

ers included Gulf Shrimp on a baguette, homemade guacamole and chips and cheesy quesadillas. Then as a warm up to the main courses, the students, including Alexis Rehm & Ellie Schulte from Fort Madison Middle School, Jayden Fedler from Fort Madison High School and Brett Azinger from Central Lee Middle School, helped prepare and dish chicken curry on Basmati rice and mint chutney.

Then attendees were then treated to a baked Tilapia on Asian coleslaw with a mango salsa before the main dish of lemon glazed pork loin and a brandy mushroom sauce, rosemary red potatoes and a braized cabbage.

The whole meal was topped of with apple cobbler and cinnamon ice cream.

Main Street director Cassie Gilbert, who worked the room while refilling wines and talking with guests, said there were 35 patrons to the event at \$75 per person.

The funds will go directly to help Main Street programming throughout the year.

Two FM grapplers place at Ed Winger Invitational

Steffensmeier (32-3) got caught in a cradle by Colin Lewis of North School at the 2:49 mark to send him to the consolation round for 3rd place. The FMHS junior had beaten Lewis by decision at the Lancer Duals in North School two weeks ago.

Steffensmeier pinned Trevor Stanley of Greenwood 1:18 into the match to get his first win of the day. Then in the quarter-finals he scored a major decision over Zach Fisher of Indianola 11-0 for his 100th win in his high school career. In the consolation round he scored a technical fall over Zach Oldham of West Des Moines 16-0. He then scored a major decision over Skyler Noftsgar of Ballard 12-1 to get the third-place medal. Noftsgar was 31-3 going into the match and rated 6th

in the state in Class 2A.

Aaron Steffensmeier (132) took 7th place at the event winning four of five matches. He lost in the first round to Will Jefferson of Bettendorf 10-0 to put him in the consolation bracket where he went on to pin his next two opponents, Todd Robinson of W. Des Moines and Luke Stuart of Urbandale. He then took a decision from Ames' Humberto Alvarado, 5-1 setting up the 7th place match with Cade Moss. Steffensmeier pinned Moss at 2:48.

Ryan Steffensmeier (113) lost in the 7th place match to Jackson Lukehart of West Des Moines Valley. He won his first match of the day over Keaton Speicher of Iowa City West with a 12-4 decision. Then was pinned by Kobey Pritchard of Indianola at the 4:50 mark,

which sent him into the 7th place bracket. There he met Cade Pahl of Des Moines Roosevelt and pinned him at the 2:49 mark to set up the match

with Lukehart. Nathan Steffensmeier lost his first two matches of the day by pin at 120 lbs. in 1:25 and 3:05. At 126, Skylar Schau

lost his first match of the day in a 10-1 decision to Ethan Wagner of Centerville. Schau then got two byes in a row to set up a match with Voyan Ad-

amson of Bettendorf who scored a technical fall at 16-0 to end Schau's day.

At 182 lbs. Diego Lozano (13-14) was pinned in his first two matches of the day, the first at the hands of Ben Lee of Ballard and the second by Tristan Richardson of North School.

Danen Settles, wrestling at 195 lbs. for the Hounds, lost in the first round by pin to Isaac Bales in :52. But Settles battled back and won two decisions in the consolation bracket over Jacob Martin of Waukee 12-6 and Kaden Sutton of Adel-DeSoto-Minburn, 5-0. Settles was on his way to the 7th place match but was stopped quickly by Reece Bowlin of Indianola by pin at :42.

On Tuesday the Hounds travel to Kirksville, Missouri for a 6 p.m. match.

Hound boys squander first-half lead in Quincy

QUINCY - A second-half let down gave the Fort Madison Bloodhounds their second loss in two games against Illinois opponents this year.

Unity of Quincy shut down the Hounds in the second half en route to a 58-50 win in a make-up game from Dec. 17.

The Hounds, who had won 6 of the last 7 games going into Saturday's game, relied on junior Caleb Cresswell and senior CJ Richardson for 26 of the teams 28 first-half points including 19 from Cresswell.

Lorenzo Riles had the only other points for the Hounds in the first half with a bucket in the second quarter. but the Hounds had an eight point lead 28-20 at the end of the half.

Unity's Corey Miller got hot in the second half for Unity and almost single-handedly pulled the game out for Unity as the Hounds had no answer for him in the fourth quarter. Miller threw up 14 points in the final period and had 21 in the second half.

FMHS was outscored 21 to 12 in the final period dashing the Hounds hope for winning 7 of 8.

Cresswell finished with 22 points followed by Richardson's 12. Austin Rose had 5 and Logan Rashid added four. Treavor Kokjohn had 3 points and Riles and Landon Bentley each added a bucket.

The Hounds travel to Kahoka for a battle with Missouri foe Clark County on Tuesday and then host 4th ranked Mt. Pleasant in a conference rematch on Friday at home. The Panther's are 12-2 on the year and undefeated in the loop. Their only losses have come to Cedar Rapids Xavier and Muscatine. The Panthers handed the Bloodhounds a 64-38 defeat on Jan. 10.

Lady Hounds lose 10th straight at Quincy

When Fort Madison did get the free throw line they made all five attempts.

The Lady Hounds fall to 3-12 in the loop and play host to non-conference Danville on Tuesday.
