MEDAL WINNERS: Foursome gets national silver medals at forum Sunday

FORT MADISON - The foursome that earned national recognition for finishing runner-up at a national trades competition in Atlanta last month received some congratulations and a little hardware for their efforts.

The group, including Landes Williams, Emmett Kruse, Andrew Schaefer, and Hayden Wolfe, were honored at Elliott Test Kitchen Sunday afternoon by representatives of Fort Madison High School, the district school board, staff, parents, economic development officials, and partners in the group's efforts.

"This group program has seen multiple state championships and now they are competing at the highest level and placing second," said Fort Madison High School co-Principal Pat Lamb.

"They were the only group to complete the build, so we've got some serious things going on."

Lamb said the school has enhanced much of the Career and Technical Education programming, including welding and auto, both at high levels in the last decade.

LEE COUNTY - After a lengthy and sometimes contentious debate, the Lee County Supervisors Monday approved committing \$100,000 to the Riverview Park and Marina restoration project.

The board approved the funds at Monday's regular meeting after voting down a motion from Supervisor Garry Seyb to commit \$250,000 to the project out of the county's \$6.5 million ARPA

Hounds lose turf war in **Cedar Rapids**

Errors on foreign surface plague Fort Madison boys in Substate semifinal

CEDAR RAPIDS - Fort Madison needs a few more games on turf fields before they come to Cedar Rapids again, at least to Mt. Mercy University, where five errors put the Bloodhounds in a big

The Hounds lost 12-2 in the Class 3A Substate 5 semifinal game in Cedar Rapids at Mt. Mercy's new all-turf field.

The errors weren't the only downfall of the Hounds, but with Matt Hopper diving for grounders behind in the infield on multiple occasions, it was clear early that the playing conditions were not what Fort Madison was used to.

Head Coach Ron Walker said that's one of the downsides of playing in rural Iowa, you don't get to see those types of environments, and you typically don't play that kind of competition.

"The kids were timid on this field, even in the warm ups. You could see it. We don't have access to these types of fields and we didn't see them at all this year, so that's a part of it," Walker said.

"But I talked to the kids out here afterwards and asked what's the one thing I preach to them and they said, to play hard and commit. So why are we playing

The Hounds' Reiburn Turnbull led the offense going 2-3 with an RBI. Fort Madison only had four other hits on the night, one each from Tate Johnson, Landes Williams, Kane Williams, and Tanner Settles who just beat out a bunt in Fort Madison's 2-run second inning. Settles also had an RBI infield single in



first two errors in the bottom of the first. A sacrifice bunt attempt turned ugly when Marion's Cael Hodges came all the way around to score on a couple throwing errors in the infield. Myles Davis would then double in another run for a 2-0 lead heading to the second.

Hopper would get dinged on a pitch but that would be the only base runner for the Hounds in the second.


Landes Williams, who went all five innings for the Hounds, gave up a two-out single to Hodges in the bottom half, but kept the Wolves in check the rest of the inning.

Williams would hit a one-out single that started a three-hit rally for Fort Madison. Kane Williams followed with a single and Turnbull lined a grounder into center field to score Landes Williams and move Kane Williams to third.

After a strikeout for the second out, Tanner Settles beat out one of the night's slower infield grounders to short stop scoring Williams and moving Turnbull to third. Hopper would strike out swinging to end the threat with the game tied 2-2.

Marion would add three in the bottom of the third while the Hounds stranded two in the top of the fourth

Marion broke things open in the bottom of the fourth with seven more runs, six of which came with

no outs. At 12-2, the Hounds sat three down in a row to get out of the inning.

Tate Johnson singled with one out in the fifth inning and Hopper drew a walk, but a fly out and strike out ended the Hounds' season.

Walker said it will be tough to replace four seniors. He will lose Johnson, Landes Williams, Hopper, and Turnbull.

"These are four kids that are all going on to play sports at the next level. They will be tough to replace, but I think it says a lot about the programming here at Fort Madison that these kids are seeing that kind of success," he said.

Turnbull said the field was definitely different.

"This was much faster than we are used to. Tate even said when he slid at second he went flying over the bag," Turnbull said.

"I think we did okay, some of us just were a bit intimidated I think, but that first pitch coming in was a heck of a lot faster than it looked in warmups."

The line on Williams was five innings, 12 runs, eight earned on 11 hits with one strike out and three walks.

Fort Madison ends the year at 19-9 overall.

Walker said Fort Madison has to play better than .650 or .700 baseball to get a higher seed going into the post-season.

"We have to maintain a better record so we get a higher seed and can control our destiny a bit more in the future," he said.

thanked former Principal Greg Smith for his vision of the CTE program and "turning over the keys" of the trades program to him to create industry-ready

"What you have in front of you today is the culmination of more than a decade of work," Kobelt said.

He said Fort Madison has been working the state circuit, winning around the state, and then got on an airplane and took the mass transit system in Atlanta.

He said the four students were in awe of the bigger city environment and taking in all the sites and sounds, until they got to the venue where the event was happening.

"Then these four flipped a switch," he said. "I've had some pretty good teams in the past nine years, but these four did some things, that - I told them not to. Their level of confidence in themselves and in each other was incredible."

He said the group was within 5% of the original schedule they set and presented to judges, on a plan that they only had seen 12 hours before and nothing on that scale of competition.

"They executed almost flawlessly. And when I say that, that means they were four points away from being national champions," Kobelt said.

"What happened there was absolutely those guys. I had to stand there at a distance for four days. These four guys never came up for air, no infighting, just an execution of a plan. Now they are the second best team in the nation. Four wide-eyed corncobs went to Atlanta and just did what they do."

Meller donation will now house new LCHD/EMS building

county by Glen Meller and his family to be used for the construction of the health department and other public purposes.

The board also approved accepting a quit claim deed on the former Iowan property from the Meller family on a 5-0 vote

Fort Madison Mayor Matt Mohrfeld said the property was worth half a million dollars to the county.

Dr. Phil Caropreso, a Lee County Health Dept. board member, said a new facility is dire for the county emergency needs because the current facilities aren't sufficient for the jobs being performed.

"This is a suboptimal environment that challenges the performance of the Health Department and this needs to be addressed," said Dr. Caropreso. LCHD Board chair Judy Bartachek encouraged the board to use all remaining ARPA funds and any other funding available to get the construction done. She said the \$7,500 the county is currently spending each month on a lease for the space at the John Bennett Center at the former Iowa State Penitentiary, could be used to pay for a new structure.

The discussion then quickly turned from support of the new health department/EMS structure to funding for the city's park and marina restoration project.

Mohrfeld said restoration advocates are not pitting funding for the restoration project against funding for the Health Department, but showing the value of both projects to the county.

"I want to see a health department and I want to see it out there. I want to see an EMS facility there, and I'd like to even see a bigger picture where one day that would even encompass a community child care center, maybe other things. That needs to be said," he said.

Mohrfeld said Greg Shottenkirk, of Shottenkirk Automotive, has agreed to match dollar-for-dollar any contribution from the county. That money would be used in combination with other new dollars raised to leverage a Destination Iowa grant from the state of Iowa.

The Destination Iowa grant program is a \$100 million investment of state ARPA funds to shovel-ready projects in the state through a competitive application process. The restoration project would apply for up to a 40% match of new funding that isn't already allocated to other grant programs. Mohrfeld was hoping that figure would include \$250,000 from the county and Shottenkirk's matching \$250,000. That \$500,000 would be added to \$350,000 that has already been privately raise, and an additional \$350,000.

Mohrfeld also mentioned another \$350,000 that he said could come to fruition through "convergence" that could be added to the grant funds for a total of \$2 million.

"Right now there is in motion through convergence another \$350,000 by the time the grant is hopefully successful that it will be matched out. That could parlay into \$2 million. Anytime we can parlay our money that's a good thing."

Seyb said the board has already signed a resolution to commit up to \$5.4 million on the health department and EMS bay so that's happening.

The county roughly has \$3.7 million in ARPA funds remaining and is working with Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission on an Iowa Community Development Block Grant for \$570,000 giving them a total of \$4.27 million. Preliminary estimates on the work have set the cost of the Health Department/EMS building at between \$5 million and \$5.4 million. That means the county would have to find up to an additional \$1.3 million to finish the project as proposed.

"Bottom line is, we're going to have to bond for something. We know that, we just hope the public will respond in a positive way," said Matt Pflug, chairman of the supervisors' board.

Tim Fencl, CEO of Danville Mutual Telephone, said the company is looking at a partnership with ambulatory services in Donnellson to provide fiber optic services. He said EMS director Dennis Cosby said it would be an asset to have the secondary Internet connection for the ambulance service.

After Seyb made his motion to approve the \$250,000 from the ARPA funds, he amended the motion to stretch the payment over the next four years. That amendment was voted down with Pflug, Ron Fedler, and Charles Holmes voting against the issue. Seyb and Rick Larkin voted in favor of the ARPA spend.

Fedler then made a motion to commit \$100,000 over five years to the city's restoration project, which was approved 5-0.

Seyb then moved to add \$150,000 from ARPA funds to the general fund commitment to give the restoration project the quarter million it had requested. That motion also failed 3-2 along the same lines.

Lee County Economic Development Group Board President Michael Mohrfeld said the county's population is in decline and data points to quality of life

"Since 1960, Lee County has seen a 26% decline in population and from 2010 to 2020, we witnessed another 6%. That means that percentage of decline is climbing. When you look at the age of our population, we're probably not on the right track," he said.

He said there are good quality jobs available in the county and housing has seen intiatives to provide sustained housing, so the main issue is quality of life.

"People are leaving Lee County for better quality of life attractions. It's plain and simple. In the same time we've lost 6% of population, the state of Iowa increased 5%. So they didn't leave Iowa, they left for bigger communities with more attractions," Mohrfeld said

"Attraction is the biggest loss leader in Lee County and we've got to get in front of this."


