# Kids battle at Riverview Games 2018

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Familes spend Saturday morning on FM Riverfront

FORT MADISON - The annual Fort Madison Chamber of Commerce's Riverview Games brought hundreds of kids down to the Fort Madison riverfront for the annual event Saturday morning.

Children ages 2 through 6th grade competed in games such as a football toss, a Baggy Clothes Relay race, a bag toss and back flip game, and the popular obstacle course. Despite the warm, humid temperatures, the kids, along with parents, grandparents and families, worked their way around Fort Madison's Riverview Park.

Air Evac brought in the rescue helicopter and landed it in the park where kids and their families could climb inside and ask questions of the rescue team on scene. Fort Madison firefighters and a big crane truck were also on hand to capture the imaginations of the children for a couple hours.

Before a lunch of hot dogs, chips and cookies sponsored by Hy-Vee, prizes were given out of the day's best performances at each of the games, and then other children's names were drawn for the remaining prizes.

The event was organized by the chamber and staff, with volunteers from the chamber, Fort Madison Rotary, Fort Madison Kiwanis, and Fort Madison Lion's service clubs on hand to help with the activities.

**Campaign goal** Wilson said he's confident the campaign will meet the goals.

The funds are used to provide financial assistance for memberships to families and individuals that apply and qualify. Wilson said last year that took about \$42,000. Iowa. Class D felonies carry a maximum five year prison sentence and \$75,000 fine.

Hamann is charged with the crime in connec-



tion with an incident that resulted in the death of Sadie Alvarado, 20, of Muscatine. Alvarado's body was discovered along a ditch southwest of West Point on the morning of Aug. 5. Hamann turned himself into the Lee County Sheriff's office that same evening and was released the next day on a pretrial release.

On Wednesday, Hamann was charged with public consumption

of alcohol-1st offense out of Louisa County, which violated his pretrial release conditions and District 8B Judge Tyron Rogers issued a warrant for Hamann with a \$15,000 cash only bond.

Lee County Attorney Ross Braden said Hamann had not been taken into custody as of Friday.

# Frantz hauls in 137 yards as Hounds roll

DONNELLSON - For the second year in a row, the Fort Madison Bloodhound football team is starting 1-0. And for the second year in a row, the Hounds opened with a shutout win.

Fort Madison dropped cross-county rival Central Lee 21-0 in a game that in all reality could have been double that had the Hounds had a little better timing in the air.

Senior quarterback Lennon Barker, who threw for 281 yards, 18-31 passing on the night, had a handful of overthrows on the night, several of which were to open receivers in the endzone.

"We need to definitely work on our timing. I had a lot of overthrows," Barker said. "We've got some things to work on, but we have things we need to work on every week."

Barker started the game with a bang on a 71-yard completion to Dominic Frantz on the Hounds' first possession. Frantz, who finished with a very quiet 132 yards on five catches, was caught from behind by the Hawks' TJ Stutes at the 3-yard line. The Hounds then

fell as far back as the 43-yard line after a bad snap on 2nd and goal and then a double penalty on 3rd and goal from the 13. Barker and Frantz hooked up again for 21 yards but the drive fell short on 4th and goal when Barker hit Shaymouhr Redd-Donald for a 16yard pass play to the 6.

The Hounds forced a 4 and out at the 49 yard line and the Hounds mixed up the offense with runs by Kali Maestro and Barker dealing on the run. Junior Mike Mosena caught two passes in the series, the second for 15 yards, to get the Hounds to the 7 and Barker would bull in from the right side for the first points of the game to give the Hounds a 7-0 advantage.

Fort Madison caught Central Lee in another four down set forcing a punt that left the Hounds in good field position at the Hawks' 41. Maestro carried again three times for 24 yards in the series and Barker found three different receivers in the set before taking it off tackle again from two yards out to give the Hounds 14-0 with the AJ Nolting extra point.

Central Lee got their legs under them and took the next series 13 plays starting at their own 22 yard line and put senior tailback Tyler Hopp to work. Hopp carried the ball six times for 20 yards while junior signal-caller Evan Pohren completed three passes in the series including a 27-yard strike to Stutes that took the Hawks to the Bloodhound 4. Pohren then looked for Dalton Westercamp on a corner route that bounced off Redd-Donald's hands and then off Nicky Carter's hands before landing in Westercamp's arms only to fall to the ground incomplete. Redd-Donald would break up the next pass, as well, turning the ball back over to the Hounds on downs.

Both teams would exchange 4 and outs before Harley Pennamon picked off a Pohren pass at the 26 to end the half.

Fort Madison came out and scored quickly in the third when Diego Lozano spun and stiff-armed his way through the right side of the Hawk defense keeping his feet and stumbling into the endzone from about 10 yards out to set the final score.

It looked like the Hounds had scored after the Hawks were unable to get a first down on the next series and punted the ball to Brock Califf, who bobbled the punt and then picked it up and raced to the right, caught a couple blocks and scampered down to the sideline for a touchdown, but an illegal block on the play nullified the run. Fort Madison would run seven plays in the next series highlighted by a 30-yard pass play from Barker to Redd-Donald, but two incompletions and a holding penalty snuffed the drive forcing a punt.

After Central Lee worked a first down at 4th and 2, junior end Quentin Schneider picked off a Pohren pass on 1st and 10 and raced it back 22 yards to the Fort Madison 25. Penalties and a couple incompletions forced a 4-10 from the 15. Shiffman sent in Nolting, who made his only field goal attempt last year, but Nolting's shot went wide right and the Hawks took over

#### at the 20.

Both teams had a four and out before Fort Madison reeled off an 11-play drive to start the 4th quarter. Barker went 4-6 on the drive for 41 yards, but a sack at 3rd and 8 pushed Fort Madison back to the 33 and forced a punt. Central Lee went to the air with Pohren throwing eight times in the next series for 39 yards, but the last three fell to the ground. Neither team would get into scoring position the rest of the final period.

Shiffman said offensively the Hounds missed on some opportunities but for the first game of the season, the did what they needed to do.

"We were executing up front and doing what we needed to do but we have to get better at it and get sharper," he said "I think we improved as a team from the Mediapolis scrimmage but we still have a long way to go. We got work to do and we know it, but we'll get it accomplished."

Eight different ball carriers were used on the night by the Hounds led by Lozano who finished with 61 yards on just seven carries. Maestro had 22 yards on nine carries. Barker hit five different receivers on the night led by Frantz's 132 yards. Mosena had 56 yards on 5 catches and Redd-Donald had 70 yards on six grabs on the night.

The defensive effort was a bend-don't-break performance and holding Hopp to just 85 yards on 23 carries was no small feat, according to Shiffman.

"That Hopp kid's a ton. He got the ball a lot and he runs hard. We told our defense he would run hard and play hard and they did that for sure," Shiffman said.

"Our defense stepped up and made plays when they needed to. They bent a little at times, but when we needed them to make a play, we either forced a turnover or a punt."

Defensive coordinator Luke Rickelman said the defensive line controlled the game after giving up some yards early.

"Overall, I'm extremely happy with the entire defense and the way we played, Rickelman said. "We didn't do anything fancy, we played our base defense with a solid front and solid coverage. We didn't have to bring a ton of blitzes or overscheme. We knew what they wanted to do and they wanted to get the ball to Hopp, so we focused on the basics."

Rickelman said Schneider, who had five solo tackles, three assists, a sack, and an interception, had a standout night and said the entire defensive line came together after Hopp gained some big runs early.

The Hounds open the home schedule Friday with West Burlington coming to town. The Falcons fell at home 44-0 to Mediapolis Friday and will come into the contest 0-1.

# **Art groups bridge Lee County** for contests

FORT MADISON - The art industry like all else in life is constantly changing. A decade ago Barn Quilts were all the rage. Last few years Paint-Your-Own Canvas parties certainly attracted interest. Gaining in popularity in leaps and bounds is the growing plein air competitions around our area.

"Plein Air" means to paint outside, what you see, in the elements, on occasion with gawkers looking over your shoulder or mosquitos buzzing on your neck. Should you have that type of countenance and the skill to render what the landscape communicates to you in pastel, watercolor, colored pencil, or oil, you may have what it takes for this competition.

The idea originated with Virginia Riddle's desire to showcase Rand Park in Keokuk for some type of art contest where amateur artists could compete for prizes. Virginia joined forces with another Keokuk Fine Arts Council member, Joe Fierce, to pursue the proposition. Keokuk Rock the Arts committee worked with Ft. Madison Area Arts Association's Art-in-Central park to form a collective cultural arts weekend for Lee County Sept. 21-23, that will be marketed as Bridging the Arts in Lee County. Both non-profit organization's resolved to match Virginia Riddle's donation and a Lee County Plein Air Competition was born. From there outside patrons have added to both Keokuk and Ft. Madison awards to be determined on each day of display.

An artist may participate by submitting \$25 for both days or \$15 per day per town to compete in one day. Keokuk paint day is Sept. 22 with competitors needing to turn in works by 4:30 p.m. for competition at the tent outside of The Grand. Artists may submit up to two works for judging, but may display more for sale. Canvases or paper can be stamped at Keokuk Convention and Visitor Bureau

at 8 a.m. that morning and maps will be available.

Display will be from 5-7 p.m. for the public to view or purchase at the tent that will be set up next to the Grand Theatre. First place will be awarded \$225 while second takes \$125 and third \$50. Virginia Riddle Family will select Best Rand Park piece for \$200 purchase award. A "People's Choice" purchase award at \$300 will be selected at the event as well.

The plein air awards is pigeonholed between two major bands at the Grand. Hear the Motown Sound of Fantasy Band at 3pm followed by the heralded Tom Petty tribute band, Free Fallin' at 7:30pm. Tickets for the Grand Bands available at Keokuk Convention and Tourism Bureau and Hy-Vee in Keokuk, as well as FMAAA gallery in Ft. Madison.

Ft. Madison is the subject matter for the second day of competition on Sept. 23. Artists can get their canvases stamped at Art-in-Central Park in the morning and then off to paint. Finished products need to be at Art-in-Central Park for hanging at 2 p.m. for display at the event from 2:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. next to the Microbrew BBQ.

Placements awards are the same as Keokuk with addition of four added Honorable Mention awards at \$50 each. FMAAA will award purchase award for best Rail/River scene. Due to the shorter painting day, Ft. Madison will look to offer a nocturne painting opportunity at Riverview Park after the Keokuk display for those artists interested. Art supply merchandise awards will be granted at the display time as well from sponsors Jack Richeson Fine Art Materials and Guerilla Painter to a \$500 overall level. Dr. Marie Brady Whitcanack will be the juror for both Lee County plein air sites. So if you see a plein air siting in Lee County the weekend of Sept. 22-23, smile like spotting a Bald Eagle a few years back, cause the movement is popular and spreading
