Iowa Legislators move quickly on fetal abortion law

DES MOINES - On Tuesday Iowa House Republicans passed House File 732 to protect the lives of unborn children.

HF 732 restricts abortion after a fetal heartbeat is detected by an abdominal ultrasound unless there is a medical emer-

gency or the pregnancy is the result of rape and incest. Representative Shannon Lundgren (R-Peosta) led the bill through the Iowa House.

"This bill protects unborn children in Iowa," said Lund-

gren. "This bill sets a clear standard where the state has an interest in the life of a child – when the baby's heart starts beating. Where there is a heartbeat - there is life."

Speaker Pat Grassley (R- New Hartford) said the bill is another promise kept to Iowans.

"Iowans know we are a pro-life caucus and they have continued to grow our majority," said Grassley. "While Demo-

SUPERVISORS Former chair gives warning to board on pipeline

LEE COUNTY - A dire warning came from a familiar face at Monday's Lee County Board of Supervisors' meeting.

Former Supervisor Don Hunold spoke to supervisors regarding his concerns about the proposed carbon sequestration pipeline through Lee County.

Hunold gave a stark warning to the board, and to the public in general, about not only the political fallout of eminent domain being considered for the pipeline, but also the dangers of the structure.

"Judas Priest, West Point you'd be dead.

If it goes where they say it's going to go, if there's any wind at all, they're all going to be dead," Hunold said regarding a rupture in the pipeline.



"It's really kinda sad."

Hunold said only 13.9% of landowners have signed onto the pipeline's easement request and the rest have not agreed to allow the pipeline to go through private land.

Navigator, Summit and Wolf, all companies that have submitted plans to the Iowa Utility Board for approval are hoping to capture carbon dioxide from fertilizer plants in the Midwest and bury deep under ground.

But opponents are making headway in the fight to prevent the pipeline, including the company's use of eminent domain. That tactic has been granted in the past for companies that are serving the public good. Opponents are saying the carbon levels in the atmosphere are some of the lowest on record and capturing the carbon dioxide isn't necessary, therefore no public good is being undertaken. Supervisor Ron Fedler said he's confirmed that Illinois has declined Navigator's permit application in that state, leaving the company with no place to sequester the liquidized carbon dioxide. "They said they were going to run the pipeline under the river and into Illinois

Reynolds to sign bill into law Friday

crats across the country continue to devalue the life of an unborn child, Iowa House Republicans are following through on our promise to protect life."

Gov. Kim Reynolds released the following statement in response to the Iowa Legislature passing the heartbeat bill:

"Today, the Iowa legislature once again voted to protect life and end abortion at a heartbeat, with exceptions for rape, incest, and life of the mother."

"The Iowa Supreme Court questioned whether this legislature would pass the same law they did in 2018, and today they have a clear answer. The voices of Iowans and their democratically elected representatives cannot be ignored any longer, and justice for the unborn should not be delayed."

"As a pro-life Governor, I am also committed to continuing policies to support women in planning for motherhood, promote the importance of fatherhood, and encourage strong families. Our state and country will be stronger because of it."

Gov. Reynolds plans to sign the bill on Friday, July 14, 2023.

HF 732 passed the Iowa House with a vote of 56-34.

Illinois declines pipeline permit

and I've heard Illinois declined them the permit," Fedler said.

Hunold confirmed that statement saying the state of Illinois had declined the permit application.

Plans initially included running the pipeline into southwestern Illinois and pumping deep into the bedrock where it will dissipate over centuries.

But Fedler said he doesn't believe the company ever intended on burying the carbon but converting it to methane and selling it as an alternative fuel.

Hunold said the carbon being pulled from fertilizer facilities across the state and into South Dakota is some of the purest forms of carbon. Iowa Fertilizer Co. is one of the plants that has indicated it would be hooking up to the CO2 pipeline to minimize its carbon footprint and take advantage of federal tax credits.

"Right at this point, they have no place to sequester that CO2. South Dakota is the same way. There's a huge land dispute up there and I think it went to the Supreme Court and they won it," Hunold said.

"So the question is, if they can't put it anywhere, is it dead in its tracks? I don't know."

Supervisor Chairman Garry Seyb said there are some tight time limits on these permits and he thinks there may be some end runs in the works to get it done.

"There's a push right now to get people to sign up," Seyb said.

Hunold said he heard at a meeting he attended in Fort Dodge over the weekend, that people are saying the counties have the most power.

An opponent of the pipeline told Supervisors in June that he's working with an attorney who's looking to get a county in Iowa to sign on as the plaintiff in a suit against the Iowa Utility Board regarding its actions permitting the pipeline work to continue.


"According to the folks up there, the most power lies within the counties," Hunold said. He said there were more than 200 people at the Fort Dodge meeting.

Governor Reynolds recently replaced two members of the IUB and those two are already functioning on the board.

Hunold said legislation proposed at the Iowa Capitol has moved through the House, but always gets hung up in the Senate.

"They get slow-walked pretty bad. I don't know you tell me, but my opinion is that something is not right here," Hunold said.

"If they got my rights (regarding his land), they got yours."

Great River launches new home dialysis system

WEST BURLINGTON - When you are told you have kidney failure and need treatment to stay alive, it can be a difficult time in your life. According to the National Kidney Foundation, 660,000 people in the United States live with kidney failure. Finding the right care and support and learning about the treatment options available to you is the first step in living with this condition.

Dialysis is one of those treatment options. Hemodialysis is a treatment that replaces the work of kidneys to clear wastes and extra fluid from the blood using a special filter called a dialyzer or artificial kidney. Blood travels through plastic tubing to the dialyzer, where it is cleaned and then returned into the body. Most people with kidney failure visit a dialysis center, like Southeastern Renal Dialysis, multiple times a week for hemodialysis treatments.

Another relatively new alternative is home hemodialysis which follows the same basic process, but the patient and a care partner are trained to do the dialysis treatment in the home.

Southeast Iowa Regional Medical Center Nephrology in partnership with Southeastern Renal Dialysis started training their first patient for home hemodialysis in August of 2022. They received certification from the State of Iowa for a home hemodialysis program in January of 2023. They currently have four patients trained to perform home hemodialysis with capacity to grow the program. They are currently using Outset Medical's Tablo Hemodialysis System.

Tablo is a hemodialysis machine designed to improve patient experience and outcomes. It's a mobile system that fits seamlessly in patients' homes, requiring only tap water and an electrical outlet to work. The easy-to-use, automated device wirelessly connects with the patient's health care team, enabling real-time remote treatment monitoring and reducing the record-keeping burden for the patient.

Dr. Maria Story is a nephrologist overseeing the program at Southeast Iowa Regional Medical Center. She explains the benefits home hemodialysis provides patients in addition to the convenience factor,

"It is unclear exactly why, but patients tell us they feel substantially better using the Tablo machine compared to using a dialysis machine in center. Patients report less cramping, muscle cramping is very common in dialysis, less fatigue, and better sleep among others. People doing home hemodialysis generally dialyze four days per week as compared to three days per week at the dialysis unit. They have improved management of fluid accumulation on the body and some of their lab work also is under better control, which allows people to be a little bit more flexible with their diet."

Other benefits reported include taking less medication to control blood pressure, bone disease and anemia, having fewer and shorter hospital stays, and enjoying better quality of life.

Tim Torgler was one of the first Southeastern Renal Dialysis patients to be trained to use home hemodialysis and started in-home treatments in September of 2022. He shares why he chose home hemodialysis.

"Home hemodialysis is a great option to consider if you work or have a busy schedule. The ability to perform the dialysis on alternating days and on off hours allows you to continue to participate in family and other outings which are difficult when you are doing in-center dialysis. Home hemodialysis allows you the freedom to continue to enjoy more opportunities and have your dialysis in the comfort of your own home."

Home hemodialysis is not a good fit for everyone. Dr. Story explains further, "We have a team-based approach to evaluating potential candidates, which includes Dialysis Nurse, Social Worker, Nurse Practitioner, and Physicians. Patients need to be physically and mentally able to perform their own bility for their own health and be willing to commit to doing dialysis treatments at home independently. They need a clean and stable living environment. Most people will have a care partner, which can be a spouse, parent, adult child, or close friend that will participate in training with them and be available to assist during home hemodialysis treatments."

Like in-center hemodialysis, home hemodialysis is covered by insurance. "Any patient who has end-stage renal disease will have Medicare insurance, even if they are under age 65. Medicare will cover any dialysis modality, which includes home hemodialysis, peritoneal dialysis also performed by the patient, at home, and in-center hemodialysis," commented Dr. Story.

Southeastern Renal Dialysis (SRD) is an organization jointly owned by Jefferson County Health Center, Henry County Health Center, and Southeast Iowa Regional Medical Center with dialysis centers in Iowa in Fairfield, Mount Pleasant, West Burlington, Fort Madison and Keokuk. They currently have 160 patients receiving hemodialysis at all of the locations.

Mr. Torgler explains why he chose Southeastern Renal Dialysis.

"The staff and providers at SRD are like family. They provide excellent care for their patients, and truly care about you and your wellbeing."

Southeast Iowa Regional Medical Center Nephrology Clinic's physicians and advance practice professionals diagnose and treat kidney disease. They provide proven treatments that may include medicine and diet management of underlying conditions. After beginning treatment, patients can expect to continue seeing a nephrologist throughout their lives.

People living with kidney failure should talk to their nephrologist about the best treatment option for them. But for patients in Southeast Iowa, it is nice to know those options include home hemodialysis.
