County eyes Keokuk property

TABLED: County delays purchase of property pending inspection of property

LEE COUNTY - Lee County EMS Director Dennis Cosby said overtime at the county-owned ambulance is running higher this week due to extra staffing needs with Keokuk no longer having an Emergency Room in the city.

At Monday's regular meeting, Cosby updated supervisors on how things were progressing with emergency calls in the city.

"It was better than I expected. We did have a few holes in the schedule here and there for a few hours, but it actually went fairly well," he said.

"We are paying more overtime because we don't have other folks hired yet."

He said the county has received a large array of applications after offering to pay for training.

"We'll start shuffling through those this week and start setting up interviews."

The county has also narrowed its search for a facility to property owned by Eric Freitag in Keokuk. The property sits on about .7 acres between the Honda Motorsports dealership and Two Rivers Veterinary clinic.

Freitag is asking for \$200,000 for the property and then the

CORONAVIRUS Covid numbers on the rise in and around county

Lee County in substantial risk zone, while four others are in high risk

LEE COUNTY - Lee County Health Director Michele Ross encouraged residents again Monday to be vigilant with efforts to inhibit the spread of the coronavirus.

According to the Iowa COVID-19 tracker, the county is once again in "substantial" risk of spread.

Ross said the county had 34 new reported positive cases in the past seven days.

"There has been increased activity across the county with positive cases and self reporting of home tests," Ross said. "So I"m just putting a plug out there to be careful and, if you're at high risk situations, consider using those mitigation strategies we've promoted since the beginning of this to protect yourself and others that you may care for."

The four counties surrounding Lee County, including Jefferson, Van Buren, Henry, and Des Moines are all experiencing "High" risk of spread currently, according to state reporting.

Current death totals for the week of Oct. 1 were 57, which is the third highest total of 2022 since the week of April 1.

Ross said those that are wanting boosters can attend clinics being held this week. They are also offering children vaccinations during the normal regular children vaccination clinics. LCHD's flu clinics will be held throughout the month of October. I encourage you to get your flu shots and we are looking for possible activity this year, so it's important to get that preventative dose now," she said. adjusting their COVID-19 vaccine clinic days and times. The Moderna and Pfizer primary doses and bivalent booster doses will be available on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of the month from 2 p.m.-4 p.m. at LCHD office (#3 John Bennett Drive, Fort Madison), no appointment is necessary. The LCHD Childhood Immunization Clinics take place on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month, and the Pfizer vaccine for 6 months-old - 11 years-old will be available by appointment.

For those interested in the Moderna and Pfizer Bivalent Booster, the qualifications are: completed primary series (1st and 2nd dose of Moderna or Pfizer OR 1 dose of Johnson & Johnson); at least two months since last COVID vaccine (primary or booster dose); must be at least 12 years or older, minors must have a parent/guardian present.

LCHD will no longer have the Johnson & Johnson COVID vaccine available.

Iowa News/From the Front

October is Domestic Violence Awareness month

Before you finish reading this, 20 people in the United States will be abused by an intimate partner. That is how prevalent domestic violence is in our country. It's an epidemic, and it's happening here in Iowa.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. My office is using this time to make Iowans aware of the pervasiveness of domestic violence, and resources available to help survivors. You might think this is an issue that mainly affects women, but you would be wrong. Approximately 1/3 of Iowans reported experiencing domestic violence, sexual abuse or stalking from their partner. That's 35% of women and 29% of men in our state.

Domestic violence is about power. It goes beyond physical violence and includes any behavior done for the purpose of gaining control over a spouse, partner, or family member. This issue affects individuals in every community, regardless of age, race, gender, or socioeconomic status.

By raising awareness about the problem, we can support victims and survivors while holding abusers accountable. My office works with organizations across the state to promote resources that are available. One of those is our Safe at Home program.

During the 2015 session of the Iowa Legislature, lawmakers from both chambers unanimously passed the Safe at Home Act. Spearheaded by Rep. Dean Fisher, they created an address confidentiality program for survivors of domestic violence, sexual abuse, trafficking, and stalking. The program shields participants' physical address and provides a legal substitute address for use on public and personal documents. Safe at Home adds an important layer of protection for survivors, making it much harder for their abusers to locate them. It also helps participants lead an active life

within their community.

Representative Fisher had a constituent who was a young mother that was suffering from domestic abuse. She was forced to flee Iowa, leave family behind to escape her attacker, and go to a state that had an address confidentiality program. That prompted Rep. Fisher to take the lead in the Iowa Legislature to create a program here, and I was proud to work with him on its implementation.

Since its launch in 2016, SafSomeone you know has been a victim of domestic violence. By raising awareness, you can help victims become survivors. On Thursday, October 20, wear purple and participate in Purple Thursday, a national day of action during Domestic Violence Awareness Month. It's an easy way to let survivors know you support them while promoting the cause. Join me, my staff, and Iowans across the state in this movement. Let's be a voice for victims.

County may try to fund EMS upgrades out of general fund

county is looking at possibly \$100,000 to \$150,000 in renovations and improvements to be able to house the two ambulances.

Supervisor Chuck Holmes asked if Freitag would consider buying the property on contract so the county could pay for it out of the general fund.

Supervisor Chairman Matt Pflug asked Budget Director Cindy Renstrom if the general fund could handle the purchase. Renstrom said things would get tight if that's how the county moved forward.

Supervisor Garry Seyb said Freitag was being very flexible with the county to be able to get in and make renovations.

"For me, the Freitag property is the one that will work the best. It's cost effective and the location is good," Seyb said.

He did express concern about the left turn out onto the highway, but said it had great access to all points of Keokuk.

Seyb said he looked at several properties. Cosby said that facility also seems to be the best fit for the service.

Lee County grant writer Chuck Vandenberg said recent conversations with USDA Rural development specialists indicated there could be a possibility of some reimbursements on the building as well as the rapid-response vehicle that was approved at last week's meeting.

"We had a very good conversation with the specialists there and we are eligible for some funding if we can turn it all back to the pandemic," he said.

Keokuk's low-middle income levels would qualify for up to a 55% reimbursement, however the rest of Lee County only qualifies for 35% reimbursement based on those income levels.

Vandenberg said the county could make the case that the Keokuk facility is geared toward supporting that service area's emergency needs, however it would still be part of the county service.
