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# Christmas Chaos at OFP

**HOLIDAY SHOW:** Playhouse cobbles together holiday production

FORT MADISON -They say the show must go on. Well, the irony abounds.

The holiday production for the Old Fort Players, almost didn't go on with several hurdles hindering the production schedule.

But after last minute-cobbling of cast, and then canceling, the show will go on Dec. 6-8 and 11-13 at the playhouse in downtown Fort Madison.

And the play itself is a theatrical dystopia of sorts with cast members bumbling about lost in the mayhem that would fictionally (and maybe nonfictionally) possibly doom the production.

The Royal Shakespeare Company hasn't arrived as promised to perform their stirring rendition of "A Christmas Carol." So an intrepid band of hapless actors and technicians must put together their own production in only seven hours, according to the production's playbill.

"What a pity that they are not quite up to the task, even though they give it their all. Have you ever experienced backstage mayhem? Well, you haven't seen anything yet! The play focuses on these poor but dedicated thespians doing their best while

# Hellige hits 20 in win over Danville

FORT MADISON - Holy Trinity's boys basketball team held just a one-point halftime lead over Danville in Tuesday's SEI Superconference South Division opener at Shottenkirk Gym.

The Crusaders, though, looked a little tight, and that was brought up in the locker

The result was a third-quarter surge that put Holy Trinity in command, and the Crusaders then had to withstand a late Danville run for a 50-43 win.

Holy Trinity (2-0 overall, 1-0 division) opened the second half with a 17-3 run for a 39-24 lead, the Crusaders' largest of the

"We just kind of refocused at halftime," said Holy Trinity coach John Hellige. "We were trying to get really fine with our sets. Then, in the locker room, we had some senior leadership there — Maddox Rung spoke up and said let's get in our sets, but then just improvise off that. Don't be so robotic, just play basketball.

"And then we went out there and that third quarter was incredible."

"We weren't hitting our shots in the second quarter," said junior Luke Hellige, who scored the first eight points of the third-quarter run and finished with 20. "We really came out strong and hit the shots that we hadn't hit, and I thought that was the difference."

The Bears (0-1, 0-1) had their own run coming. They outscored the Crusaders 14-4 to open the fourth quarter to get within 44-40, and were within 47-43 with 25 seconds left before Luke Hellige hit two free throws and Adam Sobczak one to end it.

"That eighth quarter in two days really wore us down," John Hellige said. "They were in a 1-3-1 (defense) and that affected us. We struggled a bit with that, but we were able to grind the game out and get the win."

It was the second consecutive night the Crusaders finished a win — they closed Monday's 59-50 win over WACO by scoring the last six points.

"We can finish games now," Luke Hellige said. "We couldn't finish games last year we would always come within a couple of points and then couldn't finish. We're doing that this year."



### ICGA members thank Miller-Meeks for fuel act

# Hounds show resilience in win over Davis County

FORT MADISON – Things were about as physical as they could get in a basket-ball game as the Fort Madison Lady Hounds opened their home season with a win Tuesday night over Davis County.

At one point, referee Jason Marlow had to jump in between Taylor Johnson and the Mustangs' Laynee Moore who scuffled in the lane off a rebound.

But that intensity pushed the Hounds to a 47-37 non-conference win. It also resulted in both Johnson and Moore riding the bench for a few minutes.

Fort Madison Head Coach Landon Bentley said he appreciated the intensity, but then the Hounds got down to business.

"We bring intensity. I'm a defensive guy and my big thing is bring the intensity every possession. And when something doesn't go our way, we move on," he said after the game.

"We're not going to dwell on that. It's not us. We're going to play hard. We'll battle with ya, but we're not going to be malicious - we'll stay composed."

Another hurdle the Hounds seem to have cleared is how well senior Irelynd Sargent would react to the reconstructed ligaments in her knee. Sargent blew out her knee last year diving for a ball headed out of bounds and had surgery to repair the damage. Wearing a knee brace, Sargent led the Hounds with 12 points and went to the free throw line 10 times slashing through the Mustangs' physical man defense.

"I rehabbed the knee for about nine months, but I had no pain. I just haven't been active forever. I don't think it's going to be a problem. Sometimes I cramp up a bit, but it's just getting back in shape," Sargent said.

In addition to the dozen points from the floor, Sargent also had several nifty assists off drives around the lane, including a nice bounce pass down low to Halle Menke who converted inside for a 33-22 lead with about four minutes left in the third period.

"I would much rather hit an open teammate than just throw something up there," she said

Menke finished with nine points, just one off a double-double, including a nice left-handed jumper from about 17 feet off the left key. Working mostly inside for the last two years, the jumper isn't normally a shot Bentley wants out of the offense.

The shot came out of an offense the Hounds ran last year, after the first half saw a more inside/outside game working Johnson and Menke in the middle, while Aija Jenkins and Dayonna Davis worked the perimeter with Sargent.

"This was the first team we've run our new offense, but we have some things to work on in practice tomorrow. We had to put the old offense back in and that got us through the second half and worked well," Bentley said.

Davis County would put a small 5-2 run together to open the fourth quarter, down 37-28, to cut the lead to six at 39-33. But Menke would score again inside and then Sargent got the dagger with a steal and layup with 2:59 left to put the

game away for Fort Madison.

Jenkins had 10 points for Fort Madison while Johnson had eight and Davis finished with five.



# Lady Crusaders survive in SEISC win

FORT MADISON - The first few games of the season provide plenty of lessons, and Holy Trinity's girls basketball team learned on Tuesday night how to win games that become a jumbled mess.

The Crusaders' 48-42 victory over Danville at Shottenkirk Gym was what coach Tony Johnson expected.

"They're aggressive," Johnson said of the Bears.
"They're always in your face, they never let you catch your breath or gather yourself."

But the Crusaders (2-0 overall, 1-0 SEI Superconference South Division) showed composure in the final minutes as Danville (0-3, 0-1) cut Holy Trinity's 12-point lead to three with 2:20 to play. The Crusaders, though, made enough plays to finish off the win, with Adalyn Kruse's shot with eight seconds left finally sealing the win.

"It was a really sloppy game with a lot of turnovers," said Holy Trinity senior Mary Kate Bendlage, who led the Crusaders with 27 points. "We probably missed 10 easy shots there in the second half, and that's 20 points that could have helped us really pull away there. It's our second game, though, so there are things we can fix."

"We probably missed 25 shots within three feet of the basket," Johnson said. "If we make half of those it's different."

Holy Trinity seemed to have the game under control when Teagan Snaadt hit a jumper with 3:45 left that put the Crusaders up 44-32. But Danville went on a

9-0 run with two 3-pointers from Macie Wagner and one from Alaina Gourley.

Bendlage got her last points of the night with a 15-foot jumper with 1:40 left that ended the Bears' run. Danville had two chances to cut into the lead again, but could only make 1-of-4 free throws in the span of 13 seconds.

The Crusaders led 24-11 at halftime, then kept the pressure on the Bears behind Bendlage, who had 10 of Holy Trinity's 12 third-quarter points.

Bendlage said Holy Trinity's offense is more balanced this season with the return of senior Natalie Randolph, who had 19 points in Monday's win at WACO and followed that with a nine-point game in this one.

"It just makes it easier with Natalie," Bendlage said. "We're really balanced, and that's tough for teams to defend."

All of Holy Trinity's rotation was part of the volley-ball team that finished second in the Class 1A state tournament. There was no break for the Crusaders, with the first day of girls basketball practice coming four days after the end of the volleyball season.

"A lot of teams had open gyms and conditioning, and we didn't have that," Bendlage said. "But I think that volleyball run really shows our athleticism, and it's carrying over to the basketball court."

"These kids know how to win," Johnson said. "Everything they do is about winning, and they know how to finish. I thought they handled the pressure well tonight, and to get two wins to open the season is a good start."

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
