Next phase of Bus. 61 rehab in front of council

City to vote on starting plans for 6th through 10th streets

FORT MADISON - With the city getting ready to rebid the reconstruction of Bus. 61 from 2nd to 6th streets, officials will vote this week to enter into an agreement for professional services for the next segment.

At Tuesday's regular city council meeting, councilmen could vote on an agenda item to enter into a professional services agreement with HR Green out of Cedar Rapids for about \$452,000 to handle the administration for reconstruction of the highway from 6th to 10th Streets.

Green came under fire this fall for estimates that were substantially under bids on the first phase of the project, as well as for work on the platform to move the Amtrak depot to Riverview Park.

Green's services will include design of the project, a mandatory cultural resource study, public involvmenet, coordination with other utilities, geotechnical design,

bidding, permitting, and construction administration.

According to a report from City Manager David Varley, the project will be bid through the Iowa Department of Transportation in December 2020. Most of the project is expected to be done in November 2021 with final completion in May 2022.

The rebidding of the first phase of the business route could set that work to take most of the summer and fall of 2020. The work is part of a replacement of the entire stretch of highway through town.

Ancestry search turns up pain for family

 \mathbf{F} rom an early age Scott Pieper (pronounced "Pipe-er" not "Peep-er") wanted to be a mortician. He wasn't sure why. Growing up in Monmouth, Illinois, with a mother, two brothers and a father who was a well-known and respected high school golf coach, the guidance counselor thought it odd when Scott wanted to "shadow" a mortician on Career Day. The guidance counselor advised against it and sent Scott off somewhere else. But Scott never forgot about wanting to be a mortician.

Scott's father, Bill Pieper, was a renowned high school golf coach, leading his teams to seven state championships, including six in a row, making golf the most popular sport at Monmouth High. (Very unusual. Football is usually king.) Coach Pieper walked with a swagger that the kids emulated. Although not a great golfer himself, he believed in his kids and inspired them, making them feel like they could do anything. Never satisfied with mediocrity, his attitude bespoke tenacity with approachability. In the classroom, his biology instruction was like a stand-up Jackie Gleason routine, endearing him to students. Two dozen of the kids on his golf team went on to college level Division I. All three of his sons, Scott, Erik and Aaron, won medals at the state golf tournament. Bill Pieper was Coach of the Year many times and inducted into the Illinois Coaches

school, community, and the coaching profession.

Freesmeier had two state championships to her credit, the first in 1996 with Marquette and the second in 2014 with Holy Trinity. She was also on the 1991 staff when Marquette won the state title.

She has won close to 84% of the games her teams have played with 946 wins against 186 losses.

Pothitakis led Holy Trinity to the 2019 Class 1A State semis and went 31% attacking for the Crusaders. She had 41 kills against 103 attacks with nine errors.

For the year, Pothitakis had close to 400 kills and a 22% hitting efficiency. She was eighth in the state in Class 1A hitting and third in the Southeast Iowa Superconference.

So, you can imagine what a shock it was when Scott, at the age of 47, discovered that Bill Pieper was not his real father. It was like a sinkhole opening up and swallowing him, his whole life, and everything he'd ever known about himself, including the way he looked. He'd always been

ancestry search on herself. Some startling discoveries were made, like her father had a child she wasn't aware of. Scott decided to do the same DNA search on himself. Things just didn't seem to jive with the dates of his parents' wedding and the birth dates of himself and his middle brother. Bingo! There it was in black and white. Bill Pieper was not his father! His real father was a long time Burlington resident.

A ransack search of the-father-who-raisedhim filing cabinet, verified the DNA results. Scott had been adopted at less than a year of age, and the adoption papers started on his middle brother, Erik. The youngest brother, Aaron, was a true son of Bill and Suzann Pieper.

Scott's mother, Suzann, had passed away from breast cancer. So, he confronted Bill, the father who raised him. Coach Bill Pieper admitted that Scott's mother had been married to another man

previously, and that the other man was the father of Scott and Erik. Bill Pieper apologized for the lifetime of deception. He had only been trying to protect and raise the boys in a loving home. Coach Bill Pieper has since passed away at the age of 74.

It turns out that almost everyone knew the two boys were adopted, including teachers and classmates of the boys. They were the last to know.

It gets worse. In trying

to track down their real father, they learned that the man, a mortician, (Ah, ha—the connection!) had passed away in 2015. They wouldn't even get the opportunity to know who their real father was, what his handshake was like, to smell his aftershave, or ask him why he had never contacted them. What they have is a name, a few pictures, and what some other family members and friends of the man tell them.

To put it mildly, Scott is disappointed in the

parents who raised him for not telling him and his brothers the truth. They love the parents that raised them; the boys were always well fed and cared for. There is just this void, a bottomless pit, that will never be filled.

Be honest with your kids.

First phase could start toward in spring 2020

The state turned over jurisdiction of the corridor to the city in exchange for \$13.9 million dollars when the bypass was constructed. Plans included redoing several intersections including the 27th Street and Avenue L intersection, which was completed in 2018. Plans also included redoing the intersection at Avenue O and Ortho Road.

Earlier this year Jones Contracting of West Point redid the "S" curve on Avenue L in the 3500 and 3600 blocks at a cost of a just over half a million dollars.

Original plans called for four segments starting on the west side of the city and working east. However, plans changed and the city decided to go from the east and tackle 2nd Street to 6th Street, moving progressively west. The city had originally planned to have the entire corridor rehabbed by 2027.

Also on Tuesday's agenda, the council will consider:

- refinancing about \$10 million in water revenue bonds at a lower 1.75% interest rate.
- vacating a portion of property in the 3500 block of Avenue L.
- appointing Ron Knoke to the city's Airport Commission to fill an unexpired term through Sept. 30, 2021.

Gov. Reynolds lifts limits on anhydrous ammonia haulers

Late harvest had created high national demand

DES MOINES – Today, Gov. Kim Reynolds signed a proclamation that will temporarily allow vehicles that transport propane and anhydrous ammonia to be oversize and overweight.

The late harvest and high demand for petroleum products throughout the Midwest have resulted in low supplies of propane as well as difficulty transporting adequate supplies of anhydrous ammonia for agricultural activities. The proclamation temporarily suspends provisions of

anhydrous ammonia.

for agricultural activities. The proclamation temporarily suspends provisions of Iowa Code §§ 321.463 (6) (a) and (b) and 321E.29 and Iowa Admin. Code chapter 761-511 pertaining to movement of oversize and overweight loads of propane and


The proclamation is effective November 16, 2019, and will expire at midnight on December 15, 2019.

Gov. Reynolds has led the state response to the severe propane distribution and supply issues. On October 3rd she signed a proclamation easing the hours of service regulations for propane transporters, and continues to be in contact with industry stakeholders and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to increase the amount of propane in the pipelines to Iowa.



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


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

Heart attack claims state's top jurist

from a heart attack. Arrangements are pending."

Chief Justice Cady, Ft. Dodge, was appointed to the Iowa Supreme Court in 1998. The members of the court selected him as chief justice in 2011.

Born in Rapid City, South Dakota, Chief Justice Cady earned both his undergraduate and law degrees from Drake University. After graduating from law school in 1978, he served as a judicial law clerk for the Second Judicial District for one year. He was then appointed as an assistant Webster County attorney and practiced with a law firm in Fort Dodge. Chief Justice Cady was appointed a district associate judge in 1983 and a district court judge in 1986. In 1994,

he was appointed to the Iowa Court of Appeals. He was elected chief judge of the court of appeals in 1997 and served until his appointment to the supreme court.

Chief Justice Cady is a member of the Order of Coif, The Iowa State Bar Association, the American Bar Association, the Iowa Judges Association, and Iowa Academy of

Trial Lawyers (honorary). He also served as chair of the Supreme Court's Task Force on the Court's and Communities' Response to Domestic Abuse and is a member of the Drake Law School Board of Counselors. Chief Justice Cady is chair of the Nation Center for State Courts Board of Directors and President of the Conference of Chief Justices. He also serves on the Board of Directors,

and chairs its Committee on Courts, Children, and Families, and the Committee on Judicial Selection and Compensation.

He is the coauthor of Preserving the Delicate Balance Between Judicial Accountability and Independence: Merit Selection in the Post-White World, 16 Cornell J.L. and Pub. Pol'y 101 (2008) and of Iowa Practice: Lawyer and Judicial Ethics (Thomson-West 2007). He is the author of Curbing Litigation Abuse and Misuse: A Judicial Approach, 36 Drake L. Rev. 481 (1987), The Vanguard of Equality: The Iowa Supreme Court's Journey to Stay Ahead of the Curve on an Arc Bending Towards Justice, 76 Alb. L. Rev. 1991 (2013), and Reflections on Clark v. Board of School Directors, 150 Years Later, 67 Drake L. Rev. 23 (2019). Justice Cady also delivered remarks at the 2012 Drake Law School Constitutional Law Symposium, The Iowa Judiciary, Funding, and the Poor, 60 Drake L. Rev. 1127 (2012) and presented the inaugural Drake Law

School Iowa Constitution Lecture, A Pioneer's Constitution: How Iowa's Constitutional History Uniquely Shapes Our Pioneering Tradition in Recognizing Civil Rights and Civil Liberties, 60 Drake L. Rev. 1133 (2012).

Chief Justice Cady was an adjunct faculty member at Buena Vista University for more than 30 years and served on its President's Advisory Council. In 2012 he received an honorary doctorate degree in Public Service from Buena Vista University. Chief Justice Cady received the Award of Merit from the Iowa Judges Association in 2015. He received the Outstanding Alumnus Award from Drake University Law School in 2011, he received the Alumni Achievement Award from Drake University in 2012, and the Judicial Achievement Award from the Iowa Association for Justice in 2016. Chief Justice Cady is also the Iowa chair of iCivics Inc.

Chief Justice Cady is married with two children and four grandchildren.
