PAW helps rescue 77 Shih Tzu

FORT MADISON - The local PAW animal shelter is 37 dogs heavier after helping rescue 77 Shih Tzus from a home in Burlington today.

Sandy Brown, director of the Fort Madison PAW shelter said she was notified before Christmas that a lady in Burlington had a number of pure bread Shih Tzu dogs that needed to be re-homed. At that time the number was 30.

"Well, the gentleman

that's been caring for them called us last week and said there were 60. When we got to the home there were 77."

Brown said the local PAW facility wouldn't be able to handle all 77, so she contacted AHeinze57 out of DeSoto, Iowa to assist in the rescue, which took place on Friday and Monday.

"They specialize in special needs animals, so they took the very young and the old and we took the ones in the middle." Brown said.

"We just gave them a Yorkie that needed to have two knees replaced and they've just been wonderful."

Brown said it was her understanding that the woman was a breeder who's husband had died

last year and then she had taken ill and things got out of hand. She said that even though it was

a "hording" case, the animals were in relatively good care.

FORT MADISON - Most young children have dreams of what they want to be when they grow up. Typically those dreams change as we mature and move into adulthood. But sometimes they don't.

When Patti Wachtendorf takes over the helm of the Iowa State Penitentiary in early February it will be a culmination of a dream she had as a young teenager in Carthage.

"You didn't want to be a warden when you were growing up?," Wachtendorf said in a Monday morning interview at the ISP facility. "I watched a movie, and I wish I could think of the name of it, it was back in the late

60s- early 70s and the inmates were abused. And I thought it was terrible so I was gonna go in and change the world."

She said most kids when she was in school thought they had to be a cop to change the world. When she was in high school she wrote letters to wardens to see if she could go see their facilities and three said yes.

"So I went from Carthage to Rockwell City which was a long way and then to two prisons in Illinois," she said.

Wachtendorf began her career with the Department of Corrections in 1983 at ISP. She was a Correctional Officer, Investigator, Senior Correctional Officer, Correctional Counselor and Treatment Services Director. She left Fort Madison in December 1997

when she was appointed as Treatment Services Director at the Mount Pleasant Correctional Facility. In January 2001, she became the Security Director at Iowa Correctional Institute for Women in Mitchellville and then Deputy Warden in July of 2006.

I'm excited to come back home. I have children and grandchildren here," she said. "I've always wanted to work in corrections and my ultimate goal has always been maximum security warden and Fort Madison is home."

Wachtendorf will be replacing current Warden Nick Ludwick, who is retiring after close to 42 years in Iowa and Michigan

HTC kicks off new building campaign

WEST POINT - A \$6 million building campaign was the kickstart of the 2017 Catholic Schools week for the Holy Trinity School systems on Monday.

More than 400 people packed the Holy Trinity Catholic gymnasium in West Point Monday to kick off the campaign with school and local officials speaking to the group after a mass was celebrated.

Dennis Menke, the campaign chairman, along with wife Kate, for the Holy Trinity Catholic Elementary School project, said he was hoping to raise the money in six months, but he knew it was a big

"It's my hope that we can raise this money in six months," he said. "That way we would start construction at the end of the school year. Our archdiocese in Davenport mandates that we have a minimum of 60% of the funds before we can begin work. That means we would need \$3.6 million to start the work."

Sheerin said he had to leave immediately after the ceremonies due to his daughter giving birth.

"What a great day to share possibly the birth of our first grandchild and the birth of this wonderful project to send us into generations to come," Sheerin said.

Brian Foecke, the HTC Foundation Board president addressed the crowd first.

"I didn't actually look it up, but I'd bet it's been around 50 years since a new catholic school building has been built in Lee County, Iowa. Think about that...50 years,"

Foecke said.

Several dignitaries spoke to the audience including Davenport Diocese Superintendent Lee Morrison; Brad Box, HTC School Board president, and

Father Bruce DeRammelaere, about the rich heritage and history of the Catholic school system in Lee County.

Then Sheerin and principal Bob Carr led a parade of kindergartners singing the Seven Dwarfs mantra, "Hi Ho, Hi Ho, it's off to work I go," donned in yellow construction hats and some carrying shovels.

The project will entail demolishing the current school buildings aside from the gym and rebuilding it to make the whole campus enclosed for greater efficiency and security and to bring the facilities into the 21st century.

"The project will replace the entire school campus for the elementary students at HTC," said Menke. "We need to replace our school because it's over 100 years old and it doesn't fit the style. They don't teach school and classes the way they did 100 years ago. Students today need an environment they can learn in. There are no such things as blackboards and chalk anymore. It all has to do with I-pads and computers. This current campus can't be retrofitted to work the way we want it to."

"This will get us a new building, a new cafeteria and restrooms that will be connected to the gym. So when we have games and activities in the gym we can have the cafeteria right there and it will be very user friendly."

Menke said after the kickoff event today, efforts will get underway to communicate with alumni and community partners to help educate possible donors about the facility.

"Right now we're kicking this off. But our next thing will be to contact people away from here, the

This guy just keeps on runnin'

Mohrfeld will pass 40 years in the greenhouse game in *February*

FORT MADISON - "It's an evolution, not a revolution."

That's a quote from 60-year-old Matt Mohrfeld in response to a basic question about the flower business.

But a twinkle in his eye, and the wide smile he shares with everyone, shows maybe it's more of his mantra on life than a business perspective.

The owner and founder of Matt's Greenhouse will roll over 40 years in business on Feb. 22 and clearly has no plans to step aside. A Chamber Ambassador call has been set for Feb. 24 at his office at the top of 15th Street.

"I may lean into, but I'm not stepping out of it," he said Friday morning in his warehouse office nestled between the white rows of greenhouses where his wholesale bedding plant business, literally, regrows every year.

As evidence that he has no intention of sliding away from the work he's

been doing, Mohrfeld, who left Iowa State University before starting his business, is now just about a year away from a degree in Agronomy. Clearly the degree isn't what positioned Mohrfeld for the success he's had, so going after the degree begged the question, why?

"The mind is like the body and you have to keep working to keep it strong," Mohrfeld said. "And I have a 14-year-old son at home there's only one way he's going to learn and that's by somebody doing it."

This is highly believable coming from a man who literally at times will run across the state of Iowa with a group of friends, can constantly be seen on Facebook crossing a finish line or barking encouragement to his son, Jacob or another human fish while perched at the end of a swimming pool with a stopwatch.

Mohrfeld's life seems, and feels, even in a short hour-long conversation, like a race. But not a race to see how much can be done before it ends, but more of race of 'what's next'...a constant drive to...

Still growing

With his 40th anniversary rolling over in February, Fort Madison' Matt Mohrfeld is still reaching for the stars. At 60, he's about a year away from getting a degree in Agronomy that he started, more than 40 years ago. An avid runner, Mohrfeld said his role is more visionary now than dayto-day, and his plans are simply to stay viable.

well...evolve.

Matt's Greenhouse started in 1976 when he took over a two-block area at the bottom of the bluff on Avenue B that his brother Rich had just purchased.

"There was a stumbling little greenhouse there, the old Auge Greenhouse," Mohrfeld said. "I came home from ISU and said, hey, I'd like to run a garden center there. So that spring I did and that's how it all started," he said.

About a year later, Mohrfeld acquired a flower shop near Faeth's called the East End Florist. Shortly after opening that he closed it and incorporated the customer base

into his other greenhouse. Then in 1989 he purchased the "Cushman's" building on the highway

and moved the retail garden and flower shop there. In 1998 he grabbed the property east of the rodeo arena and started a massive expansion for wholesale bedding plants. In 2000 he married his wife Beth and in 2003 Jacob was born. Jacob attends Holy Trinity and competes in tri-athalons and swims competitively for Burlington High School.

Now, Mohrfeld said he has the fifth largest wholesale greenhouse operation in the state. He credits his start in the wholesale side to Phil Beebe of Wever.

"At that time I had the retail business, I was also doing some work for Phil and I really started to learn the wholesale side of the business. He was starting to grow beyond his capacity and told me

to get into the business and even asked me to take over a route and that sent me off onto this wholesale bedding plant business."

As a result of a self-described "Conservative-aggressive approach to expansion", Mohrfeld partnered with Quincy's Niemann Foods (County Market, Save-A-Lot, Ace Hardware) who is now his largest customer.

"The first year I sold for them, they wrote me a check for \$5,000, and last year they wrote me a check for \$1 million. That should give you some sense of where we're at."

Indeed. Mohrfeld said his customer base ranges from just north of St. Louis. Mo., north to Clinton, Iowa and east to just this side of Champaign, Ill.

with limited customers to the west of Fort Madison.

The biggest hurdles he's

seen in the past 40 years? "Probably most of them myself," he said.

"As you grow you have to manage and think and learn. You have to change with the market and the nice thing in my business is it's an evolution and not a revolution."

He also said one of the keys to his success - and a constantly developing part of his business - is attracting, retaining and training employees. His company over the past five years has put \$2.5 million in payroll back into the local economy. He has a regular staff of about 10 full-time employees, but expands to 60 during the planting season which runs from the beginning of the year until about June, where he says then production and distribution start to overlap.

"You have to build that staff...team if you will.... a family, and then keep working, growing that new customer base. We're just now adding a customer development person. We want to use social media this year to tell our story a little better about our team," he said.

A Facebook post this past week showed Mohrfeld moving around a whiteboard in his office in a red hoodie with an old digital scoreboard in the background pointing to attributes he's looking for as he literally broadcasts his new Customer Development opening.

"We had a response to that video in two minutes. Two minutes.. and we've had at least 12 more come in since then. It was incredible. And I never would have done that had I not gone back to work on finishing my degree. I learned that in a leadership training class."

Mohrfeld also said he is passionate about keeping the business as energy friendly as possible. He had solar panels erected on a north greenhouse and said that's reducing his energy demand and he may look at expanding that in the future as well.

His cessation plans are simple, especially for a man who thinks he may live forever. "

"I'm going keep making it an aggressive viable business and surround myself with quality people and see what happens down the road. I have no immediate intentions of retiring, but a very immediate intention of taking on a different role. For the past five years I've taken on more of a visionary role than a day-to-day role and that's going to continue," Mohrfeld said.

"It's a question that everybody asks and I tell everyone, 'Everybody's going to die but me.. but I could be wrong about that."

from old to new and dealing with the construction," she said. "We had some (in Mitchellville) too

but we're not maximum

security. He got the staff to adapt and offenders to adapt. He's handled all the hard work of construction and got most of the bugs worked out. I think there's still a few bugs to work out. Nick will get me up to speed on all the issues remaining as far as construction."

Part of that hard stuff

was getting the new facility up and running and offenders transferred over from the old site. Ludwick said the public perception was tough but internally everyone stayed on message.

"We managed that here. I spoke with staff often about our delayed moves and getting raked over the coals, if you will, with the delayed move and the additional budget. I convinced staff that this was no fault of our own. Our work is ongoing and the move is only one facet of the assimilation and continuation of the process of getting this place up and running."

He said he's lauded staff about their strong family ties at the prison and a real sense of community at and away from the workplace. And that focus helps offset the bad news on the outside.

Lee County Supervisor Ron Fedler, who spent more than two decades as a guard at the prison, said he wished Wachtendorf all the best. "As a supervisor I look forward to working with her and the Lee County Board looks for a long and prosperous relationship with her and the Iowa State Penitentiary."

Ludwick said he's leaving completely confident in Wachtendorf's leadership.

"I leave begrudgingly, because I'm leaving before I wanted to leave for medical reasons." Ludwick said. "But I leave very confident in Patti. Our styles are very similar in walking and "

talking, we have high expectations for staff, we're both extremely accessible. We believe that humor, when used appropriately in the workplace, really helps in this type of environment. Every day can go bad in this type of institution. There are two types of silence in a prison and only one of which is acceptable. The potential is always there for unrest, but when we do what we do and train others do the same you can prevent things from going wrong."

He also said that he believes, in a spiritual sense, that he's been afforded special favors in his battle with cancer for the work that he's done.

"I'll return home to my

family and I may write. My only regret is not coming to Iowa sooner," Ludwick said. "It's been that positive of an experience. To see the staff interactions and interactions with offenders. It's just been great to have been a part of that culture change."

"I would like to thank the people of Iowa and my staff. Everyone has known I've been battling a medical situation, but I've had an open book about it," Ludwick said. "The biggest thing for me is thanking citizens of Fort Madison and the support they've given me. I leave with head held high, sooner than I would have preferred, but knowing full well that I have a capable replacement who is also a personal friend. My work is complete."

Wachtendorf said she's looking forward to becoming a part of the Fort Madison community and helping to continue educating and updating locals on the prison's operations.

"It's part of our job to talk about the positive things that happen. It's not all gloom and doom and there are great things the prisons do. It's not all negative. I like to go out and speak to the Kiwanis and local groups and help educate the community. I don't want them to be afraid of the prison. We employee a lot of people and I want those people to be proud they work here and see we can help make a difference in peoples lives. That's why were here."


