort Madison.

The news came to Collier at about 4:30 p.m. Monday afternoon and just informed Collier, who's been coordinating plans for passengers at the dockings along with Fort Madison Tourism Director Jean Peiton, that the cruise line will not be coming further north than St. Louis for the next two weeks due to rising river levels.

"That's really all it said, and to cancel our accommodations for the cruises," Collier said.

"I actually got that message via email before I

left work today. That they off. won't be traveling north of St. Louis for the next two weeks. So it isn't just us, it's the northern part of the Mississippi cruises."

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
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

Hounds still baffled by powerhouse Solon

4th-rated Spartans almost perfect in first half of 45-7 win over Fort Madison

SOLON – Head Coach Derek Doherty said the Bloodhounds took a back seat in the first half to one of the state's best football programs.

But out of the lockerroom, the Hounds woke up to make a respectable third period stopping a running clock, before Solon capped a lopsided 45-7 Class 3A District 6 win when Seamus Poynton hauled in a screen pass from Cam Miller and rumbled 67 yards for the game's final score.

The Bloodhounds went into the locker room down 38-0 after Miller found AJ Coons in the back of the endzone. The Spartans were leading 32-0 at the time and had just brought a punt back to the Hound 36. After calling a timeout, Solon took the first snap, Miller rolled slightly right and fired a bullet to Coons streaking down the right sideline into the endzone.

With predicted rains leaving Solon alone, Doherty said the coaching staff challenged the Hounds to not lay down and come out in the second half and compete.

"We just told them our frustration wasn't in the scoreboard or anything like that. It was them taking a backseat on not competing," Doherty said.

"We knew this was an extremely good football team. They were going to be physical, and we came in and took a back seat right away. The two things we preach, attitude and effort, they didn't bring in the first half.

"We rattled their cages maybe a little bit at halftime and challenged them to bring it. And they did a nice

job in the second half."

On the Hounds first possession of the 3rd quarter, they went 63 yards in eight plays. On 1st and 10 at the Hound 40, FMHS quarterback Will Larson, slipped through the line on a read option and gained five yards before coughing the ball up in front of him, but covered it himself for another 3 yards.

After an incomplete pass to Brock Calif, and a Diego Lozano run for nil, Larson took the snap and rolled right looking for options. With a Solon lineman hanging on his jersey, Larson floated the ball behind the secondary where Parker Denning was waiting all alone and raced another 20 yards into the endzone. It was

Denning's third touchdown reception in the last two weeks

The Hounds then kicked off and on the Spartans' 2nd and 10, Miller hit Jace Andregg in the right seam, but a hit from behind by Larson jarred the ball loose and Lozano covered it up, giving the ball back to Fort Madison at their own 34.

Larson would hook up with Michael Mosena for a one yard gain off an option screen, The Hounds, who had Larson looking for gaps all night, ran a similar roll on the next play and again, with Spartans hanging

onto Larson he found senior Quentin Schneider up the right sideline. Schneider turned and raced 29 yards to the Bloodhound 36.

But the drive would stall out after a holding penalty and couple of short gains forced a punt the Spartans would return to the Hounds 38.

Three plays later Solon Coach Kevin Miller caught the Bloodhounds in a blitz and with four Hounds sucked into the pocket Cam Miller floated the ball over their heads to Poynton who had a about three Solon lineman in front of him until he outraced them to the left sideline and blew into the endzone to set the final at 45-7.

Doherty was much happier with the effort... and attitude... of the Bloodhounds in the second half.

"We came back in the second half and they still had some of their firebreathers out there and we started having some success with the (run-pass option)," he said.

"It's a lot of fun when you run this offense the way that it's supposed to be ran. Hopefully it builds confidence that we can do this against really good football players."

He said the Hounds are still very young and new to the offense, but success is coming as they learn.

"We're still young in it and we're working with it and trying to get better at it every single day and - you know when you get faced with a team like this it throws a kink in what you've been working on," he said.

"Tonight they just had a lot of pressure in our face and until we started wanting to deal with it, it was hard for Will to see anything.

The Hounds held the Spartans in check most of the night on the ground, but Miller, Coons and Andregg had success making Hounds miss tackles, including a play where Miller moved from left to right out of the pocket, and after scrambling for about six seconds found Cole Arduser on the left side of the endzone for a 4-yard score.

"Defensively they played...they played hard - and offensively, too. We're not going to make excuses, but that's a D1 quarterback and they've got a lot of guys that are going to go on and play at the next level and that's the difference

in where they're at versus where we're at right now.

Larson was 10-29 through the air for 93 yards and a touchdown, his sixth of the year. Denning led the Hounds in receiving with 49 yards on four catches and a score.

The Hounds struggled to open holes on the ground game with Larson leading the way with just 15 yards off the option on 17 carries.

Romeo Maestro led the Hounds in tackles with 5.5 including a sack of Miller. Levy Lowney and Lozano each had 4.5 tackles and Schneider added three.

The Hounds (3-2) travel to Fairfield next week before returning home the following week for matchup with Washington (4-1). Washington is coming off of ending Keokuk's unblemished season with a win at Keokuk.

Holy Trinity boys run again on Tuesday at Indian Lake Park in Farmington.



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
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
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
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Deen brings copper artwork to FMAAA for October exhibit

FORT MADISON - As the season change will turn the leaves to rust, Ron Deen of West Burlington brings his own metallic sheen to FMAAA gallery in October with his copper patina art. A reception for the artist occurs October 4th from 5-7pm. DUPONT is the show sponsor for the exhibit this month. Ron will also speak to how the colorization techniques are performed to bring the differing glows to his metal work at Lunch-ala-Art on October 25th from noon-2pm. Call 372-3996 to reserve a slot for this cultural culinary gem.

Ron had some interesting careers before turning to the arts. He left college for the 82nd Airborne, completing 32 static line combat jumps in two years. Airborne training is a tough crash course. His class started with 600 soldiers and graduated 300. In 1985 he joined Iowa State Peniten-

tiary in Ft. Madison. He stayed 28 years before retiring in 2013. He worked as a correctional officer on all three shifts. It took him 15 years to break into the coveted first shift. His last 10 years was spent in the newer CCU building. This unit housed inmates with a mentally ill diagnosis. Needless to say he saw many strange incidents over his years. Thanks for your service, Ron, on all counts.

In 2012 Ron began woodworking with a scroll saw and other tools, fabricating cutting boards and coaster sets that he sold at Farmer's Market in Burlington. He began feeling the desire to find a new medium and had always been attracted to copper so began researching the topic. In 2015 he made the medium change. There is an older work in the middle of the show that juxtaposes the end of his woodworking pieces with the first of his copper wares. His main tools of the trade are salt, ammonia, and mustard. Salt and ammonia create the patina when the copper

is "cooked" in his fume box. Mustard, as in the French's brand, is used as a paint brush to create colorization in the copper. Ron states, "It reminds me of baking in an oven. The power of the ammonia etches or burns into the copper for the effects. When the lid is on the fume box the vapors will smoke. My wife complains about the smell. Every fifteen minutes he adds more salt and ammonia which helps etch into the copper." The longer the "baking", the more patina can be created. A final rinse and shellac spray finishes the piece. Sometimes he will use acrylic paint as an overglaze to finish a piece. Sometimes "bleeding" will occur to create unplanned colorization that provides a spontaneity to this medium. See the ruddy glow for yourself all month at 825 Avenue G open Tuesday&Thursday 12-7pm and Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday 10am-5pm. Also look for Ron at the November Arts&Crafts Holiday Show at the Port of Burlington in November.

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the approval as his timelines are contingent upon city approval Tuesday.

"We let P & Z folks as well as City Council know we have a bit of a timeline situation. I've got to have a certain things completed by certain deadlines. I plan to run our legal stuff to be contingent on city council approval," Ash said.

"But if the City Council comes back and says something like, 'Wait a minute we we're not sure we want to do this,' we would have to pull back on the project."

He said the college is looking at a \$500,000 investment in the property and will be looking at both internal and external construction to get the facility ready.

Engineering plans include three classrooms, a couple of offices, lobby space, restrooms and small kitchenette and the appropriate high technology outfitting.

Ash said programs could include adult education learning in conjunction with High School Equivalency Testing (HSET), and classrooms for Emergency Responder training.

He said other options are being researched including lifelong learning classes that go with the college's Options program.

"We're exploring other programming and offerings and certainly hope we can offer lifelong learning that citizens of Fort Madison can utilize."
