MAXIMUM SECURITY: Anamosa transition sent 121 of worst criminals to ISP

FORT MADISON – After nearly five months of requests for information about the 2023 transition of Anamosa State Prison, Iowa DOC officials have finally responded with information about the impact of the transition on Fort Madison's Iowa State Penitentiary.

According to information from Department of Corrections Communications Director Nick Crawford obtained Thursday, the state transferred inmates into Fort Madison

as a result of a reclassification of Anamosa to a medium security prison.

Pen City Current requested the information back in February when word spread of the transfer of additional maximum security inmates to Fort Madison. That information was received Thursday.

As part of the transition, Crawford said a total of 200 medium-custody inmates were transferred out of ISP in Fort Madison to five other prisons within the state.

Upper river basin expands effort to improve freight mobility

DES MOINES - The Upper Mississippi River Basin Association (UMRBA) is expanding on a regional effort to improve freight mobility through innovative, strategic approaches as well as to promote the inland waterways to improve the nation's overall transportation system.

The Upper Mississippi River System and the Missouri River are vital transportation corridors, connecting the Midwest to the world economy. "Use of the Upper Mississippi and Missouri Rivers for freight supports and improves the flexibility of the entire U.S transportation

system, and increases our economic competitiveness in a global marketplace," says Iowa DOT Director Scott Marler.

"Through UMRBA, the states DOTs work collaboratively to achieve full inte-

LCHD gets new COVID classification

Health Dept. can now treat uninsured and underinsured adults for COVID

LEE COUNTY - Lee County Health Department (LCHD) is now considered a Bridge Access Program provider. This has changed the eligibility requirements on who we are able to provide COVID-19 vaccine to. LCHD will only be able to administer the COVID-19 vaccine to any adult, age 19 and older, who does not have health insurance or whose health insurance does not provide zero-cost access to COVID-19 vaccines. The eligibility requirements for adults (19+) are:

- Uninsured a person who does not have health insurance
- Underinsured a person who has health insurance, but the insurance does not include any vaccines; a person whose insurance covers only selected vaccines; a person whose insurance does not provide first-dollar coverage for vaccines. First-dollar coverage refers to health care services, such as COVID-19 vaccinations, covered pre-deductible and without any cost-sharing.

LCHD will hold a clinic for the uninsured and underinsured ONLY on Monday, October 9 from 2:00-4:00pm at LCHD (#3 John Bennett Drive, Fort Madison). LCHD has received a minimum quantity of vaccine making the clinic a first come first serve basis. There is a new screening and consent form for these new vaccines, and it can be found on the LCHD website (www.leeecountyhd.org) in the COVID Information section.

For those who do not fit these eligibility requirements, or are on Medicaid or Medicare, they need to visit with their



The move made room in Fort Madison to transfer 121 maximum security inmates out of Anamosa to Fort Madison.

Crawford wouldn't elaborate on the details of the transfer, including how and when the transfers took place, but said they were done in the first quarter of

"The transfers of inmates in and out of the Iowa State Penitentiary took place over a several-month period during the first quarter of the year," Crawford said.

Following the transition of the security designation at Anamosa, Iowa DOC director Beth Skinner said the decision to make the transfers came after COVID-19 and with resources being freed up.

"Now that the COVID-19 pandemic has ended, and in conjunction with Iowa's prison population declining, IDOC has the bed space and resources needed to safely conduct and implement this transition," said Skinner.

"This decision was made after much consideration and detailed planning, and we feel certain that now is the time to make this transition. By transitioning Anamosa State Penitentiary to a strictly medium security facility, IDOC can focus on providing even further treatment opportunities for the system's medium-custody inmates, building upon two years of reducing Iowa's recidivism


equipment is in optimal working condition, and maintains ongoing communication with her teachers and family, ensuring that she will always have the support she needs.

But GPAEA audiologists don't stop there. They work tirelessly from birth to age 21, traveling from schools to community health centers and collaborating with families and educators to address individual student needs specific to hearing. Their early identification efforts, evaluation and intervention services, school screenings, and educational support create a holistic framework for success.

GPAEA also employs Teachers of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing who provide services in a variety of ways. "We work as partners, coaching parents to be strong language models for their children with identified hearing difficulties, in classrooms supporting teachers, paraprofessionals, and students, and by providing direct instruction for students with hearing challenges from preschool till the age of 21 in high schools or one of our 4 PLUS programs," explains teacher of the deaf and hard of hearing Maureen Mark.

gration of the inland waterways into the nation's surface transportation system, ensuring that reliable, regularly scheduled, competitive, sustainable services are routine choices for shippers in the Midwest," says Missouri DOT Director Patrick McKenna.

The Navigation Assets Inventory, launched in 2021, is an interactive map that features ports, terminals, boat accesses, and other navigation-related information on Marine Highways 35 and 55, allowing users to search for intermodal access with a certain dock type or storage capacity. The expansion of the Navigation Assets Inventory includes an additional 734 miles of navigable river from Sioux City to St. Louis, including 2 ports, over 50 terminals, and 14 live National Weather Service and U.S. Geological Survey stream gauges.

The expanded Navigation Assets Inventory now includes Marine Highways 35, 55, 29, and 70, creating new opportunities for ports, terminals, and operators to access federal funding, technical support, and other resources to expand or develop new shipping services and make the Missouri and Upper Mississippi Rivers a more cost-effective and self-sustaining transportation route.

UMRBA hosts the Navigation Assets Inventory as part of its efforts to facilitate interstate coordination and leadership on behalf of the five Upper Mississippi River states – Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, and Wisconsin. UMRBA continues to work to strengthen the Upper Mississippi River transportation mobility and utilization and to ensure multi-use management of the Upper Mississippi River System.
