# City Manager resigns

**VARLEY DONE MAY 2:** City to look at different path with city leadership

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison City Manager David Varley has announced his resignation effective May 2, 2023.

Varley has been with the city since 2014 and word started to spread over the weekend that his time at the city could be coming to an end.

He said on Saturday that he "was thinking about it" but wouldn't confirm any decisions.

City officials wouldn't comment or confirm the decision over the weekend, but Varley submitted his letter of resignation to Mayor Matt Mohrfeld on Tuesday.



"Let's just say it was the right time," Varley said on what prompted the decision to step down.

"My wife and I talked about it and maybe it's time to retire or maybe look at doing something else."

The 69-year-old who's native to California and spent time in Colorado said he has no

plans to return to that area.

"We spent three years in Colorado, but we might just stay here. We've enjoyed our time here and we like it here. We're

FORT MADISON – While volunteers work to feed the food insecure at the Fort Madison Food pantry, an enterprise is forming to also help the pets that have food insecurity.

Dan Dalstra and his wife Leslie, the

pastor at the First Christian Church in Fort Madison, are standing up Roxie's Pantry.

The name comes from Roxie the Bloodhound mascot at Fort Madison High School.

"It's for those low income follks who have to sometimes make that tough choice between deciding do I feed myself, do I feed my pet, do I buy medication," Dalstra said.

"Pets are such a crucial part of our lives, basically like our children. The last thing we want to have happen to anyone is for them not to be able to take care of the animal closest to

# Hoopla gives patrons new digital access

Hoopla is defined as excitement surrounding an event or situation and we are very excited about the new addition to the library's electronic resources. Hoopla is a new library resource that provides access to digital books, audiobooks, movies, music and magazines. You can stream on a desktop or laptop computer at <a href="https://www.hoopladigital.com/">https://www.hoopladigital.com/</a>, or, if you want to read watch and listen on the go, download the app to your phone or tablet.

The first time you access Hoopla, either in the app or on the desktop site, you will need your library card to create an account. After that, you will just need to remember your user name and password. Residents of Fort Madison and rural Lee County can borrow up to five items per month. Your number of borrows resets on the first of the month, regardless of when you first register for the service. Typical loan periods are 21 days for books, 7 days for music and 3 days for movies and television shows. Have questions or need help setting up an account? 

## Council to weigh options in replacing Varley

in no hurry to look elsewhere."

Varley had been vocal about the difficulties generating revenue in Iowa and the stranglehold the state has on local government.

"The biggest frustration is the state does not give local government enough leeway in how to raise revenue," he said. "It's very difficult to have a good mix of revenue sources, especially in the general fund. My biggest frustration is the state doesn't have a strong belief in local control."

Mohrfeld said he appreciated the outgoing city manager's nine years of service to

"We appreciate David's service to the city, and I wish him the very best in his future plans," Mohrfeld said Wednesday.

Varley echoed the sentiment.

"I appreciate the opportunity I have had to work for the city. I wish the city the best in all its future endeavors," Varley wrote in his short resignation letter Tuesday.

Councilman Rusty Andrews, who serves as Mayor Pro Tem, and is a voting councilman, said the decision to leave was Varley's, but now the council may look at different options as far as city leadership.

He said there was a separation agreement reached but couldn't disclose the de-

Andrews said he hopes the council takes time to research the best way to move forward searching for a replacement.

"Council is looking to go a different direction with new leadership," he said. "We are reaching out to Southeast Iowa Regional Planning and Mike Norris for some insight on how best to move forward.

"The last time we hired a consulting firm, and we'll reach out to them again to get the ball rolling."

He said there will be pressure to using a hiring firm, but he would like to weigh all the options before moving ahead with a plan.

"We need to take a minute to breathe, look at our budget and do some research on what others are paying. We don't want to strap the budget any more than it already is."

Last year Varley's salary was set at \$126,251.



them."

The pantry will be a disbursement pantry and not the type where you can come in and choose food for your animal.

Dalstra said people will be able to fill out an application online for assistance and then the pantry volunteers will determine the amount of food needed for the animal on a monthly basis and have it ready to be picked up.

He said people who can't afford food would take them to the shelter or even release them into the

"Our primary goal is to make sure pets are fed and healthy and kept out of the shelters. People can keep their pets with them when they need them."

Leslie Dalstra's stepsister started one in the St. Louis area that grew beyond her means and she had to step away. Dan said that opened his eyes to the need for that kind of service locally.

"Looking for things to do and ways to help our community, that's always been in the back of my mind. I'm a huge animal lover, pets, dogs especially are my jam. This is something our church can be involved in and this kept surfacing in my brain."

He said there are other pet pantries in Iowa, but nothing locally, and said PAW Director Sandy Brown was supportive of the venture and said it would complement what she is doing because it could help keep more animals out of the shelter and in homes.

The program does cater to low-income families and those looking for assistance can apply online at <a href="https://www.fccfmdisciples.org/about-5">https://www.fccfmdisciples.org/about-5</a>.

"We'd like you to show something that you are in financial need. Nothing government specific, but something to show you are in need of food."

The program would allocate six months of food with dispersions monthly the last Wednesday of the month at the church at 608 10th Street in Fort Madison

Applicants can pull up to the church and get the month's supply of food and return the next month for up to six months. Disbursement times will be set later. Dalstra said if owners are in need beyond the six months, they can talk to the pantry about op-

He said they would prefer animals to be spayed or neutered, but they will allow time for that to take place to keep the number of pets controlled. Also food will only be allocated for the number of pets that were originally signed up.

"If you can't afford food for two dogs, why would you add two more?" he said.

Food prepared for the animals will not be brand specific, but special documented dietary needs will be considered.

"If your dog loves Purina One, we cannot differentiate food with Iams or whatever. We will take all our donations and mix them into one big thing and then bag them up from there. If your dog can only eat gluten free or handle XYZ, we will do what we can and get those specialty foods when we can," he said.

All the food will be from donations and Dalstra is asking for people to either donate food or financially to the pantry. The pantry operates under the church's 501c3, so donations are tax deductible.

"We can use funds to buy dog food, cat food, as we need."

Space is being rented from the church so 10% of all donations will go to the church.

He said he's hoping that partnerships can be formed with groups at the schools like National Honor Society to help beef up the volunteer efforts. "Other than children, there's nothing like pets. And the last thing we want is someone who loves their animal and it's their partner and best friend to have to let it go because you can't afford to feed it," he said.

"There's a lot of need in our community. There's a lot of hungry people, and in my mind, that means there are a lot of hungry pets."

Dalstra has also planned a Pet Parade of Parks for Roxie's Pantries with a registration at the church at 8:30 on April 15 with a parade walk with pets from Central Park to Old Settlers Park and back starting at 9 a.m. Entry fee is \$10 that will go toward the pantry.

"If you want to bring a bag of cat food or dog food, that would be great, too," he said.

All the details are laid out in the application which can be found at the link at the bottom of the Roxie's Pantry page

The site also outlines more details of the program. Interested pet owners can also stop in at the church for more information.

## Lady Hounds suffer jitters in season-opening loss to Nikes

BURLINGTON — Fort Madison's girls soccer team was playing its first game of the season.

Notre Dame-West Burlington already had played once.

And that made a difference.

The Bloodhounds' 3-1 loss to the Nikes wasn't the beginning coach Carrie Burken wanted to start the season, but it was a lesson to build on in the opening week.

"Especially at the beginning of the first half, we were playing way below our standard — really, way below what I'd seen in practice," Burken said. "You could see first-game nerves. People who played all last year, played together, just weren't doing what they did last year. I think it's just first game, new season, some new people in there, it wasn't going to be great.

"This is Notre Dame's second game. They got all of those nerves out, and they were ready to go."

The Nikes (2-0) got all of their goals from Julianna Hill in the first half, including two in the first 26 minutes. That left the Bloodhounds scrambling.

"Just mentality wise, it felt draining, especially for our defense, which didn't give up a lot of goals last year," Burken said. "To give up two quick goals in the first game, that feels a little unnerving, a little unsettling, like 'What are we doing wrong?"

Fort Madison got its lone goal with 9:40 left on the first half when Hadley Wolfe scored off a rebound after Halle Menke's shot hit the crossbar and came down just in front of the net.

But whatever momentum the Bloodhounds was gone when Hill scored again. Her shot hit the crossbar and the rebound was ruled to have hit behind the goal line before Fort Madison goalkeeper Taylor Johnson grabbed it.

"It was huge for momentum," Burken said. "Being down 3-1 is a lot different from being down 2-1, because with 2-1, you're thinking you get that next goal (in the second half) then maybe you get it to overtime or get another goal to win. So, it was a completely different mindset for us. A huge momentum changer, because they didn't score in the second half. I felt like it changed the game, but you can't do anything about it. You've got to move on."

The Bloodhounds held the Nikes scoreless in the second half, but couldn't get a

shot on offense.

"I thought we settled in a lot more (in the second half)," Burken said. "The tough part about soccer is you don't have timeouts. You can pull players off to talk to them, but it's hard to do that when you need them out there. So you can talk to individual players, but you can't get a group of them together and set something up, work on some things."

Burken thought her team's communication was better in the second half.

"Communication comes from being comfortable in what you're doing," she said. "If you're too focused on where you need to be and what you're doing, you can't communicate with your teammates because you're too focused on that."

Johnson had 14 saves for the Bloodhounds, who play Friday at Iowa City Liberty.
