City gives Barker group 2-year exclusive deal on building

FORT MADISON - The real estate company that stepped in to help the city rehab a couple historic buildings now has exclusive rights to another historic building.


At Tuesday's regular meeting of the Fort Madison City Council, the council voted 7-0 to give Barker Financial of Iowa City a two-year exclusive option on the former Humphrey building, now called the Block building at 732 Avenue G in downtown Fort Madison.

Barker Financial is giving the city a non-refundable \$1,000 cash payment for the two year option, but Barker's will be the only entity working with the city on the purchase of the building.

The city has owned the property

"Reasonable" takes a turn that is not

"Reasonable" is a word that is used often in Iowa's laws. Reasonable fees. Reasonable rules. Reasonable efforts. Reasonable force.

But events in recent weeks show government officials are not always following what many Iowans would think the term means. And when government officials deviate from "reasonable," they should not be surprised if their standing or the stature of their agency suffers in the public's

Consider the Linn-Mar Community School

The district was sued last week by a Marion woman who was prohibited from attending Linn-Mar school board meetings for the next 12 months. She also was informed Marion police have been notified of her ban — a not-sosubtle caution that she could be arrested if she ignores the ban.

What was Amanda Pierce Snyder's infraction? Her "disruptive and disrespectful behavior," Superintendent Shannon Bisgard and school board president Brittania Morey said in a letter notifying her of the punishment.

Snyder spoke up at the board's public meeting on Aug. 29 when members began talking about a contract with a consulting company, TILL360 LLC. The company was being hired to provide students with programming focused on social and emotional learning.

What got Snyder in hot water was asking an uncomfortable question of the board: How are parents to know if they want their children to sit in on the presentations by the company's speaker if parents would not learn about the specific content until after the presentations occurred?

Morey then ordered Snyder to stop talking. Snyder persisted, saying, "You are not listening to me." Morey banged her gavel and responded, "You have to leave now, ma'am. You have

City will still own building

since April 1, 2022.

"I have gone through this and I have put an option on the table and this is what's in front of us," Mayor Matt Mohrfeld said.

Rebecca Bowker asked that City Council be kept apprised of all developments over the two years of the

Mohrfeld said Barker will keep the city up to date until the moment of sale and immediately provide the city a timeframe of their plans and they are required to meet with the city monthly.

The city is required to work with the Barker group on any grants, abatements, and other revenue opportunities as part of the agreement.

Other realtors in attendance pushed the city on why the property was never officially listed for sale.

Councilman Rusty Andrews said the building has been written about and talked about for several years and the city has owned it for six months. In that time, he said anyone could have approached the city about the status.

"I would think that's a good as buying an ad in the Bonny Buyer," Andrews said. "Did you want us to list the building nationally? We have people who are charged with marketing this town and theys still have vacant buildings."

Mohrfeld said Barker's have a solid reputation and a plan for developing the building. He said without those resources, its a difficult project for most.

The city will retain ownership of the building during the two-year term unless a purchase agreement is executed, however the city will still be responsible for all repairs and maintenance on the building during the duration of the agreement.

If a purchase agreement is reached, Barker will reimburse the city for the cost of the temporary wall shoring and securing the roof to prevent leaking.

Johnson goes for 5 TDs in Hawks win over Davis County

BLOOMFIELD - Central Lee's Chase Johnson rushed for five touchdowns as the Hawks rolled to their second win of the season Friday at Davis County 33-12.

Central Lee used a punishing ground attack throwing just six passes on the night as Johnson found holes behind the beefy Hawks line all night rushing for 182 yards on 22 carries.

The sophomore averaged 8.3 yards per attempt and scored all five of the Hawks touchdowns, the longest coming on a 29-yard run in the 3rd quarter to give Central Lee the lead for good at 21-12.

Ten different Hawks carried the ball on the night totaling 322 yards on the ground. Central Lee found themselves down a

couple times in the first half.

The Mustangs got on the board first with a touchdown run at the 4:02 mark of the first quarter. A 2-point conversion attempt failed, but Davis County would hold that 6-0 lead through the first quarter.

Johnson would find the endzone after the Hawks offense found second gear in the second quarter with 5:29 left when he went off tackle for a 5-yard score to tie it at 6 with a failed PAT.

Neither team would find the endzone again in the first half, but Davis County would score quick in the third period when they picked off a Cory Jones pass and ran it back 28 yards for the pick six.

Again the 2-point conversion failed and

the Mustangs led 12-6.

That would be the last time the Hawks would give up a score as the offensive and defensive lines dominated play the rest of the night.

At 5:18 left in the third, Johnson would get his second TD on a 11-yard run, but this time Ayden Krehbiel nailed the PAT for a 13-12 Central Lee lead.

Just;47 later Johnson would get into the secondary and blaze through the defense for the 29-yard score. Kayden Calfee would convert the 2-point extra try to give Central Lee at 21-12 lead.

Johnson would put up two more touchdowns in the fourth quarter to set the final

Jones completed just one pass for 20 yards to Corbin Pohren and ran for 32 more on five carries.

Calfee had 32 yards on nine carries and Hunter Gregory had 29 yards on five attempts.

Gregory had eight tackles on the night, while Pohren had 6.5. Brody Fuller had the Hawks sole sack.

Central Lee (2-4) hosts 0-6 Eddyville-Blakesburg-Fremont on Friday, before traveling to Centerville the following week.

Johnson is closing in on 500 yards on the year rushing on 102 carries for just under five yards per attempt. Senior Fuller has five tackles for loss on the year and leads the Hawks with two sacks.

Lawsuit will test ban from meeting

disrupted the meeting, per Iowa law."

Yes, Iowa's public meetings law gives a government board the authority to enforce "reasonable rules for the conduct of its meetings." Yes, while the public has a right to attend those meetings, people do not have a right to speak there. But is a year-long ban on attending future meetings reasonable?

Nothing in the law requires a board president to direct a police officer to remove a spectator for speaking without first being recognized. Nothing in that law prevents the board president from hearing an audience member's question and answering it — especially in a school district that has been wrought up over a policy on supporting students who identify as gay, lesbian or transsexual.

In the past couple of years, some of Iowa's K-12 school districts have become boiling cauldrons of controversy over Covid policies, mask-wearing, LGBTQ issues, school library books, and how race and equity issues are addressed in classes.

With that backdrop of issues, it is not surprising officials like those serving on the Linn-Mar school board have frayed nerves when they are faced with another parent upset over another topic. But it also should not surprise school officials these controversies have energized parents and grandparents who are demanding to be heard.

Given the highly emotional topics school boards have been dealing with, prohibiting a parent from attending meetings for a year seems extreme. Is a ban likely to help heal the divisions within a school district? When a school board takes such harsh action, it merely

serves to heighten the feelings of some parents that their school officials are not listening.

That was what Amanda Snyder told the Linn-Mar board. In her lawsuit, her attorney provided context about her concerns: "Despite its benign sounding name, social and emotional learning is terminology for embedding divisive race and gender ideology into all aspects of a school's curriculum."

Snyder's lawsuit brings up the matter of her freedom-of-speech rights and her right to petition her government under the U.S. and Iowa constitutions. Her attorney, Alan Ostergren of Des Moines, wrote, "Government officials cannot discriminate against those who speak or petition the government because of the particular viewpoint of the speaker or petitioner."

Translated, that means: The Linn-Mar school board cannot gavel a parent into silence or have her escorted from the room by a police officer when she speaks without permission to criticize a planned school program — unless the school board is prepared to take similar action against a parent who rises without permission to praise school leaders for their foresight and skill in crafting the district's controversial LGBTQ policy.

Ostergren wrote in Snyder's lawsuit, "A ban on attending future board meetings for a single comment at a board meeting could not, under any circumstances, and no matter the form it was issued, be a 'reasonable rule' for the conduct of an open meeting."

The attorney's logic does not seem unreasonable
