CRITICAL PLAYS: Lady Hawks stage upset bid of Class 3A No. 1 WB/ND

WEST BURLINGTON - This one will hurt for a while.
Central Lee's Lady Hawks gathered just behind first base in right field and many looked up to the sky to try to keep from weeping. It worked for some but not others. The Hawks had just fallen 4-3 to No. 7 West Burlington/Notre Dame in the Class 3A Region 8 semifinals at Barb Carter Field in West Burlington.

The win gives West Burlington a chance to avenge a loss in the region 8 semifinals in 2021 to Davis County. The two meet again on Tuesday in West Burlington.

For Central Lee, the loss is bitter.

Trailing 3-1 headed into the sixth inning, Alix Congdon doubled to right field to open the inning and Meghan Hopp singled on a hard liner to center that scored Congdon. Kenna Sandoval came up and fanned on three fastballs up in the zone, but on the third pitch Hopp took off for second on a delayed steal that seemed to catch the Falcons off guard, putting the tying run in scoring position.

Lauren Summers struck out Shanna Buford for the second out, but eighth grader Marie Young came through big with another RBI single to center to score Hopp and tie the game. Bella Steffensmeier would ground out to short to end the rally and set up a dramatic

Area counties, companies get Volkswagon settlement funds

DES MOINES - A multiyear settlement agains Volkswagon for alleged violations of the Clean Air Act has funneled grant funds into area counties and companies.

In 2016, the Environmental Protec-

tion Agency (EPA) filed a complaint alleging VW violated the Clean Air Act by the sale of approximately 580,000 motor vehicles containing 2.0 or 3.0 turbocharged direct injection (TDI) liter diesel engines equipped with "defeat devices" between model years 2009 and 2016.

The subject vehicles are equipped with devices in the form of computer software designed to perform differently during normal vehicle operation than during emissions tests. It is alleged that during normal use, the subject vehicles

emit levels of nitrogen oxide in excess of the EPA compliant levels and are a serious health concern.

As a result of the settlement with the EPA Iowa was expected to receive \$21 million in environmental mitigation trust funds through 2026.

In the last three cycles, Lee County Secondary Roads received \$84,600 to for two diesel truck mitigation efforts, while Henry County received \$30,000, both

from the latest funding cycles.

In earlier funding cycles, Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission received \$50,000 for mitigation on two SEIBUS vehicles.

Also in the latest funding cycles, Equilon Enterprises, the owners of Shell stations around the state including Lee and Des Moines County received a combined \$320,000 to install direct current fast charging stations in Fort Madison at 5002 Avenue O, and in Burlington at 130. S. Roosevelt.

Bloodhounds first loss to Burlington a big one

REGIONALS: Fort Madison shut out by Grayhounds after sweeping the regular season matchups.

BURLINGTON — The hardest-hit balls for Fort Madison's softball team met their demise in the deepest part of Wagner Field.

Some of the balls hit by Burlington didn't have the same velocity, but found their way between Bloodhounds, or under Fort Madison gloves.

The 4-0 loss to Burlington in Saturday's Class 4A regional semifinal was a frustrating finish for the Bloodhounds, who carried the momentum from the Southeast Conference regular-season title into the postseason.

Fort Madison (23-13) had baserunners on in four of the first five innings, but on a night when the Bloodhounds got just two hits, there always seemed to be a roadblock. Fort Madison had the leadoff batter reach base in three of those innings, and still couldn't capitalize.

"It seemed like every time we got runners on, we couldn't keep moving them around," Fort Madison coach Jared Rehm said. "That always hurts, when you get two on and nobody out, or even get



one on with nobody out. The leadoff batter should always score, I think."

The two innings that hurt the most were the fourth and fifth.

Emily Steffensmeier led off the fourth with a walk and Erika Kruse followed with a single, the Bloodhounds' first hit of the night. Lexi Whaley popped out to short and Neeley Rehm struck out, then Lauryn Helmick hit a drive to deep center field that Burlington's Emily Mosley caught near the fence

McKenna Cashman led off the fifth by reaching on a dropped third strike, then Elle Ruble walked. Taylor Johnson fouled out for the first out of the inning, then Logan Johnson hit another deep fly ball to center that Mosley was able to track down. Steffensmeier followed with a single to load the bases, but Kruse struck out to end the inning.

Burlington (19-13), which advanced to play

at Clear Creek-Amana in Tuesday's regional final, scored two runs in the first inning. Keith Wiseman led off with a walk, then Hannah Heuvelmann bunted in front of home plate. Logan Johnson's throw to first was wide, but the play was ruled a single. Morgan Schroeder then doubled to score Wiseman, and Heuvelmann scored on Aubrey Hesler's single.

The Grayhounds added two runs in the fourth. They loaded the bases with one out, then Schroeder hit a grounder that went under the glove of Ruble, who was ranging to her left. The play was ruled a single, with Sophie Brown and Wiseman scoring on the play.

"They put the ball where we weren't standing," Jared Rehm said.

It was an emotional end to the season for the Bloodhounds, who won the conference title outright for the first time since 2010. Logan Johnson was the only senior on the team.

"We've got everyone back except Logan, and that's going to be a position that's tough to fill," Rehm said. "That's an OPS of 1.000 something. She was a third baseman and a catcher. So it's going to take one player, maybe two, to fill.

"We'll have 13 returners from this group. The season definitely wasn't a loss. What's goal No. 1? Win the conference. Goal No. 2? Make it to state. We were ... chipped away at it. We were just a little short."

We've been invaded and attacked again this year by Japanese Beetles. Our aronia bushes are covered with them—thousands! I was hoping the martins might like to make a meal out of the Japanese Beetles, but no such luck. The only way I know of to eradicate the Japanese Beetles before they completely strip the aronia bushes and grape vines, is to use a heavy duty insecticide. I hate to do this for two reasons. 

bottom half.

Sophie Turner, who went the distance for Central Lee, got the Falcons' Isabella Blaufuss to fly out to center and then gave up a single to Anna Engberg to center. Kylee Logan followed with a double to the gap in right center but Engberg was held up at third. With runners at 2nd and 3rd, WB's Riley Richards popped up to second base. With first base open the infield fly rule was not in effect and the ball dropped for an error loading the bases.

Lauren Krieger then drove in what proved to be the game-winner with a soft single down the right field line to score Engberg for a 4-3 lead. Logan was thrown out trying to score from second on the play to end the inning.
