Gabbard to visit Fort Madison's Sub Arena today

FORT MADISON – Congresswoman, and 2020 Pres-

idential hopeful U.S. Rep. Tulsi Gabbard (D-Hawaii), will be stumping in southeast Iowa on Wednesday afternoon.

Gabbard, a Democrat who was first elected to Congress in 2012, will be at a meet-and-greet and Sub Arena beginning at approximately 3:30 p.m. Wednesday.

The stop is part of an eight-city swing through Iowa this week including stops in Iowa City

and Muscatine today. She spent time in the Des Moines metro area on Monday

Gabbard has served on the Homeland Security and Foreight Affairs committees in Congress and currently services on the House Armed Services and Financial Services committes.

She is a 16-year veteran of the Army National Guard and is one of the first female combat veterans ever elected to Congress. She is currently a major in the Army National Guard.

Gabbard was also the vice-chair of the Democratic National Committee from 2013 to 2016.

Gabbard is also scheduled to be in Mt. Pleasant at 1 p.m. and Burlington at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday.

City mulling options to fix downtown sidewalks, curbs

FORT MADISON – Downtown business owners may still get new sidewalks and curbing despite the sinking of a project that would have infused \$1.5 million into Avenue G's deteriorating paving.

At Tuesday's regular meeting of the Fort Madison City Council, a representative from HR Green and Associates told the city council that the city would be able to get one full block done and a portion of another with the money available.

HR Green are the engineers that told the city they could get initially four blocks done for the \$1.5 million grant, which is money the city is paying in inter-

est on loans secured for improvements at the waste water treatment plant.

Under the program the money can only be used for storm water improvement projects within the city. Regular city improvements like regular street and sidewalk rehabilitations or other standing city projects are not eligible

for the funding unless they target better stormwater stewardship.

Now city officials are looking at possible reconstruction of all curbs and sidewalks without the pavers, planters, and subsurface that was being planned to better handle storm water runoff.

Property Works Director Larry Driscoll said the project would carry a cost of about \$300,000 with the city paying \$150,000 to \$200,000 and property owners being assessed \$1,500 over 10 years for their share of the costs.

Driscoll also suggested a franchise fee that would help with some of the costs.

Mayor Brad Randolph said the city needed to do more investigation of the funding to get the work done to make sure the city's portion of the funding can be allocated.

Councilman Chris Greenwald said he'd heard many of the downtown businesses were relieved that the project was on thin ice.

"Another spin to this is that 50% of the business owners downtown were relieved when this project went away. They were scared to death of the construction interrupting business," said Councilman Chris Greenwald.



FORT MADISON – The Fort Madison Rotary has made it even easier to make a donation to rehab the band shell and do other Central Park Improvements.

The group announced last month that it was launching a \$100K in 100 Days campaign to fix some termite damaged support structures in the park's bandshell as well as other needed improvements to the structure. The committee is also looking at replacing lighting in the park and rehabilitating the Statue of Liberty.

Additional funding needs for the park include \$6,000 to \$8,000 for repainting the band shell, \$30,000 for new lights in the park, and at least \$12,000 to refurbish the Statue of Liberty, as well as other upkeep.

LCHD rolls out senior produce boxes again

LEE COUNTY – Last year Live Healthy Lee County (LHLC) started the Senior Produce Box Project. The goal of the project was to provide fresh produce donations at senior living and meal sites. The other goal was to have at least two participating sites. The project ended with seven sites, and over 4,400 pieces of donated produce. In 2019, LHLC hopes to see the success grow.

"All of the sites from last year have signed on again to participate, and we have a couple more we are working on getting signed on," said Emily Biddenstadt, Lee County Health Department Community Health Program Manager and LHLC coalition facilitator. "Our biggest challenge is receiving donations. We work with several producers, but the average gardener can donate as well."

The yellow and green produce donation boxes will be located at Donnellson Housing, Heritage Center (Keokuk),

Hillview Village (Fort Madison), Mississippi Terrace (Keokuk), Newberry Center (Fort Madison), Park View Apartments (West Point), and River Terrace (Keokuk). Denmark Star Park will also have a community table. Anyone interested in donating fresh produce to the project can leave the donations in the produce boxes that are located in the community rooms.

"Since we are still receiving grant funds for the project we are needing to track as much donated produce as possible," Biddenstadt said.

At each site is a binder with a tracking form. No personal information is needed, just the type of produce being donated along with the amount. If someone is unable to drop-off their donation they can call the Lee County Health Department.

Lee County Health Department received funding from the Iowa Department of Public Health and SNAP-Ed to plan and coordinate the sourcing and distribution of fresh fruits and vegeta-



bles. The project is not to take away from producers who accept Senior Farmer's Market Nutrition Program, but to get fresh produce in the hands of those who are unable to attend a market.

"We do receive donations from some farmer's market vendors, however we do not receive them every week. We highly encourage seniors to take advantage of the Senior Farmer's Market Nutrition Program. That way, if they are able, they can attend a market to pick their own produce, while helping a local producer," she said.

Last year also saw the start-up of the

LHLC Garden at the Lee County Conservation site. That project has also grown this year with the addition of a garden bed. The ISU Extension & Outreach plans on continuing their summer Youth Garden Camp where they teach kids about gardening, when produce is ready to be picked, and how delicious fresh produce can taste.

The biggest challenge of these projects is the need of volunteers. If anyone is interested in donating their time to helping deliver produce, assisting at the LHLC Garden or at the garden camp they can contact Biddenstadt at (319)372-5225.

Fairfield girls too much for Fort Madison

Trojans bring two of state's best in Gaskell, Charoenkul as Lady Hounds fall 8-1

FORT MADISON – For Fairfield senior Anatta Charoenkul, Tuesday's matchup with Fort Madison appeared to be much like any other. For Fort Madison's Lanie Kuntz, Tuesday was going to be the one of the toughest matches she would play all season.

With Charoenkul and No. 2 singles player Yana Gaskell, probably the best one-two punch in the state, in tow, the Trojans handed Fort Madison an 8-1 loss in Fort Madison.

Kuntz battled back multiple times during her match with two-time state champion Charoenkul, but the three-peat hopeful came away with an 8-0 victory. The Bloodhounds No. 2, Larissa Ferrill, may not have been playing a past state champion, but she was paired up with one of the best underclassman she will see this year in Yana Gaskell. Much like Kuntz, Ferrill played her best possible match, but Gaskell proved to be too much, coming away with another 8-0 sweep.

Zoe Ramatowski nearly gave Fort Mad-



ison a tally in the win column, but fell short 9-7 against Fairfield's No. 3, Nellie Higdon. The Bloodhounds No. 4, Kirklynn Nafziger, was the lone singles competitor to record a win for Fort Madison Tuesday, as Lily Cadwallader dropped her set 8-4 against Tess Paton. Alyse Schmidt pushed Fairfield's Destiny Gridley to an 8-8 tie, but Gridley shut out Schmidt in the tiebreaker 7-0 for the win.

Doubles were more successful for the Hounds in terms of total points scored, but not in terms of wins. Kunts and Ferrill teamed up in an attempt to takedown

Charoenkul and Abby Schaefer, but fell just short 9-7. Ramatowski and Nafziger paired together to face the combo of Gaskell and Higdon, but the underclassman was too much, helping Fairfield come away with the 8-2 win. Cadwallader and Schmidt were the final pair of Hounds in doubles, dropping their set 8-5 to Paton and Gridley, giving Fairfield the 8-1 win.

"The final score does not show it, but we put up a good fight tonight," Fort Madison Head Coach Jeremy Swink said. "It's no secret how tough Yana and Anatta are. There is no doubt they are the two best players in the state, props to Larissa and Lanie for being up for the challenge to take them on.

"Those two aside, our three through six matches in singles were competitive, our girls fought and didn't give up. We still have a few things we need to work on, but I am proud of our girls tonight for not giving up."

Fort Madison will have another crack on their home court Thursday as they take on Mount Pleasant in a makeup game from March 26.

Hounds win CL boys invite

DONNELLSON – Personal records continue to fall as the boys on the Fort Madison track team brought home another first-place finish in what was supposed to be a rebuilding year with two new co-coaches.

Fort Madison's Ethan Deacon brought home his first top finish of the year setting a new personal best for him in the shot put with a heave of 41'-3.25". Deacon also took 2nd in the discus with a spin of 121'-4".

Other top finishers for the Hounds, who won the meet overall with 129 points, included Matt Hellige in the mile run. Hellige continues to drop times in the distance runs for the Bloodhounds. Monday he finished the mile run in 4:37.43, a full five seconds faster than his Thursday time in Mt. Pleasant.

Hellige took 2nd to West Hancock's Miles Sheppard in the 3,200 meter run with a time of 10:16.86. Hellige ran a 10:01 at the Mt. Pleasant boys invitational Thursday.

In an event the Hounds have entered sporadically throughout the season, the shuttle hurdle relay team of Macaden Rhoer, Mathew Meierotto, Isaiah Miller and Jakob McGowan finished with a top time at 1:12.31.

"Those boys just stepped in and ran that, granted there were only three teams in it, but this is what we get from these kids. They just step in and do their best and are scoring points for us," said co-head coach Mike Schneider.

"We've battled injuries and absences all year and we're able to mix and match and put kids together and they have success. Sometimes we just say "Hey, we need some points so we gotta have a sixth or better, and they go get it."

Junior Quentin Schneider was tops in the 400-meter hurdles with a season best 57.89 to earn

10 points for Fort Madison. The 4×400 relay team of Brock Califf, Garrett Hannum, Andrew Schaefer and Schneider was another first-place finish for the Hounds with a time of 3:37.10.

Fort Madison got another second-place finish in the 800-sprint medley with Schaefer, Michael Mosena, Califf and Hannum running a time of 1:44.72.

Califf took third in the 400-meter dash with a time of 56.04, while the 1600-meter medley of Gavin Wiseman, Romeo Maestro, Mikey DiPrima and Rhoer came in third with a time of 4:15.29. Hannum had the other top three finishes for the Hounds with a 2:12.74 mark.

had personal bests at the meet including senior Alec Craft through his season's best in the discus with a throw of 102'-8" good enough for sixth place. Schaefer had a personal best in the 200-meter dash, when he pulled a 24.18 good for fifth place.

Several other Hounds

Meierotto ran the 800 in 2:17.78, his best time ever and finished 6th overall.

Freshman Hayden Wolfe ran his best 1600 with a time of 5:21.67 which was good enough for fourth place. Miller placed fourth in the 110 hurdles in 19.31, his best time of the year.

"It was a great team effort tonight. Lots of guys PR'ed and everybody contributed in some way," said co-head coach Chad Hannum.

Hawks finish 6th

Hosts Central Lee got 2nd-place finishes from sophomore Chance Hocker in the 200-meter dash and 100-meter dashes enroute to 51 points and a 6th place finish in the eight team field.

The Hawks 4×100 team garnered a 3rd place finish with a time of 45.74. Wyatt Schulte earned a 3rd place mark in the 400-meter hurdles, while Tyler Hopp took 3rd in the 100-meter dash with an 11:95 mark and the 4×200 relay team took 3rd with a mark of 1:36.41.

Fort Madison takes down Fairfield on the road

FAIRFIELD – The Fort Madison Bloodhound boys tennis team continues to plow through opponents with a 7-2 win Tuesday night in Fairfield.

The Bloodhounds top five players have not lost in singles or doubles action all year.

At No. 1 singles, senior Sam Avery dispatched AJ Greiner with 6-0, 6-0 shutout. Jason Thurman, playing at No. 2 singles downed the Trojans' Noel Peterson 6-4, 6-1 and Vasin Thurman downed Will Sheppard 6-2, 6-3 in the No. 3 spot.

At No. 4, junior Reed Fehseke knocked off Blake Holden 6-4, 6-3. Fehseke is in his first year of high school tennis and has not lost a match in singles or doubles play.

The Trojans got their two wins at Nos. 5 and 6 singles, when Brian Parcel defeated Bryce Workman 6-4, 6-3 and then Michael Holt downed Fort Madison's Levi Sissel 6-2, 6-0.

Fort Madison then swept the doubles action with the Thurman brothers playing Greiner and Sheppard to a 6-1, 6-0 loss. Avery and Fehseke knocked off Peterson and Holden by the same 6-3, 6-3 scores.

Workman and Sissel teamed up to down Fairfield's Dylan Barras and Sam Mattson 6-3, 6-4.

Fort Madison will test their undefeated season when the Hounds travel to Burlington to take on the Grayhounds at Dankwardt Park on Thursday afternoon.

City may take storm water funding to parking lots

"It would be interesting to get that organized and get their input, especially if we're talking about special assessments."

The project garnered just one bidder at \$3.4 million coming in \$1.9 million over HR Green's projected estimate of \$1.5 million to redo Avenue G's curbs and sidewalks from 6th to 10th Street. With the city not having the funds to make up the difference, the city is moving to redoing two city-owned parking lots with storm water improvements at an estimated cost of \$850,000.

The two lots would be the parking lot directly behind city hall and the city lot on the southeast corner of Avenue F and 8th Street.

Greenwald asked Driscoll if he thought parking lots were the best use of the money.

"I do now," Driscoll said.

Councilman Matt Mohrfeld asked if the \$850,000 was a legitimate estimate. "With all due respect, is that going to come in at \$2.5 million?" Mohrfeld asked.

Driscoll said the first step would be to do soil borings to see what was under the lots and, if it didn't make sense, they could pull back before spending too much money.


