## Proposed budget shows lower levy rate

Preliminary numbers may change at Feb. 12 workshop

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison residents may be getting a bit of good news from the city as a proposed budget for next year shows a 33.4 cent drop in the city's levy rate.

City Administrator David Varley and city staff have put together a preliminary budget that includes a 15.564 general mil levy. That number compares to the 2017-18 fiscal year budget levy of \$15.911. That number is the amount the city collects per \$1,000 of assessed valuation of city residential, commercial, and industrial property.

The city is maxed out on its \$8.10/\$1,000 regular general levy, an amount capped by Iowa law, so they

are permitted a .27/1,000 emergency levy. Outside of the \$8.10, the city levies for liability, property and any self-insurance costs, local emergency management services, employee benefits such as retirement, and debt service. The city can also levy on agricultural land but at a reduced \$3/1,000 assessed valuation rate. Outside of the agricultural levy, those levies total \$15.564. The levy is the lowest since FY2014 when it was set at \$14.89.

FORT MADISON –A local bank has donated a financial literacy program to be used at the Fort Madison Middle School as part of an ongoing commitment to local students and educators.



## Lady Hounds get first win of year

FORT MADISON -The Fort Madison girls got their first win of the season in a 48-34 win over Davis County behind sophomore Sara Bernhart's 15 points.

The win moves the Hounds to 1-19 on the year, but it also was a big motivator for freshman Maddie Rashid who finished with 11 points on the night.

"I'm just kind of excited that we got a win and our record doesn't show a zero. I think it makes our confidence a lot better going into next season," Rashid said after the game.

Rashid sparked a 23-9 first quarter that was probably one of Fort Madison's most efficient quarters of the season. Rashid hit on a 3-pointer

and went 4-10 from the field in the opening period for nine points.

Head Coach Charlie Knipe said the pressure was the key in the first quarter. While teams have pressed Fort Madison this year most of the year, and sometimes for full games, the Hounds were able to capitalize on some three-quarter pressure of their own, forcing four turnovers in the quarter.

"We pressed in the first quarter and got away with some turnovers and that was key to get things going," Knipe said. "I took it off because I don't like to run up the score, I don't think that's right. But getting the turnovers was the key. We also passed very well in the fast breaks."

Rashid started the scoring on a long ball. Davis County's Alexa Francis converted and was fouled in the lane but missed the freebie. Kamryn Bailey missed both ends of two free throws after getting fouled in the lane, but Rashid kickstarted a Hounds 10-4 run by pouring in six points.

Francis scored again for Davis County to make it 15-6, but the Hounds pulled away with another 8-3 run to end the quarter.

Shooting went cold for both teams in the second quarter as Fort Madison got one bucket from Bernhart and a free throw from sophomore Anna Kester for just three points in the period. The Hounds were a dismal 1-14 from the field and 1-5 from the charity stripe.

But Davis County didn't fare much better. They outscored the hosts 8-3 in the period but were just 3-11 from the field and 2-of-6 from the line giving Fort Madison a 26-17 lead at halftime.

"They adjusted well with their zone offense to what we were doing," Knipe said. "I think we got a little lazy and content and forgot what we we're doing."

The Mustangs again outscored Fort Madison in the third period 9-8 and had cut the deficit to eight at 34-26. The Hounds shot just 2-8 in the period and committed

five turnovers. Bailey led the way with three points in the period.

### Cresswell ties school mark with eight 3-balls

## Senior leads Hounds with 28 in win over Davis County

BLOOMFIELD - Fort Madison senior Kaleb Cresswell hit eight 3-pointers to tie an FMHS record as the Hounds dropped Davis County 79-43 in boys high school basketball action Wednesday night.

Cresswell and fellow senior Treavor James-Kokjohn combined for 50 as the Hounds moved to 12-7 on the season. The two are fourth and second, respectively, in the Southeast Conference in scoring and combined for all of FMHS' first quarter points with Cresswell hitting on two 3-balls enroute to 10 points to put the Hounds up 17-5 in the first period.

Cresswell led all scorers with 28 on the night and is averaging just over 14 points per outing, while James-Kokjohn had 22 and is averaging 15.7 per contest.

The Hounds pushed the lead to 45-15 in the second period and were quickly putting the game out of reach. Cresswell again led FMHS with nine points, all

3-pointers. Sheymouhr Redd-Donald had five in the period.

Fort Madison pushed the lead to 65-26 headed into a quick fourth quarter with the continuous clock

running. Again Creswell hit on three 3-pointers to lead Fort Madison with nine points and James-Kokjohn had

Davis County was led by Riley Heller with 12 points.

Rounding out the scoring for Fort
Madison was Lorenzo Riles with eight

points, Jayden Fedler had six points, Redd-Donald finished with five, while Jace Burgher had three, Logan Rashid, Parker Denning and Michael Mosena each had two points. Roman Maestro added a free throw for Fort Madison.

The Hounds take their 12-7 record into the final regular season game of the season Friday night in a girls/boys varsity double header for Senior Night at the Hound-Dome. Seeding meetings for sectionals took place this morning, but that information is embargoed until Friday.


He was preceded in death by his grandparents, aunts and uncles. Services will be held at a later date in the spring.

## Expired TIFs help drop city's levy need

Varley handed the preliminary budget book to the Fort Madison City Council following Tuesday's regular meeting.

As part of the book, Varley outlined that revenues for the city were projected to be up this year, despite the reduced levy. Property valuations in the city have gone up in some areas, but Varley said the major reason for the increased revenues is that some TIF financing projects have timed out and some of those revenues are coming back into city coffers.

A Tax Increment Financing project, is basically the city rebating increased property tax revenues on improvements back to the private entity making the improvements. The city can also offer up incentives, such as cash payments, infrastructure improvements, or land. The property tax rebates occur over a specified period of time. According to a TIF worksheet included in the budget, \$34,900 in incentives paid to Independent Can in the current fiscal year won't have to be paid in FY 2019.

The city also made a one-time \$250,000 payment to Boulders Inn and Suites for their expansion project, however the city does have \$50,910 to the company in TIF rebates in the proposed budget. Siemens will still be getting a \$110,750 rebate in the budget. A one-time payment to Fareway Grocery for land preparation and legal expenses of \$91,930 was also paid in the current budget, but will not be in future budgets.

The General Fund is expected to carry just \$5,611 at the end of FY 2019. The Road Use fund is projected to carry \$122,378, Sales Tax fund will carry \$1, but those funds are disbursed 80% to the general fund and 20% to Capital Improvements when they are received.. The


Hotel/Motel Tax fund, which pays for Tourism Director Jean Peiton's salary, as well as distributing funds to the Fort Madison Area Artists Association, the North Lee County Historical Society, and other individual efforts aimed at bringing visitors into Fort Madison, is projected to carry a \$2,198 balance.

The Highway 61 and Hwy 2 improvement Fund will carry \$9.75 million at the end of FY 19 but projects along Hwy. 61 are set to begin this year.. The Water fund will will carry a balance of \$542,900, Wastewater will carry \$2,930, and Solid Waste will carry \$55,425.

It should be noted however, that many of these funds have expenses exceeding revenues and they are supplemented with money from the general fund, which is why the general fund balance is at \$5,600.

Varley also indicated in the budget that the new platform for the relocated Amtrak Depot, will probably not be built until toward the end of FY 19 because of construction plan snags with Burlington Northern Santa Fe. He's only including money in the budget for a few months of operations.
