Southern takes off April 1 OFPs' winter

BURLINGTON: New air provider says they have 99.3% reliability rating

BURLINGTON - A single prop, blue-and white, fixedwing aircraft with the name SOUTHERN emblazened across its body sat in the large hangar at Southeast Iowa Regional Airport Tuesday morning.

The new aircraft represents the recent signing of Southern Airways Express as the Essential Air Services provider out of the airport in Burlington.

About 30 dignitaries and media gathered in the hangar for

the announcement that Southern will start offering flights on April. 1.

"No joke," said Mark Cestari, Chief Commercial Officer, to a laugh from the crowd in the hangar.

But the remark rang loud with the crowd, most of whom have been involved in economics of a regional airport. Southeast Iowa Regional Airport has had three different carriers in the last 18 months and sustainability is critical to the area.


Governor, Dept. of Education team up

HTC girls cool off in season-ending loss to Wolves

Winfield-Mt. Union stops HTC's run for the 3rd straight year

WINFIELD — Winfield-Mount Union has been a post-season thorn for Holy Trinity's girls basketball team.

The Crusaders came into Tuesday's Class 1A regional quarterfinal against the eighth-ranked Wolves with plenty of momentum, but W-MU took advantage of Holy Trinity's missed opportunities in the second half to take a 56-42 win.

Winfield-Mount Union (20-1) advanced to host Notre Dame (18-6) in Friday's regional semifinal.

It was the third consecutive season the Wolves have ended the Crusaders' season.

Holy Trinity trailed by four at halftime and six midway through the third quarter, but the Crusaders would have just five field goals over the last 14 1/2 minutes.

"We missed a lot of shots," Holy Trinity coach Tony Johnson said. "That was the thing I told them — we missed a lot of easy shots. Our defense was fine, we got the people in foul trouble that we wanted to, and didn't take advantage of it."

Holy Trinity (13-9), which came into the game on a five-game winning streak, was within 44-38 with 4:58 left to play in the game, but would only get a Mary Kate Bendlage shot inside and two free throws from Teagan Snaadt with 18 seconds left as Winfield-Mount Union pulled away.

"It seemed like we were in the right places, but we would either miss a shot or something else wouldn't





work out," Johnson said.

Anna Anderson's 3-pointer with 3:50 left put Winfield-Mount Union up 48-38, then after Keely Malone's basket with 3:15 left the Wolves scored their final six points off free throws.

Bradie Buffington led Winfield-Mount Union with 16



points. Melina Oepping had 15 points.

Bendlage led Holy Trinity with 23 points. Snaadt had 13.

It was a season with plenty of roster changes for the Crusaders. Guard Natalie Randolph was unavailable after she suffered a torn ACL before the beginning of volleyball season. Bendlage hurt her knee during preseason practice and didn't play until right before Christmas break. Freshman center Presley Myers suffered a knee injury late in the season.

"There were so many highs and lows this season, with injuries and sickness," Johnson said. "You're mixing and matching, moving people around. We lost Natalie before the season even started, lost MK, and when we were .500 at Christmas that exceeded my expectations.

"I thought as the year went on, we started playing well together. The last two or three weeks we played really good basketball."

Holy Trinity loses seniors Kayla Box, Mary Hellige and Jenna DiPrima but gets back the bulk of its scoring.

"This core group coming back, plus the incoming players we have, we've got to get together this summer and work at it, if we want to get to where we want to get."

"Martin Luther" is a must-read for book lovers

I read the book by Emma Donoghue a couple of years ago, so when the movie came out, Ginnie and I settled in. Like the story of a virgin birth recurring throughout history, a woman who appears to live without food, also pops up now and then. In fact, in my book review below, Martin Luther, in the 16th century, also encounters a woman who allegedly lives without food.

Speaking of Martin Luther, if you don't read another book the rest of your life, read "Martin Luther: The Man Who Rediscovered God and Changed the World" by Eric Metaxas. Actually, you could spend the rest of your life reading "Martin Luther." There is so much material, information and history, and Metaxas is such an intricate, detailed biographer, that I read the Introduction, Epilogue, footnotes, Appendices (something I don't normally do), and am ready to start reading the book again, and again, and again.

Have you ever read a book and wished you could read more of that book and author? Well, the well doesn't run dry with Metaxas. Can't say I agree with his politics, but as far as one of the best authors writing today, he has the corner market, biographies in particular. And with Kindle-when I'm done with one book, voila! I don't even have to leave my recliner and another book is in





my sweaty palms.

Metaxas' threesome of "Martin Luther: The Man Who Rediscov-

ered God and Changed the World," "Amazing Grace: William Willberforce and the Heroic Campaign to End Slavery" and "Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy," is the greatest reading I have ever done. Throw in "Miracles: What They Are, Why They Happen, and How They Can Change Your Life," and "Fish Out of Water: A Search for the Meaning of Life" (Metaxas' autobiography) all of which I read, and I'm just getting warmed up. In the hopper are, "More Men, and the Secret of Their Greatness," "Is Atheism Dead?" "If You Can Keep It, The Forgotten Promise of American Liberty" and "Letter to the American Church" all of which I haven't read, but plan to, and I'm set with reading material for the rest of my life. Eric Metaxas also wrote over 300 children's books. Holy smokes, Tonto! It's probably my imagination but I feel like my IQ increases about 10 points just by reading his books. His vocabulary is mind-boggling, but with Kindle, just touch the word and the Oxford Dictionary definition pops up. Nifty.

Metaxas is heavy reading, but rewarding. Just for fun I picked up Rick Bragg's, "The Speckled Beauty...A Dog and His People...." It's a dog story, similar to John Grogan's, "Marley." You'll love it. I had read a couple of Bragg's (I'm not bragging) books a few years ago: "The Prince of Frogtown" and "I'm a Soldier Too: The Jessica Lynch Story," for which he and his newspaper got in a little controversy over whether the book was true or not. Anywho, Bragg is an excellent Southern writer in the "good ole-boy" tradition. He has a number of other books that are also best sellers. Lord have mercy.



Rumors of canceled flights and stranded passengers under the Cape Air brand has hurt the image of the airport.

SIRA manager Sara Sandburg said it's been a rough past 18 months.

"This will be the third in the last year and a half. We had Air Choice last February and switched to Cape Air," Sandburg said.

"Air Choice One has these same planes. In fact (Southern) bought Air Choice One when they left here. The other part is the single-engine vs. twin-engine. Part of what happened with Cape Air was Delta and Jet Blue were plucking their pilots because they were twin engine and they could fly the bigger planes."

She said there is more room in the Southern planes than the Cape Air aircraft, which is also better for travelers.

Cestari said Southern will be more sustainable for Burlington because they have plenty of pilots. The Southern fleet in the central area is single-engine planes so their pilots aren't being absorbed by larger air carriers who need twin-engine training and certification.

He said those dynamics were limiting Cape Air's capabilities and Southern won't have those constraints with more than 300 pilots in their system.

"I couldn't even fly in today from St. Louis on Cape Air because they only had one flight," Cestari said. "I had to drive in and that's a long drive.

"We have the best reliability. Our fares are lower, which stimulates the market and we have these partnerships with

United, American, Alaska, Hawai'an where people can hop on us, and then hop on them and go anywhere in the world.

"We're not perfect, but our regular reliability rate for completion in 2021 and most of 2022 was 99.3%," he said.

The prices are also going to very comparable to Air Choice and Cape Air, the other two airlines that have serviced Burlington in the last three years.

"No one will ever pay triple digits for our flights to Chicago or St. Louis," Cistari said.

Prices will be \$39 for trips to Chicago or St. Louis with 14-days advance purchase, \$69 for a 7-day advance purchase, and an \$89 walk-up rate.

Southern will fly 24 round-trip flights per week, 2 daily trips to Chicago and 10 weekly trips to St. Louis, once a day and twice on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.

Cestari's also a full-time resource to community partners with sponsorships of events, flight donations, and other support.

"It's really the teamwork that makes everything great," he said.

The company website <u>www.iflysouth-</u> <u>ern.com</u> is also a one-stop booking site and Cestari said their customer service is also better than what you'd get with the larger carriers.

"We're on it and we're aware we have a lot of work to do to rebuild confidence. It's not going to happen overnight, but I told the manager now that the spring is here and summer vacation ramping up, I think we're going to do great."
