FORT MADISON - Another crazy twist in the saga that is unfolding at the Fort Madison Housing Authority came about Wednesday afternoon at a special meeting at Hillview Village.

Commission chairman Rebecca Bowker, who's been a part of the Housing Authority for 18 years, abruptly announced her resignation to the media following the adjournment of the five-minute meeting that was called to vote on suspending Executive Director Mike Dear and a maintenance staffer. The two were on the agenda for a motion to suspend pending an administrative review. There was no agenda item for a closed session under Iowa Code section 21.5(i) to discuss the subject of the possible suspensions.

for their support and the support of the staff who was also in attendance. Bowker said there would be no public comment due to the nature of the agenda.

"Due to the nature of the meeting, we will not be taking public comments from anyone in the audience. We are just going to move forward with meeting," Bowker said. "Due to recent facts There was no motion offered to

to a vote.

Carle and Salazar voted in favor of tabling the issue, but Bowker voted against the motion to table. With only two of the four current board members voting in favor of tabling it, Bowker said the motion to table failed, but the agenda item was never returned to.

Board member Jenny Divine was not yet on the meeting via Zoom, but the board had a quorum to start the meeting without her.

Divine joined the meeting after the first vote to table, and Bowker went straight to the next agenda item which was to suspend a maintenance worker pending an investigation into his hiring.

IUB grants certificate to **Alliant for** Wever project

SOLAR FIELD: Order sites public convenience, use, and neccesity of project

WEVER - The Iowa Utilities Board (IUB) today issued an order granting a certificate of public convenience, use and necessity to Interstate Power and Light Company, a subsidiary of Alliant Energy (Alliant), for a solar electric generating facility and battery energy storage system (BESS) project to be located in Lee County, Iowa.

Alliant filed its application on October 31, 2022, in Docket No. GCU-2022-0003 for a proposed solar generating facility totaling up to 150 megawatts (MW) and an associated 75 MW BESS project. The proposed project area consists of approximately 925 acres within a 2,685acre area of agricultural land near the unincorporated community of Wever.

Alliant anticipates the project area will consist of the solar array system and associated electric generating equipment, with approximately five acres designed for the BESS project to be located adjacent to the collector substation. The solar project will connect to inverters, which will connect to a collector substation in the southwest corner of the project, and connect through a generation tie-in transmission line to the ITC Midwest LLC Wever substation. The BESS project will also connect to the collector substation

Lady Hounds stacking wins as season picks up

FORT MADISON - The offensive outburst was quick and effective.

Fort Madison's 3-0 win over Central Lee in Tuesday's girls soccer match at the Baxter Sports Complex featured all of its goals in the first 14 minutes.

That was fine for Fort Madison coach Carrie Burken.

"We settled in really well," Burken said. "We had some good energy before the game. We were very loose — we were playing around, but also, we had a lot of energy. So that was a really good thing, the mindset we had going into this, and I thought we played really, really well."

The Bloodhounds (6-2), coming off a 10-0 win over Fairfield on Monday night, got their first goal from Laura Mehmert just three minutes into the match. Teagan Snaadt, coming off a six-goal night on Monday, scored 9 ½ minutes later to give Fort Madison a 2-0 lead. Halle Menke then closed the scoring with 26:06 left in the first half.

"I think having fun like we did last night, that sort of energy carried over to today, where you're playing with confidence, you feel good after getting 10 goals yesterday," Burken said. "So I think that really did lead into this game."

Central Lee coach Antonio Estrada was disappointed with how his team started.

"This game, I felt the girls came into this like, 'Oh, Fort Madison was going to beat us," he said. "I don't know if you heard me, but I talked to them about having the mentality of going into this thinking we can win the game regardless of what the stats are, or what the records are, or what you've seen. We could do better, and I think we understood that."

The defense of the Hawks (3-3) kept the Bloodhounds in check the rest of the match.

"I think in the second half they made the adjustment to have more numbers back," Burken said.

"I talked to them about, when we were on defense, we can't get too far apart," Estrada said. "When they're attacking, we have to get tight. Because when we got too far apart, that's when they made their three (goals), and game's over then. So we tightened up the defense, made sure we were talking back there."

Central Lee had some offensive opportunities, but couldn't convert. Fort Madison goalkeeper Taylor Johnson had four saves.

"I think our defense did a really good job of communicating," Burken said. "And Taylor's done such a good job of communicating when she's going to get the ball, which just helps the defense. They don't have to feel the same pressure."

"I thought we were being lazy today (on offense)," Estrada said. "I told the girls, when we're attacking, we just can't watch the person with the ball do all the work. When we're attacking, we have to attack in numbers, because if we're not attacking in numbers, we're not going to have the opportunities to crash the goal."

Estrada said the match was a good lesson for his team.

"This game would have been a great game to record and look back on," he said. "I liked the way they performed in the second half. I think they didn't give up, they fought to the very end. And that's all I ask for."

The Lady Hounds finished second in the Keokuk Relays which were hosted at Fort Madison due to work being done at Keokuk High School. FORT MADISON – Fort Madison High School ran a rare second home meet on Tuesday night hosting the Keokuk Relays. Construction crews are on the site at Keokuk High School prompting the move.

Fort Madison girls took second place with 104 points behind Mt. Pleasant's 189. Central Lee girls were sixth with 25 points.

On the boys' side Fort Madison was third with 93 points behind Mt. Pleasant with 173 points and Burlington with 115.33. Central Lee was fifth with 45.67 points.

The Lady Hounds got a first place in the 4x800 behind the efforts of Elle Huebner, Mara Smith, Addison Rump, and Peyton Wiegand with a time of 10:59.76.

Aija Jenkins also gave the Hounds 10 points with her 1st place in the high jump clearing 4-10.

Avery Rump pulled in 20 points with her top finishes in the 1500 and 3000-meter runs. Addison Rump set a personal best with her second place in the 1500 with a time of 5:22.29. Avery won the event in 5:08.23.

On the boys' side, Central Lee got a first place finish from Thomas Eschman in the long jump at 21-4.5. The Hawks got a second place finish with Eschman leading the way in the 4x100 along with Corbin Pohren, Brayden Wyrick, and Grant Myhre for a 46.26 mark.

Fort Madison's boys got first place finishes in the 4x200 with Tate Settles, Kiawante Smith, Nik Fullenkamp, and Dayton Lamar with a time of 1:34.79. The productive Shuttle Hurdle relay squad of Gavin Callahan, Smith, Adam Sobczak, and Henry Wiseman also took first place with a time of at 1:04.44.

Fort Madison's 4x100 team, which qualified for Drake this coming weekend, was disqualified for a false start. The Hounds run in preliminaries Saturday morning.

Eschman will jump in the long jump preliminaries on Friday afternoon.

LEE COUNTY INVEST-MENT POLICY

It is hereby resolved that as required by Iowa Code Section 12B.10 that the following are adopted as the Lee County Investment Policies. These policies may be amended from time to time after consultation with the Lee County Treasurer and the Lee County Attorney by a duly enacted resolution of the Board of Supervisors.

1. In addition to investment standards and requirements otherwise provided by law, all investment of public funds by the Lee County Treasurer shall comply with Iowa Code Section 12B.10. The County Treasurer shall at all times keep funds coming into his or her possession as public money in a vault or safe or in one or more depositories approved pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 12C. However, the County shall invest, unless otherwise provided, any public funds not currently needed, in investments authorized by Iowa Code Section

be based in the following order of priority: a. Safety of principal is

the first priority. b. Maintaining the necessary liquidity to match expected liabilities is the

second priority. c. Obtaining a reasonable return is the third

able return is the third priority. 3. The trading of secu-

rities in which any public funds are invested for the purpose of speculation or the realization of shortterm trading profits is prohibited.

4. The investment of public funds by the Lee County Treasurer shall be limited to the following:

a. Obligations of the United States government, its agencies and instrumentalities.

b. Certificates of deposit and other evidences of deposit at federally insured depository institutions approved pursuant to Chapter 12C.

c. Prime bankers' acceptances that mature within 270 days and that are eligible for purchase by a federal reserve bank, provided that at the time of purchase no more than10% of the investment portfolio of the county shall be in investments authorized by this paragraph and that at the that 5% of the investment portfolio shall be invested in the securities of a single issuer.

d. Commercial paper or other short-term corporate debt that matures within 270 days and that is rated within the two highest classifications. as established by at least one of the standard rating services approved by the superintendent of banking by rule adopted pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 17A, provided that at the time of purchase no more than 5% of all amounts invested in commercial paper and other shortterm corporate debt shall be invested in paper and debt rated in the second highest classification, and provided further that at the time of purchase no more than 10% of the investment portfolio shall be in investments authorized by this paragraph and that at the time of purchase no more that 5% of the investment portfolio shall be invested in the securities of single issuer.

e. Repurchase agreements whose underlying collateral consists of the investments set out in paragraph "a" if the County Treasurer takes delivery of the collateral either directly or through Repurchase agreements do not include reverse repurchase agreements.

f. An open-end management investment company registered with the federal securities and exchange commission under the Federal Investment Company Act of 1940,15 USC Section 80(a), and operated in accordance with 17 CFP Section 270.2a-7.

g. A joint investment trust organized pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 28E prior to and existing in good standing on April 28., 1992, or a joint investment trust organized pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 28E after April 28, 19912, provided that the joint investment trust shall either be rated within the two high test classifications by at least one of the standard rating services approved by the superintendent of Banking by rule adopted pursuant to Iowa Code Chapter 17A and operated in accordance with 17FCR Section 270.2A-7, or be registered with the federal Securities and Exchange commission under the federal Investment Company Act of 1940, 15 USC Section 80(a) and operated in accordance with 17CFR Section 270.2a-7.

After that, Bowker adjourned the meeting. Dear asked if he was going to able to speak but Bowker had adjourned the meeting.

After the meeting when asked about the administrative procedure of not revisiting the first agenda item, since only a motion to table the issue had been voted on, Bowker confirmed that vote to table had failed.

"That motion failed, and you can add that I'm submitting my resignation effective immediately," she said.

Bowker then sent out an email confirming her immediate resignation at 3:27 p.m.

After the meeting, Carle and Salazar said they would be looking for guidance from the city going forward but would have to reset the board meeting and address the issues still pending.

"Well, she's resigned so we're going to have to get back together and appoint a new chair," Carle said.

He said then the commission is going to have to address the two agenda items, because one was tabled and the other had no action taken.

Bowker is the second commission member in the last two days to resign. Linda Larkin who was just appointed to the commission by Mayor Matt Mohrfeld, resigned Monday.

Dear, who's been with the authority for just over four months, said the issue had to do with him hiring a maintenance person with a felony record. But the authority bylaws do not require a background check for employees. They also give Dear hiring authority with direction by the commission.

The only bylaws the authority could uncover when requested Tuesday by Pen City Current are from 1972 when the authority was formed. The job description for Dear is currently on the city's website, but is different than the description given by the authority.

Shirley Rende, a resident of Hillview Village, said Dear hasn't been on the job long enough to be in a position where he understands the ins and outs of the housing authority.

"This man's only been here four months. He can't possibly all know the ropes here yet. And I think they're using him as (scape) goat. I think someone else's involved and they are using him," she said.

Dear said the support of the residents proves that he's doing a good job and hiring and firing is at his discretion. Dear didn't know Bowker had resigned after the meeting.

"Because of this right here. There it is...There it is," Dear said of the support in the room.

"We're going to continue operating as normal."

Dear said what happened in the room spoke to his work so far.

"What took place in here speaks for itself. There was a narrative about me showing a man grace. A man who's served his time. All of us have shown grace at some level. This individual I chose to hire. He did his time and got the help he needed, and I showed him grace. That's what this is about. I don't want that to be lost in the shuffle," Dear said.

"I would do that ten out of ten times. If I could fall on that sword to show a man grace 10 times, I would do that."

Commission members for the Housing Authority are appointed by Mayor Matt Mohrfeld and voted on by the Fort Madison City Council.

The Housing Authority was recently audited by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The audit uncovered federal funds that had been used to pay for work on county-owned property.

HUD recommended the board end the contract for managing the county properties, which the board did at their next regular meeting.

Now the county owns and manages the properties, seven of which are in Fort Madison. County supervisors voted this week to look into the options around selling or gifting the property to another public or private entity.

The sale of the property could result in many of those getting housing assistance being displaced. But the issue has been placed with a county building committee that is going to discuss the issue Thursday at 3 p.m.
