County may revisit EMS charges

NON-TRANSPORTS: County may try to curb repeated visits for non-emergent services

BY CHUCK VANDENBERG

LEE COUNTY - A move to potentially charge residents who call for ambulance assistance, but turn down transport to the hospital, came up again Monday at the Lee County Board of Supervisors meeting.

Lee County EMS Director Dennis Cosby said he was approached by the EMS billing services company who said other ambulance services do charge for those runs.

But PCC Ambulance Billing, out of West Bend, Ind. gets

paid by the county on a percentage of the billing it collects.

Cosby brought the issue up at a Lee County EMS advisory committee meeting last week.

Fort Madison Fire Chief Joey Herren was on the call as a member of the committee and said many times the fire department will get to the calls first and they have been dealing with many of the repeat callers.

Herren said it's just something the fire department handles. "Its just something we have to deal with. If we see a pattern

PILLAR GROUPS

City wants to create directory for local clubs, groups

Group looking for clubs listed in social media post following story

FORT MADISON - A routine argument for a perceived stagnancy in Fort Madison has always been, there's nothing to do.

A committee formed to look at marketing the city to people to look at potentially relocating to the city, wants to create a directory of local clubs, groups, and hobbyists that currently exist in the city.

Fort Madison Mayor Matt Mohrfeld is holding pillar group meetings looking at different aspects of how to grow Fort Madison including among other things; housing, jobs, and quality of life.

The quality of life aspect spilled into the marketing pillar committee Monday night and the group centered on creating a directory of what nuance

County to pay \$140K as part ofsettlement

Insurance company to pick up \$25,000 of county's portion of the settlement

LEE COUNTY - A \$115,000 settlement will close out pending litigation against the county by CenturyLink dating back to 2016.

At Monday's Lee County Board of Supervisors meeting, the board agreed to pay \$115,000 to the communications company as part of an agreement to drop all litigation associated with a cut to CenturyLink's line when the Iowa Fertilizer plant was under construction.

The county will pay \$115,000 of the settlement and the county's insurance company would add \$25,000 for a total of \$140,000, which is half of the proposed settlement of \$280,000.

The other half would



come from Poepping Stone Bach & Associates and Terry Knoke, an Illinois resident listed in the suit. Lee County Engineer Ben Hull and former Lee County Engineer Ernie Steffensmeier were also named in the suit.

Lee County Attorney Ross Braden said an analysis of the litigation and the future risk makes settling the best

"I think it's clear in discussions with Ben, although the county does not feel that it is in the wrong by any means, by doing a cost-benefit analysis and the potential liability the county is exposed to in the event this lawsuit were to proceed through trial - the county could be on the hook for closer to \$400,000 or \$500,000," Braden said.

"It is a possiblity of a huge judgment against the county, and the advice of our legal counsel is to settle the matter short





of trial, if possible."

The U.S. District Court for Southern Iowa ruled against CenturyLink in the lawsuit brought by Allied Manatts Group, L.L.C and DeLong Construction, Inc regarding the construction damage. CenturyLink, settled that claim with the two entities and then filed suit against the county, PSBA, and Knoke for negligence.

Supervisor Rick Larkin asked what had changed to make them offer a settlement.

Hull said there has been a request for a summary judgment made in the case and the trial is set to start in September. With those issues pending, CenturyLink decided to put out a settlement offer.

"This thing could go on and on and I think it's in the best interest of the county that we do settle. And we are taking the word from our counsel. It's never good when we have to pay this amount, but it is what it is."

Hull said he and Steffensmeier were 1,000s of hours into the case.

"Given the 1,000s of hours, I could do \$100,000 worth of good for the county. This could go on for another five years," Hull said.

Supervisor Ron Fedler said the county has been kicking the issue down the road for years.

"I agree with our attorney. I don't want to roll the dice here. You never know."

In other action, supervisors:

- approved, 5-0, a contract to accept a donation of just under 10 acres of land from the Circle M Inc., and the Glen Meller family for property to house a new Lee County Health Department.
- approved, 5-0, a motion to re-appoint Liza Alton to the Lee County Conservation Board for a five-year term.

Transparency is key in keeping beef prices low

 ${f T}$ ransparency is the cornerstone of trust and accountability. That's why I've worked hard to maintain a high standard of transparency as your senator, including by holding meetings in all 99 counties ever year and through weekly calls with Iowa reporters. During my town halls and press calls, constituents and reporters are welcome to ask me questions on any subject.

I hold government agencies, corporations and other entities to the same high standard that I set for myself - working hard on legislation that holds them accountable and ensures they're being open and honest with

the American people. Recently, I've led proposals that seek to cultivate transparency in the cattle and pharmaceutical industries. My goal is to shine a light on undisclosed practices that drive up costs for consumers, and in the cattle industry, practices that drive down revenue for independent cattle producers.

For years, I've been fighting to enhance transparency to improve cattle markets for independent cattle feeders. It's been a long haul, but as a lifelong farmer and member of the Senate Agriculture Committee, I never stopped listening to Iowa cattle feeders and kept championing their livelihoods in Congress, working with my colleagues to advance this much-needed legislation. At the end of June, the Agriculture Committee voted to advance the Cattle Price Discovery and Transparency Act, a bipartisan proposal I'm leading alongside Senators Fischer of Nebraska, Tester of Montana and Wyden of Oregon.

Currently, four big meat packers control more than 80 percent of the market. These packers often enter into hidden contracts with large cattle feedlots, making it difficult for smaller, independent producers to get a fair shake or even identify a fair price in the market all while making it easier for packers to increase their profits. For example, while independent cattle producers have seen market prices fall or remain stagnant, Tyson Foods – one of the big four meat packers – reported that they raised prices for beef 23.8 percent during

the first three months of this year. JBS, another one of the big four meat packers, recently settled a \$52 million beef price-fixing lawsuit.

Our legislation seeks to improve transparency among meat packers who purchase livestock directly from independent producers by bolstering the negotiated cash market. Specifically, it requires the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to establish a mandatory minimum amount of purchases through an approved and transparent pricing structure for large meat packers, increasing competition in the cattle marketplace. Additionally, the bill would create a public contract library to disclose how contracts between feeders and packers are structured. Now that our legislation to boost transparency has passed the Agriculture Committee, Iowa producers are one step closer to being on a level playing field so they can receive a fair price for their cattle and increase their bottom lines.

As I travel the state holding my 99 county meetings, Iowans consistently tell me they are concerned with soaring prices - including the skyrocketing cost of prescription drugs. I've continued working on my bipartisan Prescription Drug Pricing Reduction Act, which successfully passed the Finance Committee when I was chairman. Unfortunately, Majority Leader Schumer won't bring it up for a vote, even though it would easily pass the Senate – but that hasn't stopped me from trying to find other ways to help bring down the cost of medication.

I recently joined Senator Cantwell of Washington to introduce the Pharmacy Benefit Manager (PBM) Transparency Act. Once again, our bill tackles the issue of transparency, but this one focuses on the drug industry's middlemen: PBMs. Today, three PBMs control nearly 80 percent of the prescription drug market, and they get away with operating in the shadows. They make decisions that are often unknown to consumers, pharmacies and regulators – increasing their profits while driving up costs for consumers and taxpayers in the process. Our bill, which successfully passed the Commerce Committee with bipartisan support, would direct the FTC to hold PBMs accountable for unfair and deceptive practices by banning manipulative pric-

Improving transparency and accountability among PBMs is a critical step in my ongoing bipartisan effort to lower prescription drug costs. I've also successfully pressed the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to investigate the impact PBMs have on the affordability of medicine. The agency recently announced it's opening an inquiry, which will tackle the current opaque structure of the industry. This will help bring additional transparency that is desperately needed in the pharmaceutical industry.

From low prices for Iowa cattle feeders to high costs at the pharmacy counter, improving transparency can help solve serious issues hurting Iowans' pocketbooks today. While we've made significant progress in recent weeks, I'll continue fighting for transparency by working tirelessly to get my bills on the president's desk and signed into law.

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

IowaWORKS vendor victimized by cyberattack

DES MOINES - The **IowaWORKS**.gov website that was recently impacted by a website outage has been restored, Iowa Workforce Development announced. The outage, caused by a cyberattack on third-party vendor Geographic Solutions Inc. (GSI), was resolved after close coordination between GSI and the state.

Iowans can utilize the <u>IowaWORKS.gov</u> website to search for a new job and record their work search activities.

The delivery of unemployment benefit payments was not impacted by the outage, but the need for unemployment claimants to report reemployment activities on **IowaWORKS**.gov was temporarily suspended. As a result of the website being restored:

Individuals filing weekly claims will again be required to report reemployment activities on Iowa-WORKS.gov beginning on Sunday, July 24 (to report activities for the week prior) Individuals who filed an initial claim from Sunday, June 26 through Friday, July 15, 2022, are asked to log into the <u>IowaWORKS.gov</u> website and ensure they have an active resume that is viewable to employers.

of people calling for assistance, we call the families and let them know they may need other assistance," Herren

Cosby said there are many occurrences where people are calling two and three times per day.

"I think there might be some abuse there," Cosby

He said he didn't have hard numbers on those calls, but could start tracking those. Patients are required to sign waivers of transport if they don't want to go to the

Lee County Supervisor Garry Seyb said at last week's meeting, he would be supportive of some type of charge for a non-emergent call.

"Correct me if I'm wrong, but once that ambulance is dedicated to a non-emergent call, it takes emergent response time away from that ambulance."

He said there seems to be a large amount of calls going out with no transports that were not emergent. Seyb said there has been some negative response to

the potential charge when it was brought up.

"Dennis brought that up not that he wanted to move forward with it, but wanted to look at it," Seyb said.

"The discussion was that we do see it happening, but we're not sure of the impact of it. Dennis suggested, and I agree, that we need to look at it and pull some data to see how often we're getting reccuring calls to the same address in a short amount of time and is that impacting emergent calls in the area."

Seyb said he's not motivated by the increased revenue, but more of a concern about having ambulances that are needed for emergent calls being tied up in non-emergent calls.

emergent calls because there's an ambulance in the area that's responding to a non emergent call," he said.

When that was heard, it was thought that we were going to start charging for it, but nothing has been brought forward.

Cosby said he wanted to bring that to the full board before that decision would be made.

Charles Holmes said Monday in general in the health care industry, if there is a service provided, there is a charge associated with it.

"If you go to the emergency room and you die of a heart attack, believe me, you're still going to get billed. If you die on the operating table you're gonna get a bill no matter what. To be consistent with how billing is done in the health care industry, you would be billing no matter what."

Holmes asked if Medicare or Medicaid would be picking up the bill in those instances.

Cosby said if there is no transport under EMS industry standards, it's very difficult to bill for those trips.


He said those laws are changing slowly and if there are medications administered, but no transport, they can bill for the medications provided.

"This charge would not be billable to insurance now. That could change in the future," Cosby said.

Seyb said he wanted to take a closer look at the data. "We'll take a look at that and see where it goes," he

"If it bares out statistically that we're sacrificing care of someone in an emergent call for someone not in an emergent call, then I think we have a duty to absolutely do something to address it."
