# City preps for first winter storm

**SNOW:** City sets parking restrictions and sidewalk alerts in wake of first major snowfall


FORT MADISON - The City of Fort Madison is declaring a Snow Emergency because of the anticipated winter storm events over the next 48 hours. The snow emergency will be in effect for all roadways in Fort Madison starting at 8 p.m tonight and will be extended through 8 p.m. Monday January 15.

The National Weather Service is predicting anywhere from 6 to 12 inches of snow locally starting at 6 p.m. Monday through Tuesday

The City of Fort Madison has determined that due to previous years history of the high number of properties not clearing snow from sidewalks, the City will perform removal of ice and snow from abutting owners' property with twelve (12) hours' notice to persons who have not adequately cleared snow from their sidewalks.

# SCC student arrested for shooting vehicle Sunday in FM

FORT MADISON - On the morning of Sunday, January 7th, 2024, Fort Madison officers were dispatched to an address on Florence Drive to a report of criminal mischief.

At that time, it was discovered that an unoccupied vehicle had been shot multiple

times with a firearm. Evidence was recovered at the scene and interviews were conducted. The owner also named a suspect, believing it was perpetrated because of an earlier dispute between the two.

With the assistance of Southeastern Community College staff and West Burlington Police Department, Fort Madison detectives executed a search warrant that same day at

the Blackhawk Tower Apartments in West Burlington. Subsequently, additional evidence was recovered and Angel Joann Maes, age 19, a resident of the SCC housing, was taken into custody.

Maes has been charged with Going Armed with Intent (D felony); Intimidation

with a Dangerous Weapon (D felony); 1st degree Harassment (aggravated misd) and Reckless Use of a Firearm (aggravated misd).

She was subsequently transported to the Lee County Jail where she awaits arraignment in North Lee County District Court.

The public is advised that this was de-

termined to be an isolated event between involved parties, and not a continued threat to the general community.

Also, that charges are merely an accusation of a crime, and the suspect presumed innocent until conviction in a court of law.

# City urges residents to make sure sidewalks are being cleared



requires adjoining property owners to maintain sidewalks free and clear from all snow, ice, and accumulations. Further, subsection 7-3-2 declares that failure to remove snow and ice in a reasonable amount of time is a misdemeanor. Finally, subsection 7-3-3 reads:

7-3-3: ASSESSMENT:

Should snow, ice, or accumulation be permitted to remain upon any sidewalk for more than a reasonable time, the City Engineer, with or without notice to the owner, tenant, or other person in charge of the property abutting upon said sidewalk, shall cause said snow, ice, or accumulations to be removed, and the expenses of removal shall be specially assessed to the abutting property, in accordance with Section 1-6-9 of this Code. (Ord. A-67, 12-28-53; amd. Ord. B-292, 9-4-79)

Therefore, beginning January 15, 2024, the City will begin posting 12-hour notices on non-compliant properties, and begin clearing all sidewalks of snow not adequately cleared by the property owner within that timeframe. Minimum charge for any abatement is \$50.00. All charges will be assessed to the property taxes in the form of a special assessment per City Code 6-4-3(C)(1)(b).





through his nose, was awkward. So, on to the next movie.

"The Color Purple" is out in theaters. It's a remake of the original, "The Color Purple" starring Whoopi Goldberg and Oprah Winfrey, only this time it's a musical. Outstanding! I may have to see "The Color Purple" again. As Ginnie says, "Bring a box of tissue."

"Boys in the Boat" directed by George Clooney is well worth seeing. It had slipped my mind that I read the book years ago, so it was like discovering something I once knew, but forgot. # Riddle takes first place at 157 in Highland's Curtis Invite

CEDAR RAPIDS – Fort Madison's boy wrestlers took 6th place at the Gary Curtis Invitational at Highland High School in Riverside Saturday afternoon.

Nolan Riddle led the Bloodhounds with a title at 157 lbs. Riddle is trying to get back to the IHSAA State Wrestling Tournament after a second day exit in 2023. The senior scored a 14-0 major decision over Washington's Chase Greiner, his second win over Greiner this week, to take the championship and score 28 points for the Hounds.

Riddle went 4-0 on the day with two major decisions and two falls in early wrestling action.

Ike Thacher, wrestling at 190 lbs., and Cory Arnett at 285 lbs. both captured second place with Thacher scoring 22 points and Arnett garnering 20 for the Hounds.

Thacher suffered another loss to WACO's Louden Huisenga, this time by a 5-3 decision. On Thursday, Thacher lost to Huisenga 6-4 in a dual match. Thacher led the match 3-0 90 seconds into the second period, but Huisenga was able to get a reversal before the end of the period to cut into the Bloodhound's lead at 3-2. Huisenga chose the bottom to start period three and scored an escape at 1:20 and then got Thacher compromised for a takedown with :30 left in the match. Huisenga was warned for stalling with 15 seconds left in the match, but Thacher couldn't escape for the 5-3 loss.

Arnett won 2-1 on the day with a pin of Alburnett's Josiah Redel in the quarterfinals after receiving a first-round bye. In the finals, the Hound junior (13-7) won in

an ultimate tiebreaker over West Branch's Logan Wright. The two were tied at one at the end of regulation wrestling. # Kemper, Smith, Sokolik runners-up at girls Highland Invite

HIGHLAND – Fort Madison High School's girls' wrestling team took just six wrestlers to the Highland Invitational Friday evening, but captured 4th place overall.

The Bloodhounds got three 2nd place finished at 100 lbs., 120 lbs., and 130 lbs. when Hailey Kemper, Mara Smith, and Chloe Sokolik all advanced to the championship matches in their respective brackets.

Kemper went 2-1 on the night, scoring pinfalls over Muscatine senior Leah Hill and West Branch freshman Finley Rushton. The two wins put her in the title match against Wilton sophomore Audrey Cummings (24-3). Kemper scored a two-point takedown 25 seconds into the match and held control for about
