TANKS BLOW: Explosion grabs attention of city's east side

FORT MADISON - Fort Madison firefighters worked for just over an hour putting out a garage fire Saturday night.

Reports started coming into LeeComm at about 8:30 p.m. Saturday of an explosion of some type in the 1100 block of Avenue E.

According to Fort Madison Fire Chief Joey Herren the fire started when a acetylene tank inside the garage blew up causing several other tanks to explode destroying the structure.

"We might have some video of this from a patrol car, maybe. But one of the officers said it blew the roof up off the garage."

Herren said the fire is under investigation and didn't know exactly what caused the tanks to explode. The garage was completely destroyed by the explosion and ensuing blaze.

No one was injured and firefighters cleared the scene right around 10 p.m.

Firefighters were assisted at the scene by Fort Madison Police.

I don't really believe, yet, that everyone has access to websites, so I'm not sure that this transitioning fully satisfies the publishing component of open meetings laws, but I certainly have access to websites. And the agendas are posted at meeting sites.

In some cases, not all, I don't get emails with agendas. So if the meeting isn't something that's in my phone calendar, I forget it happens with all the noise in my life.

So I'm missing things, like the recent hiring of Central Lee football coach

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



My wife's brother-inlaw, Ron, in his mid-seventies, is a good Christian. He and his wife Becky live in Liberty, Missouri, which is a suburb of Kansas City (go Chiefs!). Ron's a friendly sort of fellow who will walk up to a stranger and begin chit-chatting.

One day while Ron was walking, he noticed a teenager shooting baskets. Ron began talking with the teen, Cal, and found out Cal needed a ride to football practice. Cal's parents were at work. Ron offered to give Cal a ride, and then picked him up when practice was

over.

Well, it turned out there was a group of teens in Liberty in the same situation. Their parents were at work or off somewhere, and the teens had no transportation. Ron has two large cars, a Lincoln Town Car and a Mercury Marquis. Soon Ron was transporting a group of boys to their practices and picking them up afterwards. He would even treat them to fast food. Of course, Ron cleared all this with the boys' parents so that the parents knew what was going on. Ron and his wife Becky even

attended the boys' sporting events and Ron jotted down the good things the boys did and then went over those good points with the boys—something they appreciated.

Being a Christian, Ron would love the boys with Jesus' love, and tell them of his own experience with Christ. Two of them eventually asked about Jesus. Ron was elated.

At the meetings Ron talked to the boys about building relationships. He asked them, "Who is your best friend?" The boys hemmed and hawed. Ron tapped himself on the chest. They themselves are their

best friend. They needed to look inward. Then they needed to look vertically, to their Creator, God or Jesus Christ. Thirdly, there are horizontal relationships with teachers, parents, and friends. So, they can use their relationship with themselves, and God to build better relationships with others. Ron pointed out that wisdom is best developed in relationships. They will become wise. Hence they called themselves, The WiseGuys.

The WiseGuys' meetings on Saturday nights in Ron's home office became so popular that once, when Ron and Becky were out of town and had to cancel the meeting, Cal called and said, "The WiseGuys have to meet." Ron and Becky hurried back so that the meeting could be held.

Each week one of the boys is a facilitator of various topics such as premarital sex, substance abuse, and career goals. Ron stays in the background and lets the boys interact amongst themselves. The meeting may consist of about 1/3 topic and 2/3 girls and football. There's a lot of roughhousing, cussing and four letter words. But as Ron points out, the Disciple Peter, a fisherman, no doubt used course language.

Speakers are sometimes invited in. There has been a yoga instructor, guidance counselor, and college professor. The meetings wind down with food and Xbox games on a huge television screen. Zoom is available for boys who can't attend in person.

Then the ultimate happened. Two of the boys, Jordan and River, expressed a desire to be baptized. On Sunday, Feb. 19th, at the 2nd Baptist Church in Liberty, MO, Jordan and River were fully immersed and surfaced as new young men. Reverend Jason Edwards had actual water from the Jordan River in Israel where Jesus was baptized. Rev. Edwards sprinkled a few drops of that water into the baptismal tank. He noted that Jordan and River were being baptized in water from the Jordan River—an "Ah, Ha!" moment, like it was ordained. The Wise-Guys attended and observed closely. Another teen expressed a desire to become baptized also. Hallelujah, praise God!

Ron's overall approach to the guys is one of building a loving relationship with each one of them, letting God's Spirit do the rest of the work. He continues to be blessed daily in this work. His lay youth ministry is making an impact, a difference in a troubled world.



SECTION 1. PUR-POSE. The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend Title 9, Chapter 7, authorizing the City Council to add a no parking zone, as recommended by the Chief of Police.

SECTION 2. The City Council of the City of Fort Madison does hereby amend Title 9, Traffic, Chapter 7, Stopping, Standing, Parking, Section 6, Parking Prohibited, by adding the following:

Street48th Street Side East and West Area Commencing at the intersection of Avenue O, extended a distance of approximately 2000 feet south to the south most driveway access of 1910 – 48th Street (Scott's Miracle Gro)

SECTION 3. REPEAL-ER. All other sections of this Ordinance in conflict with these provisions shall be repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVER-ABILITY CLAUSE. If any section, provision or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 5. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Telling good tales depends on having good sources

Chuck Banks to the Bloodhounds staff. Chuck is very nice fit for head coach Derek Doherty's program. He believes in a culture of building a program that not only the athletes buy into, but the community as well. Banks had a rough go of it at Central Lee hampered by COVID and diminishing numbers.

But his relationship with the Fort Madison staff resulted in him being absorbed into the Hounds system. And we're excited for that addition.

Those relationships are critical in small towns, but much harder to hang onto. That may seem counterintuitive, but it's not. Everyone knows everyone. Stories are shared, and the inquisitive nature of beings leaves us all a little exposed.

he or she put their name on a ballot. Councilmembers are exposed, supervisors are exposed... journalists are exposed.

I open my life to readership almost on a weekly basis. People know a lot about me, but in my six years with Pen City Current, I've learned quickly and profoundly, they want it that way.

I write these pieces every week to create debate, to help people who've just had a rough week and are looking for a good start to the next one.

I write in the hopes that these words find their way to someone who really needs them that day - looking for balance. Or someone who's a little lost and sees in about six minutes they aren't the only ones.

Sometimes I feel like I'm on a short cliff with my fingers searching for just a crack to hang onto or maybe the top of the cliff enjoying the view.

I'm dancing around a little bit here to lay some foundation. I'm not an attorney, but I like lawyer shows.

Here's the deal. Journalism is all about relationships and trust. When you're having a casual conversation with sources, they need to know whether they're on the record or not. They should always assume they are, but clarify when they don't want to be. After six years most of my sources I consider friends. So trust comes into play very quickly.

When they ask you to sit on a story and you do, that's capital being spent.

When I do sources a solid and sit on a story it's with the intention that when the story breaks and those related to it are ready to go public, the favor of sitting on the story is repaid. It's a gamble we measure against the reward many, many times.

And many times being the nice guy has burned me. Many times. But it also has instilled a sense of fair play with the people we tell stories about. And they like that...for the most part.

But it's also a thing we do to build repoire and trust with all sides of news. Sometimes we win with that approach and sometimes we lose. But at the end of the day it all figures in how the news gets released, and how stories are told.

The relationship has to grow and change and grow strong roots. And every now and then we test the boundaries a bit, and like a making a muscle grow, you have to tear it down to build it up.

This past weekend we tore things down a bit in hopes that the relationship gets stronger. We believe it will, and in the meantime friendships grow under the surface - but that's Beside the Point.
