

Mayor pursuing depot despite council poll

Randolph, Greenwald on quest to find late funding

FORT MADISON – He called it a standing eight count, but Fort Madison Mayor Brad Randolph hasn't given up on relocating the Amtrak depot to the historic museum in Riverview Park.

Despite what amounted to a straw poll of the Fort Madison City Council Tuesday that indicated the council wouldn't support continuing the depot project in light of critical budget constraints, Randolph said he



and Councilman Chris Greenwald are not done looking for answers. "I just don't want people to think I was in favor of the project and then against it. After hearing Councilman (Chad) Can-

gas say he was ready to wash his hands of the depot and then (Councilman Matt) Mohrfeld say the council wouldn't vote

for it, I was very frustrated and said at that point maybe it was best to pull it," Randolph said Saturday.

"But I took a standing eight count, I've brushed myself off, and now we're going to look at see what's out there."

When Randolph polled the council during a budget workshop and the informal consensus was to pull funding for the remainder of the relocation, a cost estimated at about \$280,000, Greenwald said the council might as well board up the city.

Greenwald told the council that it isn't necessarily the best option to shut all activity down and weather the storm.

He said if the city wasn't going to continue to look to the future, then the council should just pull outside funding, including funding for the Old Fort, the historical society, the arts association, and all external support, and focus all revenues back to the general fund.

"Just shut her down, board her up," he said. Randolph said he's been spearheading this project since 2012 and the city has spent countless hours and

resources on the project, and if it wasn't for the squeez-

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

whoever bought the ticket also added the Power Play® option to the purchase, which multiplied the prize to \$2 million. The Burlington ticket was the only one in the country to win a \$2 million prize in Saturday's drawing.

Saturday's winning numbers were: 1-2-3-7-39 and Powerball 25. No one matched all six numbers to win the jackpot, so the big prize climbs to an estimated \$242 million annuity (\$148.1 million lump-sum option) for Wednesday.

Hy-Vee will receive a \$2,000 bonus from the Iowa Lottery for selling the \$2 million-winning ticket at one of its stores.

Prizes of \$2 million must be claimed at Iowa Lottery headquarters in Clive. The lottery's offices are open Monday through Friday. If the winner or winners need information before coming forward to claim the prize, they are welcome to call the lottery at 515-725-7900.

Earlier this month, a Quad-Cities man claimed a \$1 million Mega Millions® prize with a ticket he purchased at a central-Iowa convenience store for that game's Jan. 15 drawing. Danny Lovett, a trucker driver from East Moline, Ill., claimed his \$1 million prize on Feb. 4.


TJ Stutes led the Hawks with 12 points and Tyler Hopp had 10.



Mohrfeld's district time in the 100 was a BHS record and the first under a minute.

In the 200 individual medley race, Mohrfeld finished 22nd, but his third turn at a time of :34.25 was seventh fastest on the day.

He also swam on the 200-medley relay and the 200 individual relay, both of which BHS teams finished 18th of 24 teams. In the medley relay, the Grayhounds finished at 1:41.09. Mohrfeld's :26.75 was the seventh fastest second leg of the event. Fellow HTC junior Wyatt Hellman swam the final leg at :23.05. Danville's Kale Schuff and Central Lee's Blake Wyrick also swam on both relay teams.

The Grayhounds finished at 1:30.65 in the freestyle medley with Mohrfeld on the first leg. Hellman swam the third leg at :22.98.

Mohrfeld said he'll get small break now before training for the YMCA swim season where his state and district times have qualified him for the national meet.

"I'm not done with my season. I participate in the YMCA league. I've been doing that since I was five and I keep doing that. I'll start training for state and regionals. There's about three weeks to state, three weeks after that is the regional meet, and then the national event," he said. "But my family and I haven't discussed that far ahead yet."

Mohrfeld said he comes from a family of non-swimmers.

"Both of my parents can't swim. My dad (Matt) really knows how to train and stuff like that, but he can't swim to save his life."

Wyrick also competed in the 50- and 100-yard freestyle events. The senior lost .3 of a second off his district time in the 50 to finish 22nd out of 24. In the 100, he cut .4 seconds off his district time and finished with the 18th best time in the state.

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
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



Mayor hopes to have news at Feb. 19 meeting

ing the budget has experienced in the last few fiscal years, the council would still support it.

City funding has dropped almost \$330,000 in sales tax revenue alone, in addition to the city's contribution from riverboat gambling ending several years ago.

Opponents of continuing to fund the depot say there has been no real commitment on the part of Amtrak to get the project moved. Amtrak has committed \$150,000 to the project plus a \$400 monthly rental on the property. However, the national rail service system has moved methodically slow in agreeing to submitted documentation.

At Tuesday's meeting Cangas said he had no faith in Amtrak's commitment to the city currently with the project, or in the future with maintaining the stop in Fort Madison.

Cangas also left the meeting early and wasn't on hand when Randolph was doing the straw poll of the council, citing he had to travel the next day. Cangas's departure left several tied issues with the six remaining councilman expressing their opinions.

Randolph said the project has taken close to two decades, a time frame that could ultimately be the reason for its demise.

"This project has taken way longer than anyone anticipated, and for reasons beyond our control, and that's part of the problem here as well," he said.

The city is planning on a vote to approve the next fiscal year budget, which begins on July 1, at the Feb. 19th meeting.

"We're taking the information we have now and we are looking at all options and talking with a lot of people. And we hope to have something in front of the council on the 19th," Randolph said.

He said he believes that if he can find a way to take most of the financial burden off the city, he can garner enough votes from the council to move forward with the project.
