Health officials take flu actions

FMCH restricts visitors at Birthplace, surgery areas

FORT MADISON -Officials at Fort Madison Community Hospital announced Friday that visitation restrictions are now in place at the FMCH Birthplace and postpartum suites.

According to a release from community relations manager Angie Budnik, Birthplace visitors will be temporarily limited to the following people: Coach or significant other; immediate grandparents who do not display any flu like symptoms; and siblings that are 72 hours symptom free from the following: fever, cough, diarrhea, vomiting, rash or persistent runny nose. Budnik said the restric-

tion will last until the

LCHD offers tips on dealing with outbreak

FORT MADISON - Due to influenza cases on the rise in Iowa, Lee County Health Department issued a statement Friday reminding everyone it is not too late to get the flu shot.

Flu shots are still available at LCHD's immunization clinics held on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of each month. The next clinics will be at the Trinity United Methodist Church in Keokuk on January 11, 2018 from 12 pm to 4:30 pm and at LCHD's immunization clinic at #3 John Bennett Drive on January 25, 2018 from 12 pm to 5:30 pm. LCHD will also provide flu shots during scheduled TB clinics held at LCHD's office on Mondays and Wednesdays from 3-4 pm (except on holidays such as the week of Jan 15th).

Influenza or "Flu" is a highly contagious viral infection that affects mainly the nose, throat, chest and lungs. The flu may cause mild to severe illness, and may even lead to death. In the very young, the elderly, and those with other serious medical conditions, infection can lead to severe complications such as pneumonia. The single best way to prevent the flu is to get vaccinated each

year. Flu viruses mainly spread from person to person through coughing

or sneezing. Sometimes people may become infected by touching some-



thing with flu viruses on it and then touching their mouth or nose. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning one day before symptoms



develop and up to five days after becoming sick. That means that you may be able

to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Always remember the three C's- Cover your cough, Clean your hands, and Contain Germs!

If you get the flu remember to stay home from work or school, get plenty of rest and water, and consult with your doctor especially if you are at high risk of complications and serious disease. If you start on anti-viral medications within a day or two of when your symptoms start, your risk of serious disease, hospitalization and even death

When that's done and cleaned up, we set out the treats for the fat man and the girls rush upstairs (keep in mind - 24 and 18 years old) and sleep in the same bed, like they have done since we moved into this house 12 years ago.

FAIRFIELD - The Bloodhound boys basketball team snapped a three-game winning streak managing just 11 first half points in a 58-39 loss to Fairfield on the road Friday night.

The Trojans' junior Tristan Waugh and senior guard Dante Cingire each outscored the Hounds with 12 first half points apiece.

The Hounds didn't get on the board until two minutes left in the first period, managing a bucket each from sophomore Jayden Fedler and senior Kaleb Cresswell in the quarter. Fort Madison senior Treavor James-Kokjohn, who's second on the Southeast Conference in scoring at 17.8 points per game was held scoreless in the first half.

Fairfield raced out to 15-4 first quarter lead and things didn't get much better for the Hounds in the second period getting outscored 18-7.

Coming out after halftime, the Hounds got back to their style of play and back in the game with 10 points from James-Kokjohn, who led the Fort Madison with 13 points on the night. Sheymouhr Redd-Donald and Fedler also added buckets, while the Hound defense held Fairfield to eight points cutting into the Trojan lead 25-41.

But the Trojans went into protection mode in the fourth quarter forcing the Hounds to foul and Cingire, who led Fairfield with 21 points on the night went to the free throw line eight times, converting seven and added a 3-pointer to put the game away.

Fedler finished with 10 points for the Hounds and Cresswell added nine. Junior Logan Rashid, Redd-Donald and Brandon Keester eached added a two points for Fort Madison.

HTC girls get second win after winter break

FORT MADISON - A scoreless stretch of about 11 minutes by Burlington Notre Dame gave Holy Trinity Catholic their second straight win 69-25 over the Nikes to highlight girls high school basketball

action Friday night. Junior Taylor Boeding led the Crusaders with 18 points including eight in the third period. Senior Brett Schneider, who was coming off a career night on Tuesday when she scored a school-record 37 points against New London, fired in 17 points for HTC.



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



can be reduced.

Symptoms of flu include fever (typically $\geq 100^{\circ}$ F), headache, extreme tiredness, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle aches, and sometimes stomach symptoms such as nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea but this is more common in children than adults. To protect yourself and family from the flu please remember the following:

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 15-20 seconds. Wash your hands before and after eating, going to the bathroom, touching pets, phones, or keyboards. Use hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.

5-DAY WEATHER FORECAST



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Stay home from work or school when you are ill, and encourage others to do the same.

Stay away from others you know are ill. You are less likely to become ill if you stay at least three feet away from someone who is coughing or sneezing.

Vaccination. The first line of defense against influenza is to get your flu shot each year.

Contact your health care provider. If you experience flu-like symptoms contact your doctor. Your doctor may be able to prescribe antiviral medications for you to shorten the duration of the illness and prevent transmission if within 24-48 hours.

Clean frequently and appropriately. Some viruses can live up to two hours on some surfaces. Frequently clean commonly used surfaces, such as door handles, handrails, eating surfaces, toys, and phones. Commercial disinfectants or bleach solutions should be used. The bleach solution can be made by mixing ¼ cup bleach with 1 gallon of water. The bleach solution must be made fresh daily.

threat of increased exposure has passed.

FMCH team members are following the CDC's guidelines, as well as internal infection control procedures to help protect patients, employees and hospital visitors.

In addition, the hospital is also requesting that anyone experiencing any of the symptoms of the flu including: fever, cough, sore throat, diarrhea, vomiting, body aches, runny or stuffy nose, refrain from visiting both inpatient and outpatient surgery areas of the hospital.

People who have influenza can be contagious beginning one day before symptoms develop, and up to five to seven days after becoming sick. Some people, especially young children and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for longer time periods

The hospital recommends that residents wash hands frequently with soap and water; if soap and water are not available use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.

Spreading the flu virus can be reduced by covering your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze and throw the tissue in the trash after you use it and then sanitize your hands or cough and sneeze into your elbow if a tissue is not available. Avoid close contact with sick people and void touching your eyes, nose or mouth, as germs spread this way.

If you get sick with influenza, stay home from work or school and limit close contact with others for at least 24 hours after a fever is gone, to help prevent spreading the virus.

A flu shot is also still recommended.
