MEDIACOM: Rep says Mediacom may apply for state funding for county expansion

LEE COUNTY - While Lee County looks to expand broadband service with one local provider, a larger, more regional internet provider is looking at capitalizing on government funding to bring better service to the area.

Another round of broadband expansion under the Empower Rural Iowa Broadband Grant program has opened an Invitation to Qualify process for the next round of funding.

Mediacom is now working on preparing an application for that funding to expand services in southern Lee County for unserved and underserved homes and businesses.

Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission Executive Director Mike Norris said Mediacom sent him a letter expressing their interest in applying for funds for the south Broadband Intervention Zone, known as Lee County Broadband Expansion Zone #2 with the state's Office of the Chief Information Officer. The Notice of

Big Ten moves sound like a good idea

It did sound good, anyway. It was a little more than a week ago when we were sitting on the field at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, listening to new Big Ten commissioner Tony Petitti speak at the conference's football media days.

Colorado was getting ready to move from the Pac-12 to the Big 12, so naturally Petitti was asked about any further expansion plans for the conference with USC and UCLA coming into the league next season.

Nope, Petitti said.

"What I'll say is all the direction I'm getting from leadership, our presidents and chancellors, athletic directors, is to focus on UCLA and USC," Petitti said.

The conference had released its 2024 and 2025 football schedules, with every school playing everyone else once in a two-year period.

Petitti was so proud of that.

"I think it touches on all the right things," he said. "We have significant work to do on scheduling of other sports, especially our Olympic sports, to come up with the best solutions. I believe we have a good plan in motion. I think we'll learn from it. Like anything, there will be tweaks and changes. Overall that's really where we are." The final sentence seemed so final. More Internet work could be coming to south Lee County

Funding Opportunity is the eighth generated out of the Empower Rural Iowa effort.

Norris said Mediacom is looking to enhance service to about 4,500 addresses in Iowa, many in the south Lee County area.

A spokesperson for Mediacom confirmed the efforts Monday afternoon in an email to Pen City Current.

She wrote this round of funding is different than previous rounds because the state has identified the Intervention Zones through past Invitations to Qualify. "One of the ITQ projects we are interested in applying for and building is a rural area located immediately north and west of Keokuk. Mediacom already has fiber optic facilities in and around Keokuk. As part of our application, we are proposing to service over 80% of the homes and businesses located in that zone with fiberto-the-home (FTTH) broadband that can support gigabit internet speeds both downstream and upstream," she wrote.

"As part of the application process, we are reaching out to community leaders in an effort

to obtain local support for our project application. We are confident that, if funded, this project would drastically improve the ability of residents to connect to the internet and create remote work, study, and healthcare opportunities for them."

The new funding is in a program called Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) 8.

Danville Telecom received funding under NOFO 6 with a partnership with Southeast Iowa Regional and Economic Port Authority and Lee County to build a resiliency loop in the same service area. Danville is also going to use \$1.2 million of the county's America Rescue Plan Act money to run FTTH to about 135 residents in Wever, rural Wever, and Green Bay Bottoms.

Supervisors OK broadband pivot

LEE COUNTY - A change in direction in broadband improvements underway in Lee County was approved by supervisors without much discussion Monday.

Southeast Iowa Regional and Economic Port Authority administrator Mike Norris made a brief update to supervisors about the changes to a plan that was originally set to build a fiber optic backbone up through Lee County from Keokuk to Hwy. 16 and then east to Hwy. 61. That project would have provided internet to 125 unserved customers on 57 miles of backbone.

The project would have created just under \$1 million in lease payments back to SIREPA over 10 years.

However, due to a 39% increase over projected costs of the project, Danville Mutual Telephone Co., the company that would be providing the broadband service, had to pivot to a less costly option.

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The company secured \$1.9 million in America Rescue Plan Act funding from the county to trigger another \$3.5 million in state grants to expand the infrastructure in the county.

The state grant came from the Office of the Chief Information Officer. That office had to approve the changes, then SIREPA had to approve the changes, and finally supervisors had to give approval.

Norris said the next thing to do to drive at the original purpose of the effort, which was to provide service to unserved and underserved while at the same time creating the redundant capabilities for Danville Telecom, was to retool the plan to fit current budgeting.

"We brought in Danville Telecom, as well as remaining in constant contact with SIREPA liaisons to the board in Tom (Schultz) and Garry (Seyb), we had a couple meetings to really see how we could drive the purpose and make it affordable to the resources we had," Norris said.

The new project will serve more addresses than the original project, but with the backbone being the expensive part it was shrunk down to the point where the resiliency was maintained but at a lower cost, he said.

"We will serve 134 addresses now. We're looking at 14 miles of backbone, but still creating the resiliency that we set out to do in the first place. The cost is going to be a little bit lower."

He said the county's ARPA funds will still be used for a match, but then direct spent to run fiber optics directly to homes in the Wever area.

Supervisors had no questions about the change in plans despite the project changing substantially. The fiber optic upgrade will now include a redundant loop from Keokuk to Argyle that is currently under construction. That gives Danville more reliable service to customers as well as cellphone towers.

Danville Telephone CEO Tim Fencl told supervisors that his company provides data service to more than 30 cell towers and this infrastructure helps solidify that service as well.

Fencl said Danville Telecom serves about 230 businesses with fiber service

Big Ten trying to pull nationwide television market

Big Ten added two more teams, Oregon and Washington, picking at the carcass of the conference it helped mortally wound a couple of years ago.

The fascinating part of the whole two days in the Indianapolis was a commissioner and coaches talking about "guardrails" for the earning power of their players through name-image-likeness deals, when in fact the only guardrails out there need to be on big conferences careening down roads, carving each other up for TV money.

No, a quarterback can't get a nice deal from a car dealership in exchange for appearing in an ad or two, but schools can pack their checkbooks with money from FOX or ESPN, the puppet masters of all of these moves over the years, and we're fine with that.

I believe in the free market, I truly do. Adding USC and UCLA, despite all of the hand-wringing that went with it, made sense as the Big Ten was trying to negotiate a new media rights package, because it meant the conference had a foothold in the nation's top four media markets. And while we worried about the Trojans and the Bruins traveling around the country for games in every sport, and schools from the East Coast and the Midwest going to them, it was those schools who went to the Big Ten for help, not the other way around.

And you can make an argument for adding Oregon and Washington, because it gives USC and UCLA some West Coast neighbors, easing a bit of the travel burden. Two more teams in the Western time zone now help fill that last open TV window on late Saturday night, although you know it's not going to be Ohio State, Michigan or Penn State playing until after midnight in Seattle or Eugene or Los Angeles.

Yes, the Pac-12 screwed the Pac-12. Poor leadership put the conference in its own mess, and poor leadership failed to put together a media rights package that was good enough to keep everyone together.

But it could have been just as easy for the Big Ten to sit out this round of expansion chess moves, to stay at 16, count the money, and wait to see what happens everywhere else. The league could have been choosy — yes, waiting on Notre Dame is futile — but upheaval somewhere else could have found some better partners.

We don't know what the media landscape will look like when the current Big Ten deal expires. ESPN is having its money issues. FOX seems to have deep pockets, but eventually it will have other deals to make with professional sports leagues. NBC and CBS are willing participants, but how much more money can they bring?

And while everyone seems to think there's money in the Amazon Prime and Apple TV world, that might be on shaky ground.

Iowa fans were among everyone else cackling on Friday at the Pac-12's misfortune. But there are a lot of new voices in the Big Ten, and who's to say some of them won't be whispering in the ears of the old guard of the conference in a few years, wondering if the league really needs the TV markets of Des Moines or Omaha or Minneapolis. Why split the money 18 or 20 ways when you can split it 14 or 16?

Sound far-fetched? Well, yeah. But it was also far-fetched not long ago that Iowa would be playing a Big Ten football game at USC or UCLA would be coming to Kinnick Stadium, and here we are.

And if it seems all so far away, remember that a conference commissioner was saying the league was happy with 16 teams, and then a week later those same presidents said yes to two more.

It did sound good, though.

Wever to get focus of Danville build-out

including Iowa Fertilizer. Additionally, they serve 31 cell towers.

"The redundancy gives us the ability to serve those cell towers even if we have a fiber cut. We serve those with up to 10G of data service and if we have this ran, that creates that redundancy so even in a bad situation, those towers stay online," Fencl said.

"This also allows us the ability to cover locations in Green Bay bottoms and also expand into Wever and rural Wever with more locations than we originally talked about."

The grant now entails \$400,000 of ARPA funds to build the resiliency loop with state and private funds making up the rest of the project. The rest of the county money will be spent on running direct fiber cabling to homes in the Wever area.

Supervisor Seyb said he was happy that the project was able to be kept on track and get some expansion in Lee County.

"We've experienced the problems associated with inflationary costs, specifically with the Lee County Health Department building, so it shouldn't be unexpected to see these modifications happening."

about the need to add staff, but are struggling to find candidates.

"I'm just hoping we can get the word out. What we heard here today, I really think there are opportunities here in Lee County and I think it's important that we get the word out to our younger generation, high school students, and college students, that we are here, and we have great paying jobs," Seyb said.

Seyb said the county has a great working environment with great pay and solid benefits.

"Whether it be with our IT Department, emergency medical, sheriff's department, attorney's office or even engineers with our major companies in the county," he said.

"Everybody is hiring. When I drive down the road in Keokuk all I see is hiring all the way down. I see the hirings in the paper at all the different businesses....everybody is hiring. These are not low-paying starting jobs. These are high paying jobs. So I'm encouraging everyone to take a look at us."

Supervisor Tom Schulz said he's hearing at economic development meetings that employers are looking at adding \$31 million in payroll to this county.

"That's significant. That number is massive and I just hope we can fill the jobs." Schulz said.

Seyb said parents need to pay attention and talk to their kids, saying it would be great to see our kids making more money than we made.

"These jobs, those folks are making more than I'm making. I can tell you that," Seyb said.

He said the effort needs to continue to focus on freshmen, sophomores and juniors so they can

go get what they need in their first couple years of college so they can be prepared to grab those spots.

He said blue collar jobs are also in high demand. "Tried to get a plumber on short notice lately?" Seyb asked.

Supervisor Chuck Holmes said the staffing in the child care industry is also becoming a critical issue.

He referred to the YMCA's announcement this past week that they are closing two child care centers in Donnellson.

"They didn't close because they didn't have the clients, they could'nt find the employees to staff the place," he said.

Seyb said anyone who's willing to work can find a job in the county.

Braden said he was struggling to find a fourth Assistant County Attorney. Thomas Gage held the position but resigned in May. Braden said he immediately started advertising for the position but has not received a single application for the spot.

Braden said the case load in Lee County is close to the case load in Des Moines County and he could use five or six attorneys in the office, but wasn't asking for that.

Harter said he wanted to hire another IT professional for South Lee County staff and had it in his budget this year to bring the person on. The board approved the measure 4-0 with Schulz abstaining because he hadn't seen numbers to show that the department could maintain the salary of another person.

Schulz said each department could use more staff, but at the end of the day there has to be revenue to support the payroll and benefits of each new position.
