SUPERVISORS: Congresswoman says LCHD funding should still become a reality

LEE COUNTY – Congresswoman Mariannette Miller-Meeks said Monday she still feels strongly about getting funding for Lee County's EMS/public health building.

Miller-Meeks voted against funding the House of Representatives' Ag appropriation bill that included \$2.1 million in funding for the Lee County project. She told Lee County Supervisors at the board's regular meeting Monday the final cuts included in the bill before it got to the House floor were too steep for Iowans, and too indiscriminate.

"The funding for the EMS/Public health project would have probably been eliminated so I voted no on the ag approps bill," Miller-Meeks told the board.

The bill will come back and they're working on that bill now, but we sent a message to our conference frankly that the majority of our debt and deficit is on mandatory spending."

Miller-Meeks said she voted for a bipartisan debt commission to address all spending, especially mandatory spending.

She said that was in a continuing resolution bill that was voted down.

Experience, confidence keys to HTC run at state

Crusaders open state play in quarterfinals at 8:25 Tuesday night at Xtreme

CORALVILLE — Melissa Freesmeier has taken enough teams to the state volleyball tournament that she knows the routine for preparation.

The Holy Trinity coach knows different teams need a different level of attention. This season's version, though, is full of enough experience that the routine is simple.

"This group, they're smart, they're dedicated, and they love the game of volleyball," Freesmeier said. "They know what this is all about."



Holy Trinity, the No. 3 seed in the Class 1A tournament, opens play in Tuesday's 8:25 p.m. quarterfinal against sixth seed Don Bosco at Xtream Arena in Coralville.

The Crusaders (31-10) are making their third consecutive appearance, and they want to stay around a little longer this season after getting eliminated in the quarterfinals last season.

"We really have a ton to prove," said sophomore middle hitter Presley Myers. "Last year, we lost in the quarterfinals, and I think that's really boosting us, pushing us to work hard, and get back to prove that we can do better than we did last year."

It's only the second year the tournament has been at Xtream Arena, but a big stage is a big stage no matter the location.

Holy Trinity, with three seniors and two juniors in their rotation, understands the crucible of the week.


State reports first flu death

DES MOINES - The Iowa Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announces today the first influenza-related death of the 2023-24 respiratory virus season. The individual was an older adult (61 to 80 years) from southern Iowa.

Influenza (flu) strains, along with other respiratory viruses are circulating in the state. Iowa's most recent Respiratory Virus Surveillance Report shows the virus at a low level of activity, and hospitals are currently reporting low patient admission rates. Although flu activity in Iowa is currently low, Iowans can take a few simple precautions to keep themselves and their families healthy throughout the respiratory virus season.

"During respiratory virus season, it's important for Iowans to prioritize their health and the well-being of their community," said State Medical Director Robert Kruse.

Senate's Ag bill should include LCHD funding

Growing the economy and increasing wages and jobs will increase revenues and that's one way to cut the deficit Miller-Meeks said. The other way is to cut spending. That would be hurting the economy in a way that would further increase the deficit and debt, meanwhile hurting what is already considered fly-over country.

"There's a limit to how much you're going to push around the Midwesteners and small states. It will come back and you won't see the deep cuts and we'll be able to vote for that appropriations bill," she said.

The bill would have passed in July with an original proposed 8% cut, she said, and she would have voted for that bill.

But at the end of the debate, overnight, someone added another 14% discretionary cut to the bill. Miller-Meeks said that would cause too much damage to the Midwest and agriculture states and she couldn't support that.

The second-term Representative of Iowa's 1st Congressional District said she was the first person from Iowa's delegation to speak up about the depth of the cuts to the bill.

She said she believes the bill will still come up for a vote in some fashion probably in December after both chambers haggle over the appropriation's components, and she doesn't believe the county will have to reapply for the appropriation again next year.

"It reminded me of what Gov. Culver did when he left office. When he had a 10% across-the-board cut and he didn't really look at anything or where those cuts would be and how they would impact regions," she said.

That was when Miller-Meeks was head of the Iowa Public Health Department. Supervisor Garry Seyb asked when she thought that appropriation could get voted on again. The county is waiting on confirmation of that funding to restart work on the Lee County Health Department/EMS building. That project has been put on hold while the county waits to hear on the appropriation. The project is currently projected at \$5.5 million with \$2.4 million in ARPA funds allocated for the project. The county has also secured a \$975,000 grant from the USDA's Rural Development program and a \$600,000 Iowa Community Development Block Grant. There is also a private fund set up through the North Lee County Community Foundation that could have as much as one million set aside for the project.

Miller-Meeks said she has to go back to Washington D.C. on Tuesday, but said the measure is not on the docket yet.

She said her staff will keep the county up to date on what is happening with the bill. "We're trying to get all those appropriation bills passed by the end of the year, but

it would be nice if we got them done before Thanksgiving," she said. "Part of it is that we have to get the Senate act on those. The Senate has four of our appropriations bills...we're trying to push them to pass those that are

already over there so we don't get a huge omnibus bill."

gooey) or proving a point, I'll take chocolate chip cookies any day.





"I think going into it, we need to stay calm," senior outside hitter Mary Kate Bendlage said. "Sometimes when we go up there, we get there and we're a little jittery. It's a bigger stage, more people. We just need to stay calm, do the things we do in practice, and we'll be just fine."

"I think (playing at Xtream Arena last season) will

give us a feel for the environment," senior Taegan Denning said. "Last year, it was obviously a new place, it was kind of different. But now that we've played there, I think we're a lot more comfortable and we know what to do."

That kind of experience eases the mind of their coach.

"They've been there," Freesmeier said. "You just want them to go in with confidence and just be able to play their best volleyball — leave it out on the court. And, you know, I really think that if we do that, the game is going to go well for us. Right now we're playing at our best, and I hope we can keep that going into tomorrow and then see what happens."

The Crusaders have seized October to earn the program's 16th state tournament berth. They have only lost one set in four postseason matches, and are coming off a three-set domination of 13th-ranked Edgewood-Colesburg last Wednesday.

Holy Trinity's offense is hard to defend. Myers leads the Crusaders with 309 kills. Bendlage had 290. Senior Natalie Randolph has 181 kills while also leading Holy Trinity with 446 assists. Junior Anna Bendlage has 104 kills and 400 assists.

Randolph missed all of last season with a knee injury, and she's been dealing with knee pain all of this season.

"She's playing her best volleyball right now," Freesmeier said. "When you think about just 3 1/2 short weeks

ago, we weren't even sure if she was going to step back on the floor. She was in so much pain, but just to watch her get better and better every night is fun for us. When she's out there with confidence, the kids just thrive off of those things."

Don Bosco (24-16), ranked 10th, has won nine of its last 10 matches. Kennedi McGarvey leads the Dons with 339 kills. Alexis Even has 327 kills. Emily Naughton leads with 62 blocks.

"A lot of their offense comes from the outside," Freesmeier said. "They got two kids that swing really well out there and then they've got a kid in the middle, so they have three solid hitters who they share the ball with. We are a little bigger than they are, which doesn't happen very often, but which is nice.

"Our game plan is to go in and serve aggressively. Move our offense around and try to really keep them on their toes and be the aggressor. And if we do that, I think good things can happen."

That kind of confidence, Myers said, is going to be important.

"I feel at state last year we got down on ourselves," she said. "And you have to have so much confidence going into that gym. It's another team that's just as good as you, maybe better than you. So you have to go in and have your heads high, and know that you can do any-


