Lady Hounds open with win

FORT MADISON - It's been almost two years since Natalie Randolph scored a goal. Which is why she enjoyed getting the final goal of Fort Madison's 4-0 win over Mediapolis on Thursday night to open the season. Randolph's goal with 32:14 left in the match off an assist from Reilynn Turnbull capped the night for the Bloodhounds, who showed off the potent offense they were expected to have this season. "It was definitely exciting," said Randolph. "I was trying to get one, and I got a good pass from Reilynn. So it was good." Randolph hadn't scored since her four-goal night on May 20, 2022 in a regional first-round match against Keokuk. She missed all of last season as she recovered from a knee injury. Randolph, who played volleyball and basketball at Holy Trinity this season, wasn't sure how she would be able to play with the brace on her right knee. "I definitely thought about that," she said. "Soccer is very hard, with driving into the ground and stuff. But luckily my recovery is going well." "Coming back after an ACL injury, it's just gaining confidence," Fort Madison coach Carrie Burken said. "From the first practice until now, she's

Alliant gives \$145K to tree program

Clear Lake, Jefferson, Oelwein receive grants for Community Tree grants

CEDAR RAPIDS – Alliant Energy named 41 Iowa communities, including Clear Lake, Jefferson and Oelwein, to receive grants totaling nearly \$145,000 through the company's Community Tree Planting program, part of its One Million Trees initiative.

"Our commitment to improving the environment and supporting the communities we serve is unwavering," said May Farlinger, Vice President Customer and Community Engagement, Alliant Energy. "The Community Tree Planting program grants awarded will help these Iowa communities achieve tree restoration goals, improve energy efficiency and provide environmental benefits for generations to come."

Alliant Energy partners with Trees Forever to help communities develop, select and plant a diverse mix of trees. A tree expert helps communities select the best species for their areas and create care and maintenance plans to ensure the new trees have long, healthy lives.

"Our partnership with Alliant Energy has fueled decades of tree planting projects in communities across the state of Iowa," said Deb Powers, Trees Forever interim CEO. "Trees provide so many benefits to these towns and that's reflected in the sustained interest of the volunteer groups to partner with Trees Forever and Alliant Energy."

Since 1990, Trees Forever and Alliant Energy have awarded over \$7.85 million in grants and planted more than 1.1 million trees through their partnership and programs in Iowa and Wisconsin.

Across Iowa, communities are eligible to apply for grants up to \$5,000 to fund new trees.

Governor to send troops, troopers to Operation Lone Star

DES MOINES – Governor Reynolds has announced that eight troopers and two sergeants from the Iowa Department of Public Safety (DPS) will deploy March 31, 2024 to Texas in support of Operation Lone Star and the Texas Department of Public Safety. The deployment will last 28 days and conclude on April 27, 2024.

The Iowa National Guard will deploy on two missions to support Operation Lone Star. The first deployment will begin April 1, 2024 and conclude May

3, 2024 with 110 personnel supporting the Texas Military Department's security objectives. The second deployment will begin April 1, 2024 and conclude September 30, 2024 with 5 personnel providing ground vehicle maintenance and public affairs support.

Gov. Kim Reynolds released the following statement regarding the state's support of Operation Lone Star:

"President Biden and his Administration have failed to protect the sovereignty of our borders and the safety of the American people. What Texas faces is nothing short of an invasion with historic levels of illegal immigrants and illicit drugs entering our country. Now, every state is a border state, and with that comes a duty to protect the people of Iowa.

"These deployments will help Texas

State's stocked trout active on worm-and-bobber rigs

DES MOINES - The following is the Iowa Department of Natural Resource's weekly report on fishing activity in south-east Iowa.

Big Hollow Lake

Water temperature is around 45 degrees. Black Crappie - Fair: Anglers are picking up a few crappies out from the edge of the tree line along the south side of the lake.

East Lake Park Pond

Rainbow trout were stocked last week. Rainbow Trout - Good: It takes the trout a little while to settle down when they are stocked in this lake. Try worm and bobber or a little jig. You need a valid fishing license and pay the trout fee to fish for or possess trout.

Lake Belva Deer

Water temperature is 44 degrees; it

should get a little higher the next couple of days. Black Crappie - Slow: Slowly drift a slip bobber and minnow along the edge of the trees out from the beach down to the north boat ramp. Largemouth Bass - Slow: Try soft plastics or jigs with trailers along the northside out of the wind where the sun is warming the water a little more than the rest of the lake.

Lake Darling

Water temperature is 44 degrees. Little angling pressure so far this week; warmer weather in the forecast should increase fishing activity. Largemouth Bass - Fair: With the warmer weather in the forecast, look for bass along the base of the rocks on the north side of the lake. Use jigs and soft plastics that mimic crawdads worked slowly.

Lake Geode

Water temperatures is 45 degrees.

Largemouth Bass - Slow: Forecast warmer weather should put the bass back in shallower water. Work the top of the mounds across from the beach; don't overlook the back side of the in-lake silt dam.

Lake of the Hills

1800 rainbow trout were stocked last week. Rainbow Trout - Good: Just a few anglers were out last Wednesday fighting the wind; trout were biting just about as fast as they were coming off the truck. Still plenty of them left. Catch their attention with small spinners or jigs. You need a valid fishing license and pay the trout fee to fish for or possess trout.

Lost Grove Lake

Water temperature is 43-45 degrees. It's been windy this week. Largemouth Bass

- Fair: Anglers are picking up some bass along the edges of the deeper water in 12-16 foot of water slow trolling deep diving crankbaits.

Skunk River (Rose Hill to Coppock)

Skunk River's water level continues to drop. Still have enough to canoe or kayak; take precautions as the water is still really cold (40-44 degrees).

Wilson Lake

900 rainbow trout were stocked last week. Rainbow Trout - Good: Trout have settled down to their new home. Look for them around the cedar trees and culvert piles just out from shore. You need a valid fishing license and pay the trout fee to fish for or possess trout.

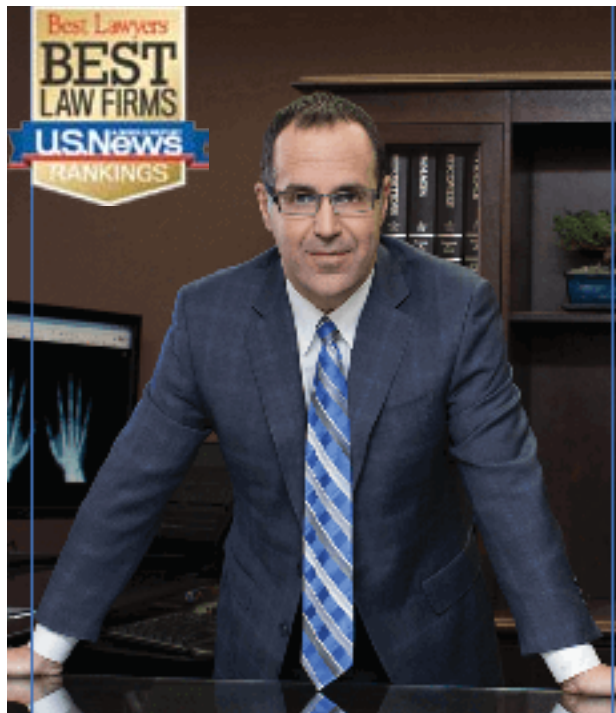

Randolph scores in first match back

gaining more and more confidence. When you have that sort of injury, and then you come out, you're not sure how it's going to go, how it's going to feel. And so every day she gets more comfortable, more and more like the form she was before she got injured."

The biggest change, Randolph said, was learning how to play with new teammates up from like sophomores Hadley Wolfe and Halle Menke.

"It's definitely an adjustment, a very different team than what I played with before," she said. "So I feel like in practice we've been trying to connect a lot, see what different people like, and it's definitely helped. And I think it stood out on the field tonight.

"It's definitely a lot of communication. It's definitely working and talking through it."

Randolph and defender Irelynd Sargent, who is also coming off an ACL injury last season, went through some of the same issues wearing braces on their right knees.

"She's playing a little more of a different position than before — she's in the center and not on the outside," Burken said. "So it's a little bit different. But it's the same

April is Distracted Driving month in Iowa

DES MOINES, Iowa – April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month. April 1-8, the Governor’s Traffic Safety Bureau (GTSB) is partnering with law enforcement across Iowa to curb the alarming and unsafe trend of distracted driving. To deter multitasking while driving, GTSB is launching a new campaign targeting overconfident drivers and reminding everyone: No One is a Good DISTRACTED Driver.

Distracted driving is a primary law in Iowa, meaning law enforcement can stop any driver who is texting (reading, writing, or sending) or using any portable electronic, device unless the motor vehicle is at a complete stop off the traveled portion of the road.

In a 2023 GTSB State Fair survey of over 1,450 Iowans, 51% admitted to always or sometimes driving with a cell phone in hand. Based on the number of registered drivers in Iowa, that translates to over 1.2 million distracted drivers. Law enforcement is cracking down on distracted driving. In

2023, over 9,000 drivers were issued citations for illegal use of an electronic device while driving compared to 1,438 in 2022.

“When talking with Iowa drivers, a common sentiment is believing they can manage many things behind the wheel,” says GTSB Bureau Chief Brett Tjepkes. “During one focus group, a participant said they drive better when texting because it forces them to pay attention to the road. This is ridiculous and not true. Driving requires our full attention. The reality is, No One is a Good DISTRACTED Driver.”

Beginning April 1, motorists will see increased law enforcement efforts to educate those found illegally using an electronic device. To limit distractions, GTSB encourages drivers to enable the ‘driving’ focus feature on their phone and use hands free features.

The Governor’s Traffic Safety Bureau works with city, county, state, and local organizations to develop and implement strategies to reduce deaths and injuries on Iowa’s roadways using federally funded grants.

Fertilizer spill kills 750,000 fish in Nishnabotna River

RED OAK – The fertilizer spill near Red Oak in Montgomery County earlier this month killed nearly all the fish in an almost 50-mile stretch of the East Nishnabotna River to the Missouri border.

On March 11, NEW Cooperative, Inc. in Red Oak notified the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) of a release occurring on-site. Approximately 1,500 tons (265,000 gallons) of liquid nitrogen fertilizer (32% solution) discharged into a drainage ditch, then into the East Nishnabotna River. The release occurred due to an aboveground storage tank valve left open for the weekend.

Upon learning of the release, DNR staff from the Environmental Field Office worked with the NEW Cooperative staff to stop the release and began cleanup efforts. DNR Fisheries staff began investigating the impacts to the Nishnabotna River.

DNR Fisheries staff documented the fish kill occurring in all 49.8 miles of the East Nishnabotna and Nishnabotna Rivers downstream of the spill. The kill continued in Missouri’s portion of the Nishnabotna River and ended near the confluence with the Missouri River.

DNR Fisheries staff used methods outlined in American Fisheries Society, Special Publication 35, and 571 Iowa Administrative Code Chapter 113 to evaluate the extent of the fish kill and estimate the number of dead fish. The

rules and the use of the American Fisheries Society’s methodology are authorized by Iowa Code section 481A.151.

The fish kill count as of March 28th is below. Investigations of the release’s impact to other aquatic life are ongoing.


Cleanup efforts at the NEW Cooperative facility are ongoing. Contaminated soils continue to be removed from the facility and from around a levee west of the facility. The contaminated soils will be land applied at approved locations, at agronomic rates consistent with Iowa law. Additionally, NEW Cooperative is pumping water from the east side of the levee. The pumped water will be stored in on-site holding tanks until land application can occur. A third-party consultant is collecting samples of the water-fertilizer mixture to determine accurate land application rates.

Per Iowa Code section 455B.186, a pollutant cannot be discharged into a river without a permit. DNR field staff are working with the DNR’s Legal Services Bureau to determine next steps with regards to enforcement action and restitution for lost aquatic life. The DNR will continue to monitor cleanup efforts.

Field test results indicate ammonia levels are declining in the river. The DNR continues to advise people to avoid recreating on the river and collecting and/or eating dead fish found on or near the river.
