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Board battles budget

SHORT FUNDS: Supervisors concerned they may have to tap ARPA funds for payroll

LEE COUNTY - Several Lee County officials have heightened concerns about the current state of the county budget and its ability to meet obligations in the current fiscal year.

That conversation became a spirited one in a workshop following Monday's regular meeting of the Lee County Board of Supervisors.

Lee County Supervisor Matt Pflug said the board needed to have a heavy discussion about the current status of the general fund balance.

From that point, the work session became a sometimes cantankerous debate on how to move forward - and how we got here in the first place.

"Obviously this is the worst I've ever seen it in the 16 years

I've been on this board," Pflug said. "This is scary. We don't know if we have enough money to get through March - well, we don't

(have enough money)."

"How did we get here? We can talk about that all day," Pflug

Budget Director Cindy Renstrom responded that the county should have raised the levy in July of 2021, the start of the fiscal year when the county took over the Lee County EMS service.

DHHS works up more child care initiatives for state

DES MOINES – The Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is infusing funding into a comprehensive set of child care initiatives that focus on supporting Iowa families, quality care delivery and attracting and retaining child care workforce. The initiatives were developed and vetted with input from providers, parents, Early Childhood Iowa as well as the Child Care Task Force. With a new formalized office of Child Care within HHS, these one-time and ongoing

programs will build a sustainable and strong child care system for the state.

"Iowa families deserve a strong, reliable child care system statewide," stated Governor Reynolds. "We've made significant investments over the last few years to expand access, support providers, and partner with employers. Now, with the addition of a dedicated team within the Department of Health and Human Services, we will empower more parents to provide for their children and reach their

potential."

Highlights of the initiatives include: Increasing "front door" eligibility for Child Care Assistance (CCA) from 145% to 155%. This will provide more families with low income access to CCA subsidy, increasing the hourly wage for initial eligibility from \$17.40 to \$18.60

Increasing the payments child care facilities receive when serving CCA fam-

Gov. turning schools into political battlefields

A recent public opinion poll found that three-quarters of Americans want members of Congress to end their bickering and begin compromising more with their colleagues from the other party.

The poll was conducted across the United States by Marist College's Institute for Public Opinion for National Public Radio and the PBS News Hour.

If such a poll were conducted in Iowa, it's my hunch the pollsters would find people here have similar views of the inability, or unwillingness, of senators and representatives in Washington to engage in the thoughtful give-and-take art of lawmaking.

It is also my hunch that Iowans are at a similar point with respect to the Legislature's recent string of proposed laws that target our 327 public school districts.

That hunch jelled even before Gov. Kim Reynolds signaled last week where she may be headed next in her quest to transform public schools. Her new goal should bother freedom-loving moms and dads and others who understand what our Founding Fathers wanted when they established the United States — you know, life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Reynolds addressed a gathering of a few hundred people at a forum organized by a national group called Moms



Increasing health care cost could make matters worse

Pflug said that was something the county couldn't have seen coming, but the county needs to find a way out now.

Supervisor Ron Fedler said the county should have raised the levy when they gave out "those huge raises" beginning in fiscal year 2022.

Fedler got pushback from Supervisor Chairman Garry Sevb and Renstrom on that scenario.

Renstrom said supervisors have been very reluctant in the past to raise the levy.

"Do you know how hard it was for me to get you guys to change general supplemental (which is the fund that's responsible for employee benefits)?" she said. "Some of you guys didn't want to raise the levy."

County Auditor Denise Fraise agreed.

"That's right. You guys wanted to keep that at 2%." Pflug said the board never wants to raise taxes.

"That's our commitment to taxpayers, that we try to hold the line on the levy. That's what we try to do, but now we're in a huge mess. We're going to have to pull money from somewhere to cover some of these deficits.

"Do we have the tough talk about taking a wage freeze? I know it's never popular."

Seyb said the current funding shortfalls don't have anything to do with the raises, but the county's neglect in keeping up with inflationary pressures over the past 12

He said a wage freeze isn't an option with negotiations already underway. He rolled out a barrage of numbers showing how the county is still behind on keeping with rising costs of payroll and other regular costs.

"We're going to have to raise taxes. There is no option other than that, if they (the state) don't take that option away from us," he said.

He said the average of county levies in Iowa over the last 11 years was \$10.64/\$1,000 of assessed valuation. He said Lee County's levy for 2023 is \$10.32.

"While it seems like it's been a great job on the part of the county, when you look at it, it shows we have not kept up with the increases in inflation in the budgets," he said.

Over the past 12 years, Seyb said raises in Lee County averaged 2.33% for county administration, 2.27% in the sheriff's office, and 2.55% for county regular staff over the last 11 years not including 2023.

"When you factor in what we did last year, the raise that everyone seems to focus on, when we factor that in to the last 12 years, the administration unit went to 3.06%, the sheriff went to 3.33% over the last 12 years,

Seyb said the last few years has been crazy with the cost of living, so he went back 12 years to get a more comprehensive snapshot. He said the inflation rate was 2.36 % between 2012 and 2023.

"If you look at what the raises did, we really haven't given raises. We've barely kept up with the cost of living over the last 12 years."

"What does that have to do with the mess we're in now?" Pflug said.

"You can go back and look at the snapshot of 10-12 years, but we've got problems right now."



"I argued the opposite - that you can't spend this much more money and not increase your revenue. It's a recipe for disaster," Fedler said.

"Because of that, when it came to voting, I voted no. I could see this coming just from managing my own business. You can't increase expenses and not increase your revenue without that coming back to haunt you."

Seyb said this current situation is not solely because of the raises, citing the ambulance department and the closure of the Keokuk Hospital/ER.

Pflug said the county has to keep the fund balance closer to \$3 million for emergencies.

"This is an emergency. Now we're at a scary level." Renstrom said the county may have to dip into ARPA funds to meet obligations.

Seyb said that hasn't been determined yet, but Ambulance revenues are above projections in the ambulance

Pflug said the county is benefitting from several funds right now, but without them, it would be in financial

"What if we didn't have the opioid settlement money, or the ARPA fund? We'd be in serious trouble. And you can't run a county that way, you just can't do it."

Supervisor Tom Schulz said that's what the county's been doing.

"Unfortunately, we have been. So now we have to correct that," Schulz said.

Renstrom said the county is looking at a \$2.8 million balance at the end of the fiscal year 2024, which is June 30, 2024. But she said that's with a projected increase from 3.5% to 6 percent if the state allows them to do that.

"When people open up their tax bills, they aren't happy. We can have this dialog all day."

Seyb asked Pflug if the alternative was laying off half the county employees.

"No, we never want to do that."

"Then what's the alternative?" Seyb pressed.

Supervisor Chuck Holmes said Jefferson County runs with one ambulance and Lee County has four, hinting that could be a spot for savings.

Lee County Sheriff Stacy Weber pleaded with the board to not do what Jefferson County is doing.

"Do not do what Jefferson County is doing. Please." Seyb asked the board when would be the right time to raise taxes.

"We're paying less now than we have the past 12 years on average."

Because the discussion was in a work session no action was taken. The county could have until the end of April to complete this year's budget with current legislation pending. Typically the budget for the coming fiscal year would be submitted by March 30.

State has an effective book-review process

for Liberty. The group advocates for changes in state laws to give parents more say in how public K-12 schools operate.

The governor said Iowa needs to "restore sanity, to make sure our schools are a place of learning and not indoctrination."

She floated the idea of changing Iowa law so that if one school district decides to remove a book from its libraries or classrooms, then every other school district would be required to remove the same book and allow students to read it only with their parents' permission.

The governor believes public school districts are dominated by "an extreme and extremely loud minority" who are hostile to parents' values. She criticized public schools for "demonizing our country" and for having "an obsession with race in the classroom."

It is important to note, however, that Reynolds did not cite specific examples to buttress her claims. It is also important to note that the demographics of Iowa's school districts vary widely — from some that are made up of nearly all Caucasian kids, to some in which most students are not Caucasian, to others in which students come from families speaking dozens of languages are spoken at home.

Reynolds did not share with her audience how Iowa schools' current book-review process works when complaints are made by people in the community or by students. That is important, because those decisions to keep, remove or restrict access to certain books involve committees of educators, students and ordinary citizens, and school superintendents and the school boards elected by voters ultimately are the final arbiters.

School districts also have policies in place now that allow parents to ask that their child not be given certain books for classroom assignments and not be allowed to check out certain books from the school libraries.

What is troubling about Reynolds' latest proposal is that it would allow a handful of parents in one school to substitute their judgment for the book decisions that rightfully should be made by tens of thousands of other parents across Iowa. And the logistics of complying with such an ill-conceived law could quickly overwhelm teachers and administrators.

The idea of banning books runs counter to most people's concept of freedom. It seems to be a practice more common in authoritarian countries, rather than the world's leading democracy.

If there are books some parents do not want their own children reading, those parents already have a way to keep those books out of their kids' hands at school. No one is trying to take that role away from parents. But those parents should not have veto power over the books that other parents are comfortable allowing their kids to read.

Many of those "comfortable" parents realize the internet has content accessible to anyone, including school kids, that is far more graphic and more offensive than anything students will find in their school library.

PEN America, a national nonprofit organization that advocates for free expression, issued a report last fall that said Texas schools banned more books from their libraries than any other state — 801 books in 22 school districts. Most of the books dealt with race, racism, abortion and LGBTQ topics.

Through history, officials have tried to ban access to such acclaimed titles as "To Kill a Mockingbird," "Uncle Tom's Cabin" and "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn."

Suzanne Nossel, PEN America's top executive, said in a statement issued with the banned-book report: "This censorious movement is turning our public schools into political battlegrounds, driving wedges within communities, forcing teachers and librarians from their jobs, and casting a chill over the spirit of open inquiry and intellectual freedom that underpin a flourishing democracy."
