GROUNDBREAKING: District officials don hard hats and dig in with gold shovels

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison school board President Dianne Hope threw dirt about 10 feet in the air with her gold shovel with a big smile on her face.

Hope has been part of the school board for most of the past referendums that have failed, five total, and each time said she was going to keep pushing forward to do what's best for Fort Madison students.

The district was breaking ground on two separate projects

Tuesday morning, the expansions at both the Fort Madison High School and the Fort Madison Middle School.

When completed in 2024, the district's PreK-6th grade students will attend school at the middle school campus, while 7th-12 grade students will attend the high school campus. All in, the project will cost the district about \$36 million.

The district has made plans and reset plans and reset plans over the past six years to get to this point of construction beginning.

What a great day in the neighborhood. It's been a long

The grant will improve the newly-acquired SEIBUS Mount Pleasant facility at 1405 N. Broadway in Mount Pleasant, Iowa.


The project is for a major reno-

Demonstrations now a clear part of Roe decision

It was not in the menu, but there was a heaping helping of irony served up one evening last week at a restaurant in Washington, D.C.

U.S. Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh was dining at Morton's steakhouse. Demonstrators were outside, intent on ensuring he left with indigestion and not just a full belly.

At the center of this dinnertime dust-up was the right to choose interposed next to the right to chew. That is part of an ongoing debate over where such protests are appro-

The demonstrators oppose the Supreme Court's recent decision ending the Constitution's guarantee that women have a right to an abortion under certain circumstances.

That issue was front and center outside Morton's — just as it has been in demonstrations in dozens of communities across the United States, including Iowa. People have peacefully gathered to express their views on the decision to end Roe vs. Wade's protections for women.

Kavanaugh has been the target of many protesters, not only because he was one of the votes in favor of overturning Roe, but also because he assured us during his Senate confirmation hearing in 2018 that Roe was an important legal precedent that has been reaffirmed many times.

Whether you support the court's recent decision or not, we should all agree peaceful demonstrations are one of the freedoms that need to be protected in the United States. Of course, it is ironic how people's views of the appropriateness of demonstrations and picketing change as the issues



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

Tables have turned on picketing

jumped on the symbolism of the reaction to the encounter on the sidewalk in front of the restaurant. At the same time, critics of the demonstration focused on the issue of people invading Kavanaugh's privacy and keeping him from dining in peace.

Morton's management criticized the "unruly behavior" of the protesters. The restaurant statement caused some supporters of the demonstrators to choke on the assertion that the rights of restaurant patrons should not be infringed upon.

"Politics, regardless of your side or views, should not trample the freedom at play of the right to congregate and eat dinner," the restaurant said.

While some people were angered by the intrusions into the private lives of Supreme Court justices, other people mocked such concerns by using language similar to that in the Supreme Court's decision.

Alexandra Petri, a Washington Post columnist, wrote: "The right to congregate and eat dinner is actually not to be found anywhere in the Constitution."

But there was much more at stake than steak in the demonstration outside Morton's. There is that matter of people's right to peaceably assemble and petition the government for a redress of their grievances, two foundations of the First Amendment. And there is the question of whether public officials like the justices should have to live by the same rules they set for the rest of us to follow.

This is where another helping of irony gets served up.

Some of the supporters of the Supreme Court's abortion decision have been vocal critics of demonstrators marching in front of the justices' homes. These critics have expressed concern for the safety of the jurists and their families. They also have said the homes of justices should be off limits so the officials can go about their lives free of harassment.

There is irony, because the Supreme Court has for many years put the large public plaza in front of its own building off-limits to demonstrators. And in the weeks leading up to the abortion ruling, the court established a much larger buffer zone around its building, with an 8-foot-tall fence to keep demonstrators farther away.

Contrast that with the Supreme Court's past

decisions in which the justices concluded that even a 35-foot-wide buffer zone around abortion clinics was an unconstitutional restriction on the First Amendment rights of abortion opponents to express their views and confront doctors and patients.

In a 1988 case, the court did uphold the constitutionality of a Wisconsin law that prohibited "targeted picketing" outside people's houses. The issue then was protesters carrying "baby killer" signs who gathered outside the homes of doctors.

But the tables have turned now.

Then, it was people who were pro-choice who wanted targeted picketing banned. Now, it is people who are pro-life who support a ban on picketing outside homes of people like Brett Kavanaugh.

Then, it was doctors and employees of abortion clinics who feared for their

safety. Now, it is judges and their families who have that fear. And both groups' concerns are legitimate.

Through the years, several doctors and clinic employees have been murdered by pro-life zealots. Last month, a retired Wisconsin judge was killed in his home by man he had sent to prison a decade ago. Five days later, an armed man was arrested in the middle of the night outside Kavanaugh's house.

There are other places to peacefully express our views without clogging the sidewalks in front of people's homes, leaving occupants to fear a wacko might be in the group. That's true whether a Supreme Court justice lives there or whether it's an employee of an abortion clinic.

This is where common sense should come in.

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

SEIRPC grant to enhance MP bus facility

Renovation of the facilities is to make it ready for use as a vehicle storage facility for vehicles used in Henry County, and wil include repairs to the roof, insulation, siding, walls, the construction of a concrete apron, installation of security cameras and

SEIRPC Executive Director Mike Norris said the building will store six buses in service plus spares for overflow services and also provide room for growth. The facility also features a driver training and office area, restroom, and material storage. Total estimated cost with contingencies is \$600,000 with 80% coming from the grant funds.

"The grant award follows PTIG awards in 2021 for the SEIBUS West Burlington storage facility, which was new construction adjacent to SEIRPC offices. The storage buildings are part of a four-phase plan to develop permanent parking and overhead storage in each county for safety, security, equipment longevity, and operational advantages," he said.

"Before 2021, SEIRPC had no permanent parking site and had used over 10 different sites in the region for its parking needs, with only one site enclosed."

SEIRPC operates the SEIBUS public transit service for Des Moines, Henry, Lee, and Louisa counties. Services are available Monday-Friday in all four counties and are reservation-based. Services offered include: In-town, Town to Town, County to County, shopping trips, medical transportation to every southeast Iowa medical center and clinic, and the Iowa City medical shuttle, and any other need. \$36 million project officially underway in FM

time," Hope said.

"I want to welcome everyone here. We have board members and others here who've worked very, very hard, not just us, there's been a tremendous amount of community support."

Hope thanked previous board presidents Timm Lamb and Tim Wondra for their leadership during the years of decisions."

She said Lamb first brought the board the suggestion of replacing the current elementary buildings.

"Thanks for this journey," she said.

Wondra led the board through decisions and indecisions and votes from the school board.

She also thanked other board members and former board members for their input during the past six years.

Superintendent Dr. Erin Slater thanked the community for their belief that the district wouldn't stop thinking about students.

"I'm so excited that we've had lasting partnerships that have made this day possible," said FMSCD Superintendent Dr. Erin Slater. We are so grateful for everyone who believed that no matter what, we were going to do what's best for kids."

Chris Smith, of Carl A. Nelson Co., said crews will be working diligently through the summer and fall for site preparation.

"The plan is to get the concrete foundations poured before cold weather this winter," he said. "This is a very challenging project with all the additions being out in front of the school and in the main parking lot. We're going to sequence the construction to make this project as minimally destructive as possible."

He said the end goal would be to complete the facility and have the doors open in the fall of 2024.

Construction at the high school will require relocation of the entrance in the spring of 2023. Plans tentatively include moving the entryway to the east side of the building temporarily during construction.

Most of the funds for the work will come from borrowing against district SAVE funds through 2050 and Physical Plant and Equipment Levy funds. SAVE funds are the 1% sales tax revenues that come from purchases in the state that are collected and distributed to state public school districts.

DLR Group, headquartered in Omaha, Neb. is the district's architectural firm, and Carl A. Nelson Co., out of Burlington, is the construction manager, on the project.

A downturn in the construction industry and a weak bidding pool put the project off for more than a year as Carl A. Nelson and the district worked to get the best price on the construction project.

Voters turned down several referendums over the past decade to construct a new elementary school at the middle school, which would have included new sports facilities for the district. Despite getting more than 50% approval for a debt service levy to build the schools, the projects could never move forward because the state requires a 60% plus one supermajority to pass bond referendums.


