

Mary Hellige gets 200th career strikeout in win over Danville Tuesday; Alix Congdon scores 4 runs to lead Lady Hawks

WEST POINT – Central Lee girls started quick with eight runs in the first two innings to lift them to a win over cross-county rival Holy Trinity Catholic Friday 15-8.

The Hawks got three hits each from Alix Congdon, Jaci Hawk, Shanna Buford, Bailey Schwartz, and Carlee Pezley enroute to a 19-hit performance against the Crusaders.

Pezley and Kenna Sandoval combined for seven RBIs in the win.

Central Lee's Everlee Harvey went 5 2/3 innings giving up just two earned runs on two hits, while fanning three and walking two.

Mary Hellige went the distance for HTC giving up 19 hits and 15 runs, just nine earned in the

Hellige and Brooke Mueller had the two hits in the game off Harvey. Schwartz came on in relief and threw 1 1/3 hitless innings, but walked five and allowed five to score.

Jenna DiPrima had two RBIs. Hellige and Mueller each had two runs scored.

Congdon scored four runs to lead the Lady Hawks. Sandoval and Schwartz each had three runs on three hits for Central Lee.

The Lady Hawks move to 2-0 in SEI Superconference and 3-4 overall. They travel to New London tonight for a 7 p.m. game.

The Crusaders fell to 1-2 in the conference and 2-2 overall with the loss.

Holy Trinity rebounded with a 14-2 win over Danville Tuesday night. Hellige went 4-4 with three runs scored and recorded her 200th high school strikeout on the mound for the Crusaders.

IEDA to pump \$5M into state food banks

DES MOINES - Today, Gov. Reynolds and the Iowa Economic Development Authority announced a \$5 million investment in food banks and food pantry networks to help more Iowans in need get access to fresh, nutritious food.

"Access to fresh foods is a challenge for those facing food insecurity and soaring inflation has made it even harder," said Gov. Reynolds. "Iowa is making long-term investments to reduce food insecurity in our communities – supporting food banks and their networks to better serve those in need. This one-time infrastructure investment will help improve capacity and distribution at Iowa's food banks, and ensure more Iowans have access to the food they need."

The new Iowa Food Insecurity Infrastructure Fund will help eligible nonprofits that have experienced economic hardship build, expand, or remodel facilities to enable them to increase the amount of food, especially fresh food, distributed to local food pantries throughout Iowa. Eligible nonprofits include food banks that are bulk food aggregators or distributors that replenish food pantries across Iowa, as well as nonprofit food pantry networks that serve as primary distribution points.


Schau gets Central Lee's Teacher of the Year honor

and for his work building a top-tier technology program at the high school. "Justin provides real-life, hands-on experiences for our students, and ven-






