GRAYHOUND TEAM: FM girls join BHS on 200 state-qualifying freestyle relay team

FORT MADISON - The fall sports season isn't over for Fort Madison - not quite yet.

With the Fort Madison Bloodhound football team qualifying for the playoffs for the first time in more than three decades and about a dozen cross-country kids running at Fort Dodge, there's one more event to showcase the talents of Fort Madison kids.

Senior Jordyn Boyer, junior Olivia Kraus, and sophomore Elli Boyer are three of the four legs on the Burlington High School 200-freestyle relay team.

The three join freshman Olivia Ritter of West Burlington on the team that qualified with a 1:44.86 time at the state qualifying in Clinton last week. The will now swim Saturday afternoon at the IGHSAU State Swimming and Diving Meet in Marshalltown.

The time erased a 27-year-old event record for the

IUB pushes Alliant on Wever solar project alternatives

DES MOINES - The Iowa Utilities Board (IUB) issued an order today denying the application for advance ratemaking principles filed on November 2, 2021, by Interstate Power and Light Company (IPL), a subsidiary of Alliant Energy, in Docket No. RPU-2021-0003.

The IUB found that Alliant relied on a 2020 analysis in support of its decision to construct 400 MW of solar generation and 75 MW of battery storage, but it should have considered other sources of electric supply

as required by Iowa Code § 476.53 and therefore could not proceed.

Today's order finds that IPL did not demonstrate that the solar and battery storage projects are reason-

November 3, 1989, I lay on my living room floor covered with blood, bleeding to death. It was 2:00 am. I had drunkenly pitched through the glass top of my coffee table and cut myself to smithereens. It was the wake-up call I needed. I had to have help. I could no longer quit drinking on my own. I entered a program of recovery and my whole life turned around.

About 30 days clean and sober, I had a spiritual experience so profound it changed my life completely. (I write about it in my first book, "Protected," available through Amazon or me.)

It was a November to remember. Each year during the month of Thanksgiving I like to take stock of what it was like then and now, and give thanks for all the blessings I have received. Today I am happily married, have two kids and four grandkids, and am living the life I dreamed about. I'm the writer I always wanted to

Profound discovery: the same high I used to get from drugs and alcohol I get from writing. (Writing is a mood-altering substance.) However, the high I get from writing doesn't end up in a blackout or find me coming to in another state, wondering how I got there. The writing high is constructive rather than destructive. It doesn't drain my checking account, beat the crap out of me, or leave me waking up in a jail cell. 

election ballots out

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 9, 2022 — The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) began mailing ballots this week for the Farm Service Agency (FSA) county and urban county committee elections to all eligible agricultural producers and private landowners across the country. Elections are occurring in certain Local Administrative Areas (LAA) for these committee members who make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally. Producers and landowners must return ballots to their local FSA county office or have their ballots be postmarked by Dec. 5, 2022, in order for those ballots to be counted.

"County committees provide an opportunity for producers to play a meaningful role in delivering farm programs, but in order for county committees to be effective, they must truly represent all who are producing," said Matt Russell, State Executive Director for FSA in Iowa. "Voting in these elections is your opportunity to help ensure our county committees in Iowa reflect the diversity of our agriculture. Your voice and vote matter, don't miss your chance to cast your ballot."

Producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program to be eligible to vote in the county committee election. A cooperating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation but may not have applied or received FSA program benefits. Additionally, producers who are not of legal voting age but supervise and conduct farming operations for an entire farm are eligible to vote in these elections.

Each committee has from three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms, and at least one seat representing an LAA is up for election each year. Ballots must in the mail or delivered in person by close of business Dec. 5, 2022, to be counted. Newly elected committee members will take office Jan. 1, 2023.

Producers can find out if their LAA is up for election and if they are eligible to vote by contacting their local FSA

county office. Eligible voters who do not receive a ballot in the mail can request one from their local FSA county office. Visit farmers.gov/ service-locator to find your local USDA Service Center and <u>fsa.usda.gov/</u> elections for more information.

FSA county committee | Argyle man pleads guilty to weapon, robbery charges

LEE COUNTY - On September 9, 2022, Hunter John West, 18, of Argyle, plead guilty to Robbery in the 2nd Degree, a Class C Felony, and Intimidation with a Dangerous Weapon, a Class C Felony, Assault Causing Bodily Injury a Serious Misdemeanor, and Solicitation of Tampering with a Witness and Aggravated Misdemeanor.

The Robbery in the 2nd Degree charge stemmed from an incident that occurred in Fort Madison, North Lee County, Iowa on January 21, 2022 in which West entered the home of another person for purposes of committing a theft. The homeowner came home while West was in the home and was assaulted by West while West was attempting to flee the scene.

The Intimidation with a Dangerous Weapon charge stemmed from an incident that occurred in Keokuk, South Lee County, Iowa on January 19, 2022 in which West discharged four shots from a 6 mm rifle into an occupied residence on South 7th Street.

Sentencing was scheduled for November 4, 2022 where West was sentenced to two ten year prison terms to run consecutive to each other, for a total of twenty years to be served within the

Iowa Department of Corrections. Each offense carried a mandatory minimum sentence. The Intimidation offense carried a mandatory five year prison term before eligibility for parole and the Robbery 2nd carried a seven year mandatory prison term before eligibility for parole, for a total mandatory minimum sentence of twelve years before eligibility for parole.

The Fort Madison Police Department and The Keokuk Police Department were the responding and investigating agencies in these matters. The matter was prosecuted by the Lee County Attorney's Office.

Casey Alexander Young, 38, of Keokuk, plead guilty to Theft in the 1st Degree, a Class C Felony and Assault While Participating in a Felony, a Class D Forcible Felony with a mandatory prison sentence in the Iowa District Court in and for South Lee County on Tuesday November 8, 2022. These charges stem from an incident that occurred on April 26, 2022 at Two Rivers Bank in which Young wore a mask and demanded money from the teller. Young proceeded to immediate sentencing and was sentenced to 10 years within the Iowa Department of Corrections.

Grayhounds, one of the squad's main goals for the year and one that elicited emotion from the girls at the meet.

"The last person usually swims back, but I jumped out of the pool and we all started crying and hugging because we knew we broke that mark," Jordyn said.

"But everyone was looking around us and didn't know what was going in."

The girls will race on Saturday afternoon and will compete in the 1st heat in lane 6.

Kraus said it would be a long shot for the girls to place in the top 10, but a top 20 finish could be attainable if they can win their heat.

"If we can each cut a second off, I think we can get to the top 25 or even top 20," Kraus said.

The Grayhounds are seeded 28th out of 32, but the amount of time separating the eight teams in their heat is just .98 of a second.

Jordyn said the Grayhounds try to play "Catch the Rabbit" which means trying to stay within a half body or less of the person ahead of them. That tactic gives the Grayhounds' next swimmer a chance to catch the other team's next swimmer off the block.

"Racing the person next to you is key. We call it Catch the Rabbit, if there is someone in front of you, you try to get on their hip or on their shoulder. We do that in practice all the time," Elli said.

Jordyn said that tactic is what can give Elli an edge in the first leg.

Kraus said her expectations going in is for everyone to have their starts and turns on point. Each swimmer swims two laps, or 50 meters, and the junior said if everyone is sharp and shaves a second off their qualifying time, they could score close to 1:42.00.



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The best time seeded at the state meet belongs to Davenport Central with a 1:37.77. A 1:42.00 according to the seedings would give the Hounds a top 15 finish.

Head Coach Emily Hill said the girls have swam together in club and in high school swimming and know each other well. Several of them, including Jordyn and Elli, came up through Fort Madison YMCA's Sailfish program and moved to Burlington's club swimming.

Kraus swam club with the Keokuk YMCA before joining Burlington's teams.

"These girls have swam together in club and High School swimming. This year had brought success to all girls on the team. Having success drives healthy competition and hard work throughout the team.," Hill said.

"Early in the season the girls knew the relay was within reach and set the path to get it!"

The Grayhounds' swim team is comprised of swimmers from Fort Madison, West Burlington, Danville, and Burlington.

"This helps youth throughout Southeast Iowa swim and have a path to compete at the high school level," she said.

Hill said she is happy for the girls and for Jordyn being able to cap her high school swimming career at state.

"Jordyn has had a great senior season, continuing to improve throughout and be a leader in the pool. I am excited she was able to put this exclamation mark on the end," Hill said,.

"The girls are definitely living in the moment and enjoying the experience."

This year's state meet takes place on Nov. 11 and 12th at the Marshalltown Family YMCA/YWCA. There will be a free live stream of all three sessions of the meet available on the IGHSAU website. The links will be posted on the website Friday morning.

Here's a biggy I learned in the program of recovery: I'm the problem, not everybody else. It's me that has to be relieved of the bondage of self. I have to change. Whammo! What a piece of Humble Pie! There's a little prayer that I memorized and refer to quite often. Within the prayer are these words: "Relieve me of the bondage of self. Take away my difficulties." It's not everybody else. It's me that's the problem.

I even teach creative writing in our home. If piano teachers can teach piano in their home, and artists can teach art in their home, well then, by golly, I can teach creative writing. In fact, I'm going to fire the creative writing class back up this winter. I took a year off because of COVID, but I'm raring to go again. The class will start in January. Voter turnout was 2nd highest in state history for mid-terms

DES MOINES – Iowa Secretary of State Paul Pate announces the unofficial turnout for the November 2022 general election was the second highest in state history for a midterm. More than 1,220,000 Iowans voted. The all-time high for an Iowa midterm election was 1,329,930, set in 2018.

"My thanks to Iowans from every corner of the state who made their voices heard by voting," Secretary Pate said. "I also want to thank the poll workers and county election officials across Iowa for their hard work and dedication. However, our work is not finished."

Every county will now conduct post-election audits in randomly selected precincts to help ensure the integrity of the vote. Secretary Pate added another layer of protection to Iowa's electoral process this year by ordering a second race to undergo hand count audits in every county. The audits will ensure the numbers match the totals reported by the ballot tabulators. The gubernatorial race and constitutional amendment ballot measure will be audited.

"Post-election audits add another layer of integrity to the election process," Secretary Pate said. "I want all Iowans to know their vote counts, and it will be counted correctly."

All election results remain unofficial until canvassing is complete, and results are certified. The deadline is December 5.

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
IUB order doesn't stop Alliant project from development

able when compared to other feasible alternative sources of electric supply as required by Iowa Code. The IUB's decision explains that IPL did not fully consider other sources of electric generation and did not update its analysis for changes in costs. In addition, the IUB found that the federal Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) presents IPL with other potential sources of electric supply.

In the order, the IUB stated that its decision does not indicate that IPL should not go forward with the projects, or that the projects are not reasonable, but that IPL needs to do additional analysis as required by Iowa Code § 476.53 before requesting advance ratemaking principles, or IPL can request cost recovery in a general rate case proceeding.
