PROGRESS: Construction moving along; hospitality center on hold for permitting

FORT MADISON – Fort Madison Mayor Matt Mohrfeld gave a brief update Tuesday night on the city's ongoing marina project.

Plans for the self-proclaimed 5-star marina are moving forward, but there has been a hitch in the progress of the privately-funded hospitality center.

Mohrfeld said progress there is hung up in bureaucracy

"The hospitality center is at a stalemate with FEMA on permitting," Mohrfeld said. "It's not through any fault of their own, but the bureaucratic slow down of touching water."

"That is coming along, and we will be getting a zoom update on that at the end of the week."

Mohrfeld also clarified the road along the river has been replaced with a 10-foot recreational path along the river.

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



Wellness paths adding depth to city's marina project

"The river road has been not put back into the plan and it has been supplanted with a wellness path. The concept there is that you don't put cars in between attractions and people," the mayor said.

"So people that are taking advantage of amenities in the park can use the path and access the river. However, the north road will be a two-lane road."

He said the rest of the roughly \$14 million marina project is coming along "nicely".

Several sets of docks are currently installed and operational with boats already moored to the structures. Another dock, Dock B, is currently under construction. At Tuesday's meeting, the board approved another \$35,433 for jet-ski lifts that will go along the east marina wall.

Motorists that have come around the marina on Hwy. 61 or traveled

down into the park have seen the ballard lights that adorn the wellness path built on top of the jetty wall.

Railings and dock gates are currently being installed and Mohrfeld said they serve to help brand the new

Concrete approaches have also been added to the newly poured boat ramp on the marina's west side as are other improvements.

"The lighting is going up and if, you haven't been by at night, the ballards are lit on the jetty. The pier has been poured with the wellness trail that comes all the way around to the boat

That's a very attractive look and has nice symmetry at night as it reflects out of the pool."

Mohrfeld added the bids for asphalt for the parking lot are coming in and that work should be delegated soon.

"We should be okay," I told Ginnie.

Just then the wind hit, I looked out the window and corn stalks from the fields were flying by in a straight line. The power went out. About five seconds later, it came back on. Our generator had kicked in. As I was shutting off the central air, rain slammed the side of the house, and it turned black outside. I looked at Ginnie, she looked at me. I said, "Basement. Now. You grab Buddy, I'll grab Stormy. Let's go!"

In the basement, with Buddy on Ginnie's lap, and Stormy, our cat, prowling around, yowling, the hail hit. I looked outside through the egress window. Marble size hail was peppering the lawn like popcorn. The sound was deafening.

We were in the basement maybe an hour, coming upstairs periodically to see what was going on. Trees were whipping around like hula dancers, and cars were pulled over on the side of the highway, their lights illuminating a frightful scene of cornstalks, rain and hail.

Then the storm just stopped. The sun came out in the west, and the sky overhead looked like marshmallows. A rainbow actually appeared in the east. Glory!

The next day we surveyed the damage while we picked up limbs. There were two inches of rain in the rain gauge. A flowering pear tree I planted last year was snapped off. The hail hadn't damaged our metal roof or the vinyl siding. One of my sculptures had blown across Highway 34 and was resting in the median. We were lucky it hadn't caused an accident. And there were drifts of cornstalks and shucks everywhere, some of them knee deep and deeper. What a mess! "How are we going to clean this up?" I asked Ginnie. She shrugged her shoulders. "I know. I'll plant tomatoes and peppers. I can spread the stalks and shucks around the plants to keep down the weeds. When it storms corn, don't be forlorn!" Ginnie rolled her eyes.

We heard a diesel engine running. The DOT had a track hoe and several dump trucks out on the side of the highway, digging huge piles of cornstalks and shucks out of the culverts and ditches. What a sight! In my entire life (I'll be 75 in July), I have never been in a cornstalk storm. It was cornstalk shock!

Then we saw something that stopped us in our tracks. Outside our kitchen door, on the sidewalk, were two sticks in the shape of a cross. It was a Godwink. Jesus had been outside our door protecting us.

WHEREAS, the voters of Lee County and cities within the county have voted to enact a 1 cent **Local Option Sales Tax** in accordance with Iowa Code 423B, and

WHEREAS, the revenue derived from the tax is used for property tax relief, integrated waste landfill fees and building maintenance, and

WHEREAS, the residents of Lee County have grown to rely on these revenues as a means to directly and indirectly reduce property taxes, and

WHEREAS, the 2023 legislative session has seen the introduction of SF 550, which proposes to convert the Local Option Sales Tax efforts into a statewide sales tax and impose the local option sales tax in every jurisdiction, thereby triggering the constitutional amendment

to require an allocation of 3/8th of a cent to the Iowa Water and Land Legacy (IWLL) trust fund, and

WHEREAS, SF 550 proposed to backfill revenues lost due to the proposal, there are concerns of the Legislature ability to continue backfilling revenues, and

WHEREAS, voters across Iowa who have voted to either implement a local option sales tax or not to do so, and

WHEREAS, voters across Iowa who have voted to utilize the local option sales tax have approved revenue purpose statements (RPS), and

WHEREAS, SF 550 also sunsets these provisions on January 1, 2025, after which no jurisdiction will have the authority to take either a LOST proposal or revenue purpose statement to a vote.

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
