Old Fort to host "Dead Zone" in October

FORT MADISON - The Old Fort Commission met in special session Tuesday night to decide whether or not to let ghouls and zombies inhabit the Old Fort for three weekends in October and on Halloween.

The commission held the special session to iron out issues such as dates, hours, insurance, and hear about the details of the event.

As a result, the commission unanimously approved to sponsor the "Dead Zone" at the Old Fort on October 12-14, 19-21, and 26-28, and then open on from 5 to 7 p.m. on Halloween for Trick or Treating. The haunted Fort would be open from 7:30 to 10:30 p.m. to allow volunteers to close The Fort down and be out of Riverview Park before the park closes at 11 p.m. Tickets would be \$10 per person.

At a previous commis-

sion meeting, the commission voted to consider using the Old Fort from 5 to 8 p.m. for three weekends in October for a haunted house.

But City Tourism Director Jean Peiton who has helped organize the event along with Jadi Zioui, said she couldn't get behind the project if the hours weren't changed.

"I'll be honest, I have

no desire to try to do a haunted house from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. It would be very limited in its audience and you wouldn't draw the people you're looking for," Peiton said.

Zioui said 11 p.m. would be a good compromise even though you are losing an hour of fundraising.

"It's going to be a lot of fun," Zioui said. "People

are going to talk about it. This year we're not in it for the money but to show our chops and see what we can do. It's going to be the best \$10 they've ever spent, I promise you."

The haunted house would take groups of five to seven with a spirit leader who will guide visitors through the ground areas

Carol Dweck is a woman with incredible foresight. She is one of the world's leading researchers in the field of motivation. Her research has focused on why people succeed and how to foster success.

She has spoken all over the world and authored four books which are highly acclaimed. Dweck's "fail forward" mantra has been widely accepted as an agent of change in educational circles, and is becoming a standard of practice in the education of students around the globe. Her research is just as easily adapted to personal life, perhaps more so than in the world of education. As a culture, we have forgotten that athletics in the formative years is not about winning. It's about growing. Period. Don't go any further. Leave it at that.

Parents: it's understandable that you want your child to do well. It's normal to want your child to have the highest test score, or be told that your first grader is reading at a third-grade level. This seems to be a growing cultural phenomenon, however. It starts early, too. The first thing parents tell their relatives is how long their newborn child is; How much they weigh. These statistics make up the most common social media posts from new parents, along with the cliché "we're so in love!", which should go without saying, but is emphatically stated, anyway.

As the child grows into the stage of life that athletic competition becomes commonplace, this cultural phenomenon seems to intensify. Parents seem literally crazy at times as they coach or spectate their children's sporting events. This has become such a problem that little leagues and youth sports programs are finding it necessary to inform parents that the competitors are kids, coaches are volunteers, and that scholarships won't be handed out on that day.

I'm not faultless here.

Travel teams are forming for alarmingly young children. Going out of state is worn as a badge of honor. Playing above your age level is like being elected President of the United States. Pointing these things out is not meant to be demeaning to parents who advocate for travel teams. Although, I urge you to carefully

Scholl says reward is watching light bulb come on

floored and didn't know what to say. I almost started crying," Scholl said. "I was shocked and I'm very humble and don't talk about myself and things I do but the kids were ecstatic and wanted to know what was going on. They got some video of us teaching and interviewed my co-teacher and some of the students."

Her nomination form was submitted by her husband Troy and as part of the essay he said that her compas-

sion runs far outside the school building walls.

"How do you know when the teacher's compassion extends beyond the classroom... But the simple fact that after they leave her classroom and move on to the high school, they continue to come back by and stop by her classroom just to say hi ... because the kids understood what it meant when Mrs. Scholl invested in them!," he wrote in the nomination.

"He's always been a big supporter," she said.

Scholl said she grew up in Fort Madison and now lives in Fort Madison but isn't looking to teach in Fort Madison because she loves her job and the students and respects what's going on in her district.

"Since taking over that at-risk program I absolutely love what I do and I believe in the Keokuk school district and what they do... but I'm a Bloodhound. When I moved back it was more important for me to have a solid support structure than to live where I work," Scholl said.

She started her education in San Diego where she was a nanny and went to night school, then came back and graduated from Western Illinois with her teaching

certificate in 1993. She said her parents encouraged her and pitched in financially to get her master's degree and she finished that in 2000. Now she's looking at completing her education with an administration degree and wants to someday become a principal.

She said one of her main goals as an administrator would be to keep building relationships with the students and said her husband encouraged her to get her doctorate and push her education, but she said she doesn't really want to be known as Dr. Scholl.

Scholl said her greatest reward is in seeing the growth of the students.

"I absolutely love it when the kids grow and you see the light bulb come on. And I love building the relationships. Many of the students don't have the best home life or their backgrounds are not great. But if we can get them in school and gain their trust and get them to trust us and build that relationship, they can get through the academic piece much easier."

This year Scholl teaches four core classes to sixth graders and then teaches 7th and 8th grade at-risk math classes. She said Keokuk currently has four teachers in the at-risk program.

and ground level buildings. The concept would be a scary take on the history of the fort in a 12-15 minute tour.

"Once this is up and running, money in the future would be funneled back into the Old Fort. We need to replace uniforms, make sure we have period specific displays when the Fort's open. When I talked with David and had meetings about these concepts, what bothered me is we need to think outside the box of what we've been doing with the Old Fort to come up with ideas to make sure it has some longevity with the community. It tends to cost more with city funding than what revenue it creates. I don't know if we kept doing things the same if we'll ever get a different outcome," Peiton said.

The group had originally planned to start the haunted tours on Oct. 7 and 8th, but with the prison having tours those days, the commission thought it would be better to have the Fort open on those days.

Costumes are being made by volunteers and seamstresses who have offered to help create them.

The other sticking point was insurance for the event. John Luna, the city's Management Analyst, said a policy could cost the group between \$400 and \$500 unless the Old Fort Commission itself sponsored the event. If that were to happen then the event would be covered under the city's policy since a city commission was sponsoring the event.

The commission also said no pyrotechnics or smoking would be allowed on the grounds of the Fort.

On Halloween night, the group would offer a more kid-friendly experience and work in conjunction with the city's Trick-or-Treat times which are from 5 to 7 p.m.

Peiton said she is also considering using an independent contractor to manage the event and paying that person or group 10% of the ticket unless expenses of the event exceed revenues. A contract is being drawn up for those who may be interested in managing the event.

Winning causes stress that can ruin passion for activity

monitor the philosophy of the team and the characteristics that your child's coach is espousing.

This is where it gets tricky. If winning becomes the defining characteristic, failure becomes unacceptable; if failure is unacceptable, participation becomes stressful; if participation becomes stressful, the love of the game wanes; if the love of the game wanes, quitting becomes commonplace. Either that or we create a subculture of youngsters who are whiny, consumed by their individual abilities, and only worry about what the score is. It's a vicious cycle!

Failing is normal. It is interwoven into the fabric of our being. It's how we learn nearly everything in life. And yet, failure somehow has a negative connotation. Parents will do nearly anything to ensure their children don't fail. This is the wrong approach. How do we expect children to experience success on their own if we will not allow them to fail?

To learn how to respond to failure is the essence of childhood. Using one's brain to overcome adversity, to think critically, to become a problem-solver, is the hallmark of a healthy individual.

Nearly nobody will care that your child was a state champion when they were in the fourth grade. What does that even mean? Colleges and universities are more concerned about the rigor of the courses a student took than they are with a student's GPA or class rank. Why? Because rigor means the likelihood of failure.

When you're sitting around twiddling your thumbs, do some research on the success of valedictorians and salutatorians in relation to other students. You'll be surprised to find that being such doesn't carry over into life any more than the student who attained a GPA of 2.50. In fact, because the student with a 2.50 likely dealt with more adversity and failure, that student is just as likely, if not more, to be successful in life.

Technical fields or employers want students with practical experience. They discard almost everything else in a student's profile. Because relevance drives the need to learn from experiences.

Let your children fail. When they fall, let them get up on their own. As they get older, resist the urge to coddle them when things don't go their way. It's difficult to watch our children experience heartbreak. It's also necessary. Everyone reading this has experienced it.

As Michael Jordan stated, "I've failed, over and over again, and that is why I succeed." Michael Jordan is one of the greatest athletes of all time. Will you so easily deny his expertise? Letting your child fail will invoke some terrible temporary emotions. You'll be the bad guy. That's certain. Later in life, those lessons will evoke other emotions and they will be grateful failure was a part of their experience. View the macro rather than the micro. "fail forward!"

FMHS spikers lose in five sets to IC Liberty squad

FORT MADISON - FMHS battled back in each of the first four sets to force a tiebreaker against Iowa City Liberty at the Hound Dome Tuesday night in girls volleyball action.

But the Hounds jumped out a 5-1 lead in the tiebreaker only to fall 9-15 to lose the match to the 8-15 Lightning, 21-25, 27-25, 22-25, 25-18 (9-15).

In the first game the Hounds were down 4-6 before senior Amber Dilsaver served out five straight points to push the lead to 9-6 before Liberty's Roman Lauren got the kill to make it a one point game. The entire varsity squad for the new Liberty high school is made up of freshman and sophomores with the exception of one junior.

The team battled through a one-point swing until an error on the Lightning gave the Hounds a slight 14-12 advantage, but a kill by Madian Elola again closed the gap to one point where it would stay until the Hounds blocked a kill that sailed out of bounds and the Lightning were one point away. Dilsaver missed on a kill and LeeAnn Potter had a kill of her own for Iowa City and the game was over 25-21.

The Hounds battled back from a 4-11 deficit in the second set getting good play at the net from senior Shyla Farmer who had two kills and a block to pull Fort Madison to within one at 12-13. Liberty got shots from Elola and Olivia Slattery to push the lead out to 12-15. The three-point lead would hold until an FMHS error made it 14-19.

Olivia Williams served three straight with Dilsaver getting two big blocks and a kill to bring the Hounds back at 18-20 in the midst of a 6-2 run. Junior Kaeli Hutson had back-to-back kills and an error by the Lightning knotted the set at 21s. Slattery added a kill that was answered by sophomore Jillian Wiseman. Dilsaver threw in another block and the score was tied again at 24. After trading the next two points, the Hounds' Farmer recorded a kill and then senior McKenna Fehseke ended the set with a kill from the left side to even up the contest.

The third game was much the same nip-and tuck through the set with the biggest lead coming at 13-11 and 15-13 for the Hounds, both on kills by junior Jassmine Bass. The Lightning tied it up at 14s on a

hitting error by the Hounds at the net and then the visitors took their first lead of the game 16-17 on another FMHS hitting error.

Head Coach Kent Bailey said that was the theme of the night.

"Our biggest problem tonight was we just made way too many mistakes," he said. "Give them credit. They forced us to and we did."

At 18-21 the Hounds committed four hitting errors in six points to surrender the contest 22-25.

In the fourth game the Hounds and Lightning traded points through a 4-4 tie and before Iowa City went on an 8-3 run to take at 12-7 lead on a kill by Elola. The Hounds put together a couple of scoring streaks, at 4-1 on a kill by Fehseke to close the gap to 11-13 and then Dilsaver went to work at the net with three kills and a big block to set the Hounds on a 5-0 run that left them up 17-13. The Lightning wouldn't get much closer in that set with FMHS running away with that set 25-18 on a kill by Wiseman and a Lightning hitting error to end the game.

Senior Kamryn Bailey served nine straight for the Hounds during an 8-0 run in the set.

"We did some good things serving when we quit serving for aces and served to put it in somewhere like they were doing, but we made too many serving mistakes early and had to work our way out," Bailey said.

In the tiebreaker Fehseke had two back-to-back kills to force an Iowa City timeout, but the stoppage worked and the Lightning put six quick points on the board with Koski Piper serving the whole way. Bailey called a timeout at 5-7, but the Hounds couldn't get back in rhythm before Iowa City reached 15.

Bailey said he should have stopped play earlier than he did.

"Our mindset in the tiebreaker was to get a couple more plays and we go up 7-1 and that game is about over. But I made a mistake and didn't call a timeout sooner to help us refocus and I allowed them to get up a couple points on us and then we had to battle back and we just didn't do that as well tonight."

The Hounds are 16-5 and had just entered the state rankings at No. 14 after a 10-match win streak. They host Mediapolis on Thursday and then return to conference action Tuesday at Fairfield.

The Fort Madison City Council met in adjourned session at 5:30 P.M. on Tuesday, September 19, 2017, at City Hall, 811 Avenue E. Mayor Randolph presided with Council Members Greenwald, Wright, Rink, Andrews, Seidel and Lair present. Council Member Cangas was absent.

On motion, Council approved the agenda as written.

Be It Resolved By the City Council of the City of Fort Madison, Iowa:

SECTION 1. The City Council of the City of Fort Madison, Iowa does hereby amend Title 9, Chapter 11, Size, Weight & Load, Section 2, Height of Vehicles; Permits, by changing the next to last sentence of the paragraph, which reads: "The permits shall be issued annually for a fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) and subject to rules adopted by the State", to read as follows:

"The permits shall be issued annually, said fee set by resolution of the City Council, and subject to rules adopted by the State."

SECTION 2. The City Council of the City of Fort Madison, Iowa does hereby amend Title 9, Chapter 11, Size, Weight & Load, Section 6, Application: Moving Large Vehicle, by deleting the word "Chief", and inserting in lieu thereof, the phrase "Public Works Director".

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of these ordinances are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. If any section, provision, or part of

this ordinance be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any portion, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall be in effect after its final passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.




