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FMHS students get free 'pass'

NO ENTRY FEE: Board wipes out entry fees for students to activities and events

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison's newly installed Activities Director is out of the gate with a gallop.

Jeff Lamb, who joined the district in June replacing outgoing AD Ben Fry, put a proposal in front of a limited Fort Madison Community School District Board of Directors Monday night.

The board barely had a quorum with directors Josh Wykert and Mio Santiago absent, board member Carol Ross on via telephone, and Brad Menke arriving just after the board meeting began.

Lamb's proposal will give all Fort Madison High School students with current year school-issued IDs free entry to all activities and events with the exception of post-season athletics and

fundraising events such as Dessert Theater or the Show

COUNCIL MEETINGS Council moves on additional fines for city code offenses

\$750 per day recurring code violation language being added to city books

FORT MADISON - A debate over the value of adding additional penalties for ongoing civil infractions in Fort Madison ended up moving the issue forward.

At Tuesday's regular meeting of the Fort Madison City Council, attorney Pat O'Connell of Lynch-Dallas, the city's attorney, was present to address the issue.

New language replaces section 1-4-2 of the city's code

for general penalty with language that adds the \$750 per day fine for "ongoing conditions" that are deemed civil infractions.



According to the city

code, a Municipal Infraction is a civil offense punishable by a civil penalty of not more than \$500 for each violation or if the infraction is a repeat offense, a civil penalty not to exceed \$750 may be imposed for each repeat offense.

The new language adds "or in the case (of) an ongoing condition, \$750 per day the condition continues."

City may block off part of 8th Street again due to building

FORT MADISON - City officials are looking again at closing down part of 8th Street due to continued deterioration of the James Block building. The former Humphrey building has

seen some additional crumbling on the west side adjacent to 8th Street and Fort Madison Building Director Doug Krogmeier said additonal settling has occured and the city is looking at barricading part of the street again. Krogmeier said conversations are planned again around the building later this week with city staff, including Fort Madison Fire Chief Joey Herren.

"We're keeping an eye on the building downtown. We're probably going to talk with Joey again when he gets back about the road situation," Krogmeier

The motion will require two additional readings or a final reading if the third reading is waived at upcoming council meetings.

Schulz: Code change allows council to speak softly, but carry a big stick

doing it?" Bowker asked.

O'Connell said many cities have added the language to put pressure on owners who are ignoring city communication.

"What I normally recommend is when we've written more than one letter, and we said clean this up, clean this up twice, and they haven't, I say, 'alright when we go to court we go back to the second letter when we warned them and we're going to ask the judge for penalty from that day forward," O'Connell said.

"Those penalties rack up, you don't get that from the court typically, but it's

nice to have a suspended penalty over somebody's head."

A suspended penalty would be a fine imposed by a judge, but part of it could be suspended pending correction of the violation.

O'Connell said a \$750 penalty could be a drop in the bucket for someone that owns 20 properties, but if they get a suspended fine from a judge it gives the city an enforcement tool in the code.

"It's not going to be used all the time, but it can be used on larger blighted properties that people are constantly complaining about," he said.

Bowker said the language seems a bit arbitrary.

O'Connell said the new code broadens the judge's discretion.

"All penalties are abitrary because the judge has discretion," he said. "I wouldn't worry about the abitrariness, that's what we have the court for. That's what judges do all day long. They figure out what is fair. It's not really arbitrary because they have a right to come to court."

O'Connell said most other cities he works with has this language added and said because it didn't exist in Fort Madison's code, he thought it should be there.

"It's a good tool in bad cases. Otherwise the judge is limited to \$750."

He said the intention isn't to make \$60,000 on a violation, it's to motivate "bad actors" to clean up property. He said the city wouldn't have that much into enforcing the violation and the city would typically be looking at recouping those fees so the taxpayers are treated fairly.

Mayor Matt Mohrfeld said a city staff discussion centered around what other communities are doing to help address repeated violations of city code with regard to properties.

City Councilman Tom Schulz said the city needs the ability to enforce the code.

"I think it comes under the heading speak softly but carry a big stick," Schulz said. "Have the ability to use this as a tool to get the situation rectified and not have to go to court or fight over it."

create equity with the students by negating who can afford student activity tickets.

"To bring the high school together in a more collaborative and engaging way, this could be an opportunity to remove some barriers that maybe some students have in being able to go and support their fellow peers," Slater said.

Menke said he's been asking for something along these lines for several years.

"I asked – it's probably been a couple of years – I asked for this exact thing and kind of hit some roadblocks, but I'm glad it's kind of going forward," Menke said. "I think it's been needed for a while now."

Lamb said he thought the idea would bring more students and families out to support Bloodhound activities.

"Whether that be for the show choir event or a varsity baseball game, they're going to be able to get into that," he said. "If we'd have a dinner theater, then absolutely not. That's a fundraising opportunity and then they would have to buy a ticket."

Slater said the district will make sure the students are aware of the new opportunity by highlighting it at the school and promoting it internally.

"We'll make sure that we're communicating with them so that they're aware just to try to get them to engage more," she said.

Board President Dianne Hope said the move will impact the student activity fund, but an anonymous donor has already stepped up to make a donation to replace some of the funds lost and the district would welcome other donations.

"My understanding is we have received an anonymous donor," Hope said. "And we will take donations from anyone else that wants to do this."

In an unrelated issue, the board heard from Keely Kangas on the district's Beyond the Bell program. Kangas reported that the non-traditional school programming has had positive impacts on student performance at different levels and is garnering favorable support from parents in the district.

The district also:

• approved the 2022-23 handbooks for the district elementary, middle, and high schools as well as the Beyond the Bell program.

• heard an update from the Carl A. Nelson Company and DLR Group about the construction progress at the Middle and High schools. Chris Smith, representing Carl A. Nelson, said some savings are already being realized and work is progressing according to timelines.

• approved a renewed contract with Southeast Iowa Regional Medical Center for athletic training services for the 2022-23 school year.

Former Humphrey jewelry building sold on tax certificate

said Tuesday.

"We may look at closing that. It's moving still and we don't have any significant movement (on the building), so I have to do something about it. We're probably going to take that step in the near future."

Krogmeier said the vacant building behind Pilot Grove Savings Bank with the damaged garage has been sold to another firm.

"It's one of those companies that buys tax certificates and gets ownership and sells. I don't think they've even physically seen the building, but they have a picture now, so I think they'll be intrigued by it," Krogmeier said.

Krogmeier said the the firm paid quite a bit for the building and, aside from the garage, the building is still in good shape.

"If they take the garage down and maybe make some parking there, the rest of the building is in pretty good shape," he said.

He said the firm is out of Des Moines and he hopes the close proximity will yield positive results on the building.

Fort Madison took possession of the Block building at 732 Avenue G in March on an order from District 8B Judge John Wright.

The building was ordered vacated in the summer of 2021 due to deteriorating and unsafe living conditions.

In the spring, environmental work was being done on the building to ready it for possible transfer or sale for future rehabilitation.
