Early voting dooms

Harlow, Kurtz lose at polls, but win with absentee margins

FORT MADISON -Early voting was critical to the success of several local Democrats in local elections Tuesday night. Rich Harlow won the District 3 Lee County Supervisors race with 1,481 votes to 1,277 or 54.6% of the votes cast in the five precincts. Harlow won 59.2% of the absentee and early voting. However, Harlow won by 204 votes, but had a 260 vote lead in absentee and early voting numbers.

"I'm glad it's over," Harlow said. "That was a lot of hard work and knocking on doors and parades."

He said he's anxious to get working for the people of Lee County and the board of supervisors. "I look forward to working with them," he said. "I've been to a lot of the meetings and they're all hard working people. Looking forward to working with them and the staff as well."

Late voter results push Reynold's back into Governor's chair

A very telling statistic in that race was that Reichman had more votes on election day than Kurtz had. Jeff Kurtz took 2,908 absentee and early votes compared to Reichman's 1886 for a difference of 1,022, but Reichman lost the election by only 931 votes. So Reichman actually had 91 more votes on election day.

"I think the absentee ballots helped, those are votes in the bank," Kurtz said. "We engaged in absolutely no dirty campaigning. I congratulate Jeff. He's probably the strongest candidate that they could have run. There were some factors there that didn't play well. I think it was matter of timing."

Kurtz said he thinks Democrats gained some ground because of emotional issues such as collective bargaining, IPERS, and underfunded education as well as the privatized Medicaid debacle.

Reichman said he was told the election would be decided by Oct. 9 and the absentee ballots proved that projection correct.

"Unfortunately, you can't take those out of the equation," Reichman panned after the results were in.

"It was a good experience overall and my first venture into politics. As we say in life and the military, you'll learn more from your defeats than through your victories."

He said that wasn't a precursor to a future run, but he didn't rule it out either.

"It's too early to tell. We'll regroup and re-evaluate," he said.

He said the Democrats just outspent his campaign and that was the main reason for the loss.

"We were just getting outspent. I said from the beginning, my measure of our success is what they had to counter. If we did something, they had to counter it and outspend us and they did that 13 to 1," Reichman said. "We had a good message. For the price they spent, they could have taken everyone out to lunch. I spent enough to return two pop cans. It's hard to compete with that, but at the end of the day they got more votes."

Reichman congratulated Kurtz on the win and said the two are really very similar except on taxes.

"Congratulations to him. We shook hands a few times and said we're going to have a beer after this and I'm going to hold him to that. We were close on everything except the tax and spend."

In the other races at the county level, U.S Rep. Dave Loebsack of Iowa's 2nd District beat Dr. Christopher Peters 6,482 to 5,558 and went on to win the seat. Businessman Fred Hubbell led Gov. Kim Reynolds through the night's reporting and took Lee County 6,353 to 5,949. Again the margin of defeat was in early voting with Hubbell holding an 809

vote advantage, but only carried the county by 404. Secretary of State Paul Pate carried Lee County with 6,184 to 5,924 for Deidre Dejear. DeJear held a 642 vote lead in early voting. County Democrats carried Democrat

Rob Sand 6,180 to Mary Mosiman's 5,861. Treasurer Michael Fitzgerald (D) carried the county 6,487 to 5,609, while Secretary of Agriculture Tim Gannon (D) carried the county 6,021 to 5,879 in a very close county vote. Democrat Tom Miller carried Lee County in a landslide with 8,063 votes to Libertarian Marco Battaglia's 2,694. Local democrats Ross Braden, Nancy Booten, Chris Spann, and Rick Larkin all were re-elected unopposed.

HTC to try and keep state foes off balance

FORT MADISON - Been there - done that.

Head Coach Melissa Freesmeier, if you've been living under a rock and don't know yet, is taking the Holy Trinity Crusaders to the Class 1A state volleyball tournament again for the ninth straight year.

The action kicks off Wednesday

the 3rdseed Crusaders will face off against 6th-seeded Montezuma.

The Lady Braves were ranked 7th in the state in 1A at the end of the regular season sporting a 30-6 record through regional play and haven't dropped a set since Sept. 27. They disposed of 10th-ranked New London in three sets 25-13, 25-22 and 25-20, right after HTC got their ticket to state punched with a 25-10, 25-11, 25-5 8th district regional championship win over East Union.

Freesmeier said Montezuma will present unique challenges, but the Crusaders have been gaining confidence and peaking at the right time.

"They run their offense out of the middle and they have two very versatile girls in the middle and on the left in (senior Riley) Gatton and (junior Waverly) Roorda) who were all district last year," Freesmeier said. "They are both great athletes. Our responsibility will be to slow them down and get some touches

against them. Our defense will have to pick up some balls, but we know we need to control and try to make it tough for them to get the ball to the middle with some aggressive serving."

Gatton was honorable mention all-state last year in Class 1A as a junior. She's currently 9th in the state in kills with 328. Shateah Wetering is a junior this year and is in the top 25 in kills with 281. Roorda is currently 4th in the state in assists with 715.

The Crusaders are coming off of two of their most complete matches of the season in their wins over East Union and Seymour holding the opponents under 10 points in four of the six sets.

Holy Trinity will be relying on the heavy hitting of seniors Emily Box and Eryn Anderson to compliment some very nifty serving of late and some solid defense from seniors Mya Lawlor, Elyse Pothitakis, and Taylor Boeding.

Box, a first team All-State selection in 2017, is 4th in the state in Class 1A in hitting with 400 kills with a 41% kill efficiency. Anderson has come on strong in the regionals and is solid hitting with Box out of the rotation. Boeding plays all over the floor, literally, and can hit from the outside, while keeping the balls in play and serves at 96% efficiency with 60 aces on the year.

Lawlor's serving kept both Seymour and East Union off balance placing the ball in a variety of zones with good efficiency and kept opposing defenses off balance.

"It's huge for us to be able to serve aggressively," Freesmeier said. "We're

smaller than most and we have to do more of the little things than others. We've picked up our serving in the post season. We've been good all year, but just have been great during that stretch. Taylor, Mya, Emily, Eryn, they all have a little different touch on the ball. It's going to be a big factor in keeping teams out of their systems."

A couple underclassman including freshman Kassie Randolph and sophomores Bailey Hellweg, Katie Denning, and Claire Pothitakis are coming into their first or second state tournament. Randolph's sister Ali played on the state championship team of 2014 so she's been exposed to the emotion of the tournament.

Freesmeier said the kids did a lot of drills against upperclassmen this week and she said the level of competitiveness is very high.

"We did a lot of underclassmen against upperclassmen drills and the competition is escalating. I think they're competitively ready and they have to go out there and play. There's nothing to be scared of."

She said the seniors

"Experience will help up there. The seniors have been here and done this," Freesmeier said. "You want them to take it to that next level - this is your last shot."

The winner of Holy Trinity/Montezuma will face the winner of LeMar Gehlen Catholic/East Mills on Thursday for the right to play for the title on Friday night, all on Court 2.

In the top half, reigning champion and top-seed Janesville (43-5) takes on 28-9 8th-seeded Gladbook-Reinbeck at 6 p.m. followed by 4th seed Starmont 29-6 against 23-15 Tripoli at 8 p.m, both matches on Court 1.

Freesmeier said the big hitters at the state tour-

"Height is always a problem. What we do is use a block and find other ways to get kills. We also have to pass better than the other team. It will be tough because the caliber of teams up there is pretty impressive."

She said Box has improved through the year and is better now at getting touches on kills by bigger hitters. And underclassmen Avery Hopper, Claire Pothitakis, and Katie Denning have been playing bigger at the net.

"Our defenders can dig up a lot and we need to touch the ball. Box has become better at that," she said. "Right side is bigger this year and they've been

getting a lot of touches -Claire, Avery, all three of them. We have to read where they're

going and try to slow them down. Those big hitters will get their kills and we can't get wrapped up in that. You just have to go out play with confidence."

Freesmeier said North Tama getting beaten in regionals was a surprise. North Tama, ranked 5th in the final Class 1A rankings, was knocked off in the semifinals by No. 11 Gladbrook-Reinbeck in three straight. But she said in the state tournament brackets any team can step up and surprise you.

"North Tama getting beat was a surprise, they were No. 5. But in the regionals it's anybody's game. There are a lot of the same teams at state from year to year. They are very solid programs and it's anybody's to win."

Fort Madison family nabbed in burglary case

"It started in Donnellson when someone had observed a vehicle behind a garage in an alleyway and a resident confronted them. They took off and he got a license plate and that's what kicked it off. From that point we had several observations of that same vehicle and began investigating," Roberts said.

He said authorities continued to receive reports of the same vehicle combing the alleyways and streets in the county.

Roberts said the investigation involved the collaboration of multiple agencies and many man hours.

"This was a result of some strong collaboration between agencies and a lot of manpower. We couldn't have made this case without the efforts of my entire staff and the assistance of the sheriff's department. These guys put in a lot of hours and most of these guys have other full time jobs," Roberts said.

Lee County Sheriff's Department Detective Chad Donaldson was also part of the investigation. He said Roberts started the investigation.

"Roberts is the one who started putting the pieces together there as numerous storage shed break-ins and reports of suspicious vehicles in the area. From there we developed the list of suspects and started the investigation as a result," Donaldson said.

He said he expects additional charges relating to the string of burglaries to be filed as the investigation reveals additional details. Donaldson said a lot of law enforcement resources were used on the investigation, including manpower and techonology to build the case.

"We deployed certain tools at our disposal to assist with the investigation and to make sure we were aware of their locations and things of that nature," Donaldson said. "We're still trying to determine what items were actually stolen. But, for example, there was a tackle box stolen from a storage department that had more than \$1,000 in fishing tackle in it, which has been identified and returned."

He said the suspects are currently in custody.

"There are still multiple burglaries under investigation in regard to this particular crew, and I believe there will be additional counts of burglaries filed on these four."

Donaldson said three of the four are sitting on \$50,000 cash-only bonds.

Other items in the burglaries include snow blowers, several generators, fishing equipment, gas cans, about a dozen big screen televisions, tools and other memorabilia and paraphernalia.

Lee County sheriff Stacy Weber said anyone who thinks they may have been victimized by any of the burglaries in the county should contact the sheriff's department to view the items.

"Due to the large quantity of possible stolen items, we are asking for the public to help identify property they are missing. Detectives Donaldson and (Clint) Wray can be reached at 372-1152 ext. 3332 and ext. 3313 to arrange for viewing of the property on Thursday Nov. 8th from 12 p.m. to 3 p.m. at the sheriffs office located at 2530 255th Street, Montrose, Iowa."
