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NuStar files for eminent domain

IMPASSE: Two county land owners refuse to give voluntary access to property

LEE COUNTY - A pipeline company planning to build 14 miles of pipeline in Lee County to transport anhydrous ammonia from the Iowa Fertilizer plant is planning on using eminent domain to secure two parcels of land.

NuStar Pipeline Co. LLC., has secured about 91% of the land they need to build the pipeline extension voluntarily from property owners, but two landowners are digging in their heels.

"We've secured voluntary easements on most of the

parcels. But there are currently two landowners who we have not yet been able to secure easments with," said KC Purgason, a senior real estate manager and spokesperson for the pipeline company.

"We've had discussions with them. We've reached an impasse and they said they aren't willing to grant us a voluntary easement."

The county was notified of the eminent domain proceedings because there is county right of way in the parcels of land.

Website case is tricky for Supreme Ct.

Few people like being told what they must do. Lorie Smith is one of them.

The suburban Denver, Colo., business owner, a devout Christian, builds websites for customers. She wants to expand her business and begin building websites for couples who are planning weddings.

But she is adamant that she does not want to be forced to build websites for same-sex couples. Doing so, she says, would violate her faith, which does not allow her to celebrate same-sex marriages.

For more than an hour last week, the U.S. Supreme Court listened to arguments for and against the position staked out by Smith, the proprietor of 303 Creative LLC. The court's decision is not expected until sometime in the first half of 2023.

An old attorney friend once made the memorable legal observation, "I never had a client listen himself into trouble, but I've had many who talked themselves into trouble." He also reminded me that only a fool predicts how judges or juries will decide a case.

That wisdom also applies to predicting a U.S. Supreme Court decision. But it does not take a wizard to foresee that the 303 Creative case presents the justices with a legal slippery slope if they rule in favor of

County property rolled into eminent domain case

One of the parcels belongs to Margaret Strunk and Coette Gida, 2840 County Rd. 103. The other belongs to Hayes Menke of Mt. Prospect, Illinois and is in the 1700 block of 330th Avenue.

The pipeline will run 13.7 miles to connect to Iowa Fertilizer Co. and all the construction will take place in Lee County, along the north side of the bypass out to the fertilizer plant.

Purgason said NuStar emailed the county to let them know the company's position. But he said NuStar has no plans to condemn any rights of the county, they just were required by Iowa code to notify the county.

"We were required by law to notify the county of the intent to acquire the property via eminent domain if necessary, but we do intend to follow all county processes to build the pipeline," Purgason said.

Supervisor Garry Seyb said he spoke with Lee County Engineer Ben Hull and he said there was no issue from the county's perspective as far as county-owned property.

Seyb asked how many property owners agreed to voluntary easements.

Purgason said 91% of the easements have been acquired voluntarily. The two landowners represent about eight parcels, whereas 81 parcels have been secured.

Supervisor Ron Fedler said the landowners he's spoken with have not had any opposition.

Fedler said he's also heard that the plant is only operating the anhydrous production at about 65% because they can't move it fast enough, and the pipeline will help them increase that production.

Fedler said the county should authorize Hull to move ahead with county issues so the county isn't holding up the project. The authorization will likely be added to next Monday's agenda.

Anyone can file an objection to the eminent domain, or condemnation, request on the Iowa Utility Board's website under docket HLP-2021-0002.

A hearing has been set for 1 p.m. on Jan. 9, 2023 at the Quality Inn and Suites in Fort Madison on the condemnation requests.

ACLU involved in case headed to supreme court

any business that has an expressive service can put up a sign that says 'Women Not Served, Jews Not Served, Black People Not Served, and claim a First Amendment right to do so."

He added, "I don't think any of us want to live in that world, and I don't think the First Amendment requires us to live in that world."

In a "friend of the court" brief to the Supreme Court, the ACLU defended Colorado's anti-discrimination law. Cole described the contours of the potential slippery slope this way: "If 303 Creative is correct, could a bakery that opposed celebrating black families refuse to sell a birthday cake to a black mother? Could an architecture firm that serves the public refuse to design homes for Muslims because it opposes their religion? Could a test preparation business that objected to the number of Asians in elite colleges turn away Asian students? Could a restauranteur opposed to 'mixed marriage' put up a sign in its window saying 'No inter-racial or inter-faith couples served'?"

The creative process involved in building websites does not excuse Lorie Smith from complying with the Colorado law. Likewise, other businesses with "expressive" goods and services are not allowed to discriminate in their sales to the public, either — not theaters, jewelry design shops, hair salons, interior decorators, landscape design companies or similar businesses.

And therein is the problem Smith creates by asserting that her First Amendment, free-speech right allows her to refuse to serve certain customers who knock on the door of her design business. Colorado's anti-discrimination law does not require her to post signs in support of same-sex marriage. It only requires her to build websites for all couples planning weddings, regardless of a couple's gender or race.

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Every state has similar anti-discrimination laws. In some states, these were a product of the turbulent 1950s and 1960s, when blacks were prohibited from attending schools with white students and when blacks could not sit in certain bus seats or eat at certain lunch counter seats. They could not use "Whites Only" drinking fountains or rest rooms.

By opening the door for businesses to serve some customers, but refuse others, the Supreme Court has the potential to take us back to those terrible times of government-sanctioned discrimination.

The ACLU legal brief illustrates the dilemma facing the Supreme Court by pointing to famed portrait photographer Annie Leibovitz. She does not offer her photo services to the public at large. Instead, she picks and chooses her subjects.

By contrast, JCPenney Portrait Studios welcomes any member of the public to sit for portraits. But the studios cannot refuse to take photos of customers because they are female or male, Jewish or Catholic, black or Asian, heterosexual or gay.

The brief offers another example to help the justices grasp the issue. Under the Colorado law, a store that sells Christmas ornaments need not sell Hanukkah products. But such a store could not refuse to sell its Christmas ornaments to Jewish customers.

The ACLU said 303 Creative cannot get around the law's requirement by describing its service as "website design for opposite-sex weddings" — just as it could not offer "website design for white people's weddings."

The ACLU added, "If a business has to know who a service is for to decide whether to sell it, its decision is not about the content of the product, but about the identity of the customer."

That goes against what is right and proper.

Governor bans TikTok on state devices

DES MOINES -- Today, Governor Kim Reynolds issued a directive to the Iowa Department of Management's Office of the Chief Information Officer to ban TikTok on all state-owned devices and prohibit state agencies from subscribing to or owning a TikTok account.

"It is clear that TikTok represents a national security risk to our country and I refuse to subject the citizens of Iowa to that risk," said Gov. Reynolds. "They trust us with their personal and confidential information and we will take every step possible to protect it, including from the Chinese government. The safety of Iowans is my number one priority and that includes their cybersecurity."

Governor Reynolds' directive joins several other governors across the United States that have also banned the use of TikTok on any state-owned devices due to security concerns with the Chinese-owned social media platform.

The Governor's directive goes into effect immediately.

Falcons roll Central Lee to send Hawks to 0-5

HAWKS: Wyrick leads Hawks with 11 points as Central Lee still looking for first win of the year

DONNELLSON - Central Lee's athleticism has yet to show up for a full basketball game, but Head Coach Kritter Hayes said when it does, it will be a game changer.

The Hawks had moments but nothing sustained in Tuesday's 74-36 loss to West Burlington in a SEI Superconference matchup at the Hawks' gym.

Central Lee didn't score a point until there was 3:20 left in the first quarter. In the meantime, the Falcons had opened a 17-0 lead and would never look back.

Sophomore Brayden Wyrick scored Central Lee's only points in a 28-5 first quarter. Wyrick was playing over the West Burlington interior, but couldn't get much going early, missing his first four shots from the field.

Wyrick would finish with 11 points to lead Central Lee.

The Hawks were a chilly 8-of-24 in the first half, while West Burlington went 24-34 and opened up a 51-18 lead at halftime.

"We're fighting hard, I know that. The guys are pressing a little too much. The guys get in the half court and they press," Hayes said.

"They know what they want to achieve and what I want for them. We're all pressing a bit and we need to take a step back."

The 33-point lead would put the running clock on

for most of the second half.

The Hawks didn't have much of an answer for West Burlington's Brady Martin who led all scorers with 22 on the night, including six from 3-point land. He had 16 in the first half.

One of the few bright spots in the later moments was when Keagan Damico hit a couple of three pointers to cut into the lead late, but the Falcons had emptied the bench at that point.

Damico finished with eight points while Aiden Ross, Corbin Pohren, and Cory Jones all had four points for the Hawks. Wyrick and Jones shared the rebounding lead with five each.

Hayes said the Hawks need to find a way to be in games earlier.

"We are behind right from the get go and it takes so much energy to fight out of that. If they can learn to manage that better or I call a time out sooner that might help, but the guys have to manage that and get control," Hayes said.

"When we do break the pressure and we get into the half court, we have to run our stuff becuase it's good when we execute it."

Hayes said an extended post-game conference with

The Hawks fall to 0-5 overall and 0-4 in the SEI Superconference. They host 3-2 Danville Friday before playing at Keokuk High School in the River Rivalry Classic on Saturday.
