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County wants vote on essential service

MARCH BALLOT Supervisors take step to put EMS measure on spring ballot

BY CHUCK VANDENBERG

LEE COUNTY - Lee County voters will vote in March to determine whether ambulance services in the county will be legally defined as essential services.

At Monday's regular Lee County Board of Supervisors meeting, the board voted 5-0 to put the measure on a ballot in March.

The county would need a supermajority or 60% of voters to approve the measure. If approved, it would

require the county to provide ambulance services, and would open the door for a levy of up to 75 cents/\$1,000 of assessed valuation within the county.

The approval Monday was the first of three readings of the resolution that is required for the ballot to be placed in front of county voters.

Federal funds may help Keokuk project

COUNTY NEWS: County's LATCF funds could help with purchase of property

LEE COUNTY - An advisory panel is recommending that up to \$100,000 of supplementary America Rescue Plan Act funding be used to start the Keokuk Ambulance building project.


On Monday, the Lee County ARPA advisory panel voted to recommend that the county's \$100,000 Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency funds be used for the \$70,000 purchase of land in Keokuk for the building.

The additional \$30,000 would be used to pay up-front costs for engineering and design of the structure.

The building will house the additional

staff, rigs, and equipment needed for Keokuk ambulance services in the wake of the closure of Blessing Hospital this fall.

Panel chairman Garry Seyb asked that the county FEDLER keep the LATCF funding separate from the original ARPA allocations.



"I guess the way I look at it, this is additional funding. The original funding is going into the Lee County Health Department. This LATCF funding is new money and the full board (of supervisors) has not said what we are doing with that money," Seyb said.

Panel member Ron Fedler said the additional money could be used to reduce the money the county will need to bond for the Lee County Health Department.

"It will help us lower whatever we have to bond for the building. That would be \$100,000 less for the taxpayers. Because we're going to build that building no

AG Miller announces more opioid settlement money

PHARMACIES: Lee County already has received more than \$230,000

DES MOINES - Attorney General Tom Miller and other AGs have finalized agreements with CVS and Walgreens over their role in the opioids crisis, which will provide Iowa \$70.3 million. Under today's agreements, CVS will pay \$5 billion, and Walgreens will pay \$5.7 billion, totaling \$10.7 billion nationally

"The opioid crisis is the deadliest drug epidemic in American history," Miller said. "My colleagues and I have worked on a bipartisan basis to hold accountable the companies that created and fueled this crisis. Securing more than \$10 billion from CVS and Walgreens nationwide means our states can provide more resources for the treatment and prevention of Opioid Use Disorder to those most in need."

In total, the national amount of settlements based on investigations and litigation against the pharmaceutical industry has surpassed \$50 billion. The total share for Iowa is expected to be approximately \$320 million.

Miller and other AGs first disclosed agreements in principle with Walgreens and CVS in November. The AGs had accused the two largest pharmacy chains in the country of ignoring red flags over opioid prescriptions and failing to detect and prevent the abuse and diversion of the drugs. In addition to the financial settlement, CVS and Walgreens, along with Walmart earlier, have agreed to court-ordered injunctive relief that requires the pharmacies to monitor, report, and share data about suspicious activity related to opioid prescriptions. This court-ordered injunctive relief will help ensure a crisis like this does not happen again.

The terms of the agreements will now go to the states for their review. Each state will have until the end of 2022 to join, after which the Walmart, Wal-



greens, and CVS agreements will go to local governments around the country for sign-on during the first quarter of 2023. Iowa intends to join the agreements. Nearly all of the settlement funds must

be used to remediate the opioid crisis, including prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery services.

The payments are structured to ensure critical support in early years as well as sustained resources over time. Most of Walmart's amount will be paid during the first year; CVS's payments will be spread over 10 years; Walgreens' payments will be spread over 15 years. If there is sufficient sign-on, payments will begin during the second half of 2023.

Miller's office was one of the leaders in the negotiations.



Service levy could hit ballot in March

also requires the creation of an advisory board that would recommend the required levy necessary to support the operations of the service.

"The goal is to set up a special election next spring. We would also need 60%, which can be tough," said Matt Pflug, board chairman.

Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds signed legislation in June of 2021 allowing counties to determine if EMS services would be "essential services". Until that time only police and fire were mandated essential services in the state.

Ron Fedler, who made the motion to put the measure on the ballot, said he it should have been law a long time ago.

"I never could understand why it was never considered essential services... This is just a good thing for everybody," he said.

County Budget Director Cindy Renstrom said a tax levied to support the EMS department wouldn't be enough to cover the entire budget but would help.

The county would be able to bill insurance and Medicare/Medicaid for reimbursement of costs. The county will also qualify for federal Ground Emergency Medical Transport subsidies which help fill in the gaps between actual costs and lower federal reimbursement rates.

The advisory panel would look at all the revenue sources and set the levy at a level sufficient to cov-

er the county's cost of operating the EMS service, up to the 75 cent maximum.

"We hope the taxpayers would see the importance of this thing. But anytime you're asking for money...," Pflug said.

Board member Garry Seyb said if it's not deemed an essential service, the county isn't required to provide the service.

"I think we need to make the public very aware that this is out there and very important that we make this an essential service," he said.

Seyb said everyone he's spoken with has been supportive of making it an essential service. Seyb, who serves on the Jackson Township Fire Department, said the numbers of qualified Emergency Responders within the volunteer departments is shrinking.

"Everyone is qualified in CPR even to get on the truck, but once you go beyond CPR, that's additional training that the person has to take on on their own," he said.

Pflug said the county's going to have do some communicating with the public about the importance.

He said he had to call the ambulance recently for a familiy member.

"If you see how it works, you really see the importance of it," Pflug said.

The resolution will be placed on the supervisors' next two agendas for approval and the board cannot waive any of the readings.

matter what. That's going to be built," Fedler said.

"Now if there's a special project we could benefit from using it for, I'm open to that."

Seyb said that special project could be starting the new EMS building in Keokuk.

"That's \$70,000. We have \$50,000 currently with another \$50,000 coming. I think we make a recommendation to use that \$100,000 total for the Keokuk building," Seyb said.

The county has purchased three lots near the corner of 16th and Blondeau from Paul Rairden for the \$70,000.

"That's something I would consider a special thing that we need to do that would be a savings to the taxpayer. Otherwise we're going to have to bond for it," Fedler said.

Jason Dinwidde said the building will be somewhere in the area of a 50 foot by 120 foot metal building.

Seyb said he's estimating close to \$400,000 in today's construction costs. However, the county is waiting for an updated abstract before purchasing the property in Keokuk.

County Budget Director Cindy Renstrom said the salaries of the nine new EMTs the county approved hiring in October is taking a toll on the county's general fund, which pays salaries, as well as the county's general supplemental, which pays benefits.

Renstrom said the county is going to have to consider ARPA money or Opioid settlement funds to reimburse the county until additional revenues such as Ground Emergency Medical Transport reimbursements and/or a possible essential services levy can be found to support those costs.

The county cannot bond to pay salaries and benefits of employees.

The topic of using the other funding streams to offset some of the increased wages was going to be a topic of discussion at an upcoming Lee County Board meeting.

FSA launches pilot to recruit ag leaders

DES MOINES - Iowa Farm Service Agency (FSA) is offering a new approach to recruiting agricultural leaders who want to become County Executive Directors (CED). Iowa FSA, with support from the Biden-Harris Administration, will open job announcements later this month to the County Office Executive Director Training (CEDT) Pilot Program. The goal of the pilot is to incentivize more candidates to compete for positions in the training program by reducing the relocation distance someone might have to accept compared to if they graduated from the traditional CEDT program.

Under the CEDT Program that is currently used nationwide, candidates are expected to relocate within their state when the training program is complete. In Iowa that could mean needing to relocate up to six hours away from an applicant's current location. The new Iowa CEDT Pilot Program breaks Iowa into four quadrants allowing candidates to apply for positions that are closer to home and not requiring potential relocation across the entire state.

"There are a lot of talented people out there that are interested in entering our CEDT program but have never applied due to the risk of being relocated anywhere across the entire state of Iowa," said State Executive Director Matt Russell.

"For decades we've hired internal FSA staff and external candidates into our training program. But as part of the program candidates agree to take a job anywhere in the state of Iowa. We know we've left really great potential leaders behind because the risk of having to move across the entire state is too great. While we aren't eliminating the risk of needing to relocate, we are dramatically reducing the geographic area of that risk."

Russell says he's excited that USDA under the leadership of Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack is encouraging state leaders like himself to work with local leadership to try new approaches to recruit and hire employees into the local field offices. He also sees the approval of this pilot project as a commitment by the Biden-Harris administration to invest in

sive career."

Inductee Howard Carter spent 31 years as a Central Lee educator, teaching social studies and math. He was named the 1980 teacher of the year, in part due to his innovative Multi-Occupations Cooperative (MOC) program through which students were placed with manufacturers in business for hands-on training. He also began a World of Work class that enabled students to learn about resumes and interviewing, advertising, filing taxes, and other key concepts.


Prior to his career in education, Carter spent four years in the Air Force and earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Western Illinois University. Since retiring, Howard has served on the Keokuk City Council and spent 30 years on the Grand Theatre Commission, including six years as manager. Under his leadership, the Grand Theatre was restored to its original condition after a long period of decline.

Also inducted this year is Mary Sue Chatfield, a former first-grade teacher leader who presented various curriculum ideas at the Iowa Reading Council and Iowa Social Studies Conferences. Chatfield also served on the steering committee of the National Geographic Alliance of Iowa, along with the local Comprehensive School Improvement Plan committee. She was named Central Lee's teacher of the year in 2004.

Chatfield's leadership continued after her retirement, as she served on the Montrose Library Board, was a historian for Montrose Methodist Church, and sang in the Church Choir and St. Barnabas Choir. She helped form Montrose Riverfront, Inc. (MRI) in 2004 and was instrumental in coordinating fundraising efforts through grant writing and local events for the historic timeline murals on the downtown MRI building, the Hunold Heritage Center, a dedication ceremony for Revolutionary War Veteran Cato Mead, landscaping, and other local projects.

In medical school at the University of Iowa, Dr. Jabour was a member of Alpha Omega Alpha Medical Honor Society. Following residency in Florida, he practiced at Iowa Methodist and Methodist West hospitals and various outpatient surgery centers in the area. In 1997, he was the first anesthesiologist to become president of the Methodist medical staff.

The Academic Hall of Fame was created as a means of recognizing, preserving, and promoting Central Lee's rich history and tradition of excellence in academics. It emphasizes the importance of high-achieving graduates and former staff members who made a big impact on the school community during their time in Central Lee.

Community members, families, staff, and alumni are encouraged to nominate individuals for Hall of Fame recognition. A committee then reviews all nominations and determines each year's inductees. Central Lee also has Athletic and Fine Arts Halls of Fame.
