READY TO GO: Conservation group unveils new ADA compliant trail in WP

WEST POINT - A new \$430,000 ADA-compliant trail that connects Pollmiller Park's east parking lot with West Point's South Park is officially open after more than five years of planning.

Lee County Conservation Director Heather Huebner welcomed Lee County officials, staff from Jones Contracting, the Fort Madison Chamber of Commerce Ambassadors, and community members at the west end of the trail for a

ribbon-cutting Wednesday afternoon.

The new trail is a resurfacing of the former trail that had deteriorated over the years. It also has a new trailhead that is safer for trail users on the park's east side.

"This is a project that exemplifies the power of collaboration, dedication, and commitment to the environment," Huebner said.

"This trail, which winds through the heart of Pollmiller Park into beautiful West Point, is the culmination of hard work and the generous support of three important partners."

Governor Reynolds touts \$1.8 billion surplus for 2023

DES MOINES - Today, Gov. Kim Reynolds announced the State of Iowa will end Fiscal Year 2023 with a balance of \$1.83 billion in the General Fund, \$902 million in reserve funds and \$2.74 billion in the Taxpayer Relief Fund.

"Some see a surplus as government not spending enough, but I view it as an over collection from the hard-working men and women of Iowa," said Gov. Kim Reynolds. "We've seen what the powerful combination of growth-oriented policies and fiscal restraint can create, and now it's time for Iowans to directly receive the benefits. I look forward to cutting taxes again next legislative session and returning this surplus back to where it belongs - the people of Iowa."

"As a result of the Governor's great budget management, we are in an extremely strong financial position, making it possible to meet the needs of Iowans while leaving more money in the pockets of Iowa taxpayers," said Kraig Paulsen, Director of the Department of Management.

Last week, Gov. Reynolds announced that Iowa's corporate tax rate will drop to 7.1 percent from 8.4 percent for Tax Year 2024 due to corporate tax receipts exceeding \$700 million.

IWD looking for work-based school projects

DES MOINES - Iowa Workforce Development and the Iowa Department of Education today announced the second round of the Build Iowa's Future Design Challenge, a unique opportunity for K-12 students to create innovative projects, connect to careers and compete for up to \$1,000 in prizes for their schools. Community Colleges for Iowa, Master Builders of Iowa (MBI) and Pella Corporation are sponsoring the challenge awards.

The Iowa Clearinghouse for Work-Based Learning and the Home Builders Association of Iowa (HBA of Iowa) are hosting the challenge to provide a framework for professional project development as well as resources for participating schools, including activities and videos about careers in building trades and information about how the challenge aligns with Iowa's K-12 math and science standards.

"The Build Iowa's Future Design Challenge is a great opportunity to unleash new creativity, helping Iowa students connect what they learn in the classroom to the workplace while exploring careers in the trades and other fields," said Beth Townsend, Executive Director of Iowa Workforce Development. "We want all students, regardless of where they reside in the state, to have opportunities that develop innovation, problem solving and teamwork as well as awareness of the many great jobs available right here in Iowa."

"Every student should have access to multiple pathways to post-secondary success," said Iowa Department of Education Director McKenzie Snow. "Experiential learning opportunities like the Build Iowa's Future Design Challenge empower students to leverage math and science in real-world scenarios, while cultivating their creativity and problem-solving skills. We are excited to see students across Iowa applying their knowledge and exploring these in-demand careers."

"With approximately 7.5 million construction jobs projected nationwide by 2026, and ongoing industry expansion, we want students to explore those opportunities for great-paying jobs. This project makes that introduction in a creative way," said HBA of Iowa Executive Officer Jay Iverson. "Our members are excited to see what students are able to come up with."

"The Governor's STEM Advisory Council is always on the lookout for strengthening our partnership with allies of like mission and goals," said Jeff Weld, executive director of the Governor's STEM Advisory Council within the Iowa Department of Education. "The design challenge is a perfect match in that regard and we're honored to support the event."

Who can participate:

Elementary and middle school students can participate in the Iowa Home Design Challenge by constructing a model home using toy plastic construction bricks, wood blocks or other materials of their choice. High school students can participate in the Iowa Dream and Design Challenge, which involves conceptualizing and designing a project that could improve the quality of life in their community. High school students will seek feedback on the project's feasibility from people who would be impacted, and create a design based on their findings. Construction is not a requirement of this opportunity, but great engagement by communities may encourage high school students to take the project further.

Application process:

Teachers are invited to submit a form letter of intent to participate on the Clearinghouse website by Friday, Oct. 20, 2023. Submission of the form letter by the deadline is required. In early May 2024, three awards - \$1,000 for first place, \$500 for second place and \$300 for third place – will be made to schools in each of the K-5, 6-8 and 9-12 grade bands for projects scored and selected by reviewers. Outstanding designs may be shared on Clearinghouse and HBA of Iowa websites and through other publications and events.

She thanked Lee County Conservation, the Department of Natural Resource for a Land and Water Conservation Grant, the supervisors, and the conservation department.

"The grant funds from DNR helped with resources to construct the trail. It was through grants like these that we can protect and enhance our environment by offering our community a place to exercise and enjoy the great outdoors," she said.

She said the trail will stand as a testament to the Supervisors' commitment to the well being of the people of Lee County.

The combination of environmental stewardship and community development was the work of the Lee County Conservation district. Huebner said the trail is a shining example of that collaboration.

Jones Contracting Co. of West Point was awarded the contract for the new trail. French-Roenneker and Associates of Fairfield designed the new trail.

Supervisor Ron Fedler said the park is a result of Al Pollmiller's donation to the county. Fedler said Delbert Bullard also donated about four acres of land to create the current day park.

"I grew up in West Point and I walked this trail as a little girl in school and high school. It was always a part of my life. I saw that it was starting to go down and was like, 'Okay, if I die, I want my memorial to go to this trail," said former West Point resident Sally Boyer.

"It made a big impact. So to see this happen, it's just beautiful. I didn't know it was happening, but it is really appreciated and makes a different to our health, to our kids, and to our families."

West Point Mayor Joe
Loving said the city is
still working on grants to
allow a matching connection to Eighth Street.
Right now a four-foot
sidewalk runs from the
end of that street to where
the new trail starts.

"We've lost a couple grants, but we're still trying to get the money," Loving said.

West Point City Administrator Randy Welding said a REAP grant has been received, but the city is still looking for additional grant support for the trail.

Supervisor Chuck Holmes said a grant from Climax Molybdenum will bring in identifiers of the trees along the route through QR coding technology.

"There was an extern this past summer that researched all the trees and put the signage and QR codes. Those codes will bring up all the information so those wanting to learn about trees, this will be a great place to do it."

Tom Pollpeter, a Lee County Conservation board member said the agenda at his very first meeting as a board member included this trail discussion.

"This is great for Lee County. It's another great tool for our toolbox to keep and retain people. That's important to quality of life."

BURLINGTON — Fort Madison's volleyball team loves the five-set matches.

Two in two days, though, might have seemed like a little much, but the Bloodhounds survived.

The 25-22, 15-25, 25-17,20-25, 17-15 win over Burlington on Tuesday night at Johannsen Gym was the fifth victory of the season for the Bloodhounds.

Fort Madison (5-19 overall, 3-2 Southeast Conference) is 4-0 in five-set matches this season, and after this match and Monday's five-setter over West Hancock, the Bloodhounds could use the rest.

"Oh yeah, definitely," senior hitter Taylor Johnson said.

A three-set sweep would be nice, Johnson said.

"But this feels amazing," she said.

"We love playing five games," Fort Madison coach Kelly Knustrom joked. "The refs are going to not like us. They're going to be like, 'We're not going to do their games. We'll be there all night."

Knustrom, too, would like a sweep, just so it would help the Bloodhounds establish some consistency. But a win is a win, no matter how long it takes.

"They do keep fighting. They do," Knustrom said. "They have the capability to get things done. It's just about finding that consistency, playing level, instead of the up-and-down, up-and-down. We're going to figure it out. But if you can win matches like this, it's a sign that you know how to fight for wins."

"I think we're playing really well, especially together," Johnson said. "We have our moments where we don't do great, but we have a lot of other moments where our chemistry is really good, and we play well together.

Fort Madison got off to strong start, rallying from being down 22-20 in the first set to get that win.

But Burlington (15-14, 2-3) raced to a 10-3 start in the second set and evened the match. Fort Madison controlled the third set, but couldn't sustain the momentum. The Bloodhounds rallied to get within 22-20 before the Grayhounds scored the final three points.

The fifth set was a back-and-forth that Fort Madison finally finished. Burlington fought off two match points before Dayonna Davis' kill gave the Bloodhounds a 16-15 lead. A hitting error by the Grayhounds, though, finished the match.

"I think we didn't let up in the fifth (set)," Johnson said. "That's what we said in the huddle — don't give up, keep swinging hard."

"It was just about staying aggressive," Knustrom said. "When we were aggressive, when we were swinging, we were keeping them out of their system."

Johnson led the Bloodhounds with 12 kills and added two blocks. Davis had 10 kills. Sydney McEntee added nine kills and two blocks. Amy Yasenchok was 21-of-22 serving with five aces. Elle Ruble had 31 digs. Lauryn Helmick added 21 digs and a block. Mara Smith had 39 assists.

"Taylor was great, Dayonna hit the ball well, and I think Sydney is really peaking right now," Knustrom said. "This was a good team effort tonight."

A Resolution to Declare Necessity and Establish an Urban Renewal Area, Pursuant to Section 403.4 of the Code of Iowa and Approve Urban Renewal Plan and Project for the Lee County Urban Renewal Area #2

WHEREAS, as a preliminary step to exercising the authority conferred upon lowa counties by Chapter 403 of the Code of lowa, the "Urban Renewal Law," a county must adopt a resolution finding that one or more slums, blighted or economic development areas exist in the county and that the development of such area or areas is necessary in the interest of the public health, safety or welfare of the residents of the county; and

WHEREAS, it has been proposed to the Board of Supervisors of Lee County, lowa (the "County") that the Lee County Urban Renewal Area #2 (the "Urban Renewal Area") be established on the real property (the "Property") described in Exhibit A to this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the proposal demonstrates that sufficient need exists to warrant finding the Property to be an economic development area; and

WHEREAS, an urban renewal plan (the "Plan") has been prepared for the governance of projects and initiatives to be undertaken within the Urban Renewal Area and which authorizes a certain initial urban renewal project (the "Project") to be undertaken therein consisting of constructing, furnishing and equipping a new emergency medical services building, including an ambulance bay and living quarters; and

WHEREAS, notice of a public hearing by the Board of Supervisors on the question of establishing the Urban Renewal Area and on the proposed Plan and the Project was heretofore given in strict compliance with the provisions of Chapter 403 of the Code of Iowa, and the Board has conducted said hearing on August 21, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the Property lies within the incorporated limits of the City of Keokuk, Iowa (the "City"), and a certain agreement (the "Joint Agreement") has been executed by the City to satisfy the consent requirements of Section 403.17 of the Code of lowa; and

WHEREAS, copies of the Plan, notice of public hearing and notice of a consultation meeting with respect to the Plan were mailed to the City and the Keokuk Community School District; the consultation meeting was held on August 7, 2023; and responses to any comments or recommendations received following the consultation meeting were made as required by law;

NOW, THEREFORE, It Is Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Lee County, Iowa, as follows:

An economic development area as defined in Chapter 403 of the Code of Iowa is found to exist on the Property.

The Property is hereby declared to be an urban renewal area, in conformance with the requirements of Chapter 403 of the Code of Iowa, and is hereby designated the Lee County Urban Renewal Area #2.

The development of the Property is necessary in the interest of the public health, safety or welfare of the residents of the County.

It is hereby determined by this Board of Supervisors as follows:

The Plan conforms to the general plan for the development of the County;

Proposed development in the Urban Renewal Area is necessary and appropriate to facilitate the proper growth and development of the County in accordance with sound planning standards and local community objectives; and C. It is not anticipated that any families will be displaced in connection with the County's undertakings under the Plan. Should such issues arise, then the County will develop a feasible method of relocating any displaced persons into decent, safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations within their means and without undue hardship.

The Plan is made a part hereof and is hereby in all respects approved in the form presented to this Board, and the County is hereby authorized to undertake the projects and initiatives described therein. The Joint Agreement is hereby approved,

and the Chairperson and County Auditor are hereby authorized and directed to execute said Joint Agreement on behalf of the County.

Section 6. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, to the extent of such conflict.

FM looking to rebound from losses

FORT MADISON – Homecoming 2023 takes place at Richmond Stadium Friday night with the County Seat at stake.

The Bloodhounds are looking to right the ship after two lopsided losses in a row, 48-14 to Williamsburg two weeks ago and a 38-7 loss to Davenport Assumption last week on the

Both those teams are among the top teams in the state with Williamsburg holding onto the Class 3A top spot. The Knights had the No. 3 spot after the win Friday.

Both teams are in the top 15 overall teams in the state according to several publications.

But Fort Madison Head Coach Derek Doherty said the Hounds have shown at times they belong in those games, but didn't show it last week.

"We've seen two of the top teams in the state. It hasn't been a lot of fun," Doherty said.

"Some lessons learned there. We've had a lot of conversations and it's made us dig down deep as a staff. Are we doing the right things? We're checking schematics and practice plans and everything. This isn't fun. This isn't what we like."

Doherty said there's a difference between being beaten and losing. He said not only did the Hounds get beaten the last two weeks, but they lost because they didn't put their best out there.

The Hounds managed just 155 yards on offense and more than 60 came on the final drive against the Knights' No. 2 squad.

He's hoping for more this week from his Hounds as they get back to localized football.

"I'm looking at how our guys respond. We've had two bad weeks and weeks we feel like we weren't us. Okay cool, that's what's awesome about this right now is that we get a chance to go and prove to ourselves that we weren't who we are the last two weeks," he said.

"I'm really excited to see how we respond mentally, physically, schematically, everything moving forward."

The Hounds take on Keokuk in their second district game in Class 3A District 4.

Keokuk comes in with a dual-threat quarterback – again – in Brenton Hoard and has an offense built very similar to

what Fort Madison has been running over the past six or seven years.

Fort Madison sees success when quarterbacks can find receivers in short routes, but then take off in the run-pass-option keeping defenses honest.

They've had that going several years back with Will Larson, Landes Williams, Aiden Boyer, and now Marcus Guzman.

Keokuk's Hoard accounts for 15 scores on the year, including four on the ground. He leads the Chiefs in ground yardage with 582 and adds just under 1,000 on the season through the air.

His favorite target may be No. 9 Drew Campbell who's averaging almost 25 yards per reception and has more than 200 yards on the season. But there are two other receivers over 200 yards and another at 160, so Hoard will move the ball around.

The Chiefs are anchored on defense by sophomore Mason Claus who has more than 40 tackles on the year as a 6'1, 185 lb. linebacker. Senior Malachai Douglas is next with 24. Keokuk only has four sacks on the year, so pressure hasn't been a key to the defense, but they can lock up a run game.

"I know a couple things. Josh Roberts is a great coach. This a group they are excited about and they've been waiting for. But we're excited about our guys, too," Doherty said.

"We know we are a good football team, but the problem is we need to go prove it. That's been the message. It's not wholesale getting rid of this or that, we need to go execute and that's on us.

"This should be a really great matchup if you look at it on paper. If you don't get excited about being able to compete no matter who it is, I'm not sure why you're out for football."

The Hounds again will be without junior Brody Cashman who was on the sidelines last week with a knee injury. That leaves Hayden Segoviano with the majority of the workload out of the backfield along with Guzman. Henry Wiseman has been seeing a few carries over the past few weeks.

Segoviano is also the top receiver out of the backfield with 223 yards. Wiseman has four scoring catches. Leif Boeding got into the endzone for the first time last week. He has 190 yards on the season

Segoviano lead the Hounds in tackles from his linebacker spot with 29. Teague Smith, Ike Thacher, and Jamarkus Kline all have more than 20 tackles for Fort Madison.

Pate working to shore up elections

- Voter ID instituted at the polls and on absentee ballot requests.

"In addition to the many steps election officials take each year to ensure safe and secure elections in our state, we have 10,000 Iowans who step up each election to be poll workers," said Secretary Pate and the auditors in a joint statement. "Poll workers are trusted faces in your community, they are your friends and neighbors. Iowans from both sides of the aisle play a key role in protecting the integrity of our vote, and we have the highest respect for their service."



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
