FORT MADISON: Tri State Rodeo officials are announcing a Special Ticket Alert. Wednesday Night and Friday Night ticket availability is extremely limited.

In the case of a sellout, we will offer a limited amount of "General Admission – Standing Room Only" tickets. DeSantis needs diplomacy in his plans for Mexico cartels

Campaigning for public office is no picnic. Day after day there are speeches, Q&A's, interviews and the constant need to think before you speak.

Candidates eat enough chicken to have Colonel Sanders clucking approval. But for those who speak before engaging their brains, their other item on the menu often is crow.

The miscues are not the sole province of one party's candidates to the exclusion of the other's. Ask Hillary Clinton about that basket of deplorables. Ask Abby Finkenauer if she now wishes she had chosen a different way to express displeasure with a judge's ruling on a challenge to her nomination papers.

In recent days, Ron DeSantis pledged that if elected president, he will send United States military forces into Mexico to deal with the drug cartels "on day one."

"The president of the United States has got to use all available powers as commander in chief to protect our country and to protect the people," he said during last week's Republican debate. A few days later in Iowa, he reiterated that promise.

Just as Clinton and Finkenauer neglected to put their brains in gear and carefully think through what they wanted to say before opening their mouths, DeSantis may be guilty of relying too much on his mouth's automatic trans-

RANDOLPH: Senior gets back on floor to exact revenge on Nikes

WAPELLO - Senior Natalie Randolph hadn't played Burlington Notre Dame since the Nikes knocked off HTC at the state tournament her sophomore year.

She sat on the sidelines her junior year after suffering an injury in the preseason in 2022, but she never rotated out of the lineup in the three matches Tuesday at the Wapello

And she helped the Crusaders to the title including a 25-23, 25-15 win over the Nikes in the championship match.

"That was definitely big, I haven't played Notre Dame since

they beat us in the state tournament so it was something I was looking forward too, Randolph said.

"It's definitely a great feeling to be back on the floor with my friends. I think we're moving well and really connecting, and I'm excited about the season."

Randolph is playing in a full leg brace but said it wasn't restricting her movement too much.

The Crusaders went 4-0 including wins over Columbus, Central Lee and Wilton in Pool B setting up the title match with the Nikes.

The Nikes advanced to the title match going 3-0 through

Central Lee struggles at Wapello Invitational

pool play, but gave up a 17-21 loss to host Wapello before rolling to a 15-6 tiebreaker win to advance to the championship.

HTC Head Coach Melissa Freesmeier said the Nikes are never to be taken lightly and the first set showed that.

"You're gonna get their best game every time. They play great defense, are very tenacious and they have big hitters in the front row," Freesmeier said.

"That first set let us know we can go against adversity and comeback to win against a good team."

The Crusaders jumped out to a 6-1 early lead behind Randolph's six straight points from the service line in the first set. A block up front by sophomore Presley Myers gave the Crusaders the early margin. Myers had 85 blocks from the middle as a freshman last year.

The Nikes would rally to tie the game at 9 and then the two perennial rivals, arguably two of the best Class 1A programs in the state, showed why going back and forth with ties at 10, 15, 16, 17, and 18 before senior Mary Kate Bendlage hit a kill from midcourt to midcourt to give HTC a 20-18 lead. Randolph would get a kill to make it 21-18 with the title match going to 25 points per set.

Notre Dame would put another run together to tie things at 29 after a Myers kill gave HTC a one-point lead. A tip from the Crusader side would fall just outside the line to tie things up. Myers would then get what could be a patented kill off a Randolph set in the middle to make it 24-23 and Taegan Denning would get the next service point for the win.

The Crusaders would run away in the second set with the Nikes never getting closer than five after trailing 7-2 early on.

Myers said the weekend tournament gave the Crusaders energy for Tuesday. "We went 3-3 this weekend and the whole first pool we went 3-0. Then we got an awakening. That, losing those games, gave us the adrenaline we needed for this

In the second set of the match with HTC, Central Lee tied things up at 16 when junior Kylie Fortune got a kill from the right side. The Hawks and Crusaders would stay tied at 17 and 18, but a kill from Bendlage deep gave HTC a one-point lead and then two errors on the Hawks' side gave the Crusaders that match.

Randolph and Mary Kate Bendlage were both 43-49 attacking with Bendlage racking up 21 kills to Randolph's 19 on the night. Myers had 23 kills to lead HTC. Randolph had 36 assists and was 63-63 serving with 12 aces. Bendlage had 30 digs and Randolph had 29.



Fort Madison ladies can't overcome slow start

WASHINGTON — Fort Madison volleyball coach Kelly Knustrom called a timeout in the second set of Tuesday's game against Washington to deliver a message to her team.

And while it didn't help the Bloodhounds in their three-set loss, Knustrom hopes they listened and learned from the message.

The 25-19, 26-24, 25-13 loss to the Demons in the Southeast Conference opener for both teams dropped the Bloodhounds to 0-7. But Knustrom knows the season is still early.

It's all about getting to a fast start, she said, and that was something she said to the Bloodhounds in the second set, when they were down 11-10.

"I thought we started every game a little slow," Knustrom said. "I would have liked to have seen us come out a little more ready to play right from the get-go. It seemed like we wanted to settle in, and I don't think you can do that, ever."

The Bloodhounds had enough fire in them to be close late in the first two sets. They were down 17-16 in the first set before the Demons scored six of the next seven points to take control.

Then, after Knustrom's timeout, the Bloodhounds led 22-20, and then fought to tie the match at 23-all and 24-all before surrendering the final two points on kills from Taylor Miksch and Leighton Messinger.

"I hoped we were going to pull it off," Knustrom said. "We played so well in that game and showed a lot of fight, and I was hoping we could get that one.

"We have the capabilities. We have the tools. We just have to dig down, and want it a little more than the other team."

Washington then dominated the third set. The Demons got off to a 9-4 lead, then later had a seven-point run that included three consecutive aces from Ella Greiner to take a 21-7 lead.

"I was glad that we kept fighting in that third game," Knustrom said. "Washington didn't want to go more than three (sets) and they proved it from the beginning. Kudos to them taking the momentum from Game 2. I thought we still had some swings left in us, and we did some good things."

Ajia Jenkins and Taylor Johnson each had seven kills for the Bloodhounds. Mara Smith had 18 assists. Elle Ruble had eight digs.

Jenkins was 9-of-10 serving. Ruble was 9-of-11 serving, while Smith was 8-of-10.

There will be food and drink vendors, retail vendors, and many interactive activities as well. Tickets are required for each night and include admission to all scheduled events for that day (including both the rodeo and concerts).

Each night of the rodeo will be hosted by 4x Pro Rodeo Announcer of the Year, Boyd Polhamus, and 10-time PRCA Clown of The Year Justin Rumford. Also performing will be Cowboy Kenny's Steel Rodeo. Cowboy Kenny is a high-flying freestyle motocross rider who has won 10 medals at the X Games and Gravity Games and seven World Championships, including the Van's Triple Crown and Dew Tours.!

Is sending troops into deal with cartels in Mexico a good idea

on drugs" for 50 years. No one suggests the Biden administration's approach to the problem represents the gold standard.

But do we really believe sending U.S. troops into another nation without invitation is the best way to deal effectively with problems illegal drugs cause — especially when that country is not our enemy?

We should not be surprised when a candidate whose campaign slogan is "Never Back Down" engages in such dangerous talk about using military force.

DeSantis' strategy illustrates that one of the pitfalls of political campaigns is the tendency of candidates to see easy solutions for incredibly complex problems. Build the wall. Raise the minimum wage. Cut taxes. Eliminate homelessness.

There are many complexities that DeSantis' military pledge fails to foresee or to account for — namely, the effect military action south of the border would have on trade between our two nations.

Last year, Mexico was the second-largest buyer of U.S. goods behind Canada. Customers in Mexico paid \$324 billion to American producers, according to U.S. Trade Office figures. Mexico also was the second-largest supplier of goods companies brought into the United States in 2022. Those purchases totaled \$454 billion.

Together, that is three-quarters of a trillion dollars in U.S. economic activity that would be jeopardized by an ill-conceived deployment of U.S. troops to Mexico. Think about U.S. jobs and consumer prices.

Another aspect of the complex nature of the drug problem is why the U.S. buys so much from Mexico. The cost of living is lower in Mexico. That fact means goods produced in there cost Americans less than if there were produced here in the U.S., and Americans like the bargain.

Beyond the statistics are some facts DeSantis' Never Back Down pledge ne-

or third-largest buyer of U.S. ag products, depending upon the year. Mexico also is the largest foreign exporter of fruits and vegetables that American consumers eat.

DeSantis is kidding himself, and his campaign audiences, too, if he thinks drug lords will give up the lucrative U.S. drug market once our soldiers are airlifted south of the border. U.S. soldiers and Marines can take out enough drug peddlers to several cemeteries, but there will be another wave of producers and peddlers waiting to take over. The demand for illegal drugs by customers in the U.S., and the profit the cartels make from those drugs, has a way of replenishing the workforce.

Figures from U.S. Customs and Border Protection figures show that thus far in 2023, eight times more fentanyl is seized at ports of entry on the U.S./Mexico border than is confiscated by Border Patrol agents stopping people sneaking into the U.S. between the official crossings.

It also is a misconception that most drugs are seized from immigrants or asylum-seekers trying to cross from Mexico into the U.S., National Public Radio reported recently. Yes, illegal drugs sometimes are concealed inside trucks hauling legitimate cargo. More often, though, drugs are stashed in passenger cars or on or in the bodies of pedestrians trying to enter the U.S. at official crossing points. More than half of those smugglers are American citizens or other people legally authorized to cross the border, NPR said.

"I've been at this for over 36 years, and it's been like that forever," Michael Humphries, the U.S. port of entry director in Nogales, Ariz., told NPR.

The brute-strength strategy of DeSantis' Never Back Down message leaves little or no room for diplomacy. Do we really want a leader who believes he has cornered the market on all the good ideas — without first seeing what can be achieved through the give-and-take of discussions with our Mexican counterparts?

Taking military action against our neighbor is a "solution" that most assuredly will create as many problems as it solves.

No one disputes that illegal drugs bring heartache and death to too many U.S. families. But how can that death and destruction compare with what we will see if our military forces storm across the border or are airlifted into our neighbor's backyard?

Theodore Roosevelt did not campaign on a Never Back Down approach to governing. I think many Americans, if they are itching for a slogan at all, would prefer Teddy's "Speak softly and carry a big stick."


