Cordray's bid for 3rd trip to state stopped in OT

CEDAR RAPIDS – The Fort Madison Bloodhounds didn't come away with a title at the district state qualifying meet on Saturday, but the Hounds will be sending Elton Kruse, Sam Hayes, and Danen Settles to the state tournament next week.

Fort Madison had three others capture 3rd place and two fifth place finishers for a total of 147 points and a fourth place finish overall at the Class 3A District wrestling tournament at Cedar Rapids Prairie High School. The top two finishers in each division get to participate in the state tournament.

Senior Elton Kruse will represent Fort Madison at Wells-Fargo by knocking off Iowa City West's Parker McBride in the 113 lb. semifinal match.

Senior Alex Lauber gets Cedar Rapids Prairie's Jack Holvorson up in the air in the quarterfinal round Saturday. Lauber would win with a pin at 1:21 and would go on to finish fourth on the day.

FMHS celebrates CTE success

High school has more than 200 students in 30 programs

FORT MADISON -National data shows that students taking career and technical education courses in high school are faring better in earnings and career readiness that those who excel academically, but stay away from the CTE offerings.

February is national CTE Month, a public awareness campaign from the Business Professionals of America in conjunction with the Association for Career and Technical Education.

Fort Madison Principal Greg Smith will be holding a breakfast on Feb. 22 to recognize those leaders in the area that have helped contribute to one of the leading CTE schools in the state.

Fort Madison High School has had welders, building trades, and family science classes compete and win awards at the state level for demonstrated skills in CTE coursework. Smith said it's been the support of the board and the district's ability to attract skilled instructors that is setting it apart from other schools in the area.

He said the district's vision is success for every student after they graduate and the CTE programs help target that goal to a higher percentage of the students.

"Look at the vision of the FMCSD that everyone is successful post high school. Well, we're putting our money where our mouth is," he said. "We want all kids, we don't care what your GPA is necessarily, if this is something you're interested in, let's do it.

"And if we don't have it, and this is another thing I'm working on, is let's get you out so you can get that experience. I want my juniors and seniors out half a day everywhere exploring, learning, getting some contact time. If you want to be a vet, spend time with a vet, whatever. Get the course work done and caught up,

outta here and get that experience." The district has 240 students in CTE

and get

programs and currently has 30 courses in the curriculum.

According to a report in the American Educational Research Journal in 2017, national statistics show students who are engaged in rigorous Career and Technical Education courses have a lower drop-out rate and increased on-time graduation.



HTC gives fun send-off to state swimmers

FORT MADISON -It's getting tougher and tougher to find ways to send Holy Trinity athletes off to state, but they found a way again on Friday as juniors Wyatt Hellman and Jacob Mohrfeld were sent off to Saturday's state swimming championships in Iowa City.

In the past 12 months, HTC sent the volleyball team and cross-country specialist Matt Hellige off to state competitions.

On Friday, Mohrfeld and Hellman were joined by Central Lee's Blake Wyrick and Danville's Kale Schuff in Shottenkirk Gymnasium, as the four will compete representing Burlington High School in six events at the University of Iowa Campus Recreation and Wellness Center beginning at noon Saturday.

Mohrfeld, Wyrick, and Schuff have all been to the state championships

before, but it's the first trip for Hellman.

The 6'5" inch relay specialist will be helping the Grayhounds in the 200 medley and the 200-yard freestyle. He anchors the medley and swims the third leg in the freestyle.

Hellman said he doesn't think a championship will be in the cards in the relays so he said he's just going to go up, swim hard, and enjoy the meet.

"Well, we're coming in 15th and 16 so I think we'll do pretty well," Hellman said. "I think we can get to around 10th place in both relays so I'm hoping for that."

Schuff has competed in relays at two other state meets. He also broke the BHS 100-meter backstroke record during the regular season, but qualified in the relays.

"I'm a senior and it's my last year so I just want to leave it all in the pool and this will be the last time swimming in high school. It's that mentality of not having

any regrets and swim as hard as I can."

Wyrick also competed in the state meet last year.

Wyrick will be on both relay teams and will also swim individually in the 50-yard freestyle and the 100-yard freestyle events. Wyrick is seeded 15th in the 50 and 21st in the 100. The top 24 times at the district meets last weekend qualified for state.

The senior from Central Lee said the night before is a pretty easy night and all that's left is hitting the water.

"I'm going to eat pretty good tonight hopefully and then get up and stretch out and get ready for tomorrow," he said.

Mohrfeld finished second in the 100-yard breast stroke and set the school mark at BHS with a :59.66 at the district meet last weekend. Mohrfeld will race in both relays and will compete in the 100yard breast and the 200yard individual medley. He enters the meet with the 3rd best time in the state in the 100 and he's

seeded 22nd in the 200.

"From last year I've dropped two seconds off the 100 and I'm at :59.66 and the best in the state is :56," Mohrfeld said.

That :56 was a :56.75 from Forrest Frazier and Mohrfeld's dad, Matt, who helps coach at BHS, said Frazier has worked out at the U.S. Olympic facility in Colorado, and has the potential to throw up a :52 in Jacob's heat.

Mohrfeld said he was

hoping to drop a couple seconds off his district

"Dropping three seconds would be a pretty far goal, but I'm hoping for a :58 and hopefully that will get me in the top 5, maybe 2nd or 3rd."

HTC Principal Michael Sheerin showered the boys with trinkets, and at one point, literally with water, as the student body and faculty revved the swimmers up just before

school let out.

BHS head coach Jeff Kristensen said the experience of past meets will help the squad this year.

"I think they have real good chances since it's the second year for three of them. The first year you realize how many people there are and how loud it gets," Kristensen said. "This year that will be secondary, and they'll be able to concentrate on what they're doing."

Kruse got a bye in the first round and ended up facing McBride in the semifinal match.

Kruse was then pinned by top-seeded Austin Kegley of Prairie at 1:09 in the title match sending Kruse to the 2nd place match where McBride had slipped into the wrestle back by beating Iowa City High's Reese Hayden. But Kruse had already beaten McBride, so by rule, he was awarded 2nd place.

"This was great making it there, but now I want to go up there and do something.

Senior Sam Hayes, who's been hampered by injuries most of his career including a fractured back as a freshman that cost him his sophomore year, and then a troubled shoulder his junior year kept him out of district action.

But the senior said he's

just smiling now that he's finally punched a ticket to the Wells-Fargo arena.

"This is great. All I can do is just smile," Hayes said after wrapping up second place with a first period pin over Elias Cordero in the wrestle back for second place.

During his freshman year he fractured his back after an awkward land in a match which cost him districts and his sophomore year. He then tore the labrum in his shoulder, sidelining him for the last half of his junior year.

He injured the other shoulder this year and has been wearing protective gear on the shoulder, Hayes said he and the coaches agreed to forfeit the title match against Prairie's Ashton Stoner-DeGroot, and slide to the 2nd place match.

"I've beat that kid before," Hayes said. "I majored him last year, but it was just a precautionary thing for us. Say I lose that match and then I have to come back and wrestle another match and I'm sore... so I was like, make the tournament and then I can wrestle him at state and beat him there. But this feels great to get that stress of my back."

Settles was seconds away from taking the heavyweight title against top-seeded Jacob Murry of Iowa City High. The two went into overtime at 1-1. Settles scored an escape from the down position in the tiebreaker with four seconds left and flipped Murry to the mat but outside the circle.

Head coach Ryan Smith asked for an explanation, and then Murry took down in the tiebreaker rotation and was able to escape with :22 left in the period. He then got Settles in a headlock and was able to pull him to the ground with just :02 left on the clock for the win.

Settles would go to the wrestle back and take on Burlington's Julius Harris

and won with a 3-0 decision to take 2nd place.

Settles said he had to take a different tact with the bigger Murry in the title match.

"I didn't want to square up with him and go upper body. I wanted to defend his style. When he got me in the headlock I just tried to keep my hips up so I could get two, but it just didn't happen," Settles said

Smith said he was proud of the kids' effort and couldn't really ask for much more.

"I can't fault our effort tonight," Smith said. "It goes back to what I said before districts, we needed good attitude and good effort and I think we saw that about 99% of the time today," Smith said.

He said Cordray's match was one of the tougher one's on the night.

"He was down by like 5 with about half a minute left and just gave it everything he had and tied it up at 9 to force the overtime. That was a tough one," he said.

Freshman Gavin Wiseman came up short in a wrestle back with Clear Creek Amana's Sam Stevens 15-3 for third place. Wiseman won his first match which pitted him in the semifinal against 126-lb top-seeded Keaton Speicher of Iowa City West. Speicher rolled Wiseman to the mat at the 1:34 mark and was able to seal the pin two seconds later, forcing Wiseman to wrestle back.

Freshman Gavin Wiseman has the upper hand on Burlington's River Belger in opening round action Saturday. Wiseman went on to finish 3rd in the 126 lb. bracket, just missing a bid to the state tournament.

Wiseman pinned Iowa City High's Michael Santoro in the 3rd place match but fell to Samual Stevens in the 2nd place match by an 18-5 major decision.

Wiseman said it would be have been nice to go to Des Moines, but he said he's learned a lot and enjoyed the atmosphere of districts.

"It was pretty nice, the excitement, the crowd," he said. High school is a whole new level with wrestlers but the experi-

ence was great. I'm not happy, but I'm content. It would have been better if I had won and went to state, but overall, I did decent today," Wiseman said.

Senior Dayne Cordray also finished third after falling in sudden victory 11-9. Cordray, who qualified for state as a freshman and a junior said he knew he was going to have pull something off in the waning moments of the 2nd place match.

"The last match going into the third period I knew I was down by quite a bit and had to pull something big. I saw the opportunity for the cradle and hit it but I couldn't get his shoulder to the mat. It was setting on my shoulder and, looking back, if I had adjusted I could have gotten it," he Cordray said.

"He's a really good kid, but I just left my shoulder up in the extra period and didn't get squared up, that's all it was. It's a bitter pill to swallow, but just like cross-country, I got a lot out of it."

The state tournament starts on Thursday night, Feb. 14 in Des Moines at the Wells-Fargo arena.

Bill would provide child care at VA facilities

WASHINGTON - Congressman Dave Loebsack released the following statement today after the House passed HR 840, The Veterans' Access to Child Care Act. This legislation will make permanent, and expand, the VA's Child Care Pilot Program to ensure our veterans have access to convenient, safe and cost-free child care when they have VA medical appointments, including mental healthcare appointments. The pilot program was established in 2010 at four VA facilities. From FY2015 through FY2018, more than 13,000 veterans with children have used the program. Currently, women veterans are the fastest growing population of veterans and 42 percent of the women seeking care at the VA have said it is hard to find child care to attend medical appoint-

"I am very pleased that Congress is acting to ensure our veterans have the support they need to successfully transfer from the military to civilian life. It is very important that we not allow anything to stand in the way of our veterans receiving the care and benefits they earned and deserve," said Loebsack.

Funding hurdle keeps CTE program from growing locally

Those same students also see higher earnings, including a 3.2% wage increase in CTE concentrations. Another statistic that stands out is that 80% of students taking a curriculum that includes CTE coursework met college and career readiness benchmarks that only 63% of students with the same academic core work had, but didn't include the CTE courses.

Smith said the district's been able to hire top notch quality instructors like Building Trades Instructor Clint Kobelt, whose construction students have taken state titles in skills competitions. The district also recently hired Chris Bolander, after the closure of Dresser-Rand in Burlington, who has 16 years and a complete list of certifications in welding to replace Jim King in that department. A new automotive instructor fully certified by General Motors has also joined the staff.

With Governor Kim Reynolds touting Future Ready Iowa programming at every stop in the state, Smith said these efforts lead straight to those goals, but funding is still the highest hurdle in reaching more kids.

"I'm really frustrated that there's such a need on every side you talk to. If it wasn't for funding, I'd have four or five more programs going," he said. "The (Fort Madison School) board is very supportive, but it's a money issue. Everyone of those guys you bring in has 16-20 years experience but we put them on a teacher's salary level. Even though they don't have the education at the master's level, we still try to give them credit for the years in the field. That's where they'd be if they were still in the private sector."

He said some of the CTE instructors come in at \$50,000-\$60,000 a year. But

when he talks with local legislators they ask what they can do.

"It's not a lack of support. I talk to (Rep.) Jeff Kurtz and (Sen.) Rich Taylor and those guys, they ask what do you need from us and I hate to say money all the time, but what I need is a way to hire these guys that level the playing field a little. We want to do what you want us to do, the governor's all about it, so let's get together and figure out how we do this. I don't know what the answer is, but it always seems to come down to dollars."

Internal data from the district eight years ago said the curriculum was upside down as far what students needs were. Smith said everything was still focused on collegiate paths, yet 40% of the students weren't going to college and had no concrete plans after high school.

"If we don't have curriculum that fits our needs, are we doing what's best for our kids or what's best for a slim majority," he said

Smith recently sat with the board of the Southeast Iowa Builder's Association to figure out what certifications graduating seniors should have if they want to get their resume on top of the pile.

"We approached them to help us to determine what certificates are important. To make a long story short, we're going to meet with HR folks in those industries and say, if you want to look at a kid right out of high school, he's gonna be green, but what else do you need. Would an OSHA 13 certification help, or an ACI concrete national certification, there are all kinds out there," Smith said.

He also credited the Lee County Economic Development Group's Grow Lee program for helping him with contacts and and finding subcommittees to continue to advocate and learn about what industries are looking for from the educational community.
