State offers up 2019 STEM project funding menu


Schools, groups can apply online through March 4 for project resources

LEE COUNTY – With STEM being the action word of educational and economic development officials for the past half a decade, state officials continue to put money toward programs that focus on critical think-

A new wave of applications through Governor Kim Reynolds' Iowa STEM Advisory Council, is now being accepted for area schools and outside organizations

> interested in helping students of all ages engage in the STEM processes.





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The Iowa Governor's STEM Advisory Council began accepting Scale-Up applications for the 2019-2020 school year January 21st. Applications will be accepted through March 4th. For a complete list of 2019-2020 STEM Scale-Up Programs, and to apply please visit https://www.iowastem.gov/scale-up/.

"STEM careers with local business and industry is a major focus of our Grow Lee programing and are a vital economic development driver for the growth of SE Iowa and the state" said Millard, the group's economic development project director.

"Helping promote programs such as STEM Scale-ups are a great way for us to leverage our resources in order to benefit local students."

The STEM Scale-Up programs range from building robots and coding programs, to conducting agricultural field experiences and learning about STEM careers.

Millard said Lee County is leading Southeast Iowa in its participation in receiving STEM Scale-ups with

92% percent of the county's 13 public school buildings having received STEM Scale-up funding. That funding equates to more than \$60,000 in grants over the past four years. This is in addition to Fort Madison High School and Keokuk High School receiving \$25,000 each for the STEM BEST (Businesses Engaging Students and Teachers) program. Des Moines County has had 33% of their buildings receive a Scale-Up grant over the past four years, Henry County has had 54%, and Louisa County has had 50%.

Talks underway to help with city's redemption woes



FORT MADISON – The idea of having another redemption center in Fort Madison is being, well.... recycled.

Fort Madison Mayor Brad Randolph, who also serves as chairman of the Great River Regional Waste Authority board, has reopened conversations about the possibility of partnering with local businesses and Hope Haven out of Burlington to establish a functioning redemption center, he said.

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The move coincided with a bill introduced Jan. 17 in the Iowa Senate, that would up the amount of the reimbursement to redemption centers by a penny to two cents per beverage container.




The bill also cleans up language and would require distributors to pick up recycled containers at least weekly and provide payment within one week following the pick up.

The bill was introduced by State Sen. Mark Segebart (R-Vail) of the 6th District and was moved to a subcommittee on Wednesday.

Randolph said he'd had a few brief conversations with Wade Hamm, the director of GRRWA, as to whether space could be found to house the operations on landfill property.

Hamm said it might be difficult to find room at the landfill now, and he's not sure how much room the facility would need and what features would be required.



Randolph said he would like to see some businesses get behind the effort to help fund the operation. Spe-

Hound boys pitch 2nd quarter shutout in win over Clark County


Fedler scores 18; Rashid, Keester 12 ea.

KAHOKA - A second quarter shut out by the Fort Madison Bloodhounds Tuesday night was the catalyst to a 53-47 win over Clark County on the road.

Junior Jayden Fedler led Fort Madison with 18 points on the night including eight in the first quarter, to go with senior Brandon Keester's two 3-balls as the Hounds found themselves behind 17-14 after one.

But the Hound defense strapped the Indians

raced out to a 29-17 first half lead. Fort Madison converted three 3-pointers in the second period, two by

senior Logan Rashid and one from Keester. Clark County got things going again in the third period, putting up 17 with five different players scor-

ing in the period. Hound freshman Dayton Davis scored six in the third period and Keester got his fourth 3-pointer of the game to help the Hounds hold onto the lead.

Rashid would convert

4-of-4 free throws in the final period and Fedler would convert a couple bucket for Fort Madison to seal the win, despite the Indians outpacing the Hounds 13-10 down the stretch.

Rashid and Keester each finished with a dozen on the night for the Hounds. Davis finished with six points on the night, while Mike Mosena and Parker Denning both added two points. Jordyn Gerdes had one to round out the scoring for Fort Madison. Fort Madison went a sparkling 11-of-12 from the free throw line in the win.

Fedler is tops in the Southeast Conference in scoring with at 15.7 points per outing and 234 total points. He's also second


FAIRFIELD - Fairfield won all three games against the Little Hounds' 8th grade boys team on Tuesday.

Davis had three points in Fort Madison's 18-5 "C" game loss. Hantzeas added two to round out the scoring for Fort Mad-



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
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
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
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

Lee County has record of success with STEM funding

Kristine Bullock serves as the hub manager for the Governor's STEM Council for Southeast Iowa. She said the state has six regions and each region receives \$500,000 each year to award programs to area schools and organizations.

"We don't give money to the schools, we use it for training and programming," Bullock said. "Schools can apply for as many programs as they want. Potentially every teacher could get that training."

She said since 2011, the state has been allocating money to increase STEM participation at formal and informal school sessions. Informal school sessions could include scout groups, libraries, after-school programs and with 18 counties in southeast Iowa vying for the programming awards, the application process is very important.

Bullock said that Lee County has been able to take advantage of strong partnerships with the STEM council through the work of Lee County Economic Development Group.

"I believe that southeast Iowa and Lee County are either even, if not ahead, of the rest of the state, especially with the help of Lee County Economic Development Group," Bullock said.

"Dana is on my advisory board and that's a really great partnership and collaboration that has helped that area. We're still trying to make sure that every building has high quality STEM programing and we have pockets of excellence, but we need to make sure they have that programming every year. We don't want them to have that grade where things drop because they aren't continually thinking with that critical mindset."

On the Iowa Assessments, students who participated in the STEM Scale-Up Program scored higher than students statewide with an average of three percentage points higher in mathematics and reading, four higher in science.

"Lee County has a lot of STEM career opportunities, including careers that deal with robotics, engineering, math, and science.

It's important that we prepare our students for these careers" said Millard.

To help shape this, Millard sits on the Governor's SE Iowa STEM Advisory Council. The council is a public-private partnership of educators, companies, and Iowa students and families addressing policies and programs designed to improve Iowa's educational system focused on science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). The STEM Council works to engage and prepare students for a career-ready workforce path, regain Iowa's historic leadership position in education, and provide a vital competitive economic advantage now, and for the future, to ensure that every Iowa student has access to world-class STEM education opportunities.

"We wanted to try to get the word out that the application process is now open and we would like to see schools, groups, and non-traditional classrooms at all levels take advantage of these program resources," Bullock said.

Hamm said last week that Randolph asked to have the idea put back on the GRRWA's agenda.



Randolph said he asked for a meeting with Gobble to coordinate efforts and see what kind of funding could



be obtained. He also said he intended to reach out to

City Manager David Varley said if a place could be found to house the operation, the project might be

"They need to have a location, but I think if there was a place, Hope Haven would get pretty serious about it," Varley said.

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
