FORT MADISON - An improvised explosive device discovered during a police investigation on Thursday forced the evacuation of several homes in Fort Madison.

According to Fort Madison Police Chief Mark Rohloff, at about 1:45 p.m.

Thursday, a Fort Madison detective was working on an investigation in conjunction with the Dept. of Human Services, at a residence in the 2900 block of Avenue H when the homemade explosive device was discovered in a camper on the premises.

The officer made contact with a resident on the property living in the camper in back of a home and noticed drug paraphernalia.

"He then contacted the Lee County Attorney's office and subsequently did a search of the camper and found a homemade explosive device," Rohloff said.

WASHINGTON - Four freshmen pulled the Hounds to a strong showing at the Class 3A cross-country district state qualifier Wednesday in Washing-

The afternoon was led off by the strong 3rd-place finish of Avery Rump, who finished with a 19:17.9 at the Washington Golf and Country Club.

Then twin-sister Addison Rump finished at 14th with a 21:20.8, making state by about 12 seconds.

In the following boys' run, freshmen Mason McLey and Riley Tripp wiped out about a dozen runners in the final 400 meters to finish 14th and 15th. McLey finished at 17:08.3 with Tripp at 17:14.2.

Fort Madison finished with 109 points behind Mt. Vernon-Lisbon (60) and Western Dubuque (63).

"I told the kids at the beginning of the year to look at last year's state qualifiers and final results and see how many freshman are in that race," Mendez said.





HTC girls head to state after win over BND

BURLINGTON — The final point of the biggest match of Holy Trinity's volleyball season fell softly to the Johannsen Gym court, and a season's worth of frustration — heck, two seasons worth — was buried in the Crusaders' celebratory pile.

"This team," coach Melissa Freesmeier said, "deserves this."

Holy Trinity's 23-25, 25-23, 25-17, 25-21 victory over two-time defending state champion Notre Dame in Wednesday's Class 1A regional final was the Crusaders roaring through their biggest roadblock, an SEI Superconference South Division rival that had defeated them seven consecutive times and eliminated them from the postseason the past two seasons.

"To beat this team, I'm speechless," said junior outside hitter Mary Kate Bendlage.

"It means that we had the heart to do it," said senior middle hitter Kayla Box. "We knew we could do it."

"If we can each cut a second off, I think we can get to the top 25 or even top 20," Kraus said.

The Grayhounds are seeded 28th out of 32, but the amount of time separating the eight teams in their heat is just .98 of a second.

The Hounds would be taken down on four plays and the Go-Hawks went to work again going five plays with Gayer scoring from four yards out for a quick 21-0 lead with 5:42 still left in the first quarter.

County seeing opioid settlement funds

LEE COUNTY - Lee County opioid settlement funds are starting to trickle into the county.

At Tuesday's regular meeting of the Lee County Board of Supervisors' meeting, Supervisor Garry Seyb said the funds are being held in an interest bearing account until a clearer picture reveals itself on how the funds can be used.

Seyb told the board the opioid money seems to be

coming into the county faster than expected, but the decision to put it in an interest-bearing account is the right way to go.

"Taking that money and putting it in an interest-bearing account and sitting it there until we get a clearer picture is the best way to go. What we've seen over the last year is we've got a lot things to consider, the ambulance service, the healthcare building... a lot of things coming on," Seyb said.

The county has received several opioid payments, the most recent a \$41,000 payment this week, and was informed of an additional \$8,700 this week from another company.

The funds are settlement funds from manufacturers, distributors, and pharmaceutical companies engaged in providing opioid medications to the public.

The county was originally estimated to get close to \$725,000 over an 18-year period. Seyb said he's hearing that money could be coming forward.

However, several states, including Wisconsin, are considering selling the settlement payments to financial institutions in exchange for discounts or fees estimated at between 12 and 15%.



Fort Madison's Matt Emmett of 804 Avenue E has used his own ingenuity, a heavy, heavy dose of motherboards, tech gadgetry, and even 3D printers to create a winter digital wonderland music show for passersby on the city's east side.

Emmett was born and raised in Fort Madison and moved back to Fort Madison with his family this year.

He's a computer scientist by trade but is quickly making a name for himself in circles of progress in the community.

"I simply love Christmas lights," he said.

"My dad drove us around every year looking at Christmas lights. One of my absolute favorites was the late Mike Manka of Fort Madison. He had an amazing display. When I came across computer-controlled displays on the news, I was

curious and started researching how to do it. The rest is history.."

Emmett said this is the fourth year of creating a Christmas display and set out to create his own in Fort Madison this

The show he's created, which is complemented by radio station 87.9 FM is made up of four components: the individual lights, the controllers the show computer and the sequence software.

"I'm not going to lie, its fairly complicated. These types of shows don't use normal Christmas lights. The lights in my show are called RGB Pixels. RGB stands for Red, Green and Blue," he said.

Emmett said the RGB pixels differ from regular lights in a couple of ways. First, each light actually is made of three separate lights, red, green and blue. Together, the lights can create millions of colors. Another way they differ is that each light has three wires instead of two. The third wire tells the pixel which color and intensity to display.
