Disaster funds ready

GRANT FUNDS: State offers up Individual Assistance Grant program funds

LEE COUNTY – The Iowa Individual Assistance Grant Program (IIAGP) has been made available by Governor Kim Reynolds for those impacted in Lee County by the June 29, 2023, severe weather and households who meet the grant qualifications.

According to Jason Dinwiddie, Lee County Emergency Management Agency Coordinator, the city of Montrose, Keokuk, and the surrounding area were impacted by severe storms that caused damage to homes and infrastructure in the Lee County area. Due to the damages sustained by individuals, a request for assistance was sent to the Governor.

The IIAGP provides grants of up to \$5,000 for households with incomes up to 200 percent of the federal poverty level. Grants are available for home or car repairs, replacement of clothing or food, and temporary housing expenses. Applicants should note that original receipts are required for those seeking reimbursement for actual expenses related to storm recovery.

The grant application and instructions are available on the Iowa Department of Homeland Security Emergency Management website at https://homelandsecurity.iowa.gov/assistance/ or by contacting the disaster team at Community Action of Southeast Iowa at 319-753-0193. Potential applicants have 45 days from the disaster

City, crews did well in wake of derecho storm



Thursday's derecho that raced through Lee County, blowing up Montrose and Keokuk, while doing a substantial amount of damage in Fort Madison and outlying areas, was something close to evil.

I tried to get a couple phone photos from the deck of my porch and saw large branches - large branches blowing horizontally north on 6th Street above the houses.

"What the hell?"

The driving rain, wind, and lightning pushed me back inside.

I went to the side window and watched parts of the trees on my block fall and almost hit my truck.

Enough is enough. That F150 is better off moving around. So I ran out with my gray backpack containing my cameras and started shooting, driving around looking for pictures.

My first thought was Old Settler's Park because storms usually have some impact there.

OMG.

An arboreous warzone.

You couldn't even see the playground equipment that was almost buried under branches. Trees split due to wind and several with lightning patterns on

Locally, she's visiting some historical grave sites including a surgeon who worked at Missouri State Peniteniary.


A local woman contacted Fletcher about some phenomenon that was taking place near her home in Fort Madison. She's also done some investigative work at the Kingsley Inn.

Hawks, Falcons to play suspended substate game Monday

KEOSAUQUA - The much-needed storms may have pulled us from drought conditions, but they sure wreaked havoc on Saturday's Class 2A Substate 5, Region 10 baseball game in Van Buren.

The Central Lee Hawks and West Burlington, who have battled in two one-run games already this year, stand at a 5-5 tie in the top of the seventh after storms suspended Satur-

When the game was called at close to 10 p.m. after lightning kept cracking the skies above the Mildred and Eddie Ferguson Sports Complex in Keosauqua, Central Lee was up in the bottom of the 7th with no outs.

Bo Herdrich had just drawn a walk and James Hemingson was up with one strike. That's exactly where the game will resume on Monday at 7 p.m. at Central Lee. The Hawks were supposed to have hosted the game but field conditions moved the event to Van Buren County.

The game was originally ruled a completed game and a win for the Hawks with Iowa High School Athletic Association officials ruling that the game had to revert to the end of the last full inning completed which would have given the Hawks a 5-4 win and move them into the quarterfinals against Mediapolis Wednesday in Van Buren.

After the game was called Central Lee Athletic Director Wes McGraw phoned IHSAA

officials to confirm the ruling, which he got. But then he found a ruling under tournament guidelines that said the game should be suspended and restarted at that moment of the suspension.

"I've made another call and they will be evaluating the situation further," McGraw said after the game.


Head Coach Shane Weirather said following Saturday's game that he was moving forward as if the Hawks had won and would await a decision from the association.

"That's our understanding is that we won, but we'll see what happens," he said Saturday

Central Lee held a 5-4 lead in the bottom of the sixth inning, but the Falcons tied things in the top of the seventh.

After Central Lee's Chase Johnson set the Falcons down in order in the top of the sixth,



On first call, Hawks were declared winners

West Burlington's Cody Allen did the same in the bottom of the sixth.

Then Caleb Bush singled to lead off the 7th and Lyblii Christofferson came in to courtesy run. Jace Figuereo then singled moving Christofferson, the tying run, into scoring position. Brock Thuleen struck out. That brought Hayden Vandenberg to the plate. Vandenberg had homered in the third inning and has four homers against the Hawks.

Weirather chose to put Vandenberg on with an intentional pass to load the bases with one out.

On a wild pitch, Christopherson tried to score, but was called out on a ruling for not sliding. Christopherson appeared to beat the throw to plate, but collided with catcher Bo Herdrich's arm that was stretched out over the baseline.

Because Christopherson didn't slide for the play, he was ruled out at home and a dead ball was ordered. The speedy Figuereo, seeing the chaos, came all the way around from second and slid into home. But the dead ball rule forced him back to third.

"It all depends on catcher position. If the catcher's up the line they have a right to the plate, but they have to slide and then you had a dead ball on the Figuereo slide so – there was a lot going on there," Weirather said.

Figuereo would eventually score to tie the game on another wild pitch from Johnson. But Allen would fly out to left in the rain to end the inning at 5-all.

Weirather said he would rather take a chance with Allen then pitch to Vandenberg with two on.

"He's just too good, so dangerous. Extra bases off that kid's bat is nothing. Most of the time with high school hitters you see a lot of singles. But shoot, he doubles - home runs - extra bases and that snowballs into their team really getting excited," Weirather said on the decision.

"I think we had a better chance facing the other kid. No disrespect to him, but Hayden really has my respect. He's got maybe four home runs against us this year."

Weirather has also intentionally passed Vandenberg five times this year.

Bo Herdrich worked a walk to lead off the top of the seventh and Hemingson had a strike when a bolt of light-

ning stopped the contest for 30 minutes. IHSAA guidelines require at least 30 minutes suspension after each observation of lightning. The game was called after about 45 minutes of delays.

Both teams put up two runs in the first inning before things settled in. Central Lee got two more in the bottom half of the second sparked by Hemingsen's RBI single that went off a diving Figuereo's glove dribbling into left field.

Vandenberg would cut the lead to one at 4-3 with a solo blast to left center, but that's all the Hawks would give up in the third.

Cory Jones would hit a two-out RBI single in the bottom half of the third to make it a two-run game at 5-3.

West Burlington would get one back when Figuereo's grounder to short drew a high throw to get the senior racing down the line. The two-out error allowed Levi Fletcher-Bates, who singled to open the inning, to score from second.

Both teams went unscathed through the fourth and fifth innings, setting up the sixth inning dramatics.


The Hawks' Gannon Wells and Chase Johnson combined for seven hits and five runs, four earned while striking out seven and walking three. However, neither will be available for Monday's game due to throwing more than 40 pitches Saturday.

West Burlington starter Brady Diewold will be available Monday, but Allen will not. The two allowed five runs, three earned on nine hits and struck out four.

Central Lee's Ryan Roberts is 3-3 with a run scored. Jones is 2-3 with a run scored and an RBI to lead the Hawks at the plate as play stands.

The Disaster Case Management Program is also available for those who have serious needs related to disaster-related hardship, injury, or adverse conditions. Disaster case managers work with clients to create a disaster recovery plan and provide guidance, advice, and referral to obtain a service or resource. There are no income eligibility requirements for this program; it closes 180 days from the date of the governor's proclamation which was signed on June 30, 2023. the bark.

Avenue F was completed blocked by fallen trees and branches.

I drove through some of it to get pictures of that and then headed around Fort Madison. Trees were laying on homes and branches were dangling from power lines.

But then I saw what all communities want to see. The things that give us the warmies as residents of Fort Madison.

Fire Chief Joey Herren out in the storm (without a jacket I might add) talking with residents of homes with heavy damage and trees laying on lines. Fort Madison Police Captain Jamie Carle was out of his cruiser pulling branches off the street to allow motorists, like me, to get through even though being on the streets wasn't the wisest move at that time.I started following the four FMFD fire trucks that were out on calls and investigating damage. I followed one back to Old Settlers Park, where two of the firefighters were cutting branches on Avenue F with a chainsaw, trying to open up roads, while city crews pulled the branches out of the way into a waiting trailer.

Public Works crews drove dump trucks and end loaders around the city picking up the heavy debris.

At one point, power was out across the city. Mine was restored at about 6 p.m. My internet didn't come back on until Saturday morning.

That sucked because I had to do Pen City Current off a mobile hotspot, which wasn't nearly as fast as our home internet.

I also couldn't stream TV so I had to break my binge watching of The Rookie.

I get that through Hulu and it's a decent series. Those are so hard to find anymore. I typically have television on in the background to help balance my brain. I know it's weird, but silence can be deafening to me at times and I look to the comfort of the television in the background.

I started calling around to get information from

officials that are responsible for getting us up and running as a community or collective communities.

Jason Dinwiddie told me there were no confirmed tornadoes, but there were straightline winds that were above 80 mph consistently and possibly 110 to 120 mph gusts.

Sheesh.

"I can't go 50 feet without running into something bad," Dinwiddie said.

"This is the worst I've ever seen in Montrose."
Keokuk got banged around pretty heavily, as well, and some areas were still without power on Saturday.

I've talked with friends who are still without electricity and internet Satuday afternoon, which can be very frustrating for sure. I offered laundry services and a place to get internet and some cooler air, but people are resilient.

That resliency was in full display Thursday and Friday into the weekend. Even with a holiday weekend upon us, our resources were hard at work getting things back to normal as soon as possible.

Fort Madison Mayor Matt Mohrfeld said he was proud of how quickly staff got to putting the city back together. We agree. It gave us all the feels to see a city plan coming to bear on a pretty large problem.

Good work to everyone. Also good work to Jacob Goldstick, Doug Frenz, and the team at Sheaffer Memorial Golf Course. The course is in pretty darned good shape this year. I had my best round ever this weekend, so you know that course was in good shape. But that's Beside the Point.
